Based on the results, we have identified language usage, grammar, sentence structure, and editing mechanics as areas in which we will work towards improving. After school SELA sessions (Success in English/Language Arts) are offered every Tuesday and Thursday. We encourage any and all students to attend so they may strengthen those skills.





Lifeline to Literacy

Students have been doing a great job becoming accustomed to the routines of our school. Teachers have been hard at work presenting creative and innovative lessons to your child.

As part of our literacy initiative our 9th and 10th grade students recently took the *Measures of Academic Performance (MAP)* diagnostic assessment. Students showed diligence, used their time wisely, and put forth effort throughout the test. We will be using the data to pinpoint areas of growth and work towards mastery of skills in reading comprehension and language usage.



In addition to the initiative, we will be implementing a Reading Instruction Focus Calendar (RIF). Students will focus on

specific literacy skills that will be incorporated in core subject areas. This month we will concentrate on:

- Analyzing the central idea of a passage
- Citing textual evidence to support an idea
- Summarizing informational text



Notetaking should be an act of learning, instead of just mindlessly copying everything you hear or read. The format and structure of notes should be adapted to one's learning style, whether they are audio recorded, visually represented (outline or visual map), or typed/handwritten.



Many students have expressed their struggle in taking effective notes. As a result, Ms. River facilitated a note-taking session with students in Ms. Fort's World History class. While there are many

ways to take notes, the Cornell method was one method shared. Utilizing this framework helps students organize notes and improve study skills, ultimately leading to academic success. With continued practice and application of strategies learned, students are able to identify gaps, clarify misunderstandings, and/or make appropriate connections.

Students and teachers can refer back to the (FINDS) module in the Innovative Learning Center's D2L course where they will find additional resources and tools that may appeal to their unique learning styles on the notetaking process.

Teachers become facilitators and the students become the drivers. Students can demonstrate mastery with a variety of evidence.

Always use your head. Think things through and use good judgement.

Don't put things off. Doing things on time helps you take control of your life and shows that you can manage your own affairs.


