On December 10th, we attended the Superintendents Military Ball.

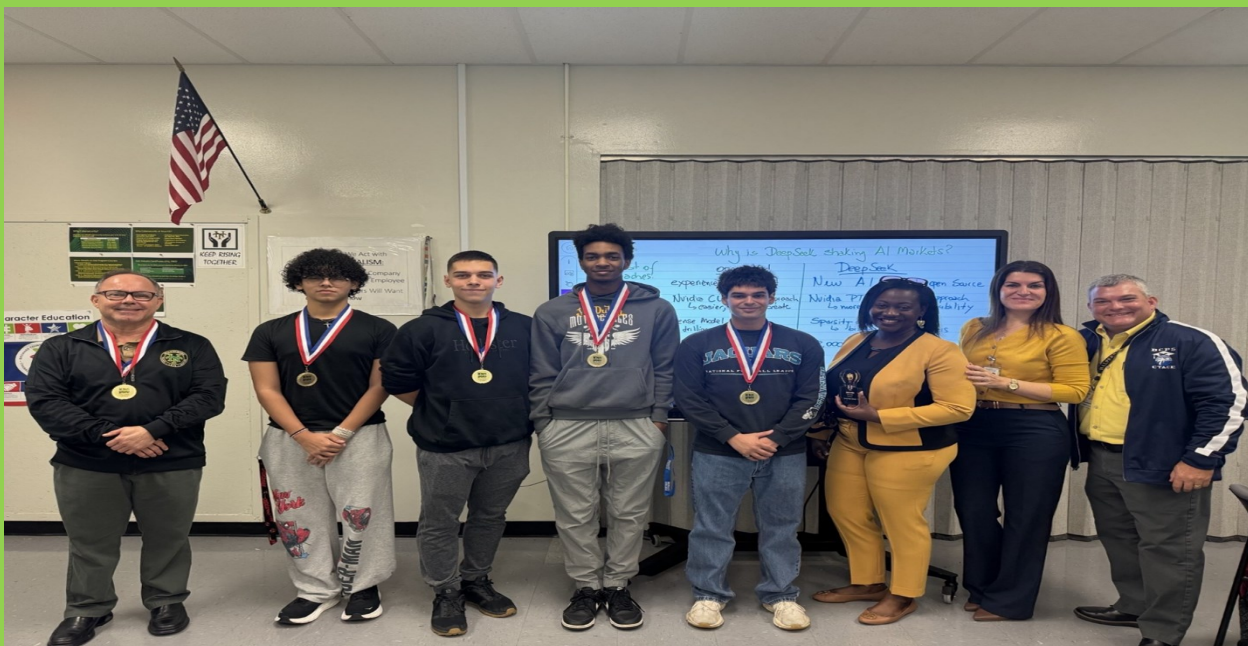


NOVA HIGH SCHOOL CYBER TITANS

Nova High School AI Students Win Cash Prize for KPMG AI Challenge

Nova High School's AI students recently won \$5,000 in the prestigious KPMG KnoPro AI Business Revolution Challenge. The team—Adrian Rincon, Jan-Carlos Reyes Santana, Kymani Sarju, and Isaac Santiago—secured first place with their innovative "Scrooge App." This AI-powered budgeting tool helps users optimize financial decisions, such as managing subscriptions, finding the cheapest grocery options, planning for college expenses, and diversifying retirement portfolios based on personalized risk assessments.

The competition encouraged students to explore how AI can solve real-world business problems while fostering positive global impacts. Nova High's success highlights their forward-thinking approach to AI's role in transforming industries. On January 29, CTACE Director, Loli Formoso and District Curriculum Leader, Bryan O'Toole visited the school, alongside Principal Ms. Awofadeju, to celebrate this remarkable achievement.



Nova High School Cybersecurity Students Shine in FBI and NSA Guest Lectures

In an inspiring session for our cybersecurity students on January 14, Professor Rebecca Passmore from the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR) shared her extensive career insights. With a background as a former Senior Digital Forensics Examiner for the FBI and Senior Vice President of Cyber Risk at Kroll, Professor Passmore brought a wealth of Digital Forensics and Cybersecurity knowledge to the classroom.

During her presentation, she expressed her admiration for our students, stating, "I've never presented where the students were so advanced in their knowledge and ask very good questions." This praise reflects the high caliber of our students and their dedication to mastering the complexities of cybersecurity.

Adding to this recognition, NSA Director Greeley visited last quarter and remarked on the quality of engagement from our students: "I thoroughly enjoyed the questions and conversations. I was reflecting and really think that was the best round of questions I have had in 6 years of engagements across the country!"

With such commendations from industry and government leaders, it's clear that our cybersecurity students are not only excelling in their studies but are also well-prepared for potential careers in industry and federal government roles. We are proud of their achievements and look forward to seeing where their talents will take them!"

NOVA CYBER TITANS CONTINUED

Nova Students Engage with Broward Health Executives on AI & Cybersecurity

In February, Nova's Cybersecurity and AI students had a unique opportunity to visit Broward Health and engage in meaningful discussions with top executives, including the CEO, CIO, Chief Medical Officer, and Chief Nursing Officer. Led by Mr. Abrantes, our Cybersecurity and AI Programs Director, and Mrs. Devlin, our Health Sciences Lead Teacher, 50 students explored how AI and cybersecurity are transforming the healthcare industry.

During the visit, students gained firsthand insight into Broward Health's recent investment in a new Electronic Medical Records system and its impact on patient care and data security. They asked insightful questions and participated in discussions that highlighted the real-world applications of their studies.

A highlight of the trip was the opportunity for 20 students to participate in mock interviews with executives, providing invaluable experience for their future careers. Additionally, for many, visiting a real data center for the first time made the concepts they study in class come to life.

Beyond formal discussions, the executives joined students at their tables during lunch, fostering informal yet insightful conversations about IT, cybersecurity, AI, professional pathways, and the evolving healthcare landscape.

Reflecting on the experience, many students described it as one of the best field trips they had ever attended, as it combined business, healthcare, and cutting-edge technology in a way that allowed them to envision their future careers.

The impact of the visit was felt on both sides. Broward Health North CIO Steve Travers shared, "It was a pleasure to meet the students; it's all people talked about yesterday and this morning." CEO Matthew Garner was equally impressed, noting that Nova students asked "very good questions" and that Nova High School is now on his radar—so much so that he expressed interest in visiting our school to continue the conversation.

This experience was a powerful reminder of the exciting career opportunities at the intersection of AI, cybersecurity, and healthcare."

- Dual Enrollment opportunities for the Fall 2025 terms are open now. Students are able to meet with their School Counselor to discuss our collegiate partnerships.

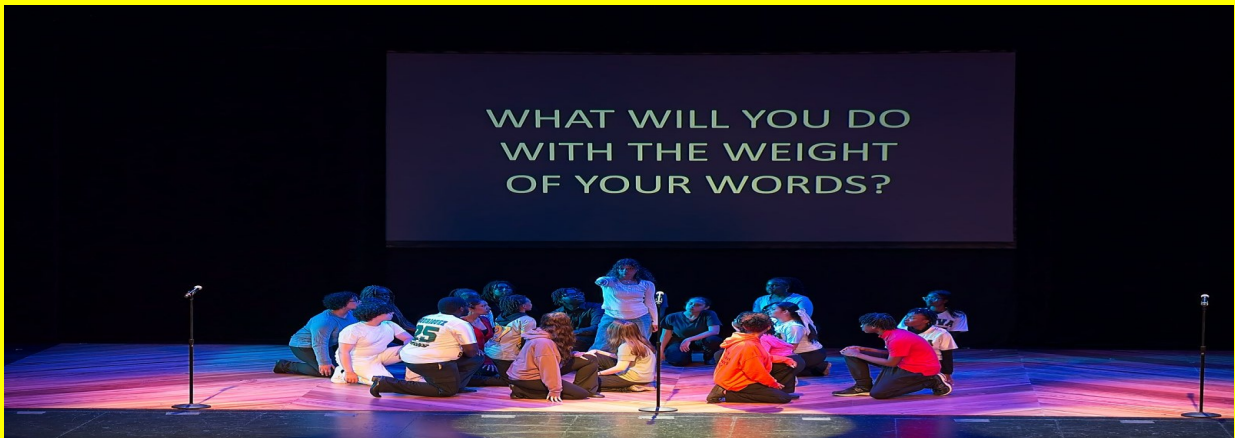


NOVA TITAN DRAMA 2025

SCHOOL-WIDE LITERACY INITIATIVES

TITAN THINK TANK (TTT) consists of the Word of the Day and the Critical Thinking Problem. Students are responsible for one composition notebook that they are expected to carry to each period for completion of the TTT activities.

TTT ACTIVITIES:

Period 1/5: Introduce WOD, pronunciation, definition, and example sentence—teacher provides. Student completes synonym and antonym

Period 2/6: Student sentence (use the word in a different context)

Period 3/7: Assigned activity (changes based on the word of the day)

Period 4/8: Students copy the Critical Thinking Problem in their notebook and find a solution (can be done in pairs, groups, or individually). Teachers play a video of the solution

- ♦ Teachers will encourage students to incorporate the words into their daily writing assignments and assign a participation grade in Pinnacle for student completion of the TTT activities.

ASSESSMENTS

- ♦ English teachers will assess the Word of the Day
- ♦ Math teachers will assess the Critical Thinking Problem

The School Advisory Forum (SAF) is open to all parents and guardians and provides important information impacting the quality of education your student receives in the Broward County Public Schools, such as: Standardized Testing, Facilities Improvement (Construction and Maintenance), College Readiness and Selection, Curriculum and Instruction, Extracurricular Activities, Guidance and Student Services, and State Funding for Education.

SAC begins at 5:30PM and our SAF meetings immediately follow.
The location of both meetings is held at Nova High School in the Media Center.

Policies

Attendance:

According to Attendance Policy 5.5, an absence needs to be excused by parent/guardian within a 48 hour period of time for every student absence. Five excused/unexcused absences/tardies during a marking period are considered a "pattern of non-attendance" and a referral from the teacher will be administered.

Signing Out:

Students are not allowed to sign out during the last 30 minutes of the school day.

Suspensions:

SB Policy 5006 outlines all the violations that result in out-of-school suspension and expulsion and/or the consequences. You may view the complete suspension/expulsion policy and all School Board policies on the Web at: <https://www.browardschools.com/Page/37754>

THE INTENT OF THIS POLICY IS TO PROVIDE FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF A SAFE, ORDERLY AND PEACEFUL EDUCATIONAL ENVIRONMENT FOR ALL STUDENTS AND TO ALIGN WITH ZERO-TOLERANCE LEGISLATION AND STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS. Suspended students are eligible to receive assignments and may earn credit and grades for make-up work during the suspension period. The make up work is due the day the students return from suspension.

Substance Abuse:

Possession or use of drugs, alcohol, and/or tobacco products, including unauthorized over-the-counter medications is prohibited. The sale or attempted sale of any of the previously mentioned items or possession of drug paraphernalia is prohibited. Failure to abide by these policies will result in disciplinary action.

Safety & Security

ID Badges

ID Badges must be worn by all staff and students while on campus or transportation. It is also required for use in the school cafeteria. Progressive discipline applies for students who are not in compliance.

Supervision on campus

Campus opens at 8:50am and at dismissal students are required to exit campus unless they are on campus for an approved activity. Supervision at all extra-curricular events ends 30 minutes after the event is over. Students should communicate with parents to ensure they are picked up in the front of the school in a timely manner.

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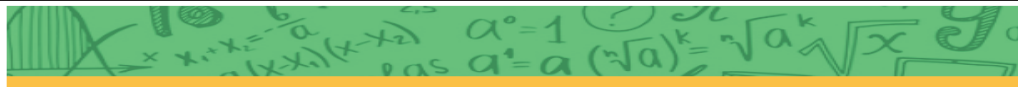
