Even though this does not mean that all our students are reading at grade level, it does show that their hard work is paying off and we are moving in the right direction. This growth measure also helped teachers to make individualized intervention based on each student's current needs. It also allowed teachers to celebrate students for their accomplishment. Reading teachers and Language Arts teachers have worked collaboratively to enforce all writing skills to ensure student success on the Writing FSA on April 5th, 6th, and 7th.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

It is already April! The Math Department is continuing to work hard to finish curriculum and start our FSA prep time review so we can ensure each student is prepared for the Math FSA and End of Course Exams in May. The Math Department is offering after school tutoring on Tuesdays and Thursdays. We also have tutoring on Saturdays in conjunction with the other tested subjects. These opportunities are available for all students.

At the beginning of April, our students will be participating in the iReady Diagnostic #3. The specific dates are: 6th grade (April 11th), 7th grade (April 12th), and 8th grade (April 13th).

HETERONORMATIVE THINKING

What Is Heteronormativity? Heteronormativity is the assumption that everyone is straight. It's the idea that romantic and sexual relationships are always between one man and one woman. Heteronormativity assumes heterosexuality is the default sexual orientation, and the only normal or natural way to express sexuality and attraction.

History of Heteronormativity. The word heteronormativity was coined in 1991 by queer literary critic and social theorist Michael Warner.¹ Some of the inspiration for the term was based on an essay by Adrienne Rich called "Compulsory Heterosexuality and Lesbian Existence,"² in which Rich theorizes that heterosexuality isn't the natural instinct of all people, rather a cultural institution that makes women inferior to men.



Dear Parent:

Honesty is the character trait of the month of February. This newsletter offers you activities and ideas, which will assist you with helping your child to understand the importance of honesty. Honesty, is taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations, and being loyal so people can trust you. People who are honest have integrity and the moral courage to do the right thing and to stand up for their beliefs even when it is difficult to do so. We ask that you continue to encourage honesty with you child.

- How can you tell if your teen is being dishonest with you? There are some key things to look for that are signs of being dishonest.
 - Defensiveness – Teens may become defensive when you ask them where they have been or where they are going. A teen with nothing to hide does not mind offering their parents a way to get in contact with them. Teens that get defensive when asked are most likely hiding something.
 - Eye Contact – If your teen makes constant eye contact without blinking this can be as alarming as the teen that won't make eye contact with you at all. Usually a teen will not look at you if they are lying to you unless they realize this. Then they over compensate by starting you in the eye and they end up not blinking. (Understand that some cultures however do not promote eye contact with adults.)
 - When people are making stories up they often look down. When someone is telling a story that is honest and true they look up like they are remembering it just as it happened.
 - The long pause – this is especially useful when you are having a phone conversation and you ask where your teen is or what is going on. There will often be a pause as they come up with a story to tell you.
 - Body Language – when someone is being dishonest, they are often nervous and have physical twitches or they will touch their face.

Self-Control is the ability to be in control of your actions so that you can make positive choices that benefit you and others. To be successful, our children need to learn from their experiences and develop self-discipline, which will help them keep their impulses and feelings from controlling them. Self-Control is a practical skill that gives our children tangible benefits in their lives and in their relationships with others.

Personal Thoughts for Parents

- In what ways do I show self-control?
- In what areas of my life is it hard for me to be self-controlled? Why?
- What can I do to be more self-controlled?

Modeling Moments

DISCUSS with your child the areas of your life where you show self-control.

ADMIT to your child when you do not show self-control.

CHALLENGE yourself and your child to be more self-controlled in areas where it may be hard.

Developing Self-Control through Service

- As a family, prepare and cook a meal together. Deliver the meal to a local homeless shelter or elderly facility. If you can, help serve the meal.
- As a family, learn how a local group helps people in your community. Have a family yard sale and donate the money to this group.

Dinner/Car Discussions

- Have each family member explain ways that he/she has shown self-control that day.
- Have family members tell about how they have seen other family members show self-control.
- Have family members share about times when they did not show self-control.
- Have family members explain some of the benefits of showing self-control.

"The experience of a sense of guilt for wrong-doing is necessary for the development of self-control. The guilt feelings will later serve as a warning signal which the child can produce himself when an impulse to repeat the naughty act comes over him."
