What is Title I?

The goal of Title I is to provide a high quality education for every child and is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools. The program serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools each year.

is a Title I school

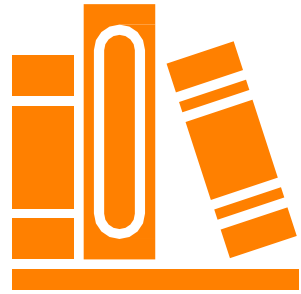


...and how does it work?

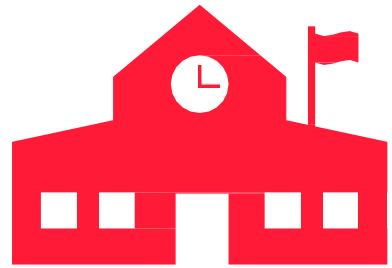
- 1** The federal government provides funding to states each year for Title I.
- 2** The Florida Department of Education sends the money to the district.
- 3** The school district identifies eligible schools and provides Title I funds.
- 4** **Village Elementary** implements a schoolwide program.

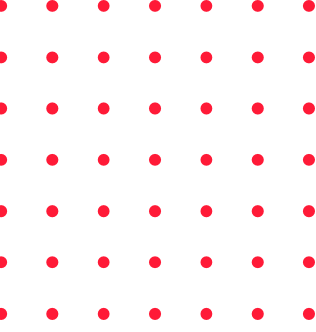

Parent's Rights

- **Be involved and request regular meetings to express your opinions and concerns;**
- **Receive information on your child's level of achievement on assessments like FAST/EOC assessments in reading/language arts, mathematics, and science;**
- **Request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher; and**
- **Be informed if your child is taught by a non-highly qualified teacher for four or more consecutive weeks.**





School Accountability Report Card

School Public Accountability Report (SPAR) provides parents and the community with important information about each public schools:

- Demographic data;
- School safety and climate for learning information;
- Academic data;
- Graduation rates;
- Class sizes;
- Teacher and staff information;
- Curriculum and instruction descriptions and
- Postsecondary preparation information

Eradicates Common Core from our classrooms



Builds upon Florida's school accountability by meeting the needs of and empowering educators, parents and students



Focuses on real time results to drive decisions that set everyone up for success before it's too late





Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (F.A.S.T.)

- Reduces testing time, and minimizes the stress of testing to three much shorter “check-in” assessments in the Fall, Winter, and Spring.
- Each subject-area test will be administered in one day. It is recommended that each student take only one subject test a day.
- PM1 and PM2 will be used for informational purposes only (not in accountability); PM3 will be a summative assessment used for accountability purposes.

Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (F.A.S.T.)

- Grades VPK-2 : Computer-adaptive; VPK and K aligned to Florida Early Learning & Developmental Standards. Grades 1 & 2 aligned to B.E.S.T standards.
- Grades 3-10 : Computer-adaptive test; aligned to B.E.S.T standards.
- Grades 4-10 (FAST Writing): Will be reported separately from Reading, not contributing to ELA score. Computer-based in all assessed grades.

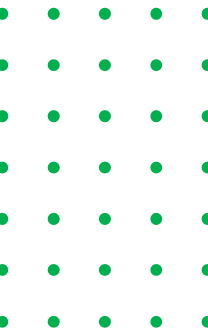

Title I Programs Provide Supplemental Support



- Smaller classes;
- Additional teachers and paraprofessionals;
- Additional training for school staff;
- Extra time for instruction (after school ELO camps);
- Parental Engagement Activities; and/or
- A variety of supplemental teaching methods and materials.

Title I Funds

Village Elementary is provided \$325,308 to pay for services and programs for our students.

- ✓ School City Assessment Program
- ✓ Instructional Materials for ELO
- ✓ Math Coach, Primary Resource Teacher
- ✓ Community Liaisons





Parent and Family Engagement Plan Requirements

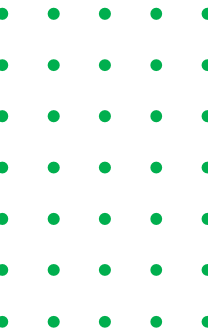
