
Teaching & Learning Spotlight

Online Collaboration Tool with OneNote Class Notebook

Students in English 1 Honors are not only sharing their writing in class, but also at home at all hours of the day and night, all in an effort to improve their writing skills. The Collaboration Space in Class Notebook allows students to communicate with each other no matter what day or time it is. Since their peers have read the same texts, heard the same instruction and have been exposed to the same materials, classmates are incredibly important resources when it comes to writing suggestions and peer editing. Other than the instructor, who better to understand the facts of a text or format of an essay than another student taking the same class?

This collaboration has not only allowed the students to interact in the evenings and on the weekends, it has also exposed them to the alternate writing styles of their classmates. The more writing one is exposed to, the better writer one can become. It has also spurred some very interesting class discussions regarding the merits of a piece of textual evidence and specific word choices. And we haven't even mentioned the value of learning how to effectively collaborate with a group of peers!









Mr. Fisher's Tech Studies – Engage in a Culinary Demonstration

Our Tech Studies course introduces students to the technical programs available at Sheridan Technical College through a hands-on, project-based approach!

Emerging Technology in Business

Each of our freshmen have completed their presentations of the Forbes Magazine list of the most innovative companies of 2016 exercising their research,

presentation and PowerPoint skills. We are also preparing for **our first round of Microsoft Industry Specialist certifications next week, March 1st – 3rd**. We have high expectations and are planning to add more students to the 170 industry certifications already awarded to STHS students.

AP Computer Science

Our 23 AP Computer Science students have been working diligently preparing for the **AP Ex-**

am, the first week of May. This class is inquisitive based with lots of collaboration, pattern recognition and problem solving. It is the first AP Exam in



the nation to be portfolio based. Students are required to generate a computational artifact and develop a complex algorithm based on mathematical and logical concepts.

"MIX-ing" Media to Support Understanding of Logical Fallacies and the Art of Argumentation ~ Ms. Friedman, Debate Teacher

Following a lesson on logical fallacies and argumentative techniques, students were asked to participate in an enrichment activity by creating a PowerPoint demonstrating how they can apply what they've learned to real world situations. Once the PowerPoint was complete the students were given an in-depth tutorial by Mrs. Rivera, the Digital Learning Specialist, on the elements of *Microsoft Office MIX* and how it can level-up the average PowerPoint presentation. Invigorated by the new knowledge the students, working in pairs, created their Mixes embedding videos, audio, and voice-overs into their work. The embedded media created an added dimension for students to identify, reinforce, and demonstrate real-life examples of persuasion through the application of logical fallacies and argumentative techniques. As an assessment Mrs. Friedman created her own Mix, shared it on D2L and had her students answer the embedded multiple choice, true false and short answer questions, unit reflection question, and a short survey.

This learning experience afforded students the opportunity to *practice analysis and evaluative* (*critical*) *thinking*, *promote problem solving*, *collaborate with peers*, *and learn and apply new digital tools*.

Settling Sediments & Sands in Science

In Ms. Smith's Marine Science classes we did a lab on the settling rates of different sediments in a water bottle. We add-


ed water to the water bottle and then we added some sand from one of 4 beaches. Ours was from Anne's Beach in the Florida Keys. We watched the sand settle into different layers over a course of a two days. On the third day, we went outside to our schools greenhouse and added the sediments into sediment sieves that separate the sediment into layers. We tried to get as much sediment through each layer as possible. It was a stinky but fun experience with the different types of sands and sediments.

Multi-media "Pictionaries" using SWAY

What better way to learn a new language than through a multi-sensory, digital approach! Ms. Tinajero's Spanish I students created virtual

"pictionairies" using SWAY, a cloud-based tool, that is part of the Office 365 suite, following a tutorial offered by Mrs. Rivera.



This tool enabled students to incorporate images from the web to illustrate their vocabulary. This particular lesson focused on descriptive words and their task was to first locate images to support each of two categories of vocabulary words: "características físicas" (physical characteristics) and "rasgos de personalidad" (personality traits). Next, students recorded their voices to practice saying the word in Span-



ish. Lastly, students shared their SWAY via Desire2Learn with Ms. Tinajero as a means of assessment along the way. This learning ex-

perience provided students a creative way to read, speak, "write," and listen to their new vocabulary words – and bring media (and their learning) to life!

As members of the STHS community, students have the opportunity to choose a Career and Tech-

nical Education (CTE) program to participate in during their junior and senior years. While a preliminary survey has been done, 10th grade students will solidify their CTE program choice in mid-March. Before choosing a CTE program, students are required to take the TABE test. TABE, the Test of Adult Basic Education, covers Reading, Language Arts, and Math. In order to complete a CTE program, students must meet the TABE level requirements that are set for each program. These levels differ by program and will be discussed with students once programs have been selected. During the past several weeks, all 10th grade students participated in the TABE test. The test was administered over a period of two days, for approximately one hour each day. All of our 10th graders did an amazing job with testing, putting forth 110% effort! Thank you to the students and teachers for your time and effort!

As the digital learning specialist, my role hinges on collaborating with teachers and students in order to help them take full advantage of the available digital tools and resources to support the teaching/learning process.



Part of this process is the result of an ongoing effort to infuse what the teachers had learned through the Microsoft Academy held at STHS this past summer. The 2-day

training included the exploration of Windows 10 and Office 365 applications including OneDrive, Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Sway, OneNote, and OneNote Class Notebook. However, the "real learning" occurs through the implementation and application of these tools within context of the curriculum. And, thus, Tech Tuesdays have been one way for teachers to become more comfortable in the "mechanics" of the different apps and the integration of the tools specific to the nature and purpose of the learning tasks and goals. These sessions occur in addition to the support we receive from Microsoft and the Department of Innovative Learning on a monthly basis. I also coordinate with teachers to visit their classes and present and/or model the various apps for students as a precursor to a unit of study or project.

Teachers and students are building their repertoire of skills and apps while engaging in creative and collaborative ways to build and apply knowledge in their course of study. Examples of these are reflected in this month's *Teaching and Learning* spotlights. Sheridan Technical High School is well on its way to becoming a Microsoft Showcase School!


