

ABOUT BROWARD COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The goal of the Broward County Public Schools is to provide students in kindergarten through adult programs with the best in educational opportunities. Broward County Public Schools is the eighth largest school district in the nation, and the second largest in Florida. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) has accredited every school and every center in the school district - making Broward's public schools the largest fully accredited school district in the United States. Each school or center meets more than 70 rigorous standards set by SACS.

In 1987, over 136,650 students (K - 12) and more than 125,000 adults were offered educational programs at 101 elementary schools, 27 middle schools, 21 high schools, 3 area vocational centers, 4 adult centers, 8 exceptional student centers, 2 alternative centers, and 18 community schools. Over 14,000 permanent employees work to make the day-to-day operation of the school district a continued success. The school district is the largest employer in Broward County.

The school district is a county-wide system. Administratively, the system is divided into three areas - north, central and south. An area superintendent is responsible for each area. It is the responsibility of the area superintendents to provide principals, teachers, and students in their area with the necessary leadership to support school based programs which carry out the policies of the School Board. This structure allows the school district to be more responsive to local community needs.

On the county level, the administrative functions are divided into five divisions: Instruction/Program Services; Government, Employee and Community Relations; Human Resource Management and Development; Business/Support Services; and Facilities, Property Management and Maintenance.

The School Board of Broward County, Florida is a seven member board with each member serving a four year term. The Superintendent of Schools is appointed by the School Board. The

Board meets regularly on the first and third Thursday of each month at 10:00 a.m. in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 1320 Southwest Fourth Street, Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Conference sessions are held on alternate Thursdays.

Exceptional Student Education

The Exceptional Student Education program provides comprehensive educational programs for all handicapped and gifted students. Exceptional Student programs include services to students certified as Educable Mentally Handicapped, Trainable Mentally Handicapped, Profoundly Retarded, Specific Learning Disabled, Emotionally Handicapped, Speech and Language Impaired, Deaf, Hard of Hearing, Partially Sighted, Blind, Physically Handicapped, Hospital, Homebound and Gifted. Ranked among the most comprehensive and progressive in the United States, approximately 20,000 students benefit from these programs.

Vocational, Technical and Adult Education (VTAE)

VTAE spans an extensive range of career opportunities, from surgical technology to nursery operations and a host of marketable job skills in between. Over 60 occupational programs are taught including business, industrial, trades, medical, marketing, communications, public/personal services, home economics, agriculture and tourism.

Vocational and technical programs combine advanced technology and up-to-the-minute training geared to the needs of business and industry in South Florida. The adult education programs provide vital basic skills every student must have to benefit from career training, as well as invaluable opportunities for personal growth and enrichment. Programs are available to provide academic remediation and basic academic skills including preparation for the General Education Development (G.E.D.) diploma.

State-of-the-art equipment, qualified staff, and nationally recognized programs for every segment of the population has been rewarded by broad-based support from both public and private sectors. District vocational centers boast some of the finest training facilities in Florida. The three full-time centers are Sheridan Vocational-Technical Center and McFatter Vocational-Technical Center. Vocational-Technical Center and adult education programs are offered in hundreds of school- and community-based locations.

Vocational, Technical, and Adult Education offers the widest possible spectrum of career training -- pretechnical, technical, and professional - covering virtually every career field. More than 67 craft advisory committees composed of industry professionals make invaluable curriculum recommendations.

A special program called "Industry Services" is designed to help new and emerging industries in Broward County meet their current and future labor needs.

Student Services

In an effort to meet the challenge of educating students in a modern day, urban society, Broward has gone beyond Florida's minimally prescribed student services program. The program includes Dropout Prevention/Alternative Education, Evaluation and Testing, Guidance and Occupational Specialist, Psychological Services, School Social Work and Attendance and Family Counseling and Parenting Education. It is a support program that delivers specialized services to students, school staff and parents. Student Services plays an integral part in assessing student academic and psycho-social skills, communication and learning skills, citizenship education, career and occupational education, home and family relationships, and human relations. In addition, specialized services are directed to the early identification of students at risk along with development of educational alternative programs and other dropout prevention strategies.

Magnet and Open Boundary Schools

Magnet schools are centered around a specialized curriculum such as music, science, pre-engineering, performing arts, foreign language, or a traditional learning program. These schools are designed to attract and motivate students as they encourage voluntary desegregation.

Magnet programs are programs which have a unique course of study and open or extended boundaries. They may be open to students only in a particular area or open to all students in the County. Transportation is provided for students residing more than two miles from the school. The current magnet schools include:

Science Engineering Program - Ely High School

This program comprises a rigorous four year course of study forstudents who plan to continue their education in the fields of Engineering, Science and Technology. Graduating seniors in 1986/87 received over \$200,000 in scholarships.

International Studies - Hallandale High School

The four year International Studies program focuses on a study of cultures through language, art, music, economics and political science. Working in cooperation with Florida International University, students attend speakers' series and cultural events as well as interact with University faculty and students.

Performing Arts - Dillard High School

The Performing Arts Program offers training in dance, voice, instrumental and electronic music and other performing art areas. Students also take coursework in stagecraft and costume design. Performances in the community complement the students regular performing schedule.

International Baccalaureate - Boyd Anderson High School

Two year course of study leading to examinations for the Baccalaureate diploma. This program is designed to educate the whole person through a rigorous liberal arts curriculum which includes a community service requirement. The pre-International Baccalaureate program offered in grades 9 and 10 will prepare students for the actual coursework requirements of the International Baccalaureate program.

Performing Arts - Parkway Middle School

In its first year of operation, the Parkway Performing Arts Program parallels the Dillard Program. Over one hundred and seventy-five magnet students are presently enrolled with plans for expansion next year.

Computer/High Technology - Parkway Middle School

The use of computers and technologically advanced equipment to aid the learner in the educational process will be the focus of this program. Allowing students to progress at their own rate and monitor their progress will attract students with diverse educational needs. The role of the teacher as imparter of knowledge will change to that of coach and facilitator. With the introduction and

intense use of computers and technology the instructional day, as we now know it, can be varied on an individual basis.

Performing Arts - Walker Elementary, Bethune Elementary and Deerfield Park Elementary

One elementary performing arts magent program is located in each geographic area. Bethune Elementary serves the south area; WalkerElementary serves the central area, and Deerfield Park serves the north area. In addition to the students' basic academic education, training in art, music, drama and dance is offered.

The nationally recognized Nova schools offer varying programs. Students throughout the county may apply for admission to these schools.

Exemplary Programs

The Broward Compact - This five year comprehensive educational plan for the school system was created as a cooperative effort between business, government, the community and education. Emphasis is on developing meaningful partnerships between education and business to improve the delivery of education services to all students and, as a result, provide Broward graduates with jobs. This is one of the County's showcase examples of community involvement with the public schools. More than 90 organizations participated in the planning process which developed 55 operational goals. These goals and objectives touch every aspect of the educational system. At the end of the first year of effort, nearly one-fifth of the Broward Compact goals had been addressed. Some accomplishments include establishing a Job Network, matching graduate skills with requirements of entry level jobs.

An adopt-a-school program called *Partners In Excellence* has matched 125 schools with 75 different businesses in the community. These partnerships facilitate the achievement of school district and community goals.

Computers - Broward County's student to computer ration ranks first among the 50 largest school districts in the nation, with a student-computer ratio of 18:1. The Association of Educational Data Systems

has named Broward as one of the top ten school district leaders in computer education in the nation.

New teaching methods are used in district pilot programs. The Nova Elementary, Middle and High Schools are 4 of only 24 schools accepted into the Coalition of Essential Schools - a nationally recognized program developed by Dr. Theodore Sizer of Brown University. Coalition programs help students learn by strengthening critical thinking skills.

The Saturday Screening Program serves Kindergarten students entering public school for the first time. Health screening teams provide parents with diagnostic screen services for children in the areas of health and education. Over 6,000 students attend the Saturday Screening Program each year.

Homework Hotline is the district's outreach, a homework assistance program which was established two years ago. Over 13,000 calls have been answered so far; more than half of these calls have been math related. There are also 10 walk-in Homework Hotline centers located throughout the County.


A Drug/Alcohol Education and Prevention Program was recognized by the Governor's Commission on Substance Abuse as the most outstanding school based program in Florida. The program was also recognized by the U.S. Office of Education as a model prevention/early intervention program. Every student (K-12) in the school system is exposed to course material through a comprehensive, sequentially developed curriculum.

A Peer Counseling Program serves as a model for the U.S. Office of Education, and has been cited as "The Outstanding Preventive Program" by the National Schools Resource Network. This program, which teaches students how to help themselves by helping others, is the largest full-time program in the state and nation.

Innovative Curriculum, an inservice training seminar on a newly developed curriculum about the Holocaust was sponsored for secondary social studies teachers. The curriculum assists staff in teaching this significant part of history. This curriculum is the first of its kind in the nation.
