This month we are working on the theme, "People and Places in Our Community." The scholars are actively participating and enthusiastic as we discuss the theme.

Parents, please remember to always have an extra set of clothing, a blanket, diapers, and wipes for your scholars at school every day. Your child's teacher will be communicating with you to set up appointments for Our Parent Teacher Conferences. Please be on the lookout.

Welcome to December! Our scholars are blossoming and becoming well rounded students just in time for the New Year! Thank you for your continuous efforts in supporting your child as they climb their way to the top of kindergarten success! As always, we look forward to partnering with you in your child's educational journey! **ELA**: Our kindergarteners have been busy learning all about story structure. They are currently being introduced to concepts such as identifying characters and settings of a story. Soon they will be able to retell from the beginning to the end of a story, explaining any major events, problems, and solutions! Our students are utilizing their brainstorming skills to now elaborate on special moments in their lives by drawing and writing. The

writing process is well underway! As always, we are incorporating daily foundational skills along with encouraging independent learning time from our young scholars! We want to remind all parents that it is extremely important that your child be on time and present each day. Please continue reading with your child each evening for 20 minutes and allowing your child to identify their sight words as they read. **Math:** Our kindergarteners are now being introduced to the mathematical concepts of addition and subtraction! We are now beginning to identify addition as putting together and adding to a as well as identifying subtraction as taking apart and taking from.

Science/Social Studies: Our very 1st Museum Night is right around the corner and our little engineers have been busy with their bridge projects! Our scholars continue making observations and collaborating with a partner to collect information, as this is the key to success in reaching our scientific goals!



Happy Fall and welcome to November 2022! Thanks for all you do in supporting your child on their academic journey in first grade. We are elated to partner with you in helping your little ones to grow and develop to their full potential. What we are Learning

ELA: Our 1st Graders are learning about text features in an informational text. They were introduced to using the table of contents, identifying headings, captions, graphs, map, glossaries, and using the illustrations to help them better understand a text. Students are also learning about different styles of writing. They were introduced to expository writing where they are learning how to explain or provide information about a topic using various sources and providing facts. They are also learning how to end their writing with a sense of closure. Please continue to work with your child and read with them every day. **Math:** Our 1st Graders are busy learning

various strategies to add whole numbers with sums from 0-20 and subtract using related facts. Some strategies they have being learning to use are the number line, counting on, the ten frame, using a model and their counters. They are also learning how to apply these skills in solving problems.

Science/Social Studies: Our students are learning how to sort objects by observable properties such as size, shape, texture, temperature whether an object or liquid is hot or cold. They have also been learning how to sort objects by weight or by whether they sink or float. Students have also been learning how to be a responsible citizen at school, at home and in their community.



Second grade continues to succeed! For Reading, in addition to some other standards, we'll be learning how to compare and contrast various elements within a story as well as understanding elements of poetry. We'll examine the particular language used to create and describe this art, as well as creating some poems of our own.

In Math, we'll go deeper and build on the foundation built earlier by looking at twodigit addition with regrouping. In writing, we've all been planning and creating Opinion Essays; now we're creating our own Informational pieces.

Alongside all this hard work, we're busy preparing for Museum Night! Each class has been assigned a specific simple machine type, and through research, experiments, and projects at home, we're looking forward to showcase our learning on December, 6th !





Hola! Hello!

It's unbelievable how quickly time flies when you are learning and having fun. The thirdgrade team cannot believe we are in the month of December and quarter 2 of the 2022-2023 school year already.

It was good to see so many 3rd grade parents at our Family Night/Curriculum Night. I hope you enjoyed the evening and learned a lot. We ask that you share what you learned with your neighbors.

As December is upon us, the 3rd grade teachers would like to remind the parents that attendance is important for the few weeks we will be at school before the winter break. Students are still actively engaged in learning, and we want to encourage you to send the students to school.

STEM Museum night is right around the corner. Third grade students are busy working on their projects. It would mean so much to your child to be here on Museum night to see their projects displayed.

On the third-grade block, we are busy with understanding geometry and measurement in math, classifying animals in science, talking about rules and laws in government and exploring theme and character's perspective in reading.

On the other hand, we ask parents not to forget that 3rd teachers are still conducting their first parent/teacher conference. Please reach out to us. We want to talk to you about how to help your child be successful in 3rd grade.

HEADPHONES! HEADPHONES! Please add them to the Christmas list/wishes. Students need them to use the laptops at school.

It's hard to believe that we are well under way into the second quarter of the school year! Things are moving quickly; students are engaged in learning and teachers are excited to continue to make the magic happen.

What are we learning?

Reading-currently we are working on our literary benchmarks. We are learning how to identify text structure and features in text as we continue to review our previously learned standards so that our scholars achieve mastery.

<u>Math</u>- we continue to build fluency with recalling multiplication facts as we introduce division

Writing- we are sharpening our technique in writing expository essays, as well as how to write in cursive.

Science- 4th grade is ROCKIN' OUT as scholars learn about rocks and minerals

<u>Here are some ways you can support your scholar:</u>

- Maintain communication with your child's teacher
- Monitor and guide scholars at home as they complete homework assignments
- Ask them to explain what they learned in school today
- Encourage them to participate in class and stay focused
- Challenge them to read a new chapter book each month

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We are excited to share that our scholars are using their magical powers to unravel certain Benchmark standards in Reading. They are implementing strategies to enable them to identify Primary and Secondary Sources (ELA.5. R.3.3), following rules taught in English (ELA.C.3.1), using skills to respond and identify expository text, and analyzing author's purpose and perspective in both Reading and Writing (ELA.5.R.2.3).

In Math, scholars are so excited when it comes to solving real-world problems. Here, they are using the relationship between multiplication and division to solve multi-step problems (Envision- Chapter 5 & 6). In addition, scholars are working in pairs to create and explain how the ordered pair helps them to locate destinations (such as building, schools and other places). (Envision- Chapter 7)

When it comes to Science, our scholars are working off the chart to wrap up their presentation on Adaptations of Organism (SC.5.L.17.1) and will be moving on to "The Flow of Energy in a Food Chain "(SC.4.L.17.3)

<u>Let's make our students successful by</u> <u>ensuring that:</u>

- all assignments are completed.
- scholars read for at least 1 hour each day, and
- an open line of communication is maintained with your child's teacher.



December 5-9, 2022, Broward County Schools will be celebrating Inclusive Schools' Week. The word inclusive means to not exclude or leave out any members of a group or parts of a process. Our focus during this week is to ensure that all students feel like they belong and are an important part of our school community.

Plantation Elementary is a cluster school. This means that we have scholars who are autistic. It simply means that they learn differently. Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a developmental disability caused by differences in the brain. Students with ASD typically have difficulty with social communication and interaction, and restricted or repetitive behaviors or interests. They may also have different ways of learning, moving, or paying attention.

During inclusion week there will be activities that will encourage interaction among all students.



FORTIFYFL TIP REPORTING

The safety and security of our students, staff and schools remain the highest priority for Broward County Public Schools (BCPS). The Division of Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone of the anonymous tip reporting resource FortifyFL and the responsibilities of each school based on Florida Statute.

Section 943.082 (4b) of Florida Statutes states:

"The district school board shall promote the use of the mobile suspicious activity reporting tool (FortifyFL) by advertising it on the school district website, in newsletters, on school campuses, and in school publications, by installing it on all mobile devices issued to students, and by bookmarking the website on all computer devices issued to students."

The FortifyFL app, from the State of Florida, allows individuals to instantly report suspicious activity to appropriate law enforcement agencies and school officials. By accessing FortifyFL, anyone can provide a description of a potential threat, share pictures and videos. Submitting a tip is quick and easy using the mobile app or website. FortifyFL is a free mobile phone application that is available in the Apple App Store and Google Play Store.

In order to further promote the application to students and parents (and to facilitate compliance with this statutory requirement), please post the attached images (available in English, Spanish, and Haitian-Creole) to promote awareness of FortifyFL throughout your school. If you have posters that include SaferWatch, Silence Hurts AND FortifyFL these are acceptable as well. Posters for SaferWatch or Silence Hurts (which do not include FortifyFL) do not satisfy this requirement.

Please remember the purpose of this tool is to report unsafe, potentially harmful, dangerous, violent, criminal activity, or the threat of these activities, to the appropriate authorities. Submissions go directly to school administrative staff, District officials, as well as local law enforcement agencies and will be investigated appropriately.

When submitting a tip, please remember to include as much detail as possible, such as social media handles, images, dates, times, or other relevant information that will assist investigators.

Note that this method of reporting is NOT a replacement for calling 9-1-1, when there is a crime in progress or an emergency.

BCPS encourages everyone to be vigilant in reporting all suspicious activity to the appropriate authorities, regardless of your preferred method of communication. Providing contact information is optional.

Working together, we can improve the safety in schools and our community.
