#### House Bill 279 - False Reporting

#### **Broward Students Inspire Legislation**

During Capitol Days, a group of Broward County students met with State Representative Michael Gottlieb to share their idea of penalizing false 911 calls related to social media threats that lead to school lockdowns or evacuations. Representative Gottlieb praised the concept, credited the students for inspiring the initiative, and has since taken steps to turn it into legislation.

## Board Update (FY 2024-25) AP/IB/AICE Course Funding Changes

Per Senator Danny Burgess, Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Pre-K - 12 Education, proposed changes have been made to how Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and AICE courses will be funded in the 2024-25 school year.

Each course will continue to be funded at approximately \$852. Previously, districts received an additional \$852 per student who earned a qualifying exam score—effectively double funding. Under the Senate's proposal, that bonus would be adjusted to \$426 per qualifying student. This amount is intended to cover testing costs and teacher bonuses, with any remaining funds included in overall district allocations.

Importantly, districts would gain flexibility: while they may continue to reinvest these funds in advanced programs, they could also use the dollars for other local needs such as teacher salary increases or student services. It's important to note that while this proposal has been put forward by the Senate, the House has not yet agreed to it. We remain in a waiting period, and no funding changes are finalized at this time.

#### **Board Update Senate Bill 7034**

#### **Committee Advances Targeted Tax Relief**

The Florida Senate Committee on Finance and Tax, chaired by Senator Bryan Avila, has passed Senate Proposed Bill (SPB) 7034, a targeted tax relief measure aimed at supporting Florida families and seniors.

The bill permanently eliminates sales tax on clothing and shoes priced at \$75 or less and reduces vehicle tag fees for one year. It also establishes the 2025 Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday, scheduled for August 1–10, 2025. During this period, backpacks priced at \$100 or less, school supplies at \$50 or less, learning aids and puzzles at \$30 or less, and personal computers or related accessories (including non-recreational software) priced at \$1,500 or less will all be tax-exempt. This legislation is designed to reduce everyday expenses, particularly for families with growing children and seniors who frequently replace essential items, while also expanding access to educational tools.

## For your Knowledge

#### **Budget Conference Process in Tallahassee**

The Senate (SB 2500) and House (HB 5001) proposed budgets currently have a \$4.4 billion difference. **The Senate bill has been passed as amended by the House, and now the bill will proceed to conference for further negotiations and alignment.** The budget conference process in Tallahassee is how the Florida Legislature finalizes the state budget when the House and Senate have differences in their proposed versions. After both chambers pass their own budgets, legislative leaders appoint members—called conferees—to work in joint committees to negotiate and settle those differences.

These conference committees are divided by budget areas like education, health care, and transportation. If the smaller subcommittees can't agree on certain items, those issues are escalated—or "bumped up"—to the full budget chairs or even to the Senate President and House Speaker for final decisions.

Once all differences are resolved, a final version of the budget, called the conference report, is completed. There is a required 72-hour waiting period before the Legislature can vote to approve the budget. After final approval, the budget goes to the Governor, who can veto specific line items before signing it into law.

Reenacts a section of the School Safety Awareness Program to include amendments regarding penalties for submitting false reports through FortifyFL, highlighting criminal penalties and potential disclosure of the user's IP address to law enforcement for further investigation.

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The bill increases penalties for false reporting and misuse of 911 services, especially when it results in serious injury or death. It lowers the threshold for felony charges from four to two prior convictions and ensures that withheld adjudication or nolo contendere counts toward that total. Courts must now order restitution for damages and costs related to emergency responses, and the Criminal Punishment Code is updated to include the new offenses.

The bill expands diabetes care in public schools by allowing schools to obtain, store, and administer undesignated glucagon for emergencies. It authorizes prescriptions through county health departments, ensures parental notification and emergency response after use, and provides liability protection for those involved. The State Board of Education and Department of Health are tasked with developing implementation rules.

The bill authorizes public schools to obtain, store, and administer undesignated glucagon for diabetic students during hypoglycemic emergencies. It allows acquisition through various means, including prescriptions from county health departments, and requires trained staff to administer it according to medical plans. The bill also provides civil and criminal liability protection for those acting in good faith.

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The bill allows certain entities to conduct volunteer background screenings and requires school districts to adopt policies for the temporary removal of instructional personnel from the classroom within 24 hours of specific arrest notifications. It also expands law enforcement's obligation to notify school districts of such arrests within 48 hours and mandates that instructional and administrative personnel self-report qualifying arrests or judgments within the same timeframe, while ensuring confidentiality is maintained.

The bill updates background screening requirements for athletic coaches by expanding the definition to include assistant coaches, managers, and referees who interact with minors. It extends the deadline for independent sanctioning authorities to complete Level 2 background screenings to July 1, 2026. The bill prohibits unscreened individuals from coaching unless exempted or directly supervised by a screened coach.

The bill prohibits out-of-school suspensions based solely on attendance records and mandates that in-school suspensions and certain extracurricular activities count toward attendance. It requires the State Board of Education to create a statewide attendance policy, define types of absences, and provide guidelines for reporting. The bill also strengthens school district responsibilities for addressing absenteeism, requiring prompt reporting of unexcused absences and engagement with families for remediation. It specifies that absences from religious observances or family-bereavement be excused. The bill refines definitions related to school attendance and truancy.

The bill prohibits student use of wireless communication devices throughout the entire school day, removing the allowance for teachers to designate areas for device use during instructional time. It requires district school boards to create rules specifying where students may use devices under administrator supervision. Exceptions are allowed for students with an IEP, 504 plan, or a doctor's note.

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The bill updates Florida statutes for apprenticeship and preapprenticeship programs, including new standards, funding structures, and reporting requirements. It mandates an annual apprenticeship report, a standard contract template for local agencies, and a fund transparency tool by July 2026. The bill also revises guidelines for the District Workforce Education Funding Steering Committee and requires a workforce education funding report to legislative committees two months before the session.

The bill increases liability limits for tort claims against the state and its subdivisions, allowing settlements above the statutory limit without legislative approval. It revises claim presentation deadlines, statute of limitations, and clarifies insurance policy conditions. It also shortens the time for final claim dispositions, deeming claims denied if not resolved within the specified period.

The bill imposes an eight-year consecutive term limit for county commissioners and district school board members. For district school board members, the limit applies to terms beginning on or after November 8, 2022.

## • <u>SB 822 – Education</u> by Senator Ana Maria Rodriguez

The bill updates Florida statutes on charter schools by allowing governing boards to adopt their own student conduct codes, expanding enrollment flexibility for eligible schools, and granting high-performing charter schools authority to assume or consolidate charters. It restricts landlord-related individuals from serving on governing boards (with some exceptions), outlines sponsor service obligations and fee limits, clarifies data reporting responsibilities, and reaffirms that charter schools must comply with public records, student welfare, and operational statutes. **Status**: Passed; On Committee agenda - Rules, 04/21/25, 2:00 pm

 <u>HB 443 - Charter Schools</u> by Representatives John Snyder and Alex Rizo (Comparable Bill) Status: Placed on Special Order Calendar, 04/24/25

## <u>SB 1150 - School Social Workers</u> by Senator Alexis Calatayud

Exempts school social workers from certain educator certification requirements.

#### <u>SB 1514 - Anaphylaxis in Public Schools</u> by Senator Carlos Guillermo Smith

The bill requires K-8 schools to train staff to recognize and respond to anaphylaxis and ensure student emergency action plans are accessible at all times. It mandates training in the use of FDA-approved epinephrine devices and directs the State Board of Education, with the Department of Health, to adopt implementation rules by October 1, 2025.

### • <u>SB 140 - Charter Schools</u> by Senator Don Gaetz

The bill expands eligibility for conversion charter schools and establishes "job engine charter schools" to support



economic development. It allows municipalities to apply for conversion charters without teacher approval and adds enrollment preference for children of employees from key local businesses. The bill also outlines annual reporting requirements for job engine charters, prohibits school boards from charging rent for conversion charter properties, and includes charter schools in workforce development grant programs.

• <u>SB 650 - Hazardous Walking Conditions</u> by Senator Tom Leek Revises the criteria for hazardous walking conditions by including walkways along limited access roads, while preserving exceptions for areas with low traffic or speed limits.

#### • <u>SB 1122 - Florida Virtual School</u> by Senator Colleen Burton

Amends Florida Virtual School regulations to ensure universal student access, strengthen governance, and clarify funding provisions. Key changes include removing enrollment prioritization, expanding communication requirements, granting sovereign immunity to staff, and allowing broader use of supplemental funding. The bill also updates leadership roles, simplifies audit procedures, and affirms eligibility for state employee benefits, while ensuring access to international assessments.

• <u>HB 885 - Florida Virtual School</u> by Representative David Smith (Comparable Bill) Status: Placed on Calendar, on 2nd reading

#### HB 5009 - Government Administration by Representative Tyler I. Sirois

Section 2 of the bill amends s. 11.40, F.S., to modify the authority of the Joint Legislative Auditing Committee. Instead of directing the Department of Revenue and Department of Financial Services to withhold funds from noncompliant local governments or district school boards, the committee would now advise these agencies to take such action. This change softens the committee's enforcement role, shifting from a mandatory to a recommended approach.

#### • <u>SB 1590 - Educator Preparation</u> by Senator Danny Burgess

Modernizes teacher certification and training in Florida by updating educator standards, creating a new readiness exam, and establishing a job-embedded certification pathway (CERT). Requires evidence-based instruction in teacher prep programs and enhances professional learning, including mentor training and use of state-approved materials.
