

Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Named to Advanced Placement School Honor Roll

Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School recognized for student success in Advanced Placement program while broadening access.

Parkland, Florida – College Board announced that Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School has been named to the Advanced Placement® Program (AP®) School Honor Roll, earning Silver distinction.

The AP® School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students while broadening access. Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School had 62% of seniors who took at least one AP exam during high school, 49% of seniors scoring a three or higher on at least one AP exam, and 23% of seniors who took five or more AP exams!
