Important Information and Reminders

Student Drop-Off & Pick-Up Students should be dropped off and picked up in the parent loop for arrival and school dismissal. We offer several programs and activities that are beyond the regular school day. Students must remain with the adults in charge while on campus. Students who are not involved in approved before and after school programs/activities must exit the campus if they are not supervised. Please ensure that you have a process in place for your child to exit our campus by 3:10 pm if not in a supervised activity.

Student Early Sign-Outs Per School Board Policy, no student sign outs will be processed after 2:10 pm daily. Also, anyone picking up a student must have parental permission and be of legal age.

Code of Student Conduct Parents and students must review and understand the guidelines outlined in the Broward County public schools Code of Student Conduct. This document is available on the [BCPS website](#). Failure to adhere to any school and/or district policy could result in suspension or expulsion from school.

Dropping Off Items We work diligently to preserve the learning environment and the safety of all our students and staff. Therefore, we do not accept any drop offs for students in the front office; this includes food items.

ID Badges must always be worn by students, faculty, and staff while on campus. Additionally, individuals visiting campus must wear some form of identification (district-issued identification badge or site-based generated visitor or volunteer badge) while on campus.

Upon entry to campus, all visitors must be processed through the RAPTOR System. This includes, but is not limited to, parents, District staff, vendors, volunteers, and members of the public. If the RAPTOR System is temporarily inoperable, you will be directed to follow a manual sign-in and out process. An official photo identification will be requested. Your name, date of visit, time of arrival, purpose for visit and time of departure will be reported in a visitor's log.

Daily Moment of Silence

Athletic and Extra-Curricular Activities News

ATHLETIC REQUIREMENTS

The BCAA recognizes the importance and value of education. The term "student-athlete" recognizes the importance of being a student first, with athletic endeavors second.

Students wishing to participate in athletics must return a completed packet of Athletic paperwork to your coach or Coach Megna before they will be approved to participate. The packets are available in the front office or from any athletic coach or as a download from the [Athletics](#) page on our school's website!

An unweighted cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.0 is required for all students' grades 10-12. Entering freshmen are eligible for the first 18 weeks of school but must attain and maintain a 2.0 GPA for continued eligibility after the first 18 weeks. Students who fall below this standard are ineligible to play.

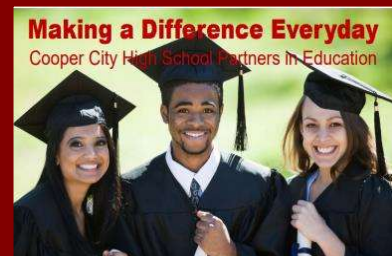
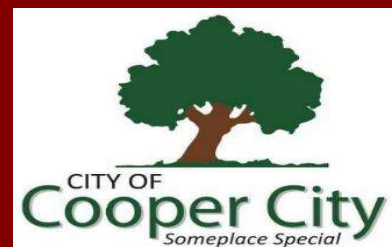

- Must be in attendance for at least half of the school day to participate in any extracurricular activity or athletic event.
- Must maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 on the 4.0 scale each semester.
- Must pass at least 3 out of 4 classes each grading period.

The price for an adult breakfast meal will remain \$1.80. 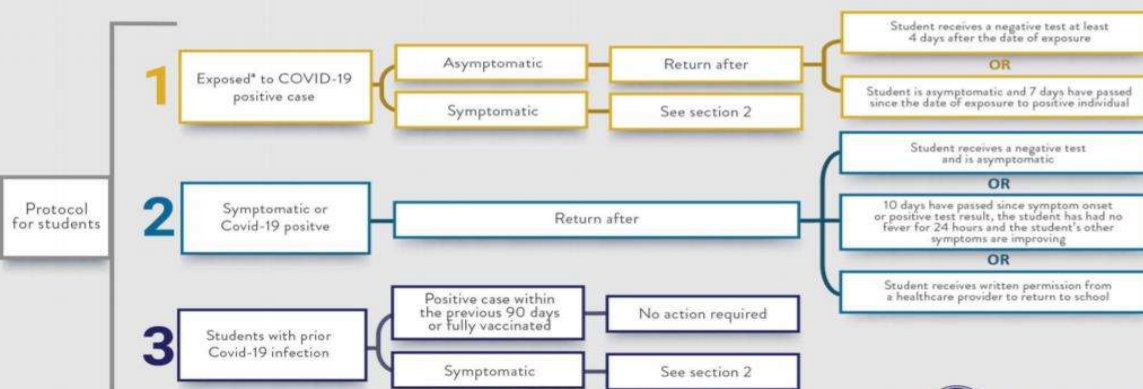

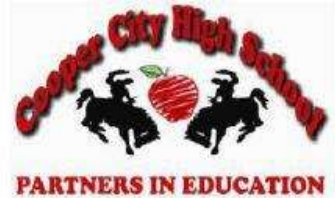
PROTOCOLS FOR CONTROLLING COVID-19

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Social Media Use Guidelines

Do you Think B4U Post?

What you post today, can affect your tomorrow.

Did you know students who violate the Code of Student Conduct's online behavior requirements can be suspended or even expelled?

While online:

DON'T:

- Use discriminatory, racially offensive or defamatory language.
- Post language or materials with vulgarity, obscenity, images containing nudity or substances/drugs.
- Engage in personal attacks, insults, inciting a disturbance, soliciting favors, threats, harassment or bullying.
- Disclose private or confidential information.
- Be academically dishonest or cheat, which includes using someone else's intellectual property without permission or violating copyright laws.

DO:

- Connect in positive ways with others. Reaching out to people you trust is one of the best ways to reduce anxiety, depression, loneliness, and boredom during social distancing. Call, text, IM, or FaceTime to connect with friends and family.
- Protect yourself by protecting your accounts. Don't share your passwords with anyone and password protect your phone so no one can impersonate you. Use privacy settings to control who can view your content and interact with you.
- Ignore online abuse by not reacting, instead block abusers and then report them. Take and save screenshots, print out messages as evidence, and tell a trusted adult immediately to get help.
- Be an activist for respect.

 - Watch for offensive or hurtful behavior and share kind words to isolated, mistreated, or cyberbullied students.
 - Express disagreement and disapproval of cruel acts and words.

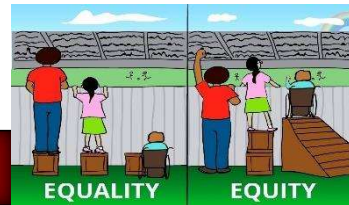

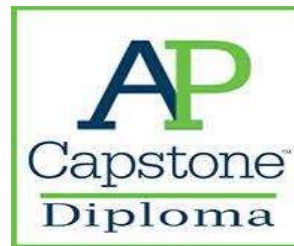


Naviance Student:

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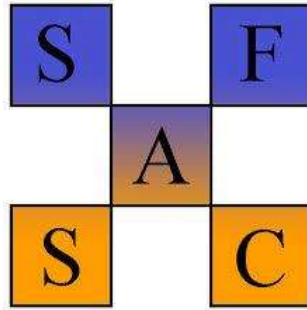
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School Advisory Council (SAC)

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Health & Wellness/ Mindfulness Corner

Mindfulness is the intentional practice of attention in the present moment to become aware of one's thoughts, emotions, bodily feelings, and the surrounding environment. Mindfulness

Life can become stressful sometimes and with the right tools we can cope better in those challenging situations. One very powerful tool to handle stress is mindfulness.

What is mindfulness?

- It is about being fully present in the moment, without judging, and having a kind and curious attitude.
- It is about focusing on breathing and observing what is happening at this moment in time, accepting what you are experiencing (whatever that may be), and then letting it go.
- You can be mindful anytime, anywhere, no matter what you are doing.
- It takes practice.

Try it!

Deep breathing. Sit or lie down comfortably. Rest your hands on your stomach. Slowly count to four while inhaling through your nose. Feel your stomach rise. Hold your breath for a second. Slowly count to four while you exhale, preferably through pursed lips to control the breath. Your stomach will fall slowly. Repeat a few times.

Mindfulness Meditation. Focus on your breath. Notice anything that passes through your awareness without judgment. If your mind starts to tackle your to-do list, just return to focusing on your breath.

Taking Care of your Mind and Body

There are no doubts we are going through some unprecedented

times and therefore it is important to take care of yourself. Here are some tips that can help you:

- Exercise every day. Go outside for a walk, run or bike ride. You can either do this by yourself or with your family.
- Follow a schedule and have a routine.
- Have a balanced and healthy diet that includes water, fruits, and vegetables.
- Take time every day to do things you love. You can watch TV, read, exercise, talk to friends or whatever makes you happy
- Find ways to relax. Things like listening to music, talking to a friend, drawing, writing, or spending time with a pet can reduce stress.
- Reach out to others if you are feeling down. It is important to talk about what is going on. Stay connected!
- Get plenty of sleep!

How to Get Organized

It is a new school year and learning to be organized can help you get things done and lower your stress level. These skills will give you an advantage not only in school but in your life. The more you practice, the better you will get at them.

How to get organized

Organize your things. When your things are organized, it is so much easier to find them and avoid wasting time to find what you need. It is a huge time saver.

- Create folders, binders, or notebooks for each subject. You can also use electronic folders to keep assignments organized.
- Also, get rid of things you no longer need.

Organize Your Space. Find a place where you can work that is quiet and allows you to have room to spread things around. It can be a desk or a table. The place you choose should allow you to focus on what you must do.

Organize Your Time. You can use a planner, app or digital calendar to keep track of your schoolwork:

- Write down all your assignments and their due dates.
- Break down long projects into smaller steps. Write down when each part needs to be turned in and follow those dates.
- Write down the dates for tests/quizzes/ assessments and make sure you have plenty of time to study. Do not procrastinate and study a little every day.
- Make sure to include all your other activities into your calendar so you do not have conflicts. This can also help you to look ahead into all the things you have to do and will allow you to manage your time better.

How to Get Focused

Avoid Distractions. Is it harder to focus and to do well on assignments or tests when you are multitasking?

- When you are working, put your devices away.
- Pay attention to what works for you to help you focus. Some people need a quiet environment and some focus better when they listen to quiet music while studying.

Take Breaks. Your brain needs to rest when you are working hard, so take frequent breaks to maintain focus.

- It is important to get up from your work area, move, stretch, or walk around to get your body in motion and clear your head.

Refocus Yourself. If you notice that your mind is wandering, pull your attention back into study mode as soon as possible.

- Remind yourself that now it is time to stay on task.

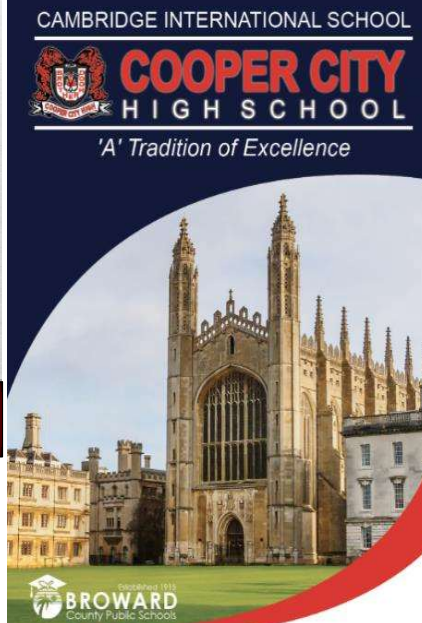

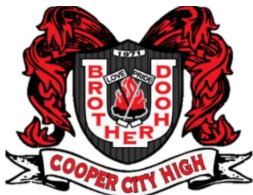
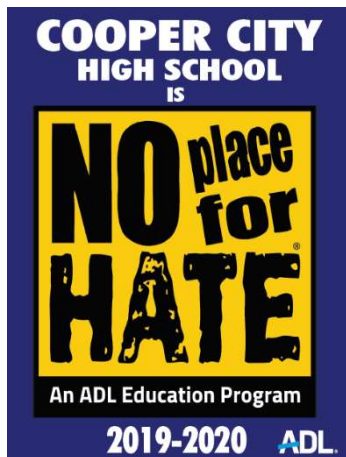
