CONTEST DESCRIPTION:

Celebrate Literacy Week 2021 will include a contest featuring student-produced submissions. This year's contest will focus on reading and writing while giving a nod toward civics. Districts will be invited to participate in the contest by creating a written proposal. Students will be able to draw on information and inspiration from texts included in An Educator's Guide to Understanding the Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards: 4 year olds to Kindergarten, Commissioner Corcoran's Recommended Reading List and/or B.E.S.T. ELA Standards Civics Booklist.

- Prekindergarten Grade 2 Read with a family member or friend a civics-related book from <u>An Educator's Guide to</u> <u>Understanding the Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards: 4 year olds to Kindergarten, Commissioner</u> <u>Corcoran's Recommended Reading List</u> (page 244), or <u>Florida's B.E.S.T. Standards Civics Booklist</u> (page 168). Illustrate what was learned and include a dictated or written paragraph describing the illustration. Book examples:
 - Police Officers on Patrol, by Kerstin Hamilton and R.W. Alley
 - Why Should I Listen, by Claire Llewellyn
 - I Pledge Allegiance, by Bill Martin Jr. and Michael Sampson
 - The Very First Americans, by Cara Ashrose
 - D is for Democracy: A Citizen's Alphabet, by Elissa Grodin
- **Grades 3 5** Read a book from <u>Florida's B.E.S.T. Standards Civics Booklist</u> (starting on page 168) and draw on information and inspiration from the book and write a proposal on how you would like to affect change.
- Secondary (Middle and High) Read texts from <u>Florida's B.E.S.T. Standards Civics Booklist</u> (starting on page 170) and draw on information and inspiration to write a proposal on how you would like to affect change. Secondary submissions should demonstrate at least 3 of the following:
 - An understanding of rights and responsibilities as Florida and American citizens
 - A sense of civic pride
 - An understanding of the process for advocating properly with government officials.
 - Student use of primary source documents to understand the philosophical underpinnings of the American Republic
 - Knowledge of the United States' governing philosophies and understanding of United States civic history

Winners will be chosen based on the following:

- Creativity of idea
- Feasibility of idea
- Overall quality of written text

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

- Only one submission per grade band may be submitted per district, totaling 4 submissions. Post must have a clear theme or central message.
- Post must be a student created product that follows district <u>Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook</u>.
- By submitting a student created post into the **2021 Celebrate Literacy Week Contest**, you are releasing publication and talent presentation rights to the Florida Department of Education and are certifying that the work is free of copyright violations.
