Our theme for this year is "Game On- Level Up". We are focused on closing the learning gap that occurred as a result of the "Covid and Summer Slide."

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome the new additions to Team Plantation- Coach Jacques (PE), Ms. K. Brown (ASD), Ms. P. Campbell (5th grade), Ms. Hobbs (1st grade), Ms. Maxwell (Campus Monitor) and Mrs. Olavarria our Guidance Counselor.

Thanks to all the Dads, grandfathers, uncles and male figures who took their students to school on September 22nd. Your child was so happy for that experience, and our staff was thrilled to see all of you. Please continue to play an active part in your child's schooling.

Students' hours are 8:00am-2:00pm, breakfast is 7:15-7:45. Office and teachers' hours are 7:30-3:00pm. Please do not drop your students to school before 7:15 am.

Please be reminded that you must have a picture ID to enter the building for any business and wearing a mask. If your child gets to school after 8:05 am you are required to come in and sign your child in and this requires a picture ID. If you are late in picking up your student at the end of the day, you will also be required to sign them out with a picture ID.

Please adhere to drop off/pick up procedures. You must remain in your car and come around the loop in your car. No parent/guardian is allowed to park in the parking lot and/or send students across the cross walk to the building. This is a safety issue. Try and get to school in enough time to drop students off. School starts at 8:00 am, students are marked tardy if they are not in class when the bell rings. Be prompt in picking up your students. Parents must refrain from parking on the swale as you run the risk of getting a ticket. Parents walking to pick up students must wait at the end of the car loop for students. Parents are not allowed to walk through the car rider students sitting.

Parents, Plantation is a mandatory uniform school, students need to be in uniform from Monday to Thursday. Friday is school spirit day, students are allowed to wear the Plantation school shirt and jeans. T-shirts may be purchased in the front office for \$10. If students don't have a school t-shirt, they may wear their school shirt with jeans. Plantation t-shirts are required for all off campus field trips.

Communication is very important to me, please call the school to speak to an administrator if you have any concerns that you feel is not being addressed.

Be active in your child's school by joining PTO, SAC and signing up to become a volunteer at www.getinvolvedineducation.com, so you can chaperone on field trips and assist with activities on campus.

Parents be reminded to conduct a wellness check on your child each morning before sending them to school. If your child is not feeling well, keep them home and call or email to excuse the absence.

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Safety is very important to us at Plantation Elementary. All scholars, staff and parents are mandated to wear masks inside the building and practice social distancing. Please exercise patience at the one point of entry as only one person/family will be allowed in at a time.

Our professional teachers are continuously working on professional development to develop their teaching skills and to increase their levels of content expertise. Our Pre-K students here at Plantation Elementary have begun their journey as they are provided opportunities for success. We cannot express

enough to our parents the importance of caring for their children with positive language being used to describe them. Let's look for and point out their strengths.

Our students are getting familiar with our daily academic routines that consist of their letters, sounds, numbers, shapes and colors. Additional learning includes their daily calendar activities. So, parents please continue reinforcing their learning at home.

We are exploring Seasons, and Pumpkins through literacy, science, social studies, music, and math.

In Head Start our Creative Curriculum theme of study is Clothes. As we study clothes we will also learn concepts and skills previously mentioned along with the arts and technology.

We're also embracing Home & School Connection through our Family Pumpkin Project.

- Please provide jackets in their book bags, a blanket or towel weekly and change of clothes.
- Children who read each day when they are young do better in school!
- Reminder Parents: please take the time to give each other a hug, a smile and an embrace to show your love daily.



The Kindergarten team would like to say Happy October! We are beyond thrilled to see the amazing transformations our students have undergone thus far! Our kindergarteners are shining, thanks to your continued support! As always, we look forward to partnering with you in your child's educational journey!

ELA: Our kindergarteners have been working with letters **Mm** and **Aa** and the words **I**, **like**, **eat**. Upcoming letters and words are **Ss**, **Tt**, **Nn**, **the**, **we**, **go**, **see**, **was**, **her**, and **down**. During Intentional Read Aloud, we will be learning about characters in a story and how they are different. Please continue reading with your child each evening for 20 minutes and discuss who the characters are and what they do.

Math: Our kindergarteners just finished working with numbers 0-5. We are currently exploring the mathematical concept of Comparing numbers 6-10!

Science/Social Studies: The Kindergarten Team will be continuing to learn about plants and animal needs. We will also be getting ready for our very 1st Museum Night that will be in November.



Hello Parents! Here is a breakdown of your child's scheduled day in 1st grade. We have also included what your child will be learning and a brief explanation of expectations.

8:00-8:15 - Arrival Procedures/ Attendance/ Reminders

Breakfast is from 7:15-7:50 Monday- Friday.

Your child needs to be in school at 8:00 a.m. every day

Attendance is extremely important. Your child wither needs to be in the classroom every day.

A few reminders for this month of September:

- October 18- SAC meeting at 6 p.m.
- October 19- Early Release- End of 1st Quarter
- October 20- No school- Teacher Planning
- October 21- Beginning of 2nd Quarter
- October 28- Curriculum night at 6 p.m.

8:10-9:50 Reading Time

We are learning about how character change and transform throughout a story. We are also learning how to describe characters in a story and story elements such as beginning, middle, and end.

We are working hard on our reading skills in reading groups.

Please make sure that you are practicing spelling words with your child.

9:54- 10:24 Specials

Your child will have a special's teacher, where your child benefits mentally and socially.

10:45-11:20 Writing Time

We are learning how to write narrative stories. We are learning to write about a small moment in time and adding details to our writing and drawings.

11:05-12:00 Lunch Break!

12:25-1:50 Math Time

We are currently working on subtraction through 10. We are learning how to use manipulatives to help us subtract. Also, students are learning how to subtract using their fingers and drawing pictures.

We will be starting to learn about Addition strategies. Some of these strategies are: add in any order, counting on, adding doubles, adding 1 and minus 1, make a 10, and add three numbers.

Conferences are being scheduled to discuss your child's progress thus far. Please check with your child's teacher.

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As we enter the new season of fall, second grade students will continue to work hard and persevere through virtual learning!

In Reading, we have covered numerous literature standards, such as—RL.1.1 (Ask and Answer Questions), RL.1.2 (Recount stories and determine their central message, lesson, or moral), and RL.2.5 (Describe the overall structure of a story). These state standards are used to drive instruction, expose

students to their grade level content, and prepare them for standardized tests. Students are expected to review and practice the standards through the i-Ready program. Scholars are required to interact and use i-ready for math and reading instruction, throughout the school days for forty-five minutes each week. As always, daily reading practice at home is important, as well as opportunities to discuss and think deeper about what has been read. Please ensure your child is engaging in some of the online resources shared on Canvas for reading instruction, for example—MyOn, i-Ready, and Scholastic. Students will grow in their fluency and comprehension skills when using these online resources.

In Math, we began the quarter developing our understanding of odd and even numbers, place value, addition and subtraction facts and strategies, and now we'll be working with numbers up to 1,000! You can help your child at home by practicing the correct way to write two and three-digit numbers, exploring patterns in number sequences, counting on and counting back by 10 and 100.

In Science, we have been learning about Animal Habitats and exploring the various types of habitats as they recognize its interdependence between animals and their environment.

Our boys and girls have learned tons of new, interesting facts in all their core subjects! Thank you for your continued support as we adjust back to the norm! We appreciate all you do and the patience. Again, thank you for being a part of our scholars' learning journey. Stay safe and be well!

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The third-grade teachers and students are in the awe at how quickly the school year is going by since we have returned to school. We are excited about being back in the classroom learning like we used to in the good old days. We are quickly settling in, some more quickly than others. Nonetheless we are getting the groove of things again.



A special shout out and thank you to all the parents who showed up for 'Open House'. It was good seeing each one of you. Each third-grade teacher was able to discuss the road to success in 3rd grade for our scholars. Do not forget parents, that parent/teacher conferences are being scheduled now. Come and sit and talk with your child's teacher about ways you can help at home and the plans to help fill the gap that's missing due to the pandemic. Please be on the lookout for your child coming home with the first STEM project of the school year. The focus this STEM Museum Night is "Pandemic". Third grade will be researching and presenting on sanitizers and masks. Let's start thinking big and creative to explore and present this aspect of a pandemic.

On the other hand, we are anxious to let you know that we are exploring, learning and gathering skills good readers need to be successful readers and in comprehending texts. So far, we have placed in our 'Readers' Toolbox, the skills of how good readers ask and answer questions to help them understand as they read as well as how good readers determine the meaning of new and academic words they meet upon in a text. Recently we have added, how good readers use text features to help them locate information. We will also be looking at how good readers use maps and illustrations in a text. We have recently become mathematicians with adding and subtracting three-digit numbers with regrouping and learning how to round numbers to the nearest 10 or 100 to estimate. Now, we are multiplying using different strategies. Science has taught us that animals are placed into different groups based on their characteristics and the same can be said for flowers. Social Studies is taking us across the world zooming in on regions, oceans and rivers while we begin to write personal narratives.

Oh well! Oh well! We are certainly keeping busy in 3rd grade! Until next time, 'stay safe'.

4th Grade is leveling up!



We are off to a great start. Our scholars are excited about learning! With diagnostic testing now behind us, we have all the information we need to best meet the needs of our Plantation Tigers. This month for Math, we will be focusing on factors, multiples, and prime & composite numbers. For Reading we will learn how to identify Main Idea; using supporting details, make inferences and explain concepts in historical, scientific and technical texts. Rocks and minerals will be our focus for Science, and we will continue to learn the various components of a well-constructed essay.

For our scholars to achieve optimal growth this year, it is imperative that they work in i-Ready for a minimum of 1 hour each week for both Reading and Math. Please continue to monitor your scholars' performance, daily, and maintain open and active communication with their respective teachers.

Tutoring has already begun! Math, Reading and Writing tutoring is available on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, until March. Please see the flyer that was sent home or check the school's website for details.

Active involvement in the academic life of your child and the life of the school, results in your child experiencing tremendous academic growth.

THE GAME IS ON!!

Our fifth graders are now in the first round of the playoffs. We are excited to share that students are currently learning how to analyze multiple texts as they find the main ideas and quote accurately when drawing inferences. In addition, students are explaining the relationship or interactions between events, ideas, or concepts in a historical, scientific, or technical text.

In Science, students have hit several home runs as they work as a Scientist to investigate the different processes in the Water Cycle and the Scientific Method. Students are now exploring how the Water Cycle affects Weather and Climate.

The Math skills students are now developing are Reading, Writing, and Rounding decimals. Students are using models to illustrate and explain the reasoning of decimal comparisons from real-world problems and writing decimals to thousandths using base-ten numerals, number names, and expanded form.

Let's make our students successful by ensuring that: -

- · Assignments are completed.
- · Students work on I-Ready Math and Reading for at least 1 hour each week.
- · Students be a part of the tutoring program that is offered at the school, and
- · An open line of communication is maintained with your child's teacher.

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The peak of the cold and flu season is upon us. To prevent widespread flu in the school, we recommend that your child stay home from school if experiencing flu or severe cold symptoms. To decide whether or not to send your child to school, please consider the following guidelines:



Consider sending your child to school if he or she had the following symptoms:

- Little stuffy or runny nose and/or cough
- Mild sore throat(no fever, no known exposure to strep)
- Mild headache
- Mild stomachache

Definitely keep your child home for treatment and observation if he or she has any of these symptoms:

- Fever(greater than 100 degrees by mouth and your child may return to school only after his or her temperature has been consistently below 100 degrees, by mouth for a minimum of 24 hours)
- Vomiting(even once)
- Diarrhea
- Chills
- General malaise or feelings of fatigue, discomfort, weakness or muscle aches
- Frequent congested (wet) or croupy cough
- Lots of nasal congestion with frequent blowing of nose

To help prevent the flu and other colds, teach your children good hygiene habits:

- Wash hands frequently
- Do not touch eyes, nose or mouth
- Cover mouth and nose when sneezing or coughing,
- use a paper tissue throw it away and then wash hands
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick

Colds are the most contagious during the first 48 hours. A child who has a fever should remain at home until "fever free" for a minimum of 24 hours. A child who has started antibiotics needs to be on the medication for 48 hours before considered non-contagious and able to return to school. Our school clinic has a Health Support Technician that can notify you when your child visits the clinic with any mild symptoms that develop into moderate or severe symptoms. For serious sickness, please keep them home.


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Guidance:

FORTIFYFL TIP REPORTING

The safety and security of our students, staff and schools remain the highest priority for Broward County Public Schools (BCPS). The Division of Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone of the anonymous tip reporting resource FortifyFL and the responsibilities of each school based on Florida Statute.

Section 943.082 (4b) of Florida Statutes states:

"The district school board shall promote the use of the mobile suspicious activity reporting tool (FortifyFL) by advertising it on the school district website, in newsletters, on school campuses, and in school publications, by installing it on all mobile devices issued to students, and by bookmarking the website on all computer devices issued to students."

The FortifyFL app, from the State of Florida, allows individuals to instantly report suspicious activity to appropriate law enforcement agencies and school officials. By accessing FortifyFL, anyone can provide a description of a potential threat, share pictures and videos. Submitting a tip is quick and easy using the mobile app or website. FortifyFL is a free mobile phone application that is available in the Apple App Store and Google Play Store.

In order to further promote the application to students and parents (and to facilitate compliance with this statutory requirement), please post the attached images (available in English, Spanish, and Haitian-Creole) to promote awareness of FortifyFL throughout your school. If you have posters that include SaferWatch, Silence Hurts AND FortifyFL these are acceptable as well. Posters for SaferWatch or Silence Hurts (which do not include FortifyFL) do not satisfy this requirement.

Please remember the purpose of this tool is to report unsafe, potentially harmful, dangerous, violent, criminal activity, or the threat of these activities, to the appropriate authorities. Submissions go directly to school administrative staff, District officials, as well as local law enforcement agencies and will be investigated appropriately.

When submitting a tip, please remember to include as much detail as possible, such as social media handles, images, dates, times, or other relevant information that will assist investigators.

Note that this method of reporting is NOT a replacement for calling 9-1-1, when there is a crime in progress or an emergency.

BCPS encourages everyone to be vigilant in reporting all suspicious activity to the appropriate authorities, regardless of your preferred method of communication. Providing contact information is optional.

Working together, we can improve the safety in schools and our community.
