Greetings STHS Stakeholders.

Before I get into what's happening in March, I want to share with you a few highlights from our February events. We hosted a phenomenal College Fair in which 56 colleges and universities came from near and far to speak with our students and parents. The visiting colleges were thrilled with the high level of academics our students are engaged in and how professional and well-spoken each student was. Our sports club started their basketball season playing both McFatter and Atlantic in friendly games after school; Individual and Dual Sports completed their bowling and golfing units; and the Debate club keeps bringing home medals. In February we hosted multiple College Tips Parent Nights where we shared important information and scholarship opportunities, including the criteria for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship. Parents, please make sure your children are earning those service hours with a minimum goal of 100 hours by their senior year.

As we begin the month, we have our district-wide SAT Day for all Juniors (11th graders) on Wednesday, March 6th. This is the REAL deal...the true SAT, so I ask you to make sure your child gets plenty of rest the night before and takes this opportunity seriously. There is no cost to you, but the benefits will be tremendous!

Over the next several weeks, all tenth-grade students will choose their CTE programs for their junior and senior year. There are several programs to choose from and students will have the opportunity to spend time shadowing their top two choices on March 6th so they can make an informed decision. It will be an exciting day for our students!

Spirit Week is coming.... March 11th - 15th culminating with a pep rally and our Spring Dance.

March 19th and 20th students will take their Quarter 3 exams with the week ending on an early release day March 21st. Dear Juniors:

I can't believe it is March already! The second term is in full swing, and lots of things are happening here at Sheridan Tech. We've had some great field trips, including a trip to Hamilton, the Renaissance Fair, and some outstanding results at our Skills USA Regional Competition. But we can't let up now. Let's be extra diligent (good vocab word) until Spring Break, and then come back refreshed and ready for our final push into finals, EOCs, and AP Exams!

A date that should be firmly on all our Juniors minds is March 6, our schoolwide <u>SAT Day</u>. This is the day that we have all been working

towards, with our Khan Academy practice skills, our math assignments, and our vocabulary and reading comprehension efforts. This test is provided free of charge to all our Juniors, and is an actual SAT test that counts for college admission. We recognize all the hard work from our teachers and students, and want everybody to be prepared. Standardized tests can cause anxiety, but feel confident in your preparation. We will continue to offer SAT tutoring after the test (see schedule below) for those that want to improve their scores, but March 6 is the key date that everybody needs to be aware of.

Speaking of Spring Break (March 23 – 31), that week is a great chance to ramp up your service hours. Keep in mind that all Sheridan Tech students need 40 service hours to graduate, but even more service hours can translate into real money. As part of the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship, students need 75 service hours and an 1170 SAT score to receive 75% paid college tuition, and 100 service hours and a 1290 SAT score to receive 100% paid college tuition. Students with 250 service hours receive a service cord award during graduation. So, keep these numbers in mind and get out there during Spring Break.

Other key dates in March include the week of March 11 – 15, otherwise known as Spirit Week. Stay tuned for all kinds of fun events that week, including the semi-formal dance (March 15, <a href="mailto:\$\$\frac{\$20/ticket}\$) and the schoolwide Pep Rally (the afternoon of March 15). Following a week of fun, it's time to get serious again, as midterm exams will take place March 19 and 20 with make-ups on March 21. For those who took AP classes in the Fall, AP exams take place in May, so review your notes for a minimum of an hour each week and don't miss after-school review sessions. Who Wants To Be A Millionaire? Advice for Those With A Great Asset -- Time



Who wants to be a millionaire? Nearly everyone! As an economics and financial literacy teacher, I will explain how becoming a millionaire is achievable, for most young people in the United States, and that, of course, includes you, dear young reader.

You have the advantage of youth. You have, statistically speaking, far more time ahead of you than your elders. That asset that you have -- lots of time -- can be put to your advantage. How? Through the "miracle" of the mathematical concept of compound growth. Specifically, over long periods of time, compound growth increases amounts exponentially. For example, the "rule of 72"

tells us, approximately, how long it will take for something to double in amount. Suppose something is growing by 6% annually. That is, every year its amount increases by 6% or, in other words, is multiplied by 1.06. The rule of 72 directs us to divide 72 by 6, and we get a quotient of 12. What that means is if something is growing at 6% annually, it will double in size in approximately 12 years. If something is growing 8% annually, 72/8 = 9, so it will double in size in approximately 9 years.

The S & P 500, an index of the 500 largest publicly traded companies in the U.S., has averaged an annual return for the past 90 years of approximately 10% when dividends and capital gains are automatically reinvested. What does that mean? It means that over very long stretches of time, money invested in the S & P 500 on average has doubled in a little more than 7 years. This does not mean that any money invested is "guaranteed." The S & P 500 does go down as it did in 2018. What this means is that over very long stretches of time it has averaged a 10% annual gain if dividends and capital gains are automatically reinvested. Indeed, in any 20-year time frame, the S & P 500 has not lost money.

So, what does a young person do with this information? How does a young person use this information to build significant wealth? By "dollar cost-averaging" into the S & P 500 every month, without fail, over long stretches of time. For example, supposing starting at age 18, you invest \$14/week, a mere \$2 per day, into the S & P 500 in a tax-deductible and tax-deferred Individual Retirement Account (IRA), and that you do this \$2/day, about \$60/month, for 50 years until you're 68 years old. And suppose the S & P 500 averages an annual return of 10% for those 50 years, just as it has for the previous 90 years. The money in your investment account would total \$1,054,376.00. Please click here to view an online investment calculator.

You can use the investment calculator to predict how much you'll accumulate using different amounts you invest, different lengths of time you're investing, or different rates of return. There are brokerage firms, e.g., Fidelity, that offer index funds for the S & P 500 with no fees, no annual costs, and no minimum investments. If you have a bank account you have money from your bank account regularly deposit money into your investment account. You can get rich, but it takes time, and that's one thing you as a young person has -- time!
