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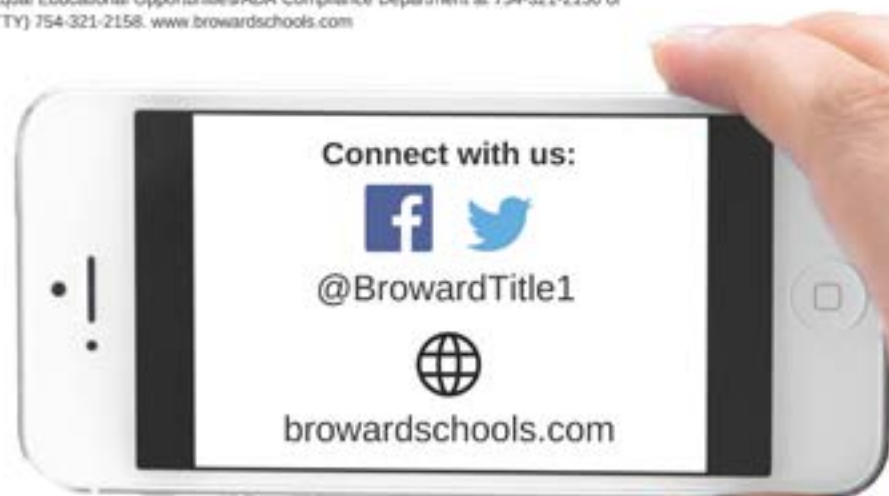


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Our Mission

The Title I, Migrant Education and Special Programs department is pleased to share with you our annual guide that's used to inform you of our programs and services.

Title I, Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) supports reforms and innovations to improve educational opportunities for low income students. In December 2015, President Obama signed into law the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) which reauthorized ESEA. ESSA includes provisions that broaden the definitions of educational excellence, while maintaining critical civil rights for all students. In addition, ESSA includes provisions designed to focus on providing students the diverse, integrated curriculum and learning experiences necessary for a well-rounded education.

The School Board of Broward County receives an annual allocation of federal dollars that provide supplemental resources to schools that have a high percentage of children who qualify for free or reduced-price lunch. Please peruse our guide and familiarize yourself with information that supports teaching and learning in our district.

Title I News Frequently Asked Questions



What is the purpose of Title I?

The purpose of Title I is to support school efforts to ensure that all children meet challenging academic standards and have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education. This purpose can be accomplished by providing additional resources for high poverty schools to enhance educational opportunities for disadvantaged students. Title I funds must be used in addition to District and State funds. All of the services students would receive in the absence of Title I must be in place before Title I funds are used.

How are Title I schools selected?

Schools are selected to receive Title I services when the school's level of poverty is at or above 50% (based upon the number of students who qualify for free/reduced price meals). Title I funds are used to serve as many schools as possible while targeting resources sufficiently to schools where needs are greatest.

How many students participate in Title I?

In FY 20, a projected 102,020 students in 200 public and charter schools will receive Title I services.

Which students are targeted for Title I services?

Students in grades K-8 who are identified as failing, or most at risk of failing to meet the State's challenging performance standards and have the greatest need for special assistance in these schools and institutions:

- 108 School-wide projects in District elementary schools
- 37 School-wide projects in District middle schools
- 55 Charter schools in Broward County
- 70 Non-public schools in Broward County
- 6 Institutions for neglected youth
- 5 Institutions for delinquent youth

How do children in public charter schools become eligible for Title I services?

In order to receive Title I funds, a public charter school must meet the same eligibility requirements as district public schools.

How are private school children selected for Title I program services?

Private school children who are assigned to a Title I eligible public school may receive services if the private school they attend meets qualifications for requesting and receiving federally funded Title I services and participates in timely and meaningful consultation throughout the year with the LEA.

How are children in institutions for the neglected or delinquent youth eligible for Title I services?

Children in designated institutions for neglected or delinquent youth that are approved by the Florida Department of Education are eligible for Title I services.

What is the role of parents in the Title I program?

Public Law 107-110 mandates that a district may not receive Title I funds unless parents are involved in planning and implementing the Title I program. A greater emphasis is placed on having schools help parents to help their children through direct parental involvement in the educational process, such as homework monitoring, enhanced communication between teachers and parents, home visits, school parent compacts and other mechanisms. Each Title I school must conduct a Title I Annual Public Meeting.

A+ Title I, Part A - Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged

The School Board of Broward County (SBBC), Title I, Part A Program supports school efforts in ensuring that all children meet challenging academic standards by providing resources to schools with economically disadvantaged students. Our district operates Title I Schoolwide programs that provide all students with access to services. These resources provide additional teachers, professional development, extra time for teaching, parent engagement activities, and other supplementary instructional activities designed to raise student achievement.



Charter Schools
In order to receive Title I funds, a public charter school must meet the same eligibility requirements as district public schools.

Homeless Education Homeless Education Assistance Resource Team (HEART)
The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act of 2001 was amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015. These very important federal laws protect the educational rights of students (PreK-12) who have lost housing and are living in transition. The ultimate goal is to remove barriers that might prevent students experiencing homelessness from enrolling, attending and succeeding in school.

Early Childhood
Title I provides high-quality, early childhood programs that reach families and impact children that are at risk. With highly qualified teachers and support staff, the children will be immersed in an engaging, developmentally appropriate classroom that is designed for academic, social, and emotional development. Our preschool program plays a key role in ensuring that our students are prepared to meet the challenging state academic achievement standards as they enter elementary school.

Parent and Family Engagement
The Title I program for parents and families is designed to 1) inform parents about Title I regulations, 2) involve parents in local Title I decisions, 3) provide literacy training, 4) offer parents training in schools and the community on ways to work with their children at home to raise student achievement, and 5) encourage active participation in their children's schools and education.

Public Law 114-95 requires:

- School districts (Local Education Agency – LEA) that receive Title I federal funds develop a LEA Parent and Family Engagement Plan. The parent and family engagement plan is distributed at the district's and school's parent meetings. The LEA Parent and Family Engagement Plan is also made available for your review on the Title I website <http://www.browardschools.com/page/34284>, at the individual school's website or by contacting the Title I, Migrant Education and Special Programs Department at (754) 321-1400.
- All Title I schools develop jointly, with parents of participating children, a School-Level Parent and Family Engagement Plan (written agreement) that states what parents, students and the school will do together to raise student achievement. This document is generally distributed during the first week of school. Once received, please sign the School-Parent Compact and return it to the school. You may request a copy of the School-Level Parent and Family Engagement Plan by contacting your child's school.
- Each Title I school is to spend their Title I parent involvement allocation on parent and family engagement activities.
- Conduct, with the involvement of parents/guardians, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the parent and family engagement plan and activities in improving the academic quality of the schools served.

Foster Care Program
Children who have been determined to have been, or are at risk of, abuse, neglect, or abandonment while in the care of their parents or legal guardian may be involved in Dependency Court. The Student Services Department provides support to the student and their family by providing a Dependency Court Liaison who monitors juvenile dependency shelter hearings daily and attends review hearings as needed.

Private Schools
Private school children who reside in a Title I eligible public-school zone may receive services if the private school they attend meets qualifications for requesting and receiving federally funded Title I services and participates in timely and meaningful consultation throughout the year with the LEA.

Title I, Part C Education of Migratory Children

The School Board of Broward County (SBBC) supports high-quality education programs to help migratory children overcome educational disruption, cultural and language barriers, social isolation and other factors that inhibit the ability of such children to meet the challenging state content and performance standards which all children are expected to meet. The goal of the Migrant Education Program (MEP) is to provide for the unmet needs of children of migratory agricultural workers and migratory fishermen.

The term "migrant child" means a child who is not older than 21 years of age, entitled to a free public education (under State law) or the child is not yet at grade level at which the District (Local Education Agency LEA) provides free public education, and made a qualifying move in the preceding 36 months as a migrant agricultural worker or migratory fisher, or did so with, or to join, a parent/guardian or spouse who is a migratory agricultural worker or migratory fisher. The identification and recruitment process ensure that eligible migrant children are provided with appropriate educational services that address their unique needs in a coordinated and efficient manner. Migrant recruiters coordinate visits with local agencies, farms, and local areas such as; schools, churches, supermarkets, health department offices, social services offices in the neighborhoods where migrant families live to help in the identification process.



Migrant Education Program (MEP) Services

Support is derived from federal funds via the Florida Department of Education and through collaboration with other federal programs and community partnerships. Services include student enrollment, coordination of services with other federal programs, referrals to community agencies, family literacy, academic support and advocacy.



Family Engagement

Parents are kept abreast of the Migrant Education Program through parent meetings, flyers, home and school visits, and phone calls. Parents are encouraged to become participants in their children's education by volunteering at school and in the classroom. In addition, parents are encouraged to attend school sponsored parent training/workshops and other school and District related activities.



Migrant 3 and 4-Year-Old Pre-K Program

The Migrant Education Program provides services to eligible migrant preschool children at Robert C. Markham Elementary School located in Pompano Beach, Florida. A high quality, developmentally appropriate Pre-K instructional program is provided to three and four-year-old migrant children.

Title I, Part D Neglected and Delinquent Program

The purpose of this program is to improve the quality of education in facilities for neglected and delinquent youth, promote smooth transitions into and out of institutions, prevent dropout, and provide young people with reentry support to ensure their continued education and involvement of their families and communities.

Students residing in homes for neglected youth participate in the regular academic program at their assigned public schools. Students who are identified as needing additional academic assistance receive supplemental after-school tutorial services provided by a certified teacher funded through Title I. For students residing in institutions for delinquent youth, Title I funds the services of paraprofessionals or retired teachers to assist students with language arts and mathematics skills under the supervision of the classroom teacher. Transition specialists play a key role in assisting students who are exiting the Delinquent Program. They ensure that students have a seamless transition back to their home school or the appropriate placement. All services are coordinated with the local dropout prevention program, juvenile justice system, existent health services, and other educational programs designed to meet the particular needs of at-risk youth.

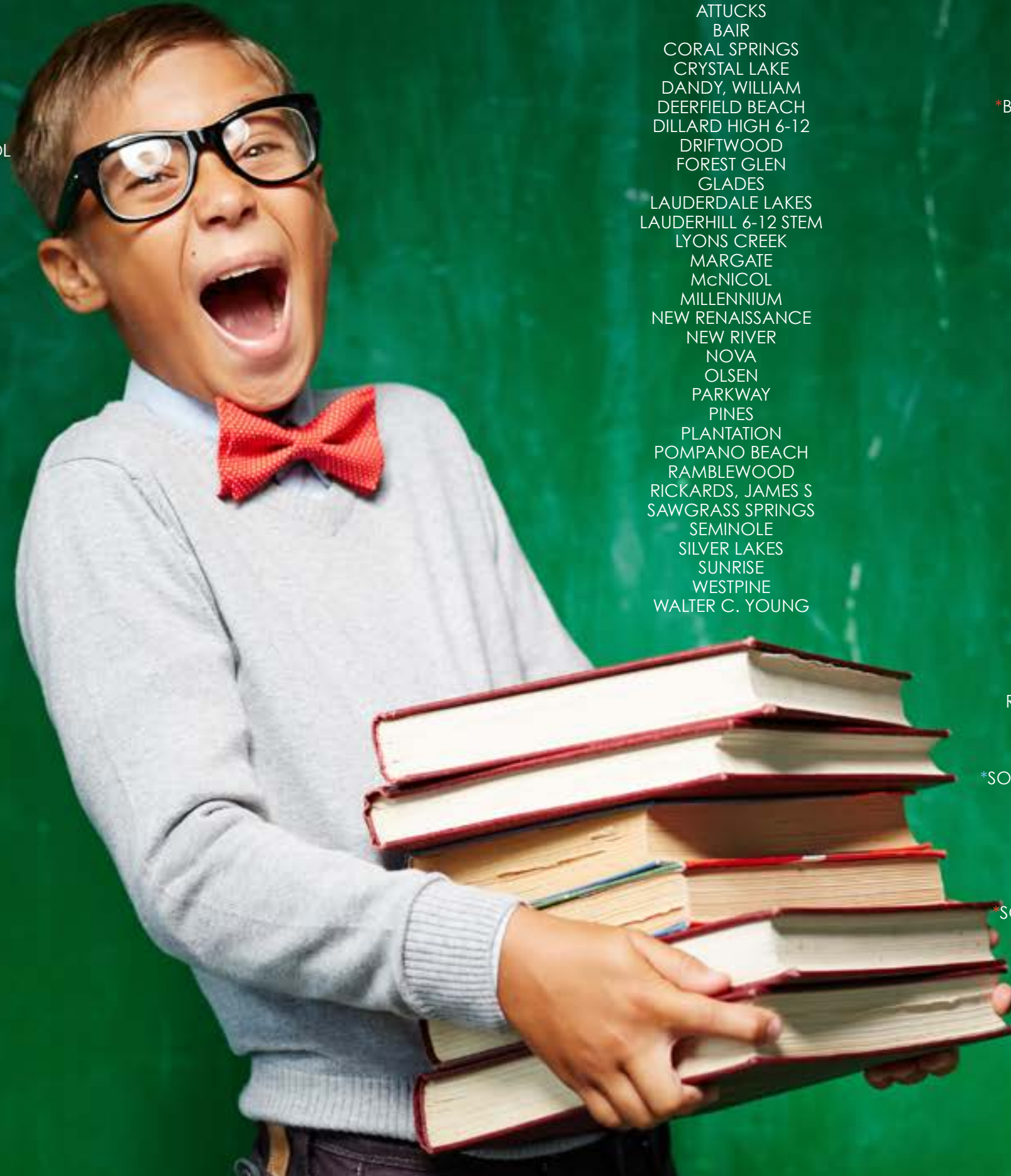
