

Teaching & Learning Spotlight

"Something Smells FISHY" in Ms. Brittney Smith's Marine Science Classroom ~ by Ricardo Garcia, Junior

Students in Ms. Smith's Marine Science classroom participated in a two part lab that began with an amazing lecture and guided discussion regarding the basics of sharks. Using pre-measured ropes, students could concretely and visually compare the different sizes of a variety of sharks.

We also learned how sometimes even baby sharks (A.K.A. pups) sometimes eat their siblings in the womb of the mama shark. The dissection was sure something everybody will remember for a while - well, at least, the smell of it. Yet, in all seriousness, the dissection enlightened us on the anatomy of a shark. We compared and contrasted sharks to our human anatomy.

Additionally, students discovered how sharks maintain buoyancy in the water which is through the amount of oil contained in their enormous livers. We learned a lot of other cool facts; for example, if one removes the inner eyeball, one can bounce it like a marble, something we were actually able to test for ourselves during the dissection.

Collaborative teams engage in an International Business Travel Project where they act as employees of a company, researching the country their business is hoping to expand to, including facts about

As shared in last month's newsletter, Career Placement students are now registered voters and will participate in the voting process, helping to elect the next president of the United States.




Students recognize what a great responsibility it is to exercise their civic duty. As part of the process, Ms. Golden and Ms. Judd's stu-



- 5. Entries are to be **submitted through your English teacher**.
- 6. All students in grades 9 through 12 are eligible to enter.
- 7. First Place is awarded a \$50 Amazon gift card; Second and Third Places are awarded \$25 Amazon gift cards.
- 8. A panel of judges selected by Broward County Council of Teachers of English will determine the winners. Decisions of the judges in all matters relating to the contest will be final.
- 9. Awards will be presented at the Broward Schools District Literary Fair in 2017 or by authors on Novel Day for Students. If the winner is not present to collect an award, the award will be forwarded to the respective English teacher for distribution.
