MEDIA AND MUSIC CONSERVATORY





Though many might believe that a skill like coding is not a necessary skill to have, they're wrong. In fact, coding is one of the most demanding jobs in the market today due to our generation's love for technology. To quote our very own coding teacher, "The skills included in learning to code (i.e. problem-solving, critical thinking, teamwork, and persistence can be applied to all aspects of life."

So, we have learned that coding is creating various websites, games, or apps, and how coding can benefit you in life. Now let's talk a bit more about coding itself and the rules that apply. Although these skills come in very handy when coding, they also transfer to real life quite effectively. Think of it as a practice-run for your new skill set. All throughout this year and the next, the ability to succeed in learning the vast majority of coding "languages" will help you significantly.
