### KINDERGARTEN

All children were tested online in FLKRs and iReady to measure what they learned in VPK. Children will now be tested in reading with the Benchmark Assessment System (BAS). This will help to identify their strengths and weaknesses in reading and how we can better meet their needs. Please continue to work with your child to truly master letters, sounds, and concepts of print. High Frequency Words are sent home for each reading unit, so the children will be able recognize, read, and write these everyday common words. These are strategies that will help your child become a successful reader and writer!

Throughout the month of September and into October, the children have been learning about our five senses and how they help us in our daily lives. We have been doing fun activities for our senses study. We are now learning about our world and geography. So many things to learn in school!

SECOND GRADE

In Reading, we have been practicing how to ask and answer questions in both literature and informational text. Asking Who? What? Where? When? Why? and How? during and after reading text will help students find the evidence to support their answers.

We have finished our first chapter in Math and will continue to reinforce addition and subtraction facts throughout the year.

We are excited to have new Science resources and will be planning fun, science experiments.

We continue to learn about Social Studies as we read and learn about important informational text.



Autumn Thoughts from The Third Grade Team

Fall into Reading! Third grade children are reading chapter books. One way to help your child is to get them started with an interesting book series such as Junie B. Jones, Magic Tree House, Magic School Bus, A to Z mysteries, Judy Moody and Horrible Harry.

We are moving in Math; you can help your child by reviewing addition, subtraction, and multiplication facts daily. Third grade students are learning about data and multiplication.

Family Challenge: Create a family graph. Some topics to graph are favorite books, favorite deserts, favorite movie, or least favorite chore. Make it fun and math graphing is done. Create multiplication problems. If one apple cost \$.89, how much will 3 apples cost? (You can use repeated addition or multiplication).

Spring ahead with COMPUTER TIME, so you don't FALL behind in Reading and Math.

The sites listed below will help your child review reading and math skills. Reflex Math is an app, you can put it on your cellphone and your child can practice their facts at any time. i-Ready will help your child understand and review reading skills that will be tested. # Classroom Happenings

### FOURTH GRADE

In October, fourth grade will continue working on literature and informational texts: comparing and contrasting people, events, and stories, as well as learning about scientific, historical and technical texts.

Fourth grade students are also working on Opinion Writing. We are working on developing strategies for essay writing.

Please continue to have your child read a minimum of 20 minutes daily.

In math, we are learning many strategies for multiplication: comparison models, place value, estimating products, distributive property, expanded form, partial product, mental math, and regrouping. Students may use what multiplication strategy works for them. It is recommended that 4th grade continues to practice multiplication and division fluency (0-12).



### FIFTH GRADE



Wow! October is going to be a whirlwind of a month! Biztown is on October 23rd. Students need to bring a bagged lunch. It is an all day field trip. Your child will be placed in a business and have a specific job title with activities to complete for their position. They will learn how to balance a checkbook, and write a check. The purpose of this activity is to increase financial literacy in children so that they can become fiscally responsible adults. In order to make this very fun day at work, we will need quite a few parent volunteers to run the businesses. Your job as a volunteer is just to simply chaperone one of the businesses. The kids do all of the work, so it's really a fun and easy day to spend with your 5th grader.

GRADE will be starting at the end of the month. We will be learning about gangs and drug resistance once a week during GRADE. Students may periodically come home with homework in their GRADE folders. Teachers will frequently be collecting the folders and activities as social studies grades, so be sure your child is completing all activities as required.

Have a spooktacular Halloween, and please remember, while candy is fun at home, it's not so fun when it ends up stuck to books and smeared on homework, so please don't allow your children to bring it to school.



Utilizing labels and visuals also supports communication and fosters a desired outcome. If I am able as a teacher to show the visual for our class rules while getting in line for lunch, and the student then complies, I am now in the position of REWARDING and shaping those appropriate behaviors. Student is successful and learning expectations in a prevention / proactive way, vs in a reactive capacity.

Counselor's Corner - Ms. Molinelli

In October we focus on the character trait of Responsibility. Responsibility is being reliable and dependable to self and others. At first, children usually do what they are supposed to do to please another person or avoid punishment. As they grow, we want our children to learn to act responsibly and with self-control because it is the right thing to do. Try to give your child a simple task at home for which he or she is responsible; making a bed, clearing the table, feeding a pet, or another age-appropriate task are some examples. Praise your children when they successfully complete the task and talk about what happened when they don't. As children mature they need to be responsible for completing and handing in their classroom assignments. Most will need guidance from parents and guardians, as well as reminders until this becomes routine.

In October I will be visiting all kindergarten and first grade students for classroom lessons. In kindergarten we will be discussing self-esteem and diversity, and in first grade we will be focusing on personal safety. Please ask your first graders to show you what they bring home from the Child Safety Matters program. Along with a parent letter, they will be receiving a pencil and a refrigerator magnet to reinforce the safety rules that they learned in class.

October is also the month we focus on Anti-Bullying and Red Ribbon activities. Students will be participating in Red Ribbon day in specials on October 26th. Students in grades 2-5 will be participating in assemblies on October 5th for an initiative called "Start with Hello." This program encourages positive interactions and a feeling of community among students. We will also be discussing internet safety with our older students.

VPK will be participating in Health screenings (Speech, hearing and vision) on October 30th and 31st. They will also be participating in the Swim Central Lessons from October 15th through October 26th.

VPK and Pre-K will participate in the Kindergarten in-house field trip - Fantasy Theater Monster Tales on October 30th. Information will be forthcoming.





### LITERACY COACH



Thank you to our fabulous Sandpiper parents! Sandpiper teachers have so many positive things to say about your efforts to help your children improve their reading, math and study skills. Frequently, parents ask me for suggestions regarding how to respond to their child's reading errors. I have included some ideas to make your reading at home helpful and enjoyable.

Based on the way most of us were taught to read, we usually tell our children to "sound it out" when they come to an unknown word. While phonics (pronouncing letter sounds) is an important part of reading, reading for understanding is the primary goal. To produce readers who monitor and correct themselves as they read, the following prompts are recommended.

- o Give your child a wait time of 5-10 seconds. See what your child attempts to do on his own.
- o "What would make sense there?"
- o "What do you think that word could be?"
- o "Use the picture to help you figure out what the word could be."
- o "Skip over the word and read to the end of the sentence (or paragraph). Now what do you think the word is?"
- o "Substitute (or put in) a word that you think would make sense there."
- o "I think you read that word on another page. Let's see if we can find it."
- o "Look at how that word begins. Start with that sound and try to read the rest of the word."
- o Tell your child the word.
- o Ask your child to tell you about what he/she has just read.



Most importantly, focus on what your child is doing well and encourage his/her attempts. Nightly reading practice is important for your child's reading progress. Make sure to include some time for the simple pleasure of reading aloud to your child. Reading is supposed to be fun!

### The Power of Dads

To celebrate the impact that dads have on the lives of their children, the Florida Department of Education has designated Wednesday, September 26, 2018 as *Dads Take Your Child to School Day*.

Children without involved dads are three times as likely to find themselves in the juvenile justice system before the age of 18 compared to those with involved dads.

When dads are involved in a child's life and help to care for their children, the children feel loved and valued and are less likely to seek love elsewhere. Therefore, children with involved dads have lower cases of teenage pregnancy and peform better later on in life.

These results are the same across the board, even with dads with little formal education. One of the strongest predictors of a child's language competence is the father's vocabulary.

### Families Prepared for Disasters

In Florida, the month of September is often a time for tropical storms and hurricanes. Now is the time to make sure your family will be safe if a tropical storm or hurricane affects your community. September is National Disaster Preparedness Month and there are many resources available to help your family prepare for hurricanes and other disasters. Planning ahead can make a big difference in your family's safety during a hurricane and in your family's quick recovery after the storm has passed.

Preparation before a hurricane protects your family. Make sure you sign up to get local weather alerts and warnings on your phone and other mobile devices. Have lots of batteries and battery operated lights, flashlights, weather radios and fans. Have plenty of water and nonperishable food for your family. Watch local news and weather reports for information on storms and evacuation notices. Make an evacuation plan with a list of different evacuation routes and a family emergency communication. plan. Have your children make a communication plan as well. Secure a place to stay (family, friends, hotels, shelters) until it is safe to return home. If you have a pet, have a plan for your pet as well. Have emergency bags for all family members packed and ready to go if needed. Remember to include medicines, special food needed, first-aid supplies and essentials for children and babies. Have a waterproof container or pouch for financial, medical, insurance, legal, and educational documents and records to take with you if you evacuate. Protect your property as best you can by turning off gas or electricity to stoves and water heaters, board up windows and anchor outside objects that may blow away or cause damage to your house. You may want to use FEMA's hurricane preparedness checklist to make sure you have all of the essential supplies you may need if no stores are open after the hurricane.

During the storm, evacuate if advised by local officials. If you stay at home, keep your family on the lowest level of your home, in an interior room, and away from all windows and doors. If there is flooding after the storm move to a higher level. Do not drive through high water or flooded streets. Call 9-1-1 if there is a life-threatening situation. Limit the use of your phones and other battery operated devices to save the batteries to contact officials, family and friends after the storm.



Ready Wrigley: An App for Kids

The Ready Wrigley mobile application designed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) teaches children what to do in emergency situations. Important information about emergencies is designed using age-appropriate language and activities for children to learn about disaster preparedness and response.

This mobile app is an adaptation of the Ready Wrigley activity book series for children, ages 2-8. The app uses the Ready Wrigley storybook, coloring book, and activities. Children can join the preparedness pup as she helps teach them and their families how to be safe during an emergency through fun games and activities!

Download the app for free on the Apple App Store.

After the storm, if you evacuated, return home only after local authorities determine it is safe to do so. If you remained at home or return home, do not drink tap water unless local officials report that the water is safe to drink. Do not go into damaged buildings until the buildings are inspected by officials. Watch for downed power lines, trees, poles and other debris that may be dangerous. Keep your children away from standing water, stormwater drains and other dangerous sites. Make sure to throw away all raw food that was frozen and has thawed.

Children will be frightened during the storm and may be upset when they see the damage the storm has done in the community. If your family experiences the loss of or injury to a family member or loss of housing as a result of the storm, your child may need counseling to deal with these traumatic events. Be calm and reassuring during and after the storm and explain to your child how your family plans to recover from the damages or losses caused by the storm. Many communities have health professionals and mental health counselors onsite after a disaster to help children and adults find ways to cope with their feelings and fears.

### Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week

September 23rd -29th

Take time to think about the dangers of children traveling in motor vehicles. Does your child travel in an age- and size-appropriate car seat, booster seat or use a seat belt? Using safety seats and seat belts can reduce the risk of serious or fatal injuries to children involved in accidents. Proper car seats for infants (birth to 12 months) reduces the risk of death in a motor vehicle accident by 71% and toddlers (1 to 4 years) by 54%. When children aged 4 – 8 years ride buckled up in a proper size booster seat, the risk of serious injuries in an accident is reduced by 45% compared with seat belt use alone. Seat belt use by older children reduces the risk of death or serious injuries in vehicle accidents by 50%.

From these statistics, the benefits of having your child in the proper size safety seat is obvious. If you do not know which type of safety seat or booster seat is the best one for your child, the Florida Department of Highway Safety has guidelines for the type of safety seat or booster seats required for infants, toddlers and young children. There is also a Champion for Safety children's activity sheet with rules for being a safe passenger on the website.

Safe Kids Worldwide has worked with General Motors to create the <u>Ultimate Car Seat Guide</u>. It is available online in English and Spanish. You enter your child's first name, date of birth and weight in pounds. When you submit this information, it takes you to a page that tells you the type of car seat that is safest for your child. It explains how to install the car seat or booster seat and how to tell if it is the correct fit for your child. There are "bonus tips" on each page for additional information. Next, if your child is in a forward facing car seat, you will get information on when to move your child into a booster seat. If you have more than one child, you can find all the information you need for each child to keep them safe.

Children who bond with their grandparents have a better sense of physical and emotional safety, know more about their cultural heritage and family history and develop a better sense of trust and independence than children who do not have a strong relationship with grandparents.

Researchers have shown that a strong grandparentgrandchild relationship results from:

- The child feeling a sense of emotional closeness to his grandparent.
- The child having regular contact with her grandparent.
- The grandparent being a source of social support.

Most new parents are overwhelmed by all of the information they receive on ways to feed babies, how to bathe babies, how to soothe a crying baby and what kind of bed, car seat and toys are safe for babies. All of this is important for you to know. You may find it easier to have a list of ways you can keep your baby safe as she grows and begins to crawl and walk. <a href="Safe Kids Worldwide">Safe Kids Worldwide</a> is a great site to find simple instructions and lists to "baby-proof" your home and prevent accidents that may harm your child.

Babies and toddlers are curious and active; it can be challenging to keep them safe while allowing them to explore and learn. Safe Kids Worldwide has many resources and safety checklists for babies and toddlers such as the High 5 Baby Safety Checklist and videos. The Can You Spot the Risks video helps you learn to recognize threats to your child's safety around your home. There are videos on car seats, water safety, heat strokes, medicine safety, toy safety, safe play, safe sleep and other safety concerns.

Safe sleep is a priority for parents of newborns. Learn to prepare a safe sleeping environment for your newborn. Watch the <u>Safe Sleep video</u> for information about safe sleep practices. <u>Keeping Babies Safe</u> offers crib safety tips, recall information on <u>baby products</u> and safety newsletters for parents. For information from the American Academy of Pediatrics on sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) visit <u>healthychildren.ors</u> and read the Recommendations for Infant Sleep Safety.



Children ages 0 - 12 months

- A firm mattress and fitted sheet are all you need for your baby's crib. Remove blankets and toys.
- Learn to use your child's car seat the right way. Use this checklist to help.
- Make sure you have both a working smake alarm and a carbon monoxide alarm on every level of your home, and in all sleeping areas. Test the alarms to make sure they work.
- Place your baby's crib and other furniture away from windows and blinds. Your baby is safer without any strings or cords within reach.
- Set your water heater to 120° F to avoid scalds.

### What Grandparents Need to Know

Many grandparents babysit their grandchildren on a regular basis or have the grandchildren visit to give their parents a break occassionally. Many child care practices have changed since grandparents had their children years ago. Make sure you share safety tips and information abour SIDS with grandparents so they can make their homes safe for your children.



Safe Sleep brochures for grandparents are available from the Safe to Sleep campaign as well as videos for grandparents to watch that explain the best way for babies to sleep. You can order a free 20-page booklet, Safe Sleep for Your Grandbaby, that helps grandparents and other care givers learn to reduce the risk of SIDS and other sleep related causes of infant deaths when caring for infants. Most grandparents will welcome a chance to learn ways to keep their grandchildren safe.

# Updated Rainy Day Dismissal Procedures

#### Rainy Day Dismissal Procedures

In an effort to improve the safety and efficiency of our Rainy Day Dismissals, the following steps will be implemented.

All walkers and bike riders automatically become car riders. Walkers and bike riders will only be allowed to walk or bike home if it is deemed by administration that the heavy rain/lightning is no longer an issue.

- 1. All ASD Special Programs, VPK, Pre-K, Kindergarten and 1st EXCEPT for bus riders and Sandpiper After Care students will go to the cafeteria and will be dismissed to parents from that location. Parents will need to park their cars and come onto campus to pick their children up.
- 2. **All 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> graders EXCEPT for bus riders and Sandpiper After Care** will go to the media center. Parents will need to park their cars and come onto campus to pick their children up.
- 3. All 4th and 5th grade students EXCEPT for bus riders and Sandpiper After Care WITHOUT younger siblings will remain in North Car Loop and will be dismissed from that area. Parents will remain in their cars and students will be dismissed to you one at a time as you pull forward to the gate nearest the canal.
- 4. **All 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students EXCEPT for bus riders and Sandpiper After Care WITH** younger siblings will go to the location of where their YOUNGEST sibling is.
- All bus riders (BCPS and Day Care) will go to room 905. These students will be dismissed as their bus arrives.
- 6. All Sandpiper After Care students will be dismissed and go to After Care as always.
- Parents All faculty and staff members will be occupied monitoring student safety. Students in 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> <u>WILL NOT</u> be sent to the cafeteria if they have younger siblings in VPK or Kindergarten. These students are much too young to be walking the campus looking for a younger sibling. <u>If you have children in multiple grade levels</u>, you will need to make multiple stops to pick your children up.


