


Charles Flanagan High School



Vision:

The Young Falcon Flyers Program vision is to develop and transform the student learning process by providing opportunities for high school and college/university acceleration that benefit the students, parents and the community as well as promote high academic achievement.

Mission:

The Young Falcon Flyers Program mission is to bridge the transition from middle to high school in alignment with the 6-12 model and offer middle school students the opportunity to participate in high school courses on a high school campus while still in the eighth grade in a dual enrollment model.

The Walter C. Young Middle School - Charles Flanagan High School Young Falcon Flyers strives to:

- 1. Provide students an opportunity to accelerate their high school careers by taking high school courses on both school campuses
- 2. Expand student proficiency in Pre Advanced Placement thinking levels
- 3. Foster student's ability to analyze and create a variety of complex tasks
- 4. Bridge the transition from middle to high school in alignment with the 6-12 model
- 5. Develop student proficiency in utilizing technology as a tool to research, organize, evaluate and communicate information effectively
- 6. Correlate and extend the Florida Standards and End of Course Exams for middle school students
- 7. Maximize the success of the students and create an educationally holistic environment between the two schools

Zero Period On High School Campus

Walter C. Young Middle School eighth students will attend a zero period class on the campus of Flanagan High each morning from 7:40 to 9:00 AM. Students will participate in two different courses because of the alternating block schedule at the high school. Students will then board a shuttle bus back to Walter C. Young campus in time to begin the regular school day.

- Geography Honors (Pre-Advanced Placement)
- Band (Marching)
- Dance (Color Guard)
- Debate/Speech
- French 1

Pre-Advanced Placement Program

The premise of Pre-Advanced Placement is the belief that we can prepare every student for higher intellectual engagement by starting the development of skills and acquisition of knowledge as early as possible. Walter C. Young students will participate in an Honors Geography class at the high school, taught by the ninth grade A.P. Human Geography teacher. Content will include creating uniformity, AP vocabulary, verbalizing thoughts and ideas about text and writing them on paper, DBQ writing, problem-solving, time-management skills and dissecting complex text and original works.

The second premise of the program takes place on the middle school campus and that is: The expectation will be reflected in curriculum and instruction throughout the school such that all students are consistently being challenged to expand their knowledge and skills to the next level.

Addressed effectively, the middle school years can provide a powerful opportunity to help all students acquire the knowledge, concepts, and skills needed to engage in a higher level of learning. AP courses can help students acquire the skills and study habits they will need to be successful in college. Research shows that AP courses help students graduate from college in four years and qualify for scholarships. AP courses can also help students get accepted into college. This makes the student stand out in the admission process. It also shows that the student is taking the initiative to prepare himself/herself for college-level work.

High School Acceleration at Middle School

Walter C. Young students will also be able to take high school level courses on the middle school campus. The following high school course offerings will be available for the 2016-17 school year at WCY: Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology, Spanish 1 and 2, and Advanced Reading/ Critical Thinking.

High School Tutoring Program

Students from Flanagan High School's Urban Teacher Academy will come to Walter C. Young's campus and tutor struggling middle school students in their content area courses during the school day. The National Education Association claims that peer tutoring programs lead to higher levels of academic achievement. The NEA claims that same-age peer tutors are as

equally effective as non same-age tutors. Much of the claimed success of peer tutoring results from the fact that it offers substantially higher amounts of individual attention to learners than traditional classroom instruction.

Another study suggests that the peer tutors enhance their own understanding of the material by teaching it to other students. Furthermore, when peer tutors provide tutoring, they are not simply learning the material better, they are also learning how to be teachers.

Dual Participation in Extra Curricular Activities

Walter C. Young Middle school students will have the opportunity to participate in the extracurricular programs of Flanagan High School including the Color Guard Dance Team and the Band.

Application Process

Students must apply for acceptance to the Young Falcon Flyers Program and be accepted. Prerequisites include:

- Level 3 or above on previous year FSA English Language Arts and Math sections
- 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Teacher or counselor recommendation

What is Color Guard and Winter Guard?

The Color Guard, or "Auxil lary", combine dance, drama, and performance – with the manipulation of flags, sabers, and rifles – into a magical pageantry Color Guard is now one of the most popular activities for girls and boys in the high school curriculum. This outstanding performing group is an intricate part of the fall season Marching Band program. In the winter and spring seasons, students perform in a number of dance recitals plus official Winter Guard appearances. The Winter Guard often travels to venues across the state and region in pageantry theater competitions incorporating a wide range of visual performance arts and choreography. The Winter Guard is a fourteen-time WGI World Championship finalist.

The Color Guard and Winter Guard, under the direction of Mr. Dean Broadbent, performs with the Marching Band at all appearances and competitions including Bands of America regional events. Visual effects are important elements in competition scoring and high scores require a competent and highly rehearsed Color Guard.

Flanagan is the 2008 & 2012 Winter Guard International WORLD CHAMPIONS! Flanagan has also been the State Champions every year since 2002!



8th grade World Cultural Geography-Honors to 9th grade AP Human Geography

World Cultural Geography will introduce cultural factors that shape humanity and the creation of nations. Students will be introduced to the evolution of language, development of agriculture, religion, race, ethnicities, economy and conflict. Students will learn the location of countries and those cultural factors that make them a nation state. By attaining background knowledge on these current global trends students will be WELL-PREPARED for the more sophisticated topics in AP Human Geography.

AP Human Geography details all the cultural and warring factors that create the development of nations and opens discussion on economic global trade. AP Human Geography will detail and emphasize religion, social psychology, government trends, global economic organizations, ethnic genocide, gender inequality, the agriculture and pharmaceutical market, and how cities in developed countries are created to feed the culture of mass consumption. Students will engage in polemic topics that deal with rise of population, spread of diseases, as well as the influence of large corporations on government laws.

AP Human Geography also discusses various historical events that will shape where we are today. For instance, there are large discussions on the origins of Christianity and its spread to North America, the creation of political structure, WWI and WWII,
