Greetings Wolf Pack.

December is here, and winter break is just a few short weeks away, however we want to keep students focused over the next three weeks to finish strong! There are a few important events and dates to share with you as we prepare for the end of Term 1. This month we have End of Course Exams (EOC's). The exams are in Biology, Algebra 1, Geometry, and U.S. History and will take place on December 11th and December 12th. Parents, please note that 30% of the course grade for Biology, Algebra 1, Geometry, and U.S. History will come from their EOC score which is why we are offering students numerous opportunities to practice, review, and receive assistance prior to their test date. Leading up to these exams, our teachers have scheduled days for after school help as well as 2 Saturday EOC prep sessions- one on December 1st and one on December 8th. We want your child to take advantage of these opportunities to strengthen their knowledge and skills in these academic areas, all of which are graduation requirements.

We also have Term 1 Final Exams, which will be administered December 19th and December 20th. Students will be receiving exemption forms the week of the 10th for your approval and signature. Please note that all students will be released after lunch on these two days. Release time will be 10:50 a.m. District buses will be picking up early and running their normal routes. If your child is a car rider, plan on a 10:50 a.m. pickup. There *is* school on Friday, December 21st, which is an early release day. The 21st is the last day of Term 1 and a good opportunity for students to make sure they have turned in all work and completed all exams. When students return in January, they will start their new classes and begin Term 2.

What's new? Term 2 Practical Nursing, Pharmacy Tech and Medical Assisting students will begin their respective programs which will take place on Sheridan Technical College's main campus. Students must wear their nursing uniforms and ID's at all times. Congratulations to the students who made it into these rigorous programs.

Many amazing events and student activities have been taking place through our classes and clubs. This newsletter is full of interesting information to keep you up to date on the wonderful things happening at STHS, so be sure to check it out.

For the Senior class, December will be filled with many new challenges and opportunities. With first semester finals coming up at the end of the month, students will soon transition into their final semester of high school. This will provide unique challenges. <u>Ms. Santana</u> would like to remind seniors that there are many financial obligations that seniors must be mindful of during their final year at STHS. These include purchasing high school rings, ordering their caps and gowns for graduation, paying for prom, paying for grad bash and a host of other responsibilities. Fundraisers throughout the year will help to lower the cost of these obligations, but the Senior class is only as strong as its members, so go out and do your part.

Seniors are doing great things around campus. Many seniors are participating in clubs and organizations. Many seniors have volunteered their time and helped organizing donations for the Harvest Drive, as well as continued disaster relief for the destruction in northern Florida due to the recent hurricane. Several members of the Senior Class, such as Marissa Ibanez and Jacob Chaimowitz were present at the Ten80 STEM-Fest, where they were exposed to new technology and helped earn STHS entry into the National STEM League. This will provide new opportunities in the future for students to compete in the areas of computer science, drone flight, rover design and piloting, autonomous robot design, and game design.

Those seniors taking <u>AP classes</u> during the Fall semester will have an added challenge of taking a new load of courses during the Spring semester and reviewing past information to prepare for their AP exams in May. While teachers of AP classes are preparing review sessions in advance, the best advice that they can give you is to review your notes for a half hour and few times a week in order to keep the information fresh.

This is also a time where seniors should be updating and finalizing college application, as well as searching and applying for scholarships and other forms of financial aid. Information for potential colleges can be found on <u>Naviance</u> through the SSO portal. Mrs. DiAlberto would like to remind you to be mindful of deadlines on Naviance. If you need a letter of recommendation you are advised to ask your teacher ahead of time. Be sure to give them enough lead-time to read your brag-sheet and write a personalized letter. Not all recommendation letters are created equally, and readers really do want to get a sense of you as a student, not see a generic form letter.

Many seniors were exposed to different colleges and universities through visits from representatives from admissions offices. Seniors are required to sign up in-advance, and they can only meet with admissions officers during nonacademic classes. This may require you to miss a day at the college, so plan accordingly. Be sure to <u>email Mrs. DiAlberto</u> in advance and plan accordingly.

Federal Student Aid

Juniors and Seniors - If you will be attending a college or technical college from August 2019 through the summer, 2020, you can do the 2019-2020 FAFSA for financial aid. The 2020-2021 FAFSA will be available Oct. 1., 2019. You will receive an Expected Family Contribution. The closer that number is to "0," the better off you are financially. You won't get your financial aid package until you have been accepted to a school. The earlier you do this, the better!

Student and a parent need to get an <u>FSA ID</u>. This is so you can sign electronically. <u>Please click here</u> <u>to apply</u>. If you need assistance, there is a list of dates and locations in the BRACE Office at various high schools in Broward County that you can attend, and get the expert help you need. If you need it emailed to you, please <u>email Mrs.</u> <u>DiAlberto.</u>

Seniors, if you are starting college in the summer, you need to do both the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 FAFSA. It is highly recommended that you link your account to the IRS Data Retrieval tool. Juniors, your parents can find out approximately how much financial aid you might receive from a college. <u>To learn, please</u> <u>click here.</u>

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Bright Futures. Juniors, your parents can check the <u>FAFSA4CASTER</u> to see approximately how much college will cost, based on their taxes.

Seniors, will meet with you in the next couple of weeks to go over your <u>Bright Futures Evaluation</u>, and what you need to do to get either 75% or 100% of tuition. You have until you graduate to be eligible for <u>Bright Futures</u>. All seniors will be signing up with me.


SECME / ROBOTICS CLUBS

Mr. Richard Berman Honors Physics, SECME Coordinator Last year, the first-year of SECME at STHS, students competed in bridge-building and bionic hand competitions at the <u>Broward County</u> <u>SECME Olympiad</u>. The 9/10th grade bridge team, led by now-10th grader *Jonathan Elias*, earned an honorable mention, and the 11/12th grade bridge, led by now-12th grader *Marissa Ibanez*, won 3rd-place.

This year students will compete in the SECME Olympiad held in Broward county in even more events: Mousetrap car racing, water-bottle rocket construction, trebuchet construction, patch design, bridge building and bionic hand construction. Students who wish to pursue a degree in STEM-related fields, and who are members of <u>SECME</u>, can apply for one of 12 <u>SECME scholarships offered by FAU</u>. These scholarships are renewable yearly and cover the cost of tuition.



<u>SECME</u> is an engineering club whose purpose is to encourage interest in project-based learning and the design process. SECME has always had a focus on encouraging this interest in minorities and females, two groups that have been underrepresented in STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics). <u>SECME</u> <u>competitions are held locally, as well as</u> <u>nationally.</u>



<u>Robotics club</u> is a brand-new club to STHS. In this club students are encouraged to learn through the process of building, piloting, testing and programming a VEX Robot. Students in this club will compete on December 8th at the Miramar Regional Park Amphitheater in a <u>VEX</u> <u>Robotics League</u> event.

During this competition there will be a period where the robot is piloted by a student. The

team can earn points in one of many ways; launch balls at targets and hit them, manipulate targets on the ground, and by ending the competition parked in one of the bonus zones. There will also be time where the team can earn points when the robot is running in an autonomous state. This means that the students cannot control the student directly. Several of our students are currently working to write the computer code that will allow the robot to pilot itself and score points during this autonomous window.

Students interested in either club can enquire in room 165-P with Mr. Berman. There are no class prerequisites for joining, but a keen mind and a curious nature are definitely encouraged. Both clubs will continue to work throughout the year to prepare for different events and competitions related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Come to room 165-P on any Thursday to see one of these two clubs in action.



Many representatives of these clubs attended a STEM-Fest held at Nova Southeastern University. There they were slit up into different teams and attended workshops involving video game design, computer programming, leadership, drone control and design, rover design and construction. These forty attendees learned many new skills and earned the sponsorship for STHS to compete in the <u>National</u> <u>STEM League</u> events held throughout the year.
