<u>Math Department</u>

Teachers in the Math department are working in their PLC groups to develop a crunch-time plan in preparation for the upcoming FSA tests. We are reviewing district provided resources and determining which of these resources best fit the needs of our students, so that we can create review and practice materials to get our students ready for their MATH FSA. We are also working with the ELA department on an instruc-

tional workshop that will address our bubble students, and the skills they may be lacking, in an effort to make improvements on our scores, as stated in our SIP plan.

Social Studies

The History Fair is completed. The winners will be announced at our next meeting. The Geography Bee was conducted on January 10th. The top five students from each teacher went on to round two on January 11th. The top scoring students from round two will move on to the third round which determines who goes to the county level. Results will be announced at our February meeting.

6th grade has started their unit on

Rome. Discussing the Roman Republic, representative democracy, Roman gods, Punic Wars, then they will move into the Roman Empire.

7th grade is continuing with the three branches of government and will begin comparing the Florida Constitution with the US Constitution.

8th grade finished the American Revolution and has started discussing the Early Presidents of the United States.



BTU Stewards have assisted teachers by request with questions and issues. Administration has been receptive to listening and problem solving through these issues. Negotiations between BTU and the District continue. There has not been agreement on salary negotiations at this time. Several guest speakers are scheduled and include a television meteorologist, National Weather Service, and a commercial airline pilot. Future studies include: climate change, storms and other natural disasters and how to prepare for them.

Peer Counselors continue to work side by side in the classrooms helping students, pulling students out of electives for one-on-one tutoring, doing mediations, and counseling. The novel, <u>The Bystander</u> by James Preller will be read. It is a fantastic novel that will keep them wanting to read more!!!

Jr. Thespian Troupe 88241 (Advanced Drama) competed at the District Level in December and is preparing to take 8 performance pieces and 2 technical pieces to State Festival in February. Troupe 88241 received Critic's Choice recognition in 6 different categories, breaking their own record! The Spring Musical, Freaky Friday, has been cast and rehearsals are in the beginning stages. The show goes on from April 24-26 at Western High School.

The Band and Show Choir have both completed their wonderful Fall Concerts and are now preparing for performances at Town Center's Celebration of the Arts on January 30th.

Students in choir will be learning a fantastic swing medley for upcoming performances as well as traditional choir music, and they will have their new choir shirts. Several choir and band students will be participating in All County Choir in January and February. On February 7th TTMS Band and Jazz Band will finish their concert performance tour for elementary students at Indian Trace. Students in Symphonic Band will be preparing solos for the solo and ensembles competition in February and the Beginning Band students later in May.

Congratulations to the TTMS Jazz Catz, who were recently invited to perform as a featured Middle School Jazz Band at the Prestigious Melton Mustaffa Jazz Festival in Miami in February. Congratulations to 8th grader Sophia Morero who performed flute with the All State band on January 12th in Tampa.

The TTMS Speech and Debate team will be competing in two tournaments in Broward County this month. The first is the monthly After School Tournament (MAST) at Glades Middle School on January 23rd, and the second is the Coral Springs Middle Stallion Showcase Showdown on Saturday, January 26th. These enthusiastic students will be preparing their own materials which include research, cropping, storytelling, and persuasive writing. After school practices will be announced in Mrs. Levine's Class. Go Cougars!

Using the Achieve 3000 program, our reading students have shown growth in their Lexile scores across all 3 grade levels. As a school, we made gains and our projections have increased with 68% of our current level 1 and 2 readers enrolled in the intensive reading classes either approaching or meeting forecasts of reading readiness on grade level by the end of the school year. There are currently 362 students using Achieve 3000.
