




## Summer Dual Enrollment is open at Broward College.

# Avoid a HALLWAY Detention!

#### Attention all Students and Parents/Guardians...

The STHS Magnet Contract is still very much in effect. After repeated conversations with students via this newsletter, on campus announcements, and hallway conversations, the Staff of STHS has unanimously voted to implement Fast Pass Detention Notices to any students who are witnessed to be in violation of the basic expectations as set in the STHS Magnet Contract.

Where teachers will continue to proactively check for all expectations to be adhered to within their classes, the hallways will also be monitored to ensure that teaching and learning is not compromised by basic expectations not being met.

For this reason, any of the following violations will result in an administrative detention. None of these expectations are new, and all can be implemented without any disciplinary consequences with both student and parent support.

- Out of uniform/dress code/No visible ID
- Not using their school-assigned backpack
- Visible phone and/or listening device
- Using profane language

- Tardy to school/class
- Not following directions
- Engaging in horseplay
- Out of assigned area

The detention will take place during the student's lunch within 2 school days of it being assigned. Failure to serve the detention will result in progressive disciplinary consequences, as detailed in the BCPS Discipline Matrix.

Our goal is that students will follow the established expectations, with a focus on their learning environment. We thank you for your compliance and support in this effort.



STHS is actively working to connect with a new uniform vendor! Information about our new vendor will be placed on the <u>school's website</u> as soon as it is available.

All Students are expected to be in their current uniformed shirts and school-appropriate bottoms (pants/jeans/shorts/skirts) or STC Program uniform every day.

Should a jacket or sweater be needed, one in school colors is allowed if a uniformed one was not purchased (solid red, navy blue, or white).



# Resiliency Education News FL DOE Resiliency Education: Civic and Character Education & Life Skills Education

Resiliency Education ensures that students in grades 6-12 receive annual instruction and participate in skill building activities that focus on the following areas: civics, character development, and life skills. Our goal is to provide students with opportunities to grow in their resiliency in an ever

changing and diverse world.

**Character Trait:** for January is *Respect*; for February is *Honesty*.

<u>Human Trafficking</u>: Develop strategies to protect oneself and others against human trafficking. Understand the right to safety and protection for all individuals against human trafficking. Recognize the tactics that human traffickers use to exploit individuals.

<u>Support Systems</u>: Learn how to reduce stress during stressful situations and identify the individuals in your support system. Explain how to use supports systems as a method to maintain safety and wellbeing.

**Emotions:** Understand how individuals react physically, mentally, and emotionally in stressful situations. Practice expressing emotions in healthy ways.

Preventing Violence: Understand the different forms of violence and recognize the signs of possible violent situations. Use strategies to ensure that all individuals remain safe and out of harm's way.

<u>Fee Waivers</u>: Students continue to have two paths to receive their fee waiver benefits:

- Requesting a fee waiver directly from College Board: When requesting from College Board directly, if a student isn't automatically approved, the adult they identify will receive an email to verify student eligibility. This occasionally happened in the past, but now the identified adult receiving an email will be an automatic feature going forward.
- Using a fee waiver code from their counselor: If you and your students prefer to use the fee waiver codes, counselors can find the codes in the <u>K-12 reporting portal</u> under the Downloads tab. Contact Customer Service if you need help with fee waiver codes.

#### **Bright Futures Info for Seniors**

I met with most of the seniors in October to sign them up for Bright Futures. Seniors have until May to get the GPA and service hours needed for BF. You are encouraged to continue to work on the required test score minimums for BF which are due by August 31, 2025.

The plain language emergency protocol will eventually eliminate the use of ALL color codes, as required by the federal government and the MSD Commission, that are currently in place in Broward County Schools. STHS will abide by the required monthly emergency drills as dictated by FL Statute 1006.07 and SBBC Policy 2120.

Important Notice: Florida Statute 943.082 states that *if, following an investigation, it is determined that a person knowingly submitted a false tip through FortifyFL*, the Internet protocol (IP) address of the device on which the tip was submitted will be provided to law enforcement agencies for further investigation, and *the reporting party may be subject to criminal penalties* under s. 837.05. In all other circumstances, unless the reporting party has chosen to disclose his or her identity, the report will remain anonymous.

All students, staff, parents, and community members must show valid PHOTO ID to enter campus. Sheridan Tech College and Technical High School require all visitors to check in through a Single Point Entry on the south side of the building. All staff and district personnel must have their School or BCPS ID Badge.

- Any students who do not have a school-issued ID must go to the Administrative Office for a new one. Progressive discipline applied on 3rd replacement ID in same school year.
- All visiting parents/guardians and community members must present a valid photo ID at the Single Point Entry.

#### Preventing Youth Suicide: Tips for Parents and Educators

Suicide is preventable. Youth who are contemplating suicide frequently give warning signs. Do not be afraid to ask about suicidal thoughts. Never take warning signs lightly or promise to keep them secret.

#### Preventing Teen Suicide: Tips for Peers

Suicide rarely happens without warning. As a peer, you may be in the best position to recognize when a friend might need help and help them get it. You may see signs in person, hear about them secondhand, or see them online in social media. Never ignore these signs.



#### **Risk Factors**

- Hopelessness
- · Nonsuicidal self-injury (e.g., cutting)
- Mental illness and substance abuse
- History of suicidal thinking and behavior
- Prior suicide among peers or family members
- Interpersonal conflict, family stress/dysfunction
- · Presence of a firearm in the home



#### **Warning Signs**

- Suicidal threats in the form of direct (e.g., "I want to die") and indirect (e.g., "I wish I could go to sleep and not wake up") statements
- · Suicide notes, plans, online postings
- Making final arrangements
- · Preoccupation with death
- Giving away prized possessions Talking about death
- Sudden unexplained happiness Increased risk taking
- Heavy drug/alcohol use
