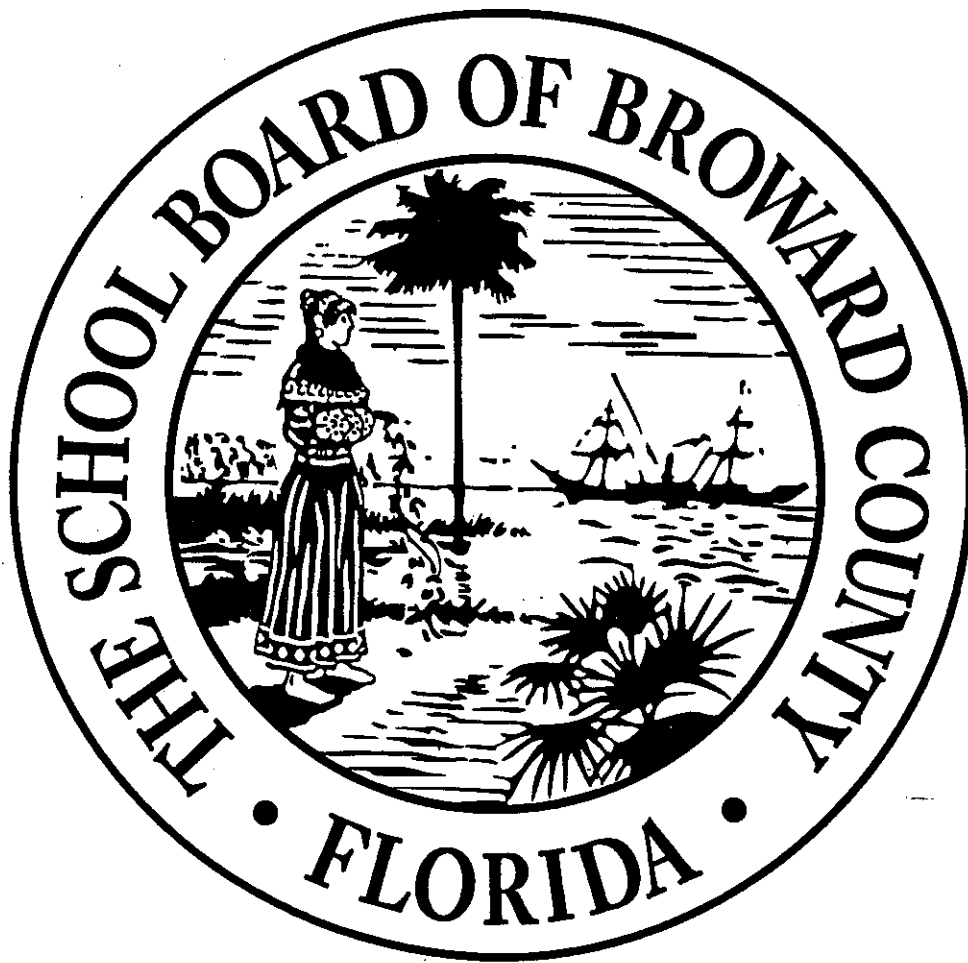

OVERVIEW

In January, the 1994-95 School Attendance Areas (Boundaries) and School Usage Recommendations were submitted for your consideration. After reviewing the proposed changes, I am submitting revised recommendations for your review and consideration. These recommendations will be discussed on February 22nd.

Having looked at the existing situation and been made aware of your concerns, I believe it is time that we actively pursue a systematic review of all attendance areas. This District must be proactive in its approach toward desegregation. We need to be in a position not only to recommend policy, but to gain the confidence of the community. We must develop a system wide policy on growth and desegregation. We cannot view the school attendance areas in isolation. Attendance areas must be reviewed in conjunction with overcrowding and future growth projections, our commitment to desegregation, and safety issues. The right size for a school, how the overcrowded schools should be capped, utilization of portables, feeder patterns, reconfiguration of schools, innovation zones, controlled choice, and other related considerations must also be included in the review.

I believe the Desegregation Task Force needs to be the top priority. This task force has been educated with the proper information, data, and history of the School District. To accomplish my priorities with regard to boundaries, I believe the existing Desegregation Task Force should be expanded to include a larger community base of representation. I will instruct them to expand their purpose by evaluating all the attendance zones in the District. This will be done through deliberation with the staff and public forum hearings, hosted by the Area Superintendents, to receive input from the community. Subsequent to the Desegregation Task Force's review and recommendations, specific areas of the county will be targeted for the implementation of alternatives.

This year, I am also recommending that a special subcommittee of the Desegregation Task Force be convened to develop an alternative proposal addressing the desegregation of Sanders Park Elementary School and other area elementary schools. The subcommittee will include representatives from the northeast community.

Based upon my review and consultation with the staff, I am proposing five changes for elementary school attendance areas for the 1994-95 school year which will require School Board action during the public hearing process. No changes are being recommended to the current middle and high school attendance areas. The attendance areas for all other schools in the district will remain as they are now, or will follow previously approved grade phase-in schedules.

The elementary changes proposed for the 1994-95 school year include the following:

- Establishing the boundary for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary, which is scheduled to open in August 1994. A Montessori Magnet Program is proposed for this new elementary school. The program would draw eligible elementary students countywide. A School Near The Workplace Program is also proposed for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, including a preschool component. Some students who currently attend Walker and Harbordale elementary schools would be assigned to Virginia S. Young Elementary School; and
- Establishing the boundary for New Elementary School "G-91," which is scheduled to open in the fall of 1995. Students will be assigned to an existing portable facility for the 1994-95 school year. Some students who currently attend Indian Trace Elementary School will be assigned to Elementary School "G-91."

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE 1994-95 SCHOOL YEAR

The specific attendance area changes and the proposed programs for the 1994-95 school year include the following:

Virginia Shuman Young, Walker and Harbordale Elementary Schools:

Recommendations E-1:

Establish a Montessori Magnet Program at Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School.

- Elementary students countywide, who meet the eligibility requirements, may apply to the program. Equal spaces will be made available for black students and white students up to a potential 250 spaces each, to help provide an integrated membership in the school. The Magnet Policy #5004 will be revised to reflect the criteria for the Montessori Magnet Program.
- The Montessori approach to learning develops independent learners and thinkers. Children use specific materials which will help them learn through their senses about practical life, mathematics, language, and cultural subjects. Students choose activities which interest them and develop skills and acquire knowledge as they work.
- The Montessori Program will be a full Program for preschool three and four year olds, kindergarten and first grade students. A Transition Montessori Program will be offered to students in grades two through five, phasing in as a full Montessori.
- A Magnet Lead Teacher (half time) will be designated to provide curriculum support and to market the program, while involving the community. Montessori certified teachers will be recruited as faculty to keep training costs at a minimum.
- The Montessori Magnet Program will be marketed by contacting and working with the Downtown Development Authority, the Greater Ft. Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce and other groups.
- The Magnet Program will provide opportunities for students in other areas of the county, who may attend overcrowded schools.
- Before and after school care will be available for magnet students.

Designate Virginia S. Young as a School Near the Workplace, including a preschool component.

- The School Near The Workplace Program will provide additional opportunities to families in Broward County. Parents of kindergarten through fifth grade students who may be assigned to overcrowded schools in other parts of the County, who work in the downtown area north of New River, and who meet the Workplace Program guidelines may apply to attend Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School.
- The Workplace Program will include a Montessori preschool component. Parents with preschool children, ages three and four, who work within a two mile radius of Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, north of New River, and who meet the Workplace Program guidelines may apply for admission to the Workplace Program.
- Families who reside in the proposed Virginia S. Young Elementary School neighborhood boundary area would also have the opportunity for participation in the preschool program.
- The preschool component of the Workplace Program will provide additional incentives for participation. Funding will be a combination of fee-supported and district preschool grant funds, if the family meets the low income eligibility guidelines. The specific details of the preschool program are to be determined. Consideration will be given to contracting with private providers for the delivery of services on the school site.
- The preschool and the before and after school care components for school aged children are proposed to operate on a year round basis.

Recommendation E-2:

Reassign the areas east of the F.E.C. Railroad from Walker Elementary School to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School:

- The proposed change will reduce overcrowding at Walker Elementary School by moving a projected one-hundred and six (106) students to Virginia S. Young Elementary School and will provide opportunities for growth in the Performing Arts Magnet Program.

Recommendation E-3:

Reassign areas from Harbordale Elementary School to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School:

- The proposed change will move boundary lines from the middle of local streets to adjacent canals thereby allowing all of the Victoria Park neighborhood to attend the same school. Three (3) students would be reassigned from this area.

Recommendation E-4:

Reassign an area from Walker Elementary School to Harbordale Elementary School:

- The change will move a boundary line from the middle of a local street to an adjacent canal. No students currently attend public school in this area.

Based upon the proposal outlined, which includes the neighborhood boundary area, the proposed Montessori Magnet Program, the Workplace Program and potential additional neighborhood students, we estimate a membership next fall at Virginia S. Young Elementary School of four-hundred and seventy-three (473) students. It is anticipated that the potential membership would be comprised of 42% black students.

**Portable Elementary School/ New Elementary School "G-91",
Indian Trace Elementary School:**

Recommendation E-5:

Establish the boundaries for Elementary School "G-91," a new school to be located on Indian Trace Boulevard, south of I-75, anticipated to open in the fall of 1995. Open Elementary School "G-91" in an existing portable facility located at 270 North New River Circle, in the city of Sunrise. Adjust the boundary of Indian Trace Elementary School to bring students to the Elementary School "G-91" attendance area.

- This change will relieve overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School. Indian Trace has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776. The projection for next fall with the current boundary area exceeds 1750 students.
- The boundary area will be established for Elementary "G-91". Students will be housed at an existing portable school in the area until the new school is completed. The immediate overcrowding problem will be relieved by utilizing the existing portable facility.

**Portable Elementary School/ New Elementary School "G-91",
Indian Trace Elementary School (Continued):**

- It is anticipated that Elementary "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed facility and the travel times and distances from areas where minority children reside, it is not practical or feasible to assign areas to the school which would result in an integrated enrollment.
- If the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools, Indian Trace and Elementary "G-91," will require additional relief in the future.

SUBJECT: **Revised Boundary Recommendations for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School and Follow up to Issues Raised at March 10, 1994 Boundary Hearing**

By way of this memorandum, I am proposing an alternative approach to the student assignment for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School for consideration by the School Board. In addition, responses to questions and concerns raised at the boundary hearing on March 10, 1994 are attached (EXHIBIT 1). The alternative option has been reviewed by the Biracial Committee (EXHIBIT 2), the co-chairpersons of the Desegregation Task Force, the School Board Attorney, and Mr. George Allen.

The approach is a significant departure from what that has been utilized in the past. **A districtwide choice model is proposed with a preference for students who attend schools in the east central community. Virginia Shuman Young would not have a boundaried neighborhood attendance area. A countywide Montessori Magnet Program would be implemented at Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School.** First, preference would be given to families and students who attend the surrounding neighborhood schools including, Bayview, Bennett, North Side, North Fork, Walker, Croissant Park, and Harbordale elementary schools. The goal would be to attract a student membership to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School which reflects the racial composition of the school district (56% White; 33% Black; 11% Hispanic). Students would be accepted by application, with priority based upon the order in which applications are received.

Black students in predominately Black schools and non-Black students in predominately non-Black schools from those identified would be eligible to apply in phase one. After thirty days, if space remains, students attending schools countywide would be eligible to apply for the Montessori Magnet program, based upon the same guidelines.

The Desegregation Task Force will be making recommendations to the School Board regarding magnets. Because of the time factor, staff has drafted the attached preliminary admission guidelines for the Montessori Magnet program, to be utilized until the Task Force recommendations are made (EXHIBIT 3).

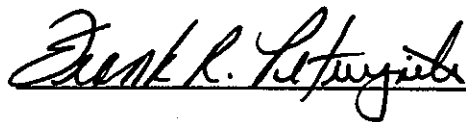

The alternative plan includes designating Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School as a School Near the Workplace, with a preschool component. Students in schools, countywide, whose parents work within a two mile radius of Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School and north of New River, and who meet the eligibility guidelines, would be able to attend the new elementary school. Transportation would be the responsibility of parents. However, the empty seat policy may and a depot transportation plan could provide transportation opportunities for some of the workplace students.

The membership for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School under this approach would be based upon parental and student choice with specific goals for student membership. **This is a new approach to achieving desegregation in magnet schools.** It is anticipated that the school would attain a capacity membership that approximates the racial makeup of the county based upon the proposed Montessori Magnet program and the Workplace program with the preschool component.

A third public hearing on the elementary boundaries will be necessary if the School Board accepts the choice approach or if other changes are made. The second public hearing on boundaries is scheduled for 7:00 pm on April 14, 1994, at Plantation High School. The third hearing can be scheduled for May 5, 1994, at 7:00 p.m., at Plantation High School. I also want to remind the School Board Members of the following schedule changes:

Follow up to Questions and Concerns Raised by School Board Members at the Boundary Hearing on March 10, 1994:

The following comments and explanations are in response to questions and issues raised by School Board Members at the First Boundary Hearing on March 10, 1994.

Recommendations E-1 and E-2:

1. Ms. Oliphant asked for the justification for building Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School.

Staff Response: This elementary school was proposed because of the projected growth in the east central areas of Broward County. The attached memorandum dated March 9, 1994, pages 2 and 3, provides a response.

2. Ms. Dickerhoof requested clarification regarding Virginia Shuman Young Elementary as a School Near The Workplace. She stated that she wanted to be sure that is not just implied, but included as a part of the recommendation and understand that parents will provide their own transportation.

Staff Response: Ms. Dickerhoof amended the recommendations to include designating Virginia Shuman Young as a School Near The Workplace, at the hearing. The amendment will be incorporated into the hearing document for the second public hearing. Staff will ensure that parents understand that transportation is their responsibility.

Recommendation E-2:

1. School Board Members asked about removing 12 White students from Walker Elementary School.

Staff Response: Mr. Marko responded by reference to the March 9, 1994 written response to Ms. Oliphant. The Superintendent of Schools reiterated his support for the enhancement of the program at Walker Elementary School and his commitment to integrate Walker.

Recommendation E-6 :

1. The notification of the parents, only in English, of current fourth grade students at North Side Elementary School Annex concerning the proposed change to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, was a concern of Ms. Wasserman. In addition, follow up was requested regarding outreach to parents who do not speak English or those who do not read English or Creole.

Recommendation E-6 (continued):

Staff Response: The Central Area Superintendent has instructed the North Side School Liaison and School Social Worker to ensure that the parents are notified, in their home language, of the proposed change. The Social Worker will make house calls to ensure that parents are informed. The Central Area Superintendent has followed up with an informational meeting at the North Side Annex held on March 24, 1994.

2. Concern was expressed regarding siblings of students who will be assigned from North Side Elementary School Annex to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School.

Staff Response: The Principal of North Side Elementary School will determine affected families with siblings. Their needs will be addressed by providing transportation back to the Annex, after school, or by allowing siblings to go to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School.

3. Will the level of service provided at North Side Elementary School Annex for the ESOL and Chapter I students continue at Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School?

Staff Response: The Superintendent of Schools and the Central Area Superintendent indicated that the services will follow these students. The students and parents will be notified by the Principal.

4. Will there be provision of after school care at North Side Elementary School Annex for the students proposed for assignment to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School?

Staff Response: Yes, after school care will be provided at both the North Side Elementary School Annex and Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School. The families will have a choice to participate in either program.

Other Middle School Concerns:

1. Mrs. Wexler stated that she had never spoken to the parents of New River Middle School students about full implementation of the magnet program next year, but had said that it would be a planning year with the help and support from the district.

Staff Response: The Superintendent of Schools verified that this would come forth as an agenda item, scheduled for the April 5, 1994 School Board Meeting. Once the School Board authorizes New River to proceed, inherent in that is the support from area and district level staff in developing and implementing the program.

SUBJECT: **Response to Question Raised Regarding Boundaries at
February 22, 1994, Conference Session**

I. Harbordale Projections/Workplace Question:

The cohort projections, November 1993, for Harbordale Elementary School were reviewed for accuracy and reasonableness. Based upon a review of the trends in the individual traffic analysis zones (Tazs) which comprise the boundary area, and the trend in workplace enrollment, the projections for 1994 - 1998 historically were determined to be appropriate. The demographer did not note any unusual aberrations which would indicate an adjustment to the projections. The projections for workplace students were based upon the past history of 65 to 80 students per year. If additional workplace students are added through marketing efforts, these students would be in addition to the current projection for 1994 which is 443. The following table shows the historical and projected enrollment, as well as the increase or decrease, year to year:

Since 1991, the actual membership has declined by 67 students. The projections indicate a decline next year, leveling off in 1995 and 1996 and increases in 1997 and 1998.

II. Anticipated Population for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary:

New school "W" or Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School was added to the Five-Year Capital Plan when the plan was updated July 18, 1989. The school's location at the old East Side Elementary site was specifically delineated in that document. At the time of its addition to the plan, the student projections were showing continued increases in the eastern portions of the county. Although there were several schools located in the growing areas, they were generally older ones and smaller in capacity.

Shortly after work started on planning the school which included going to the City of Fort Lauderdale for site plan approval, the neighborhood where the school was to be located objected strenuously to the site plan. In addition to the approval of the site plan, the property had to be condemned, platted and certain streets vacated. The neighborhood association came out in significant numbers to object. Moreover, many of the owners of properties being condemned objected to the taking requiring a court hearing and long months of negotiations. During that time period, it did not appear optimistic that approvals would be forthcoming. The decision was made to start work on new school A-1 or Thurgood Marshall Elementary School which would be the relief for North Side Elementary. The numbers at North Side required the creation of the Annex and relief had to be assured. New school A-1 went to the School Board for the designation of the site on December 18, 1990. On that same date, the resolutions of condemnation for "W" (Young) and "A-1" (Marshall) were approved.

TABLE 1, attached, shows the five year projections done in 1987 for all of the elementary schools that existed at the time, north of the airport, east of I-95 and south of Oakland Park Blvd. Oriole Elementary is included because of its large non-contiguous area located in the study area. In 1987, a total of 9,529 students was projected for school year 1992/93 for the selected schools. This represented an increase of 2,429 students over the student membership at the time, and a need for over 4,100 student stations to provide for the existing deficit and for the new growth. The projections proved to be high for school year 1992/93 and it appears the population may have reached a plateau this year at less than 400 under the forecast.

As part of the 1989 update to the Five Year Plan, several of the existing schools increased their capital work program to accommodate the influx of students. TABLE 2 shows the number of additional classrooms that were planned for the individual facilities in the original work program and those that have been added. The original plan called for the addition of 143 classrooms and the current plan which includes the new schools would add 256. Some of those classrooms were replacements for existing rooms, therefore, it is not a net number. TABLE 1 shows the increases in F.I.S.H. capacity which have occurred as a result of the new construction. The student membership increase from the twentieth day count 1987 to the twentieth day count 1993 was 2,062. During that same time period, the number of student stations added was 2,887, including the two new elementary schools, Virginia Shuman Young and Thurgood Marshall. Numerically, a deficit of student stations still exists in the area but further construction probably is not justified by the current projections.

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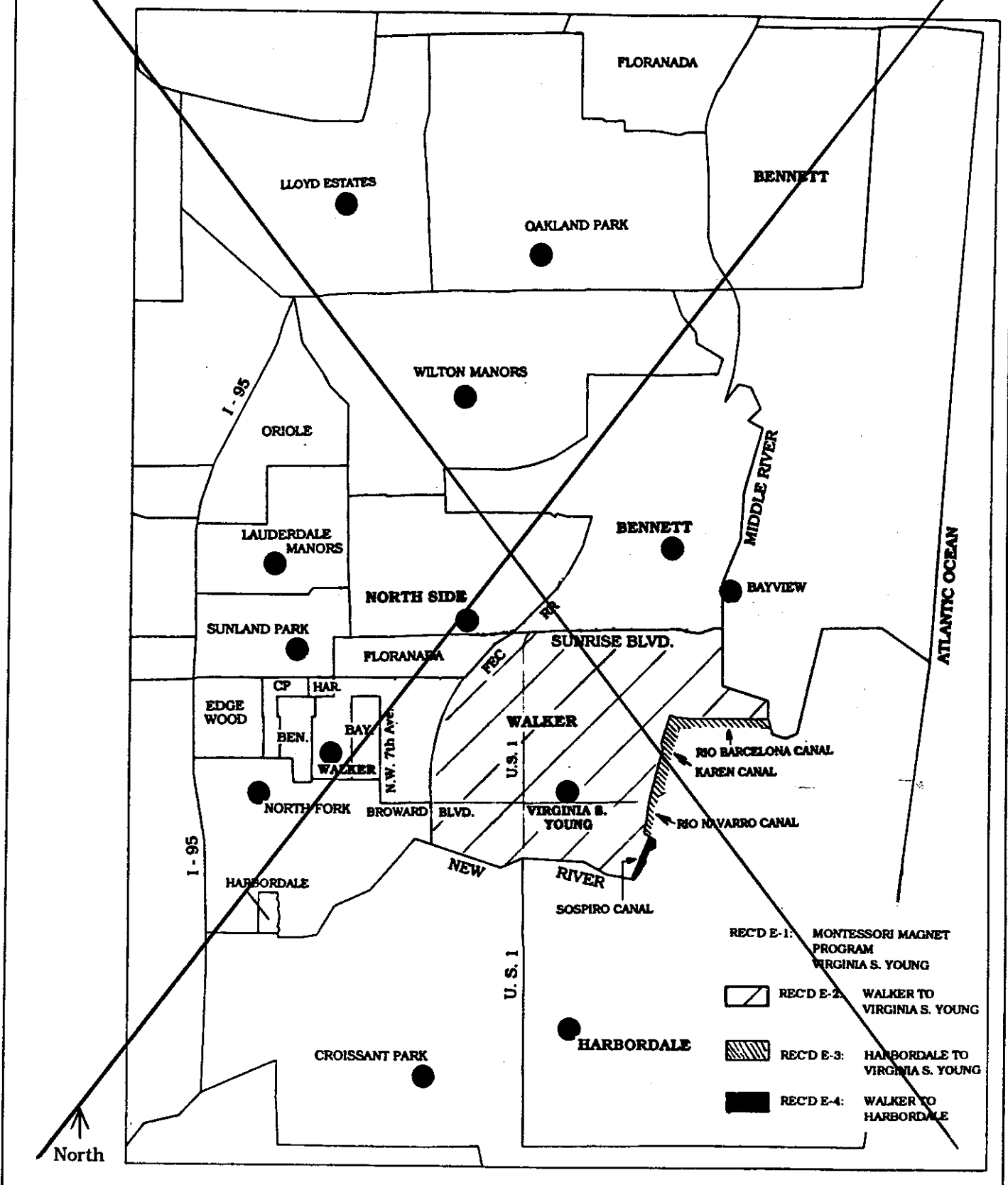

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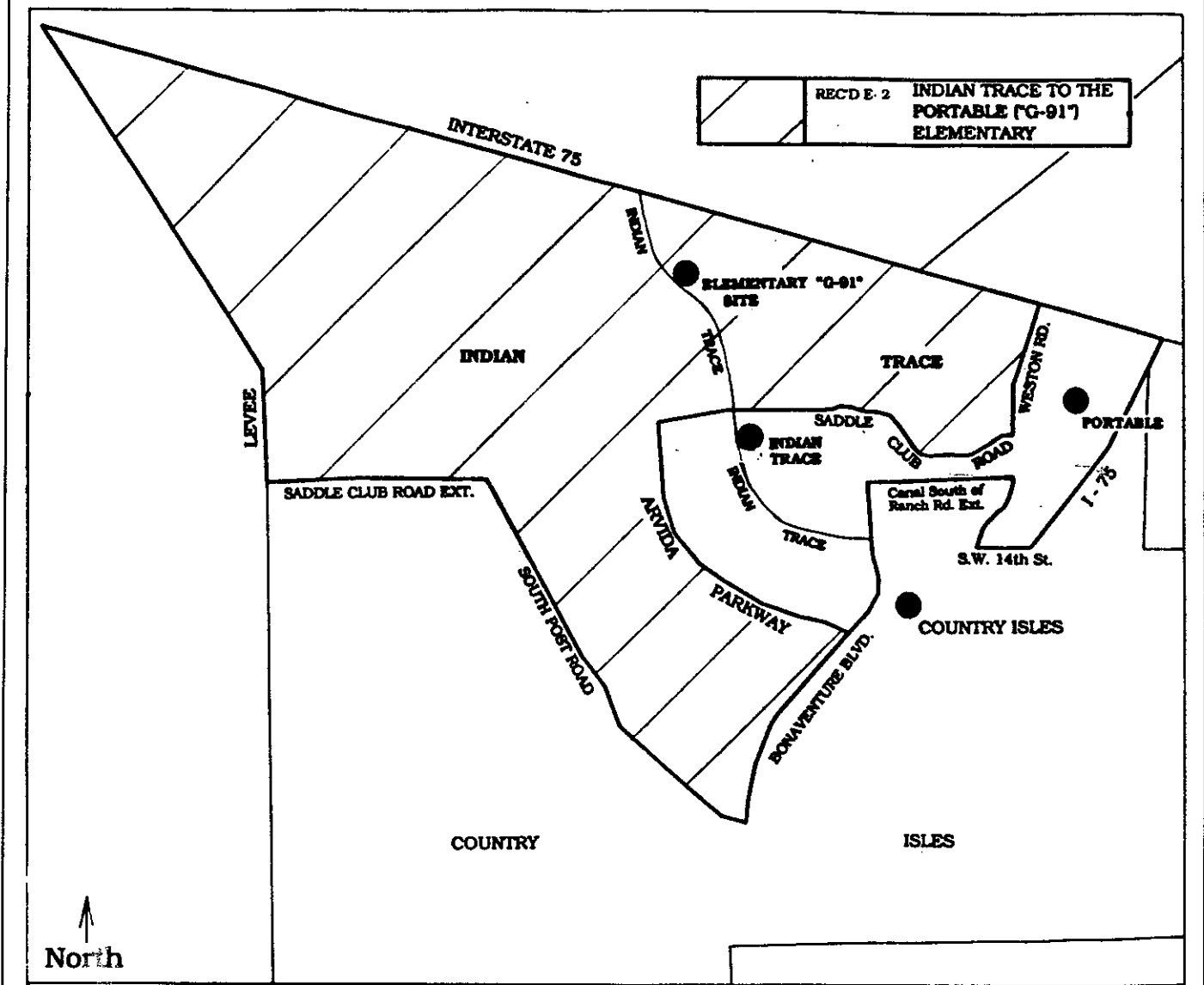

SUMMARY OF INTENDED ACTION

It is proposed that:

- A. A ~~countywide central area~~ Montessori Magnet Program and a School Near the Workplace Program with a preschool component be established at Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, a new elementary school located at 101 Northeast Eleventh Avenue in Fort Lauderdale. First preference will be given to families and students who attend the surrounding neighborhood schools including Bayview, Bennett, North Side, North Fork, Walker, Croissant Park, and Harbordale elementary schools.*
- B. Admission requirements for the elementary magnet program shall be in accordance with School Board Policy #5004, as it may be amended and the preliminary magnet attendance guidelines.*
- C. ~~Boundaries be changed to reduce current and projected overcrowding by creating a new elementary school. The following identifies the existing school from which some students will be assigned to the new elementary school boundary area being created:~~

PURPOSE OF THE ACTION:

The purpose of the proposed boundary recommendations includes relieving current and projected overcrowding in identified areas and providing continued quality programs. Magnet programs assist in the voluntary desegregation process. Other considerations include:

- a. The unitary school system and the 1987 Court Order,
- b. Improved utilization of present facilities,
- c. Feeder patterns,
- d. Safety of students,
- e. Transportation, and
- f. New construction (planned and recommended).

LEGAL AUTHORITY FOR TAKING ACTION:

The School Board is authorized to take such action under Section 230.22, Florida Statutes, and Section 230.23, Florida Statutes, implementing Section 230.232, Florida Statutes, and 230.33, Florida Statutes, as well as administrative Rule 6A1.43 of the Florida State Board of Education and in accordance with existing School Board Policy 5000. It should be noted that the adoption of a zoning plan is not considered a change in policy by the Board, but appears to fall under the Board definition of a rule in Section 120.52 (15), Florida Statutes.

PLANS FOR IMPLEMENTING THE ACTION:

Approved Board action regarding boundary changes and admission policies would become effective for the 1994-95 school year. Plans for the use of a new facility and changes to existing schools have been outlined and would be implemented following School Board approval. Some personnel from existing schools may be reassigned to the new schools. As per Board Policy, the Superintendent will designate personnel to work with parents, community, and staff as they move from their current schools to the new schools. If for any reason the new school openings are delayed, the Area Superintendents and principals will provide temporary arrangements until students can be moved into the new school sites. The planning principals for the new schools will be assigned after the second public hearing.

ESTIMATED COST TO THE AGENCY OF THE PROPOSED ACTION INCLUDING ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS:

The costs associated with the establishment of attendance areas for all elementary schools in the District are estimated at this date to be the following.

The cost estimates are based upon the present operating cost of \$624.07 per student for transporting students to Parkway Middle School. Based upon this figure, the estimated cost for 400 Students is \$249,628. The actual cost could vary as dictated by the number of students eligible for transportation, the pattern of the transported pupil population, approved route time, and school opening time.  School Year



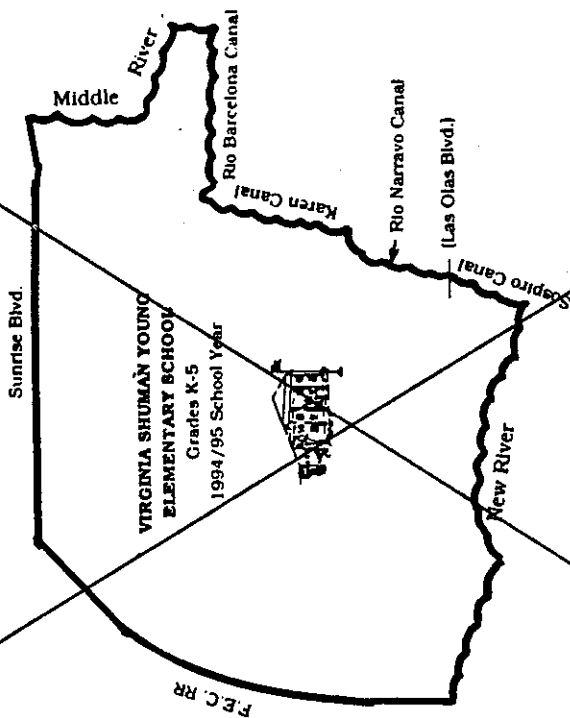

Introduction

School Input Forms & Responses:

The information in this book documents the communication between the schools and the district staff during the decision-making process to determine the 1994-95 school attendance areas (boundaries). On August 27, 1993, the Superintendent sent letters to each elementary, middle, and high school requesting that boundary input be submitted to the appropriate area superintendent by October 8, 1993. Schools were asked to use a consensus process to arrive at the boundary input which would be submitted. Spaces were designated on each input form for the principal advisory chairperson, PTA president, and teacher representative to sign off on the school's request. Additionally, high school student government presidents were asked to participate in this process.

The boundary input forms were collected by the area offices, and the requests contained on each of these forms were considered by the Superintendent's Boundary Committee, along with other information related to the establishment of the 1994-95 boundaries. On Monday, January 10, 1994, the Superintendent submitted his recommendations for 1994-95 boundaries to the School Board. Representatives from each school which would be affected by the proposed changes were invited to attend a meeting on January 10, 1994, to review the recommendations and ask any questions related to the recommendations. In January, 1994, letters were sent from the principal of each of the affected schools to parents of children who would be affected if the recommended changes are approved.

Legal ads will be published in the Sun-Sentinel and the Miami Herald to notify the community of the proposed changes approximately 10 days prior to the boundary hearings which are scheduled for Thursday, March 10, 1994 and Thursday, April 14, 1994.

The area superintendents have sent letters to all elementary, middle, and high schools responding to their school's boundary input form requests. The rationale for not recommending a boundary change was provided along with a schedule for the two boundary hearings. To date, meetings have been held at Bennett Elementary School and Indian Trace Elementary School. A meeting has been scheduled at Winston Park Elementary. Area office and district staff continues to be available to meet with any

school requesting a meeting relating to the boundary process. Area and district staff will continue to respond to Board Member, school, and community questions.

This document contains:

1. The Superintendent's letter requesting school boundary input (example), and

2. School input forms and response letters to principals from the area superintendents.

Forms and letters for schools which did not request a change or note other concerns on their boundary input form are not included, but are on file in the Property Management Department.

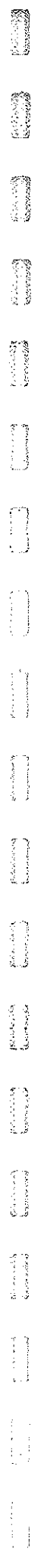

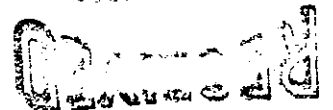

The L.D. classes are very small and would impact us with probably no more than 30 students, but opening up those classrooms at Tamarrac for regular classrooms could provide them with up to 60+ student stations. Since we are experiencing a traffic flow problem at Morrow, we could not make a choice that would bring more cars onto our campus. The two classrooms of L.D. children are already being transported to Tamarrac by bus and would simply be brought here instead. These children would come to us with special funding to support the smaller student/teacher ratio and therefore, would not negatively impact our budget in any way.

2nd Choice: No boundary change.

Rationale: With our new addition, Morrow's FISII (Florida Inventory School Housing), capacity will be 782. We currently have 830 students. Next year, we are projected to have 835. We are using our building the way it was intended to be used. However, we are experiencing a serious traffic flow problem on our campus. We did not feel we could recommend a boundary change that would bring more children into our school, thus bringing more cars onto our campus, without creating a serious safety hazard.

Recommendation E-1:

Winston Park and Sanders Park Elementary Schools

This recommended boundary change will bring students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. The current membership at Winston Park exceeds the permanent capacity of the school by 523 students. The projected enrollment at Winston Park Elementary School for next fall exceeds 1450 students, without boundary changes. The potential for continued residential development around Winston Park Elementary School is significant. Sanders Park Elementary School had a twentieth day membership of 466 students. This elementary school is underenrolled by 224 students. The permanent capacity of Sanders Park Elementary School is 690 students. The projections for Sanders Park indicate the enrollment at the school will be less than 500 students for the next five years, based upon the current attendance area. In light of our capital budget shortfall it is important to utilize available space, where feasible and practical.

The area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of the S.C.L. Railroad are proposed for reassignment from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This recommendation includes the Crystal Lake community and the Blue Lake, Gual Close areas south of Sample Road. The demographic makeup of the students residing in these areas is predominately white. Therefore, assigning these students to Sanders Park Elementary School will improve the racial balance at the school.

The proposed change, moving students out of Winston Park Elementary School, will provide some relief for existing overcrowding. However, because of the continued rapid development in the area, Winston Park Elementary School will remain overenrolled over the next two years. It is anticipated that the opening of new Elementary School "I-91" will provide relief for Winston Park Elementary. Elementary School "I-91" is one of the nineteen new schools designated to be funded from the anticipated capital revenues.

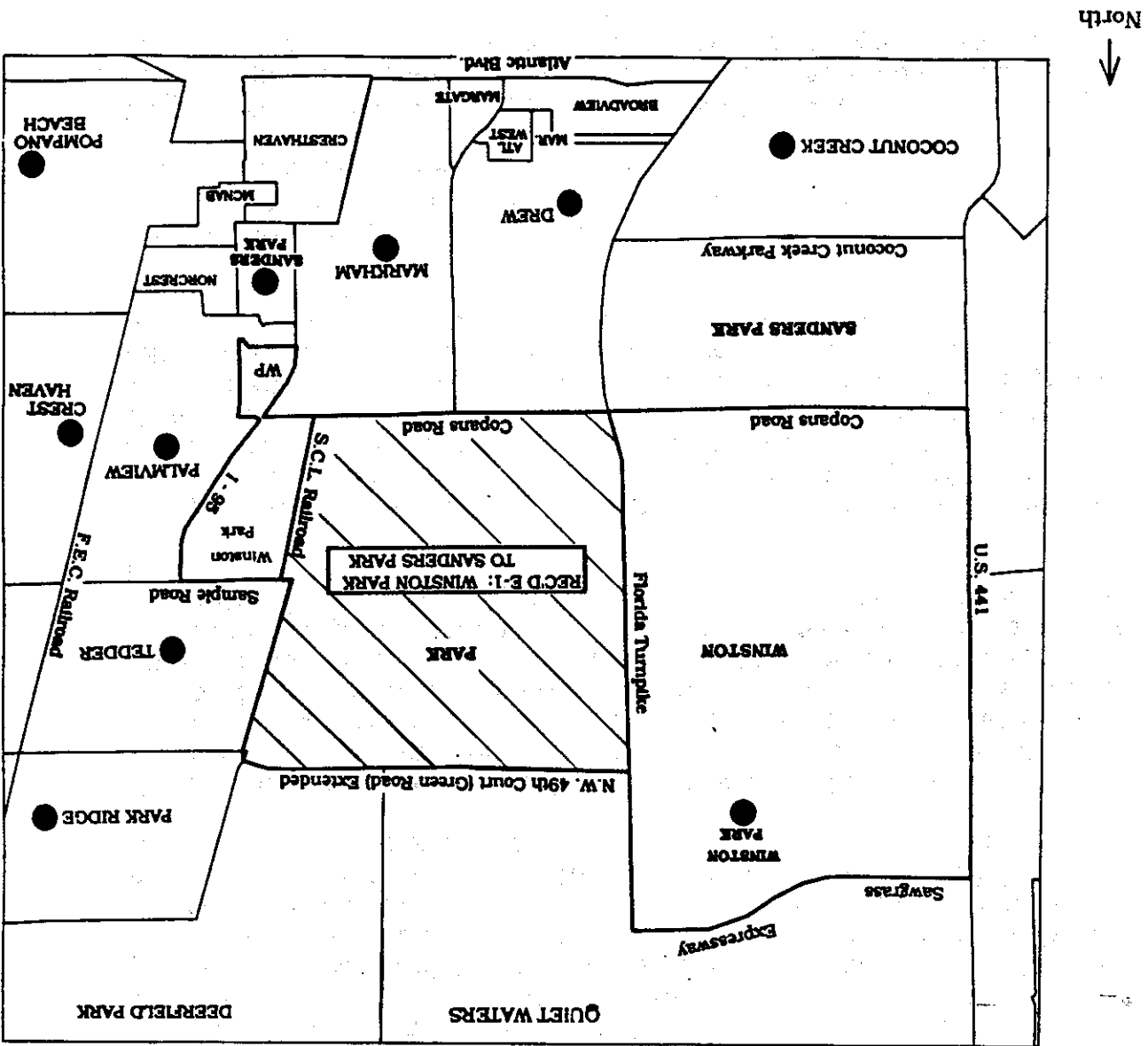

**Recommendation E-1:
Winston Park and Sanders Park Elementary Schools**

This recommended boundary change will bring students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. The current membership at Winston Park exceeds the permanent capacity of the school by 523 students. The projected enrollment at Winston Park Elementary School for next fall exceeds 1450 students, without boundary changes. The potential for continued residential development around Winston Park Elementary School is significant. Sanders Park Elementary School had a twentieth day membership of 466 students. This elementary school is underenrolled by 224 students. The permanent capacity of Sanders Park Elementary School is 690 students. The projections for Sanders Park indicate the enrollment at the school will be less than 500 students for the next five years, based upon the current attendance area. In light of our capital budget shortfall it is important to utilize available space, where feasible and practical.

The area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of the S.C.L. Railroad are proposed for reassignment from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This recommendation includes the Crystal Lake community and the Blue Lake, Gull Close areas south of Sample Road. The demographic makeup of the students residing in these areas is predominately white. Therefore, assigning these students to Sanders Park Elementary School will improve the racial balance at the school.

The proposed change, moving students out of Winston Park Elementary School, will provide some relief for existing overcrowding. However, because of the continued rapid development in the area, Winston Park Elementary School will remain overenrolled over the next two years. It is anticipated that the opening of new Elementary School "I-91" will provide relief for Winston Park Elementary. Elementary School "I-91" is one of the nineteen new schools designated to be funded from the anticipated capital revenues.

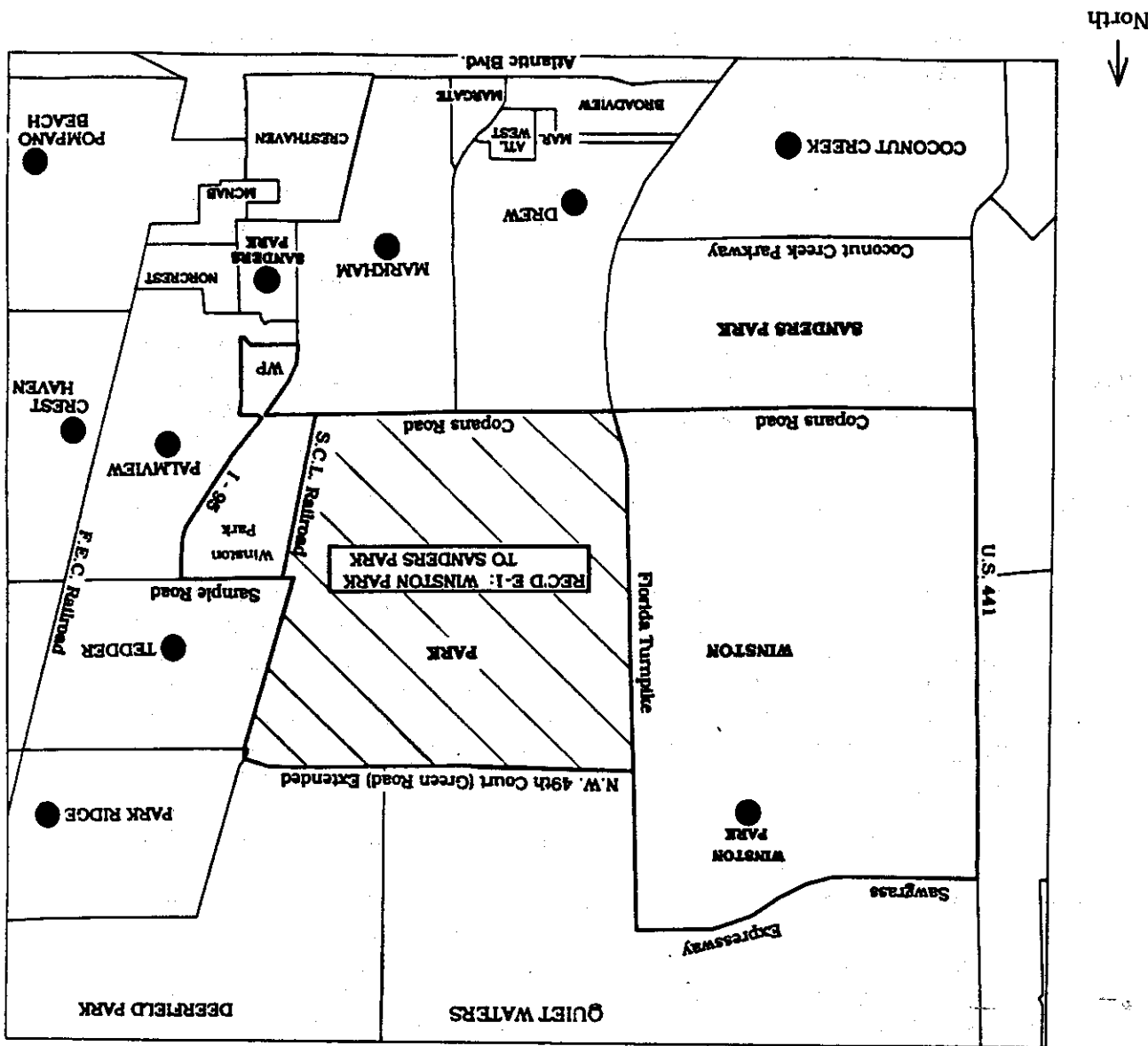

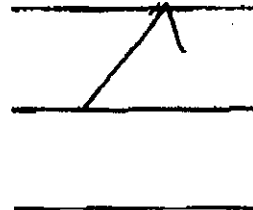

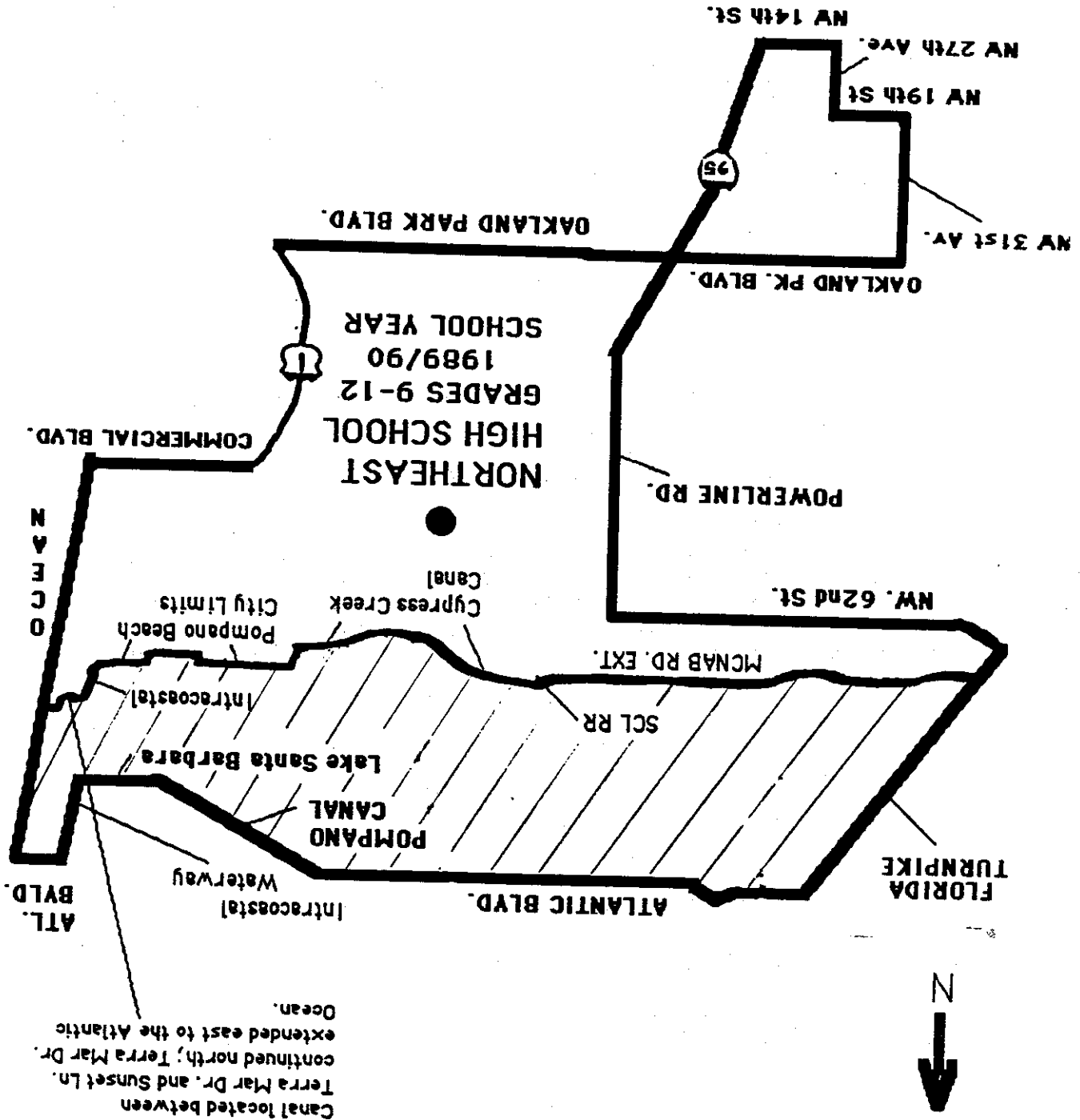

STEPHEN FOSTER ELEMENTARY BOUNDARY CHANGES & CONCERNS FOR 1994-95 SCHOOL YEAR

Stephen Foster Elementary is requesting an increase of enrollment of around 150 students via a boundary change. Our present enrollment is 563 students that generate FTE funds and our current FISH is 582. Presently additional classrooms are being built on campus. The committee feels we will not reach the County's cohort projection of 640 students for the 1993-94 school year. Our committee is not recommending that we lose any of our present students.

Possible boundary changes may include receiving students from Martin Luther King Elementary by adding a contiguous area to our boundaries. There is presently a bus stop for Martin Luther King Elementary at Sunset Learning Center and students could walk directly to Stephen Foster. If the existing court order will not allow students from Martin Luther King Elementary to be transferred out of that school, our committee discussed looking at some of the western schools off Interstate 595. The bus ride from the west would be equal to that of minority students being bused north of Broward Blvd.

As principal of Stephen Foster Elementary, I am concerned over the fact that this year we lost 13 students to the Nova schools. Thirteen students equal half of a teacher's salary and I had to form three combination grades this year. This seemed to be a high number of students to lose in one year and felt this concern should be addressed along with boundaries.

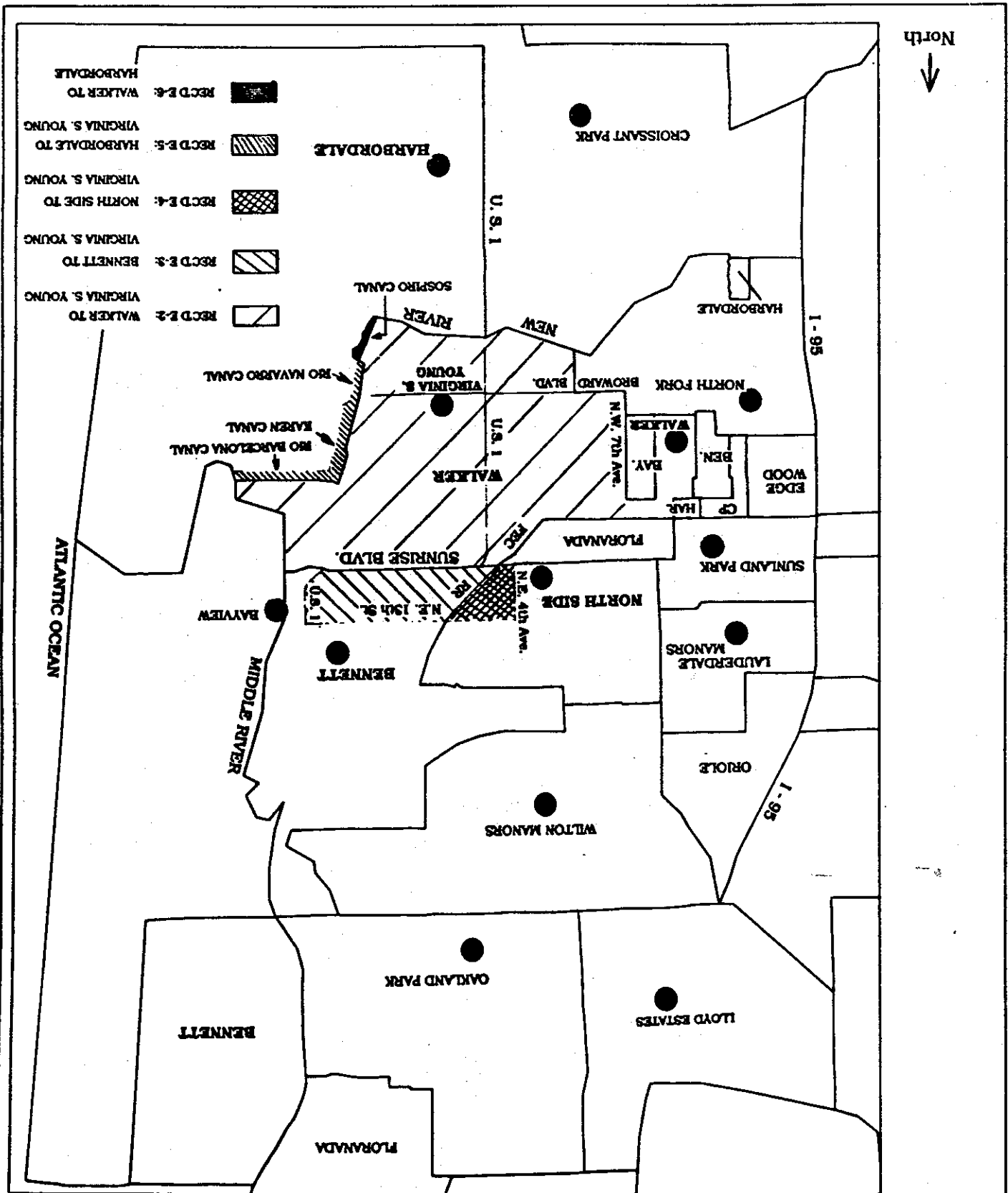

This memorandum contains a general description of the boundary proposals for the 1994-95 school year, and the rationale for the recommended changes. Additionally, the supporting documentation, which is included, provides detailed projections, maps, and descriptions of the areas proposed for change.

This fall, the Superintendent's Boundary Committee reviewed, analyzed and discussed over sixty-five proposed changes and concerns which were submitted by advisory representatives, PTA/PTO representatives, parents, principals, school staff, community groups, the South Area Boundary Committee, elected officials, and citizens. The Boundary Committee considered and discussed each of the recommendations and proposals. Written responses will be sent to the organizations, advisory groups, and individuals whose proposals were received for review. The responses will indicate whether or not the proposal was recommended, and the rationale for the decision.

The boundary recommendations for the 1994-95 school year address the following objectives:

- to establish the attendance area boundaries for two new elementary schools;
- to provide relief for existing overcrowding at five elementary schools; and
- to utilize existing classroom space to provide relief for an overenrolled elementary school;

Changes to the attendance areas for seven elementary schools are being recommended. A boundary change is proposed to move students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This change will reduce existing overcrowding at Winston Park. Sanders Park Elementary School is underenrolled and can accommodate additional students.

The boundary area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School will be established. This school will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools, and some relief for North Side Elementary School. The boundary area for new Elementary School "G-91" will be established. Students in this boundary area will attend an existing portable facility until Elementary School "G-91" has been constructed. The portable facility will provide relief for Indian Trace Elementary School.

**Recommendation E-1:
Winston Park and Sanders Park Elementary Schools**

This recommended boundary change will bring students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. The current membership at Winston Park exceeds the permanent capacity of the school by 523 students. The projected enrollment at Winston Park Elementary School for next fall exceeds 1450 students, without boundary changes. The potential for continued residential development around Winston Park Elementary School is significant. Sanders Park Elementary School had a twentieth day membership of 466 students. This elementary school is underenrolled by 224 students. The permanent capacity of Sanders Park Elementary School is 690 students. The projections for Sanders Park indicate the enrollment at the school will be less than 500 students for the next five years, based upon the current attendance area. In light of our capital budget shortfall it is important to utilize available space, where feasible and practical.

The area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of the S.C.L. Railroad are proposed for reassignment from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This recommendation includes the Crystal Lake community and the Blue Lake, Quail Close areas south of Sample Road. The demographic makeup of the students residing in these areas is predominately white. Therefore, assigning these students to Sanders Park Elementary School will improve the racial balance at the school.

The proposed change, moving students out of Winston Park Elementary School, will provide some relief for existing overcrowding. However, because of the continued rapid development in the area, Winston Park Elementary School will remain overenrolled over the next two years. It is anticipated that the opening of new Elementary School "I-91" will provide relief for Winston Park Elementary. Elementary School "I-91" is one of the nineteen new schools designated to be funded from the anticipated capital revenues.

**Recommendations E-2 through E-6:
Virginia Shuman Young, Walker, North Side, Bennett,
and Harbordale Elementary Schools**

Virginia Shuman Young (Elementary School "W") was approved in July 1989, as part of the amendment to the five year capital plan. At that time, the school was proposed to relieve overcrowding at North Side

Elementary School. Since 1989, it has become apparent that other eastern schools are overenrolled and in need of relief.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is under construction at 101 Northeast Eleventh Avenue in Ft. Lauderdale. The proposed attendance area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools. In addition, the opening of Virginia Shuman Young will provide some relief for North Side Elementary School.

The current enrollment at Walker Elementary School is 1004 students. The permanent capacity is 634 students. Walker is a magnet school for the performing arts. The boundary change would move areas east of Northwest Seventh Avenue from Walker Elementary School to Virginia Shuman Young. The designated area includes the Holiday Park and Victoria Park communities, Cooley Hammock, the Las Olas and downtown areas north of New River, a portion of the Progresso neighborhood, and areas adjacent to Sistrunk Boulevard, east of Northwest Seventh Avenue.

The proposed change, moving students to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary, will reduce significantly the student membership at Walker Elementary School. This reduction will allow for growth in the magnet program. Marketing efforts will be concentrated on attracting white students to Walker, thereby helping to enhance our desegregation efforts. Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is located in a predominantly white neighborhood. United States Census data indicate that over two hundred children, who are elementary school age, reside in the portion of the Walker Elementary School attendance area located east of U.S. 1, south of Sunrise Boulevard, and north of New River. With the attendance area proposed for Virginia S. Young, the school is anticipated to open with an enrollment of approximately 500 students. The capacity of the new elementary school is 776 students. The opening of Virginia S. Young with a projected enrollment which is below the capacity of the school will allow opportunities for neighborhood children to attend the public school system.

Bennett Elementary School has a current membership of 767 students. The permanent capacity of the facility is 501 students. The southern portion of the current Bennett Elementary School attendance area, the areas located south of Northeast Thirteenth Street, are proposed to be moved to Young Elementary School. The proposed change will relieve current overcrowding at Bennett Elementary School.

North Side Elementary School, which includes the North Side Annex facility located across from Ft. Lauderdale High School, is housing over 1200 students. The enrollment exceeds the permanent capacity of the combined facilities by 664 students. The area east of Northeast Fourth Avenue and south of Northeast Thirteenth Street is proposed for reassignment to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The area is contiguous to the area which is proposed for reassignment from Bennett Elementary School to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The change will give North Side some relief for the 1994-95 school year. North Side Elementary School will have an additional reduction in numbers when Thurgood Marshall Elementary School opens. Thurgood Marshall is under construction at 800 Northwest Thirteenth Street in Fort Lauderdale. It is anticipated that Thurgood Marshall Elementary School will open in the fall of 1995.

Boundary adjustments are also being proposed for a portion of the Harbordale Elementary School attendance area. Portions of the current boundary line which divide Harbordale and Walker elementary schools are Sunrise Key Boulevard, Victoria Park Road, and Mola Avenue. Those students who reside on opposite sides of these streets would attend different elementary schools. The proposed adjustments will move the boundary line to adjacent canals, thereby placing all of Sunrise Key Boulevard and Victoria Park Road into Virginia Shuman Young's neighborhood for the 1994-95 school year. Therefore, all of the Victoria Park neighborhood will be assigned to the same school. All of the students who live on Mola Avenue would be assigned to Harbordale Elementary School, under this proposal.

In addition to the proposed changes described above, I am proposing that Virginia Shuman Young be designated a School Near the Workplace. Students of parents who work within a two mile radius of Virginia Shuman Young and north of New River, and who fall within the Schools Near the Workplace guidelines, would be eligible to attend Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School. It is anticipated that this program would draw additional students to the school from parents who work in the downtown areas north of New River, from the Las Olas Boulevard corridor and areas on Fort Lauderdale Beach. As mentioned previously, Virginia S. Young Elementary School is anticipated to open with a membership which will be below the capacity of the school. This will allow room for potential workplace students.

The current Schools Near the Workplace Program at Harbordale Elementary School would continue. Based upon the work locations of parents with students in the current workplace program at Harbordale

Elementary School, primarily Broward General Hospital, it is anticipated that the proposed new program at Virginia S. Young Elementary will have a minimal impact on the enrollment at Harbordale.

Recommendation E-7:

Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91" and Indian Trace Elementary School

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

Please be advised that the parents and staff of Martin Luther King Elementary School met on Wednesday, September 29, 1993 to discuss our boundary recommendations for the 1994-95 school year. Since the current F.I.S.H. capacity of our school is 726 and the anticipated enrollment for 1994-95 is 993, we would like to make the following recommendations based upon the indicated rationale:

1. Students walking north on N.W. 31 Avenue must walk past a dangerous canal. These children live on Washington Drive, NW 9th Court, NW 9th Place, NW 9th Street and the 2800 block of NW 8th Court and have been observed shoving each other near the canal. We do not want students placed in potential danger because they must walk this route to get to our school. We recommend that these students be removed from our school boundaries and reassigned to another school site. The number of students affected is approximately 45.
2. Since our enrollment is now 986 we are presently 260 students over our F.I.S.H. capacity and more growth is expected. We recommend that 148 students living on SW 37th Terrace, SW 38th Avenue, Jackson Blvd., Atkinson Ave., Tennessee Ave., Pennsylvania, Long Island, Wyoming, Campus, Dayton,

Evanson and Park Drive which are in closest proximity to Stephen Foster Elementary School be reassigned to that school site. Since Stephen Foster presently has 560 students (FISH 583), that will equalize our populations. When these students were originally bussed to our school, they were Caucasian families and it enhanced the unitary school philosophy. This is no longer the case, therefore, the movement of these students will not be in conflict to the unitary school philosophy.

Reassignment of these students will make available some of the portables on our school site for distribution throughout the district. If these changes are accepted, we would work with these families to facilitate this process.

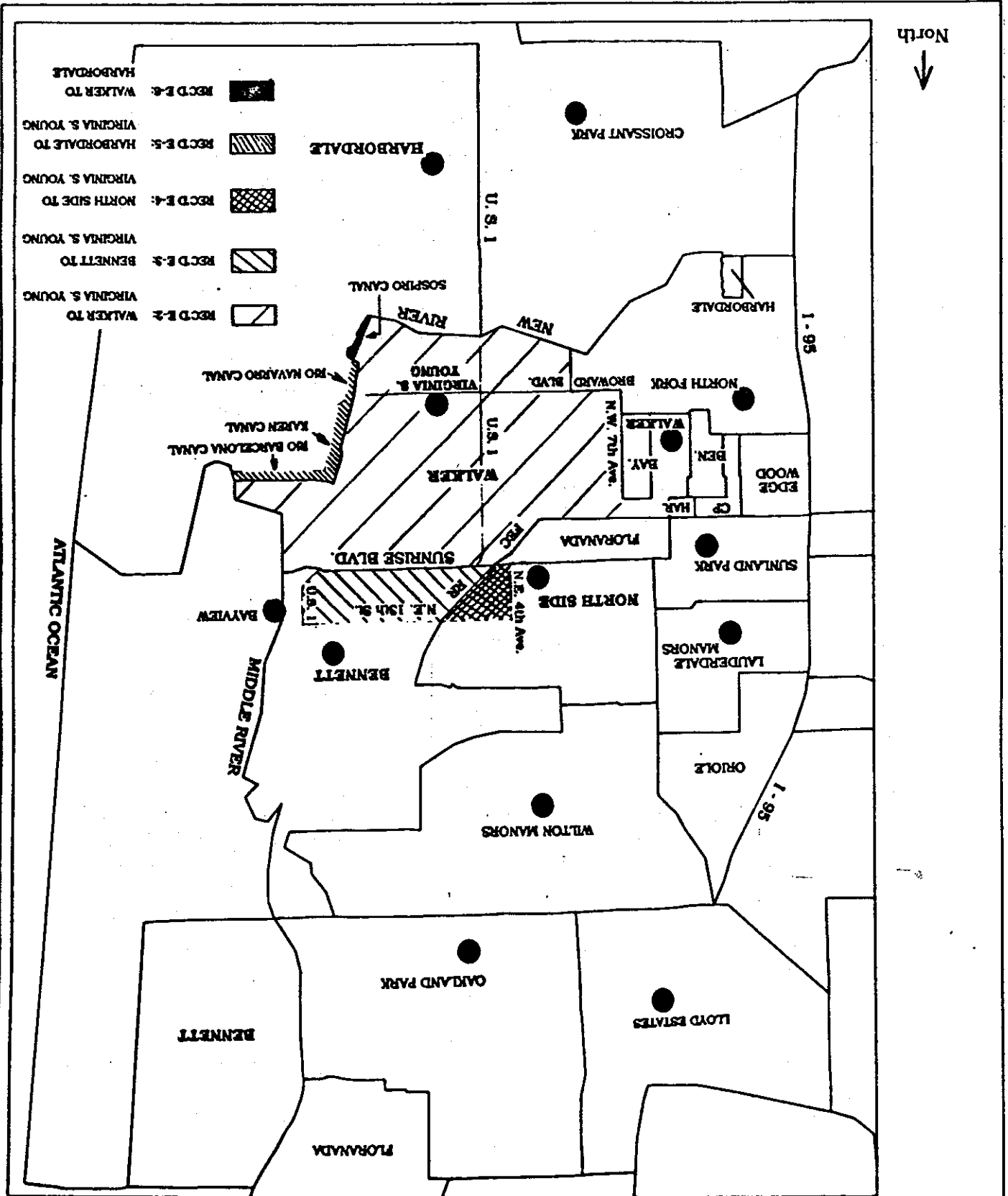

This memorandum contains a general description of the boundary proposals for the 1994-95 school year, and the rationale for the recommended changes. Additionally, the supporting documentation, which is included, provides detailed projections, maps, and descriptions of the areas proposed for change.

This fall, the Superintendent's Boundary Committee reviewed, analyzed and discussed over sixty-five proposed changes and concerns which were submitted by advisory representatives, PTA/PTO representatives, parents, principals, school staff, community groups, the South Area Boundary Committee, elected officials, and citizens. The Boundary Committee considered and discussed each of the recommendations and proposals. Written responses will be sent to the organizations, advisory groups, and individuals whose proposals were received for review. The responses will indicate whether or not the proposal was recommended, and the rationale for the decision.

The boundary recommendations for the 1994-95 school year address the following objectives:

to establish the attendance area boundaries for two new elementary schools;

to provide relief for existing overcrowding at five elementary schools; and

to utilize existing classroom space to provide relief for an overenrolled elementary school;

Changes to the attendance areas for seven elementary schools are being recommended. A boundary change is proposed to move students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This change will reduce existing overcrowding at Winston Park. Sanders Park Elementary School is underenrolled and can accommodate additional students.

The boundary area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School will be established. This school will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools, and some relief for North Side Elementary School. The boundary area for new Elementary School "G-91" will be established. Students in this boundary area will attend an existing portable facility until Elementary School "G-91" has been constructed. The portable facility will provide relief for Indian Trace Elementary School.

**Recommendation E-1:
Winston Park and Sanders Park Elementary Schools**

This recommended boundary change will bring students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. The current membership at Winston Park exceeds the permanent capacity of the school by 523 students. The projected enrollment at Winston Park Elementary School for next fall exceeds 1450 students, without boundary changes. The potential for continued residential development around Winston Park Elementary School is significant. Sanders Park Elementary School had a twentieth day membership of 466 students. This elementary school is underenrolled by 224 students. The permanent capacity of Sanders Park Elementary School is 690 students. The projections for Sanders Park indicate the enrollment at the school will be less than 500 students for the next five years, based upon the current attendance area. In light of our capital budget shortfall it is important to utilize available space, where feasible and practical.

The area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of the S.C.L. Railroad are proposed for reassignment from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This recommendation includes the Crystal Lake community and the Blue Lake, Gual Close areas south of Sample Road. The demographic makeup of the students residing in these areas is predominately white. Therefore, assigning these students to Sanders Park Elementary School will improve the racial balance at the school.

The proposed change, moving students out of Winston Park Elementary School, will provide some relief for existing overcrowding. However, because of the continued rapid development in the area, Winston Park Elementary School will remain overenrolled over the next two years. It is anticipated that the opening of new Elementary School "I-91" will provide relief for Winston Park Elementary. Elementary School "I-91" is one of the nineteen new schools designated to be funded from the anticipated capital revenues.

**Recommendations E-2 through E-6:
Virginia Shuman Young, Walker, North Side, Bennett,
and Harbordale Elementary Schools**

Virginia Shuman Young (Elementary School "W") was approved in July 1989, as part of the amendment to the five year capital plan. At that time, the school was proposed to relieve overcrowding at North Side

Elementary School. Since 1989, it has become apparent that other eastern schools are overenrolled and in need of relief.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is under construction at 101 Northeast Eleventh Avenue in Ft. Lauderdale. The proposed attendance area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools. In addition, the opening of Virginia Shuman Young will provide some relief for North Side Elementary School.

The current enrollment at Walker Elementary School is 1004 students. The permanent capacity is 634 students. Walker is a magnet school for the performing arts. The boundary change would move areas east of Northwest Seventh Avenue from Walker Elementary School to Virginia Shuman Young. The designated area includes the Holiday Park and Victoria Park communities, Cooley Hammock, the Las Olas and downtown areas north of New River, a portion of the Progresso neighborhood, and areas adjacent to Sistrunk Boulevard, east of Northwest Seventh Avenue.

The proposed change, moving students to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary, will reduce significantly the student membership at Walker Elementary School. This reduction will allow for growth in the magnet program. Marketing efforts will be concentrated on attracting white students to Walker, thereby helping to enhance our desegregation efforts.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is located in a predominately white neighborhood. United States Census data indicate that over two hundred children, who are elementary school age, reside in the portion of the Walker Elementary School attendance area located east of U.S. 1, south of Sunrise Boulevard, and north of New River. With the attendance area proposed for Virginia S. Young, the school is anticipated to open with an enrollment of approximately 500 students. The capacity of the new elementary school is 776 students. The opening of Virginia S. Young with a projected enrollment which is below the capacity of the school will allow opportunities for neighborhood children to attend the public school system.

Bennett Elementary School has a current membership of 767 students. The permanent capacity of the facility is 501 students. The southern portion of the current Bennett Elementary School attendance area, the areas located south of Northeast Thirteenth Street, are proposed to be moved to Young Elementary School. The proposed change will relieve current overcrowding at Bennett Elementary School.

North Side Elementary School, which includes the North Side Annex facility located across from Ft. Lauderdale High School, is housing over 1200 students. The enrollment exceeds the permanent capacity of the combined facilities by 664 students. The area east of Northeast Fourth Avenue and south of Northeast Thirteenth Street is proposed for reassignment to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The area is contiguous to the area which is proposed for reassignment from Bennett Elementary School to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The change will give North Side some relief for the 1994-95 school year. North Side Elementary School will have an additional reduction in numbers when Thurgood Marshall Elementary School opens. Thurgood Marshall is under construction at 800 Northwest Thirteenth Street in Fort Lauderdale. It is anticipated that Thurgood Marshall Elementary School will open in the fall of 1995.

Boundary adjustments are also being proposed for a portion of the Harbordale Elementary School attendance area. Portions of the current boundary line which divide Harbordale and Walker elementary schools are Sunrise Key Boulevard, Victoria Park Road, and Mola Avenue. Those students who reside on opposite sides of these streets would attend different elementary schools. The proposed adjustments will move the boundary line to adjacent canals, thereby placing all of Sunrise Key Boulevard and Victoria Park Road into Virginia Shuman Young's neighborhood, for the 1994-95 school year. Therefore, all of the Victoria Park who live on Mola Avenue would be assigned to Harbordale Elementary School, under this proposal.

In addition to the proposed changes described above, I am proposing that Virginia Shuman Young be designated a School Near the Workplace. Students of parents who work within a two mile radius of Virginia Shuman Young and north of New River, and who fall within the Schools Near the Workplace guidelines, would be eligible to attend Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School. It is anticipated that this program would draw additional students to the school from parents who work in the downtown areas north of New River, from the Las Olas Boulevard corridor and areas on Fort Lauderdale Beach. As mentioned previously, Virginia S. Young Elementary School is anticipated to open with a membership which will be below the capacity of the school. This will allow room for potential workplace students.

The current Schools Near the Workplace Program at Harbordale Elementary School would continue. Based upon the work locations of parents with students in the current workplace program at Harbordale

Elementary School, primarily Broward General Hospital, it is anticipated that the proposed new program at Virginia S. Young Elementary will have a minimal impact on the enrollment at Harbordale.

Recommendation E-7:

Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91" and Indian Trace Elementary School

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

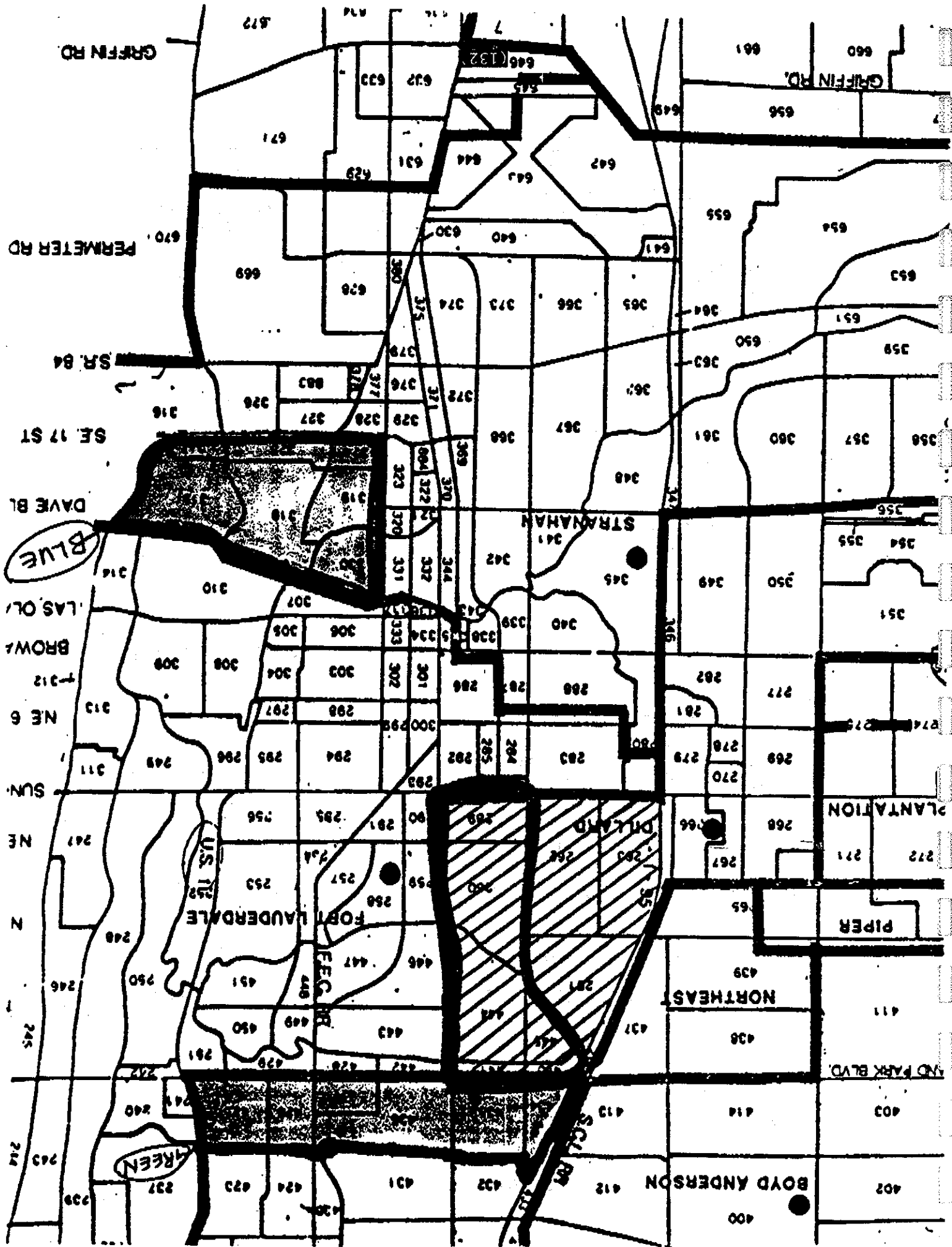

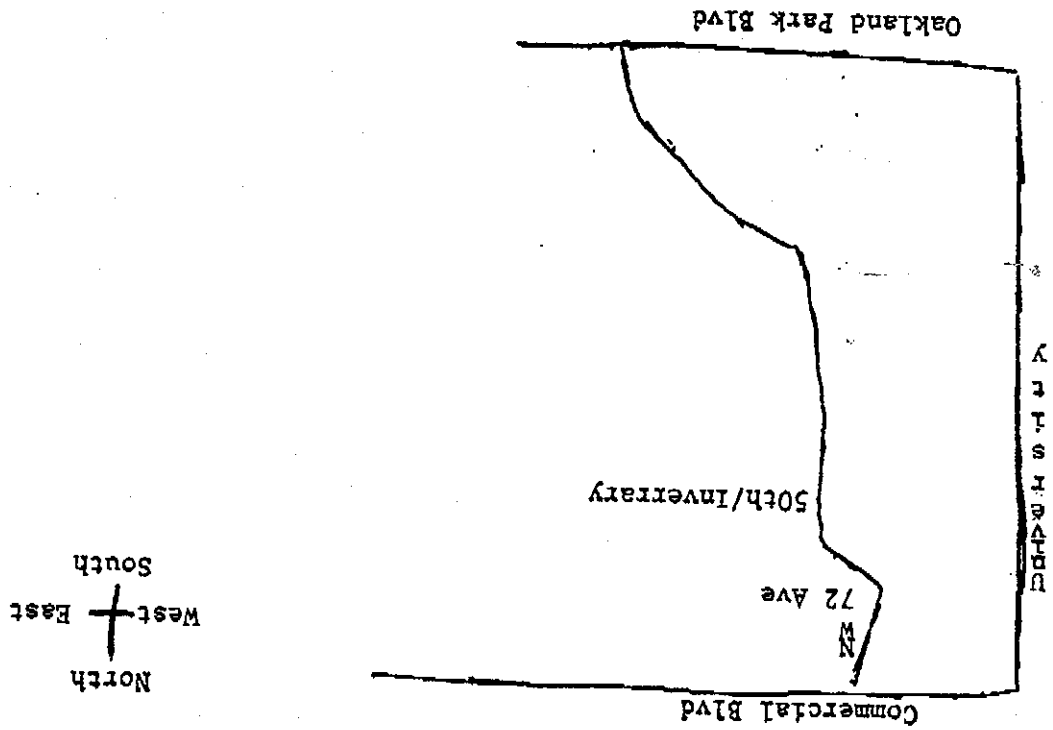

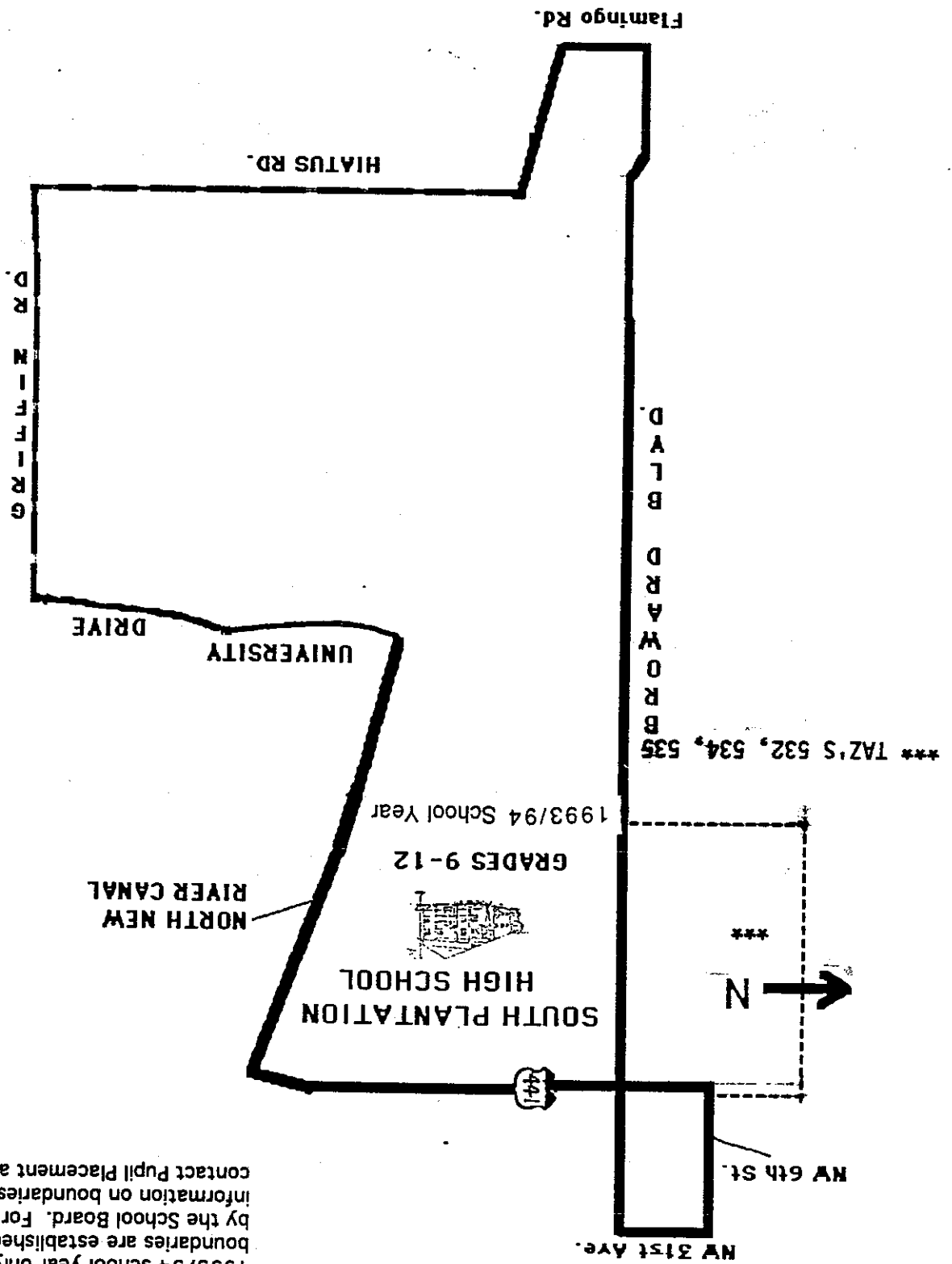

Boundary Request or Concerns:

Proposal #1 -

Fairway Elementary recommends, in support of the effort of the Carver Ranches Feasibility Study Committee, the deletion of all students east of State Road 441 from Fairway's assigned boundaries. We propose the opening of an elementary facility in the Carver Ranches community (a magnet school). This will initiate the long term goal of unifying the Carver Ranches community by bringing together the student population from the Carver Ranches community into one school rather than divide them up among five different elementary schools. In addition, we believe this would eliminate transportation problems, improve school to home communication, increase parental involvement in education, and increase community pride. Option 2: The reassignment of these students to Lake Forest Elementary. The current enrollment figure at Lake Forest Elementary indicates that this school could accommodate these students (approximately 100), stay within their racial percentages, and keep the school's enrollment within educationally sound parameters.

Additional Considerations:

1. Presently 27 portable classrooms are located on site. There is no area for additional portables and P.E. and play areas are non-existent.
2. Safety concerns increase as enrollment increases due to the fact that there is only one street (Fairway Blvd.) available to dismiss students.
3. Currently under renovations, construction will continue until the 1994-95 (960 construction days).
4. District projected enrollment figures predict 1,400 students in 96/97.

Proposal #2 -

Because Sea Castle Elementary School was built to help alleviate the overcrowding of Fairway, we propose that students in the Missionwood Community adjacent to the North Knolls (North of Miramar Parkway; West of University Dr.) be reassigned to Sea Castle.

Proposal #3 -

Three hundred and twenty-two 3 and 4 bedroom townhomes will be built in the University Park area between 1993-95. They are scheduled to begin construction 11/93 with occupancy in 4/94 in the overcrowded Fairway boundaries. This, coupled with the large population growth in the S.W. Miramar (i.e. Huntington) area, will require a new elementary school.

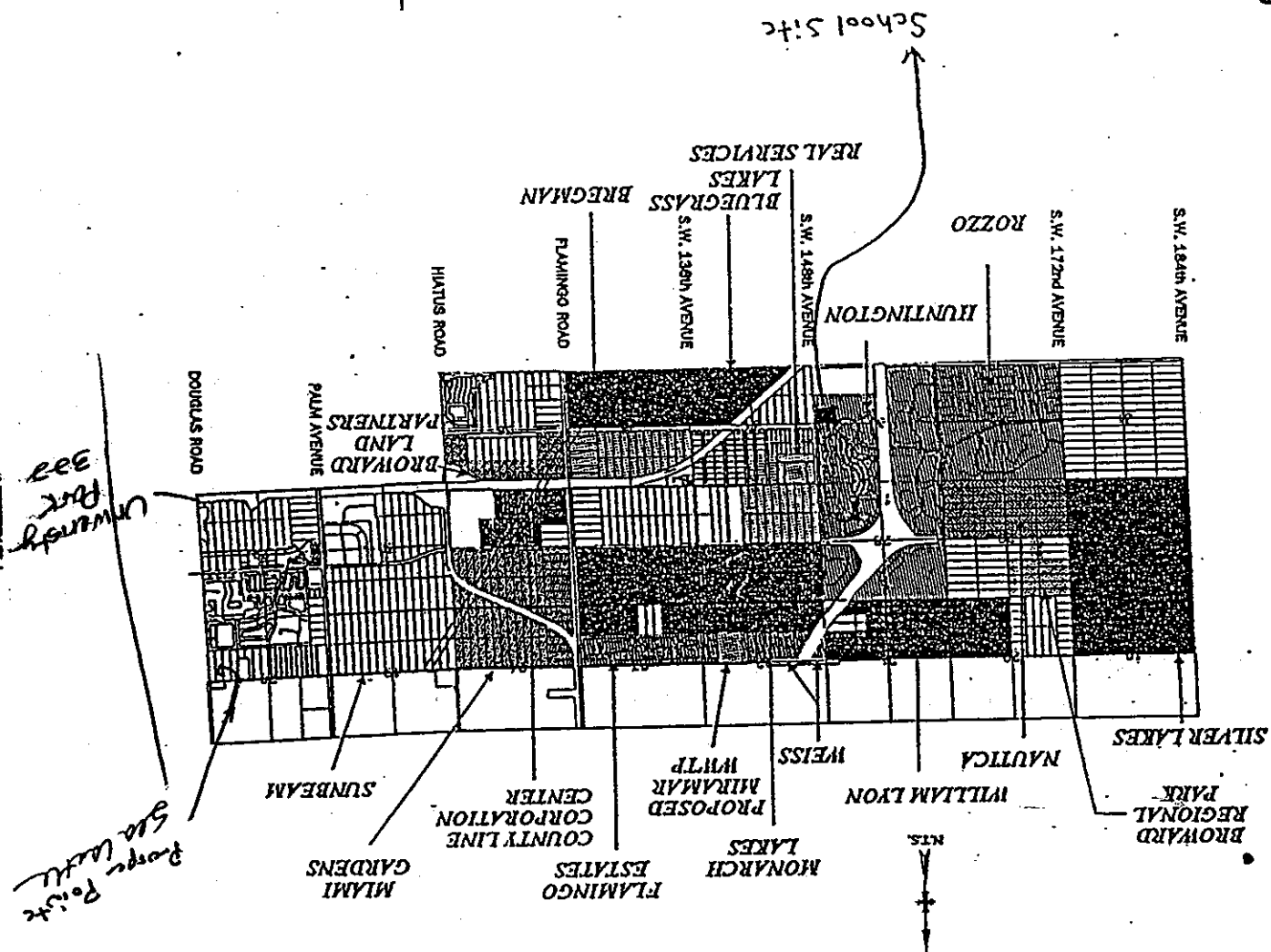

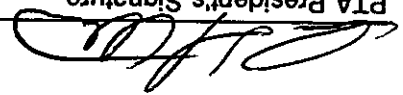
The issue of overcrowding and its effect on Hawkes Bluff Elementary has been studied by the Growth Committee. Members of the committee included staff, faculty, parents and community. Hawkes Bluff's FISH capacity is 776 and our enrollment at this time is 986. We have had approximately eight meetings where we investigated development within and adjacent to our boundaries, the facility usage through 1998, and possible options. These options include grade restructuring, satellite schools, double sessions, modified calendar, magnet schools, capping enrollment, extended 4-day schedule, and charter schools.

The Growth Committee's recommendation is for multi-track/modified school calendar. Committee members believe the Year-Round multi-track option would benefit our students' educational program. Approval of the recommendation was made by:

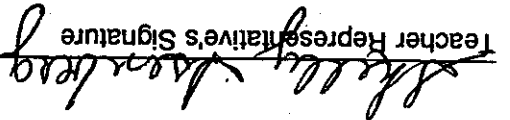

Upon completion of the 94/95 school year siblings go to their perspective schools (691).

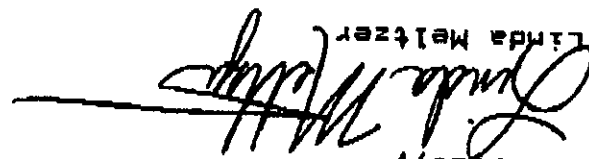

The Indian Trace Growth Task Force has considered two possible proposals "A" and "F". By a majority ballot vote held on Wednesday, October 6, 1993, Proposal "A" was approved 11 to 3.

Proposal "A" was approved for the following reasons:

1. Proposal "A" allows for a gradual even growth in both schools. Proposal "F", in contrast, allows Indian Trace to virtually stop growing in 95-96 and then concentrates all future growth in the new school.

2. Proposal "A" also uses natural main streets as boundary lines and allows for continuity of neighborhoods.

3. Proposal "A" also provides a multicultural diversity in both schools which Proposal "F" does not provide.

4. In addition to the overwhelming support shown by the voting process, there is also strong community support for Proposal "A", except for the aforementioned included.

In response to the community outcry regarding student movement between schools, we would like to include an addendum to Proposal "A".

Movement between schools only directly involves fourth grade students. Therefore, we are proposing the following:

All fifth grade students and their siblings be allowed to complete the 94-95 school year at Indian Trace. In school year 95-96 all students will attend their respective school as per Proposal "A".

CONCERNS AND RECOMMENDATIONS
PRESENTED TO THE INDIAN TRACE ELEMENTARY GROWTH TASK FORCE
BY BONAVENTURE RESIDENTS

The Bonaventure Community met on Tuesday Oct 5, 1993 to discuss the current boundary issue. The residents reviewed the different proposals presented to them which included proposals A-E emitted by the Growth Task Force as well as the proposal emitted by the community of 84 South, from here on referred to as proposal F.

Bonaventure Residents expressed that in their priorities as a community is necessary to secure the well being of all children. Therefore the objectives were to create STABILITY, a SENSE OF NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY and CONTINUITY, all necessary elements in creating an excellent learning environment for our students. Consensus was reached in supporting proposition "F" which makes possible the continuity of the current school community allowing the children to feel secure in a stable environment with the same group of teachers and students.

After careful consideration we feel that proposition "A" does not meet our needs and objectives as a community. In scenario "A" a new boundary process would have to be undergone by both Indian Trace and the new school by 1997. Long established communities like Bonaventure and 84 South were assigned to Indian Trace Elementary following the 1989 County Isles Boundary Change process. Due to the projected growth expected in this area and its effect on student enrollment another boundary process will be necessary. We feel strongly that our neighborhood school community should not have to undergo a another dislocation again.

Looking at the growth pattern of proposition "F" one can see that the school population at Indian Trace Elementary will stabilize by the year 1995/96 with approximately 1137 students. Proposition "F" would also allow the newer Weston Communities: The Islands, The Lakes, The Landings and Weston Hills to create continuity and a sense of community. In the same manner that Bonaventure, The Springs and 84 South will preserve their continuity as a school community.

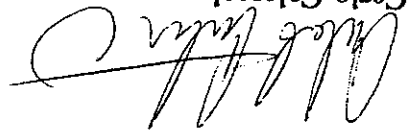
In addition, based on our estimations the transportation of students in proposal "A" may ultimately prove to be more expensive than in proposition "F".

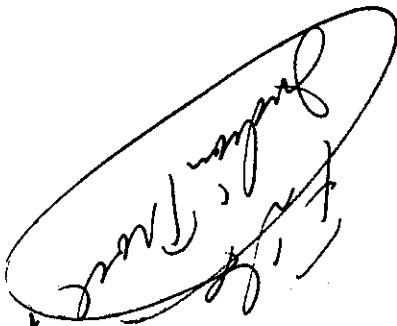

We are concerned because Proposal A will force our community's children to be shifted yet again. Please review the history of our community's school boundaries:

Flamingo Elementary and Portable Site: 1987/88 School Year
 Country Isles Elementary: 1988/89 and 1989/90 School Year
 Portable Site: 1990/91 School Year
 Indian Trace Elementary: 1991/92 and 1992/93 School Year

Should Proposal A be adopted our children will once again be moved to the Portable Site for one year and then to the new school. In a few years when Boundary Changes are to be considered again, as per Proposal A, our children will be the first to be moved because they live the farthest from the new school and from the land designated for the next school.

Let this be an opportunity to designate Indian Trace Elementary as the permanent school site for our children, whose community is fully developed and long established. Our proposal provides stability for the population of Indian Trace Elementary as well.

Residents of 84 South Alternative Proposal

-This proposal allows for a more "even" over-crowding status between Indian Trace and the new school over a four year period than the recommended Proposal A.

-This proposal leaves less students at Indian trace at the end of the 97/98 School year, and only 29 more students at the new school at the end of 97/98 School year than Proposal A.

-The Indian Trace population will level off in two years (95/96), thus avoiding more boundary changes for Indian Trace. Even though Indian Trace will have more student overcrowding in 95/96 and 96/97 than the new school. Indian Trace will be secure in the knowledge that the population of the school will not increase and the numbers are compatible with the other schools in our area. Proposal A does not allow for this provision.

-This proposal allows for the least amount of students in the portable school than any other proposal. (When Indian Trace opened in the portables, the student count was 624.) Placing 970 students in the portables while only 789 remain at Indian Trace, as per Proposal A, provides overcrowding for those students affected to endure again. The cafeteria at the portables is too small to handle 970 students. This will cause additional expense for the School Board for such items as an additional cafeteria and staff.

-Indian Trace would have 789 students while other area schools have more than 1100 students.

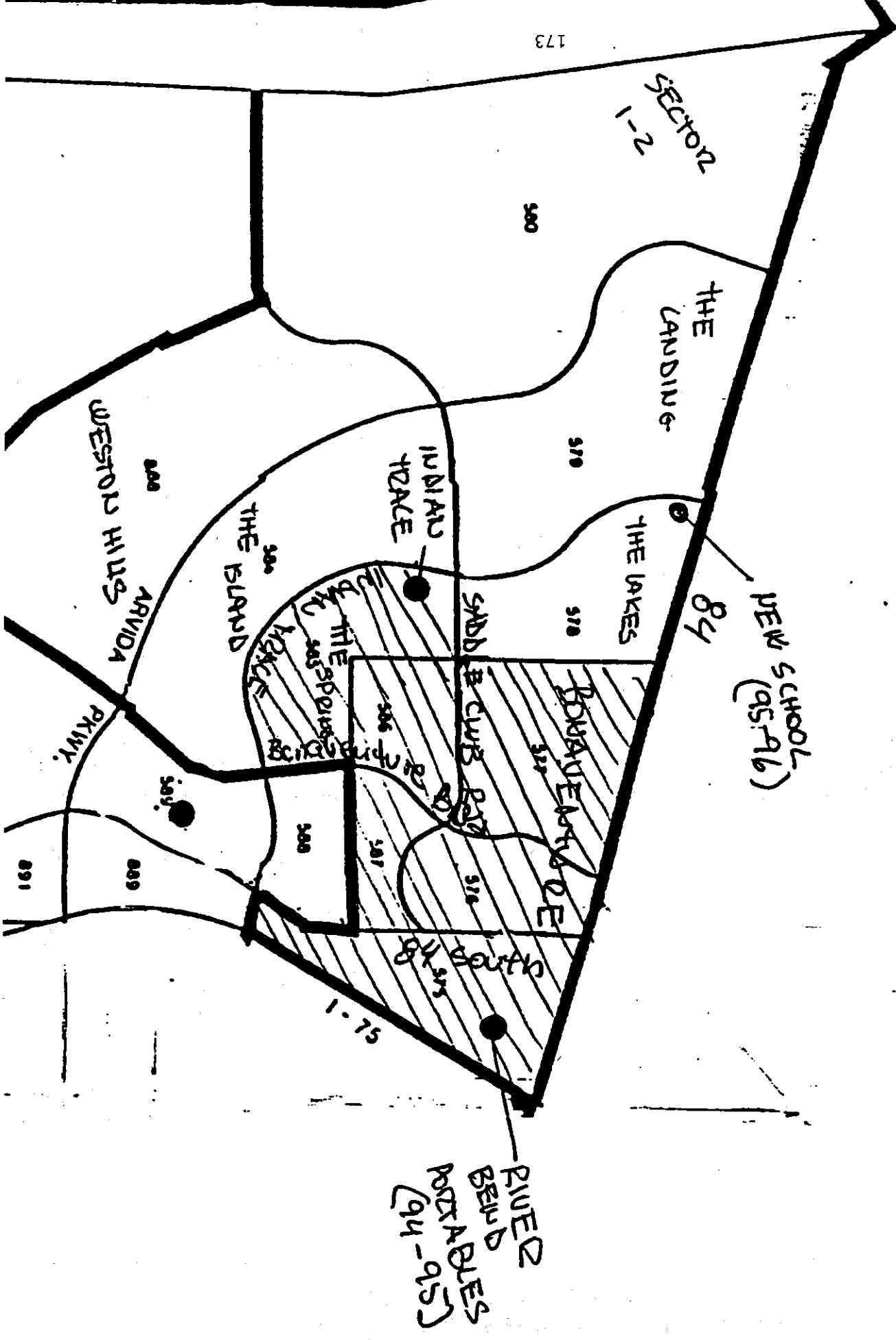
-As Weston develops, the new Weston residents would attend the new G-91 school.

-Regarding this new school being labeled a "Weston" school, it is inevitable, due to the large geographic area of Weston, that one of the elementary school boundaries remain with Weston.

-Proposal A indicates that the new school would open at 988, which is eight students short of the maximum capacity of 996. History has shown that projections of student enrollment have been incorrect, and always less than the actual amount of enrolled students. For example, Indian Trace was supposed to solve our boundary problems for four years, however, at the beginning of our third year, Indian Trace has 1410 students in a school designed for 776. By the time the new school opens, there will be more than 997 students attending.

Student count numbers in this proposal are based upon figures provided by the Indian Trace Elementary Growth Task Force Committee presented at their September 30, 1993 meeting.

We appreciate careful consideration of our proposal and trust that our representative Advisory Council will vote on the best boundary solution for our children.

**Recommendation E-7:
Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91"
and Indian Trace Elementary School**

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

facility and the travel times and distances from areas where minority children reside, it is not practical or feasible to assign areas to the school which would result in an integrated enrollment. Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed farther west than any existing elementary school in the district.

SUMMARY

The recommendations which are being proposed for the 1994-95 school year were derived from a comprehensive review and analysis by the staff and the Boundary Committee. All of the requests and concerns received from parents, schools, advisory groups, committees, elected officials and others were given due consideration.

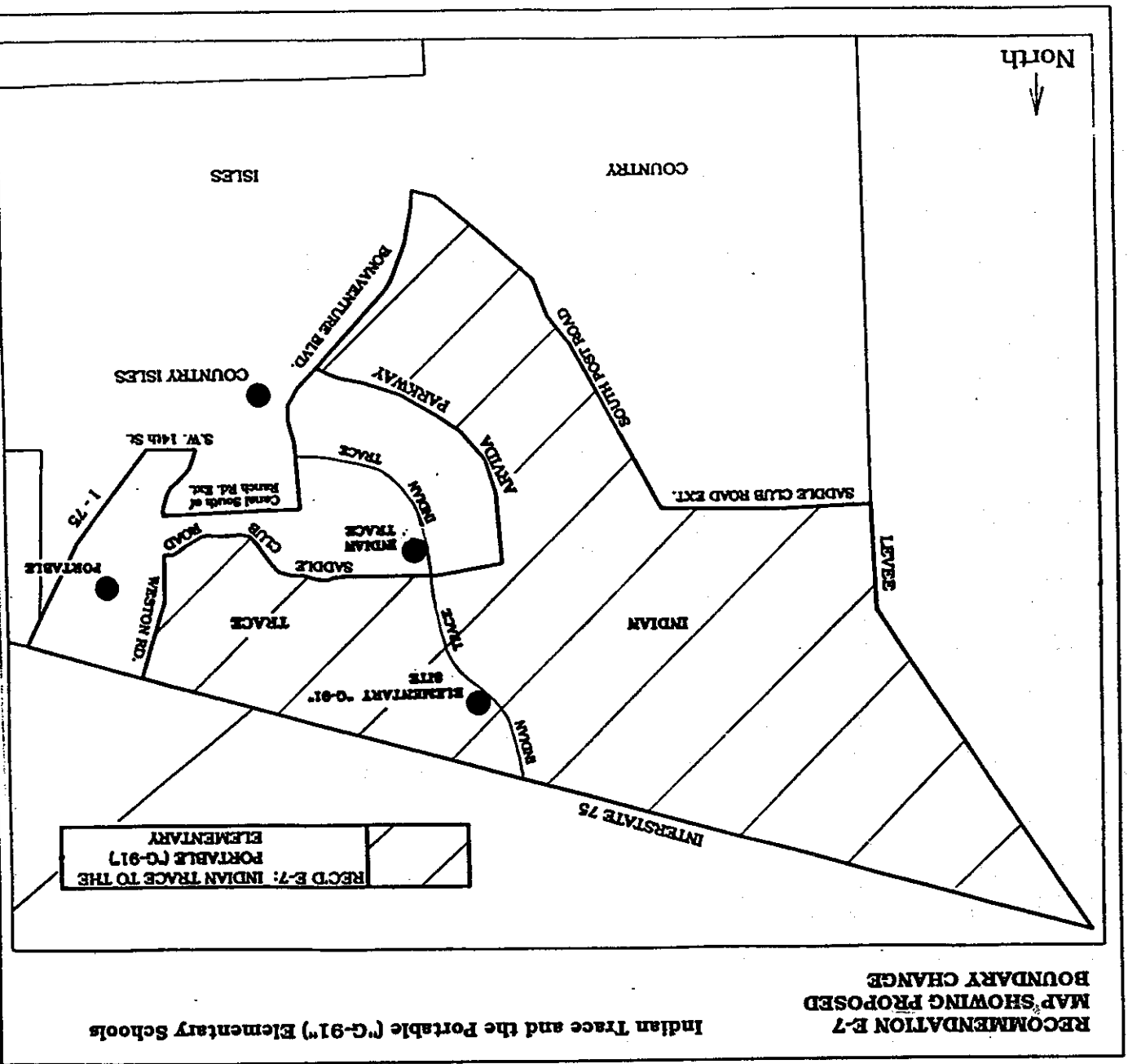
If the proposals are approved, they will facilitate the opening of Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, and relieve overcrowding at three east central elementary schools. We will continue our desegregation efforts by reducing the overenrollment at Walker Elementary School, thereby allowing for growth in the magnet program. Moreover, the assignment of additional white students to Sanders Park Elementary School is a positive step to improve the racial balance, while utilizing existing available space.

The creation of the boundary area for the new Elementary School "G-91" will allow relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. Utilization of the existing portable facility will also eliminate some of the current logistical problems at Indian Trace which are associated with overcrowding.

The Desegregation Task Force will formulate recommendations for your consideration. These recommendations will relate to our future course for desegregation efforts in Broward County. It is anticipated that the report from the Task Force will be presented this year. The results of the efforts of the Task Force should have implications for future boundary recommendations for the 1995-96 school year and beyond.

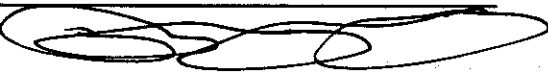

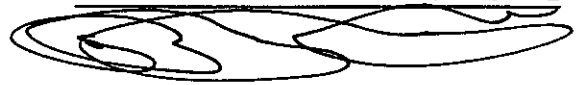

- Our FISH capacity is 1380 but our Real Program Capacity (RPC) is 1041. There are 29 Chapter I classes, 35 ESE classes and 36 DOP classes.
- Sixteen rooms are being utilized that are the exceptions to the original intent of these rooms (i.e., Faculty Dining is a classroom, Graphics Lab is being divided to accommodate two classrooms, the Reading Lab is being used as a classroom, resource rooms are being used as classrooms, one art room is now a reading classroom.

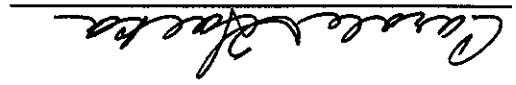

Please allow us to reiterate the position of our School Advisory Committee related to boundaries. We are asking that no change to our present boundaries be made. Considering our present enrollment of 1560 and our projected growth to 1700 next year and 1850 the following year, a boundary change as outlined above would put us at 2450 by the 1995-96 school year. 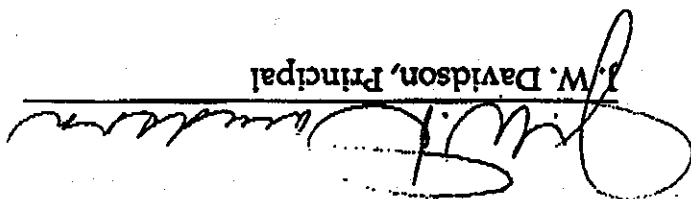

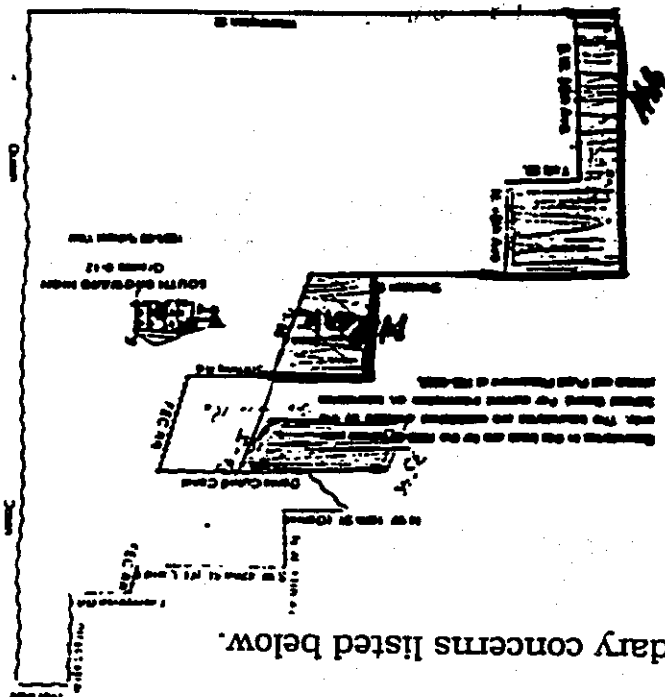

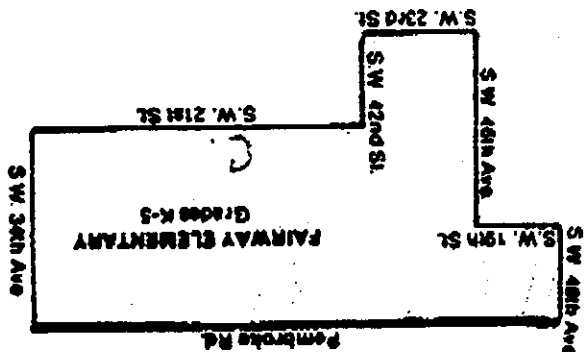

Elementary Schools

Recommendation #1: Fairway Elementary School to Lake Forest Elementary School

The Task Force recommendation is to remove approximately 120 students living in TAZ numbers 788, 785, and 789 from Fairway Elementary and boundary this area into Lake Forest Elementary.



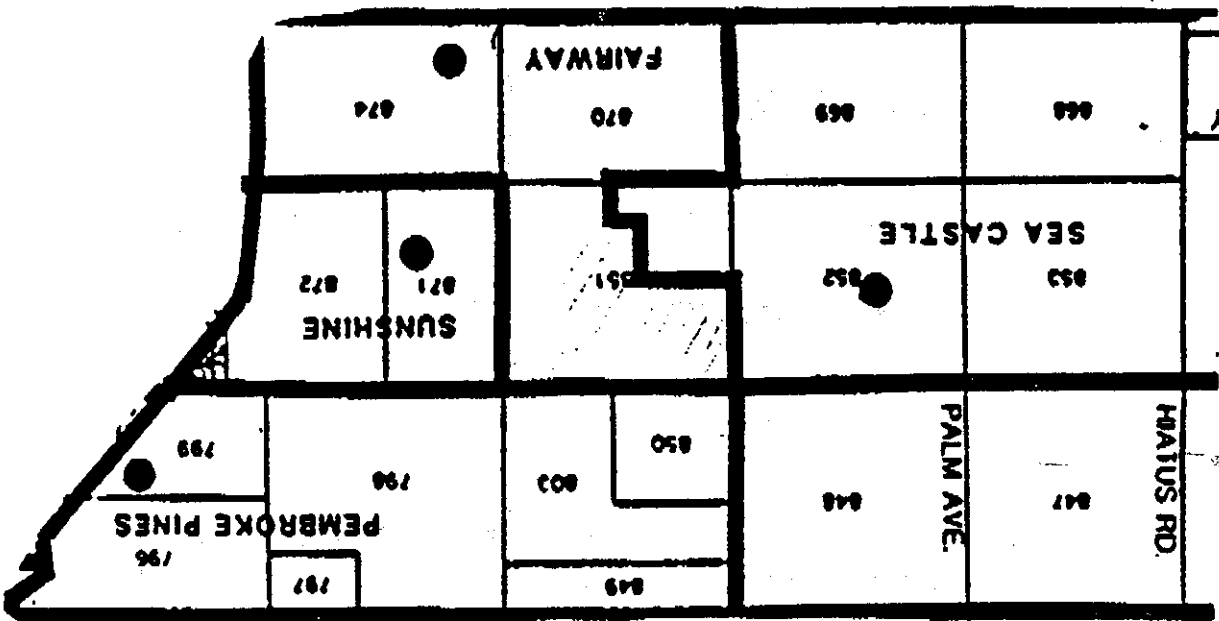

Rationale: This recommendation would relieve Fairway Elementary of a significant number of students. Currently the enrollment at Fairway is 1,126 students and there are 22 portables. Their projected enrollment with no boundary adjustment is 1,400 by 1996-1997. The current enrollment at Lake Forest Elementary indicates that this school could accommodate these students and improve their racial percentages. Addition elementary recommendations for your consideration

Silver Ridge Elementary is recommending an additional elementary school be sited within their present boundaries. They are also recommending the District reevaluate their commitment to the Nova School Programs with the possibility of relocating these schools to another site. Therefore, this would create additional student stations for children attending overenrolled schools in the South Area.

Dania to Bethune Elementary: Students living west of the FEC railroad tracks between Farragut Street and Stirling Road should be relocated from Dania Elementary to Bethune Elementary. 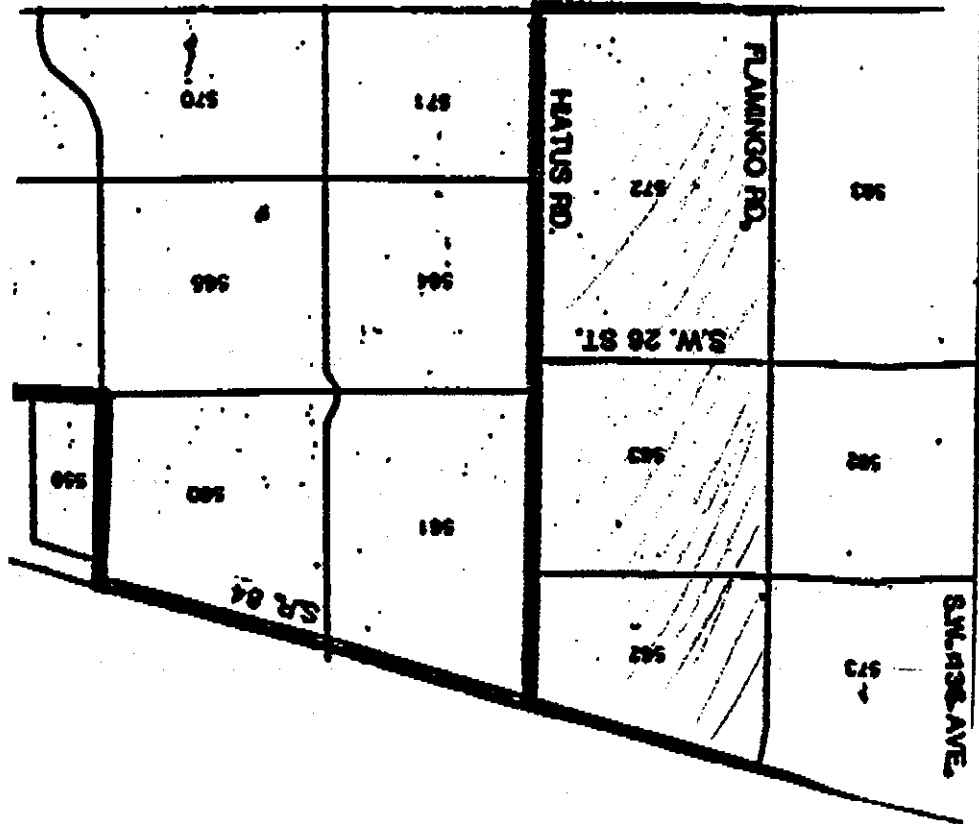

Recommendation #9: Walter C. Young Middle

The Task Force recommends a sixth grade center be constructed on the 12-acre park adjacent to the Walter C. Young campus to relieve overcrowding at this school. The Five-Year Capital Plan includes a new middle school to relieve overcrowding at Walter C. Young Middle. The Task Force believes that they cannot hold until this time. Therefore, we are recommending this portable facility.

Reinvestigate the possibility of a performing arts magnet program at the underenrolled Attucks Middle School. The program at Bethune Elementary is very successful. This would provide continuing exposure to the arts for 60% of the Bethune students for whom Attucks Middle is the feeder school.

Additional Areas of Concern

1. Enrollment Projections

The Task Force unanimously agrees that potential growth in the west dictates a closer monitoring. We are opening these new schools in the west over the FISH capacity. The Property Management personnel need to work closer with the developers to more accurately project growth!

2. Feeder Patterns

The Task Force has a serious concern about disruption feeder patterns. We further recognize the necessity of establishing and maintaining consistent feeder patterns with consideration for the feasibility of implementing Year Round Education.

3. Bond Issue

The parents in the South Area have expressed an interest in promoting a bond issue to further meet the educational needs of our expanding student population.

Development to alter forever southwest Broward landscape

Prior to, who lives in Silverlakes, said he is glad his nephew, Michael Zube, 13, will attend the magnet program in science, pre-engineering and medical sciences at Sturman High School in Fort Lauderdale next year.

If Michelle had not passed Sturman's entrance exam, Priorie said she would attend Miramar High School, which has 2,563 students in a school designed for 1,681.

Western Pembroke Pines won't simply have more people. The population will be different from the rest of Broward.

"From a people standpoint, it will probably be a little more Latin," said Thomas Powers, president of a real estate trends.

"In southwest Broward subdivisions, 20 percent to 30 percent of the buyers are Latin, and most of them are from Dade County," Powers said. Broward's 1990 population was roughly 10 percent Hispanic, the U.S. census showed.

Lydia and Luis Ruiz are part of the new influx, though they did not move here from Dade.

The Ruizes moved to Silverlakes last winter. Both are retired from New York City and chose Silverlakes because of the tranquility it offered them.

Lydia Ruiz suffers from heart problems. To improve her health, she swims each day in the lake.

"This is the way we always wanted to live: near the birds and the plants. There are fish. She swims with them and feeds them every day," Luis Ruiz said.

But all the new residents may adversely affect the very environment they want to be near.

More people need more water — which means more will have to be pulled from the Biscayne Aquifer, South Florida's main drinking water source. If too much is pulled, the aquifer could be tainted with salt.

Horses graze on fields that eventually will be developed into homes for the residents of Spring Valley.

water seeping in from the ocean. Water officials must carefully watch how much they draw — and perhaps seek other, more expensive sources, said Tom Teels, supervising professional for the South Florida Water Management District.

There are other costs to life in far-western Pembroke Pines: the cost of a gallon of milk.

Right now, the only place west of I-75 to buy groceries is a pair of convenience stores inside gas stations. The closest grocery store is at Flamingo Road and Pines Boulevard — nearly two miles east of I-75.

Relief is expected to arrive sometime next year. A grocery store will be included in a shopping center in Silverlakes, to be built at the corner of Pines Boulevard and Northwest 184th Street.

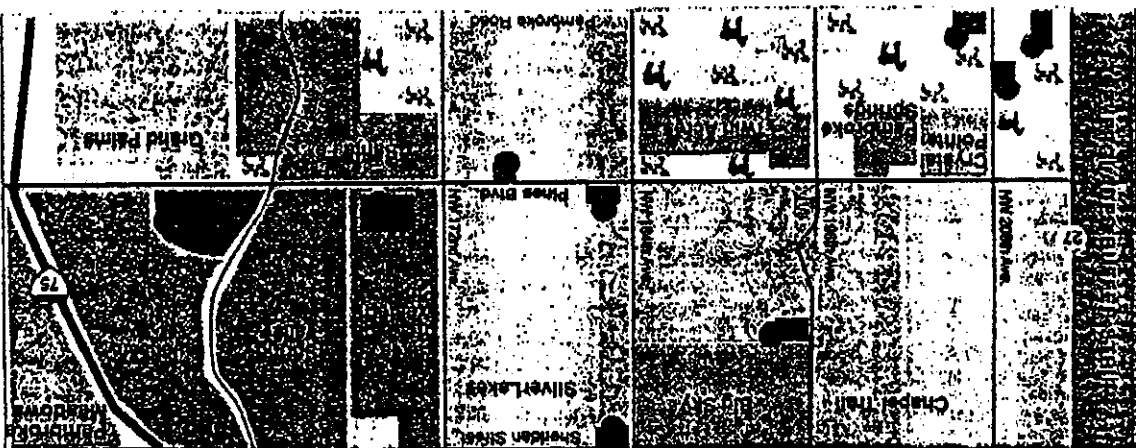
Another grocery store is planned for a center in Chapel Trail, but it is unknown where it will be located or when it will open, said Michael Konig, general

partner for Chapel Trail.

What is known about the future of western Pembroke Pines is that there will be more building, more people and more growth. The question is when it will happen and how quickly.

As western residents look out their windows and watch the construction trucks rumble past their homes toward the pastures, they know the future will come soon.

I received your boundary recommendations and concerns in October, 1993. The Boundary Task Force recommendations were reviewed and considered by the Superintendent's Boundary Committee. The Superintendent has recommended a change for Indian Trace Elementary School. The following considerations relate to the decision making process for the Task Force recommendations submitted.

Recommendation #1: Fairway Elementary School to Lake Forest Elementary School
The current enrollment at Lake Forest Elementary School exceeds the permanent F.L.S.H. capacity by 236 students. The current enrollment at Sea Castle Elementary School exceeds the permanent F.L.S.H. capacity by 332 students. Moving additional students to either of these schools would further exacerbate the overcrowding.

Recommendation #2: Fairway, Miramar, and Perry Elementary Schools/
Carver Ranches
The Carver Ranches Feasibility Study has been completed. The district is determining how we would fund the potential future magnet school.

Recommendation #3: Miramar Elementary/Watkins Elementary

The current membership at Watkins Elementary School exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity of the school by 116 students. Projections indicate enrollment increases over the next five year period with the current boundary area.

Recommendation #4: Sea Castle Elementary/Palm Cove Elementary

Projections indicate that the enrollment at Palm Cove Elementary School will continue to increase with the existing boundary area.

Recommendation #5: Hawkes Bluff Elementary School to Griffin Elementary School

The enrollment at Griffin Elementary currently exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity. Projections indicate that the enrollment at Griffin Elementary will continue to increase over the next five year period.

Recommendation #6: Indian Trace Elementary

Refer to the attached recommendation and rationale.

Recommendation #7: Pines Lakes Elementary

The boundary for the new elementary school in Chapel Trail will be established next school year. It is anticipated that the new school will open in the fall of 1995.

Additional Elementary Recommendations:

Silver Ridge: The concerns have been forwarded to the appropriate staff personnel for review and consideration.

Dania to Bethune: The enrollment in Bethune Elementary School currently exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity by 376 students. Adding additional students to your school will exacerbate the overcrowding.

Hollywood Central to Hallandale Elementary: The proposed change would have a negative impact on the unitary school system.

Recommendation #8: Tequesta Trace Middle

The current enrollment at Pioneer Middle School exceeds the permanent F.L.S.H. capacity of the school by 169 students. Projections indicate a continued membership increase over the next five year period.

Your other concerns have been forwarded to the appropriate staff personnel for review and consideration.

Recommendation #9: Walter C. Young Middle

The staff is continuing to explore options to accommodate the current and projected overcrowding at Walter C. Young Middle School.

Recommendation #10

The district is reassessing the direction of magnet programs countywide. No new magnet programs have been recommended for the 1994-95 school year.

Additional areas of concern:

The concerns you raised concerning enrollment projections and feeder patterns have been forwarded to the property management department and other appropriate staff personnel for review.

**Recommendation E-7:
Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91"
and Indian Trace Elementary School**

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Western. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

facility and the travel times and distances from areas where minority children reside, it is not practical or feasible to assign areas to the school which would result in an integrated enrollment. Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed farther west than any existing elementary school in the district.

SUMMARY

The recommendations which are being proposed for the 1994-95 school year were derived from a comprehensive review and analysis by the staff and the Boundary Committee. All of the requests and concerns received from parents, schools, advisory groups, committees, elected officials and others were given due consideration.

If the proposals are approved, they will facilitate the opening of Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, and relieve overcrowding at three east central elementary schools. We will continue our desegregation efforts by reducing the overenrollment at Walker Elementary School, thereby allowing for growth in the magnet program. Moreover, the assignment of additional white students to Sanders Park Elementary School is a positive step to improve the racial balance, while utilizing existing available space.

The creation of the boundary area for the new Elementary School "G-91" will allow relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. Utilization of the existing portable facility will also eliminate some of the current logistical problems at Indian Trace which are associated with overcrowding.

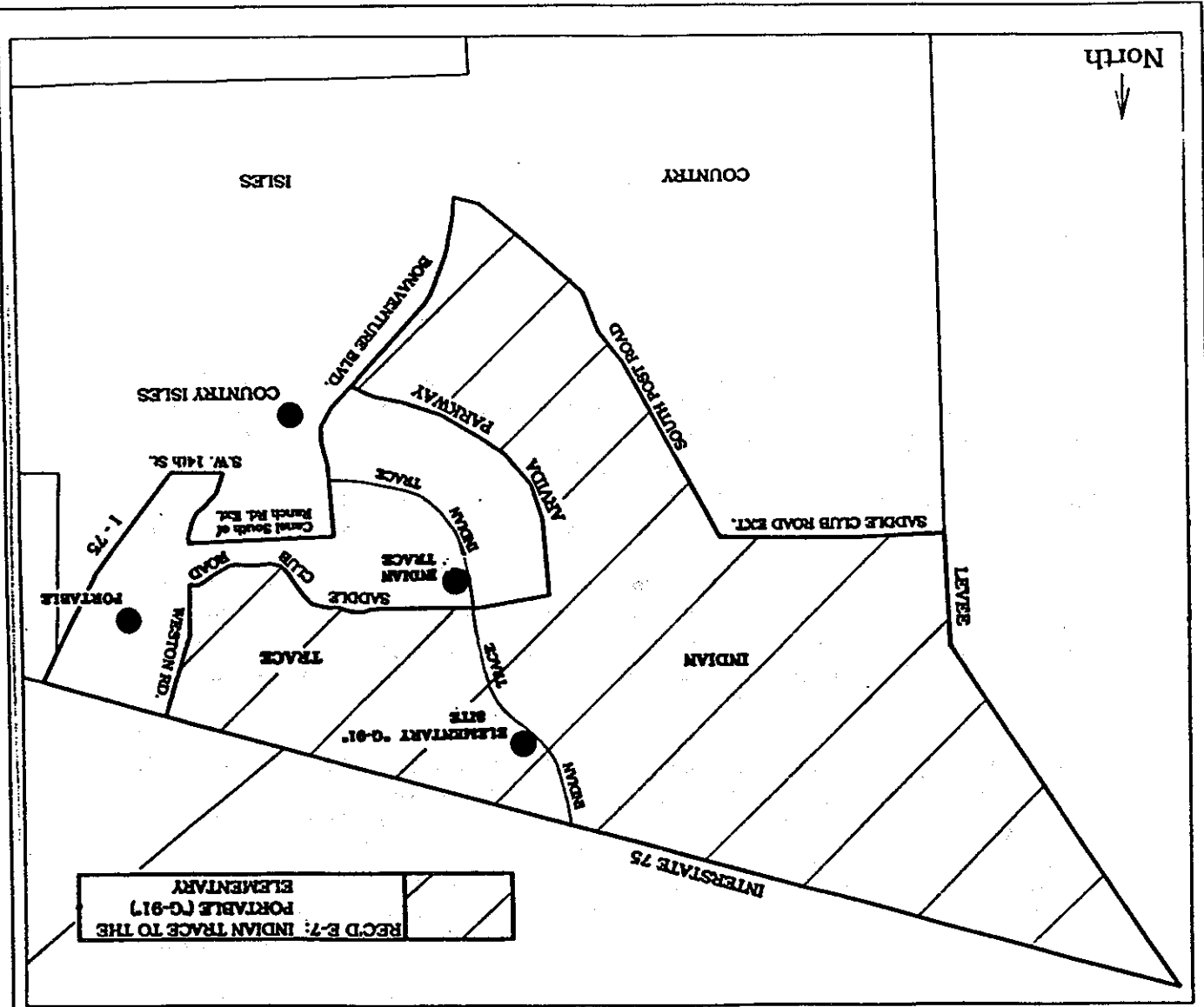
The Desegregation Task Force will formulate recommendations for your consideration. These recommendations will relate to our future course for desegregation efforts in Broward County. It is anticipated that the report from the Task Force will be presented this year. The results of the efforts of the Task Force should have implications for future boundary recommendations for the 1995-96 school year and beyond.

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Introduction

School Input Forms & Responses:

The information in this book documents the communication between the schools and the district staff during the decision-making process to determine the 1994-95 school attendance areas (boundaries). On August 27, 1993, the Superintendent sent letters to each elementary, middle, and high school requesting that boundary input be submitted to the appropriate area superintendent by October 8, 1993. Schools were asked to use a consensus process to arrive at the boundary input which would be submitted. Spaces were designated on each input form for the principal, advisory chairperson, PTA president, and teacher representative to sign off on the school's request. Additionally, high school student government presidents were asked to participate in this process.

The boundary input forms were collected by the area offices, and the requests contained on each of these forms were considered by the Superintendent's Boundary Committee, along with other information related to the establishment of the 1994-95 boundaries.

On Monday, January 10, 1994, the Superintendent submitted his recommendations for 1994-95 boundaries to the School Board. Representatives from each school which would be affected by the proposed changes were invited to attend a meeting on January 10, 1994, to review the recommendations and ask any questions related to the recommendations.

In January, 1994, letters were sent from the principal of each of the affected schools to parents of children who would be affected if the recommended changes are approved.

Legal ads will be published in the Sun-Sentinel and the Miami Herald to notify the community of the proposed changes approximately 10 days prior to the boundary hearings which are scheduled for Thursday, March 10, 1994 and Thursday, April 14, 1994.

The area superintendents have sent letters to all elementary, middle, and high schools responding to their school's boundary input form requests. The rationale for not recommending a boundary change was provided along with a schedule for the two boundary hearings. To date, meetings have been held at Bennett Elementary School and Indian Trace Elementary School. A meeting has been scheduled at Winston Park Elementary. Area office and district staff continues to be available to meet with any

school requesting a meeting relating to the boundary process. Area and district staff will continue to respond to Board Member, school, and community questions.

This document contains:

1. The Superintendent's letter requesting school boundary input (example), and
2. School input forms and response letters to principals from the area superintendents.

Forms and letters for schools which did not request a change or note other concerns on their boundary input form are not included, but are on file in the Property Management Department.

1st Choice: Acceptance of children currently enrolled in two LLD (Language Learning Disabled), classes at Tamarac Elementary.

Rationale: Tamarac Elementary currently has an enrollment of 1,188. Morrow Elementary has 830. By our accepting these two classrooms of students into our school, we are enabling Tamarac to free up two classroom spaces. The LLD classes are very small and would impact us with probably no more than 30 students, but opening up those classrooms at Tamarac for regular classrooms could provide them with up to 60+ student stations. Since we are experiencing a traffic flow problem at Morrow, we could not make a choice that would bring more cars onto our campus. The two classrooms of LLD children are already being transported to Tamarac by bus and would simply be brought here instead. These children would come to us with special funding to support the smaller student/teacher ratio and therefore, would not negatively impact our budget in any way.

2nd Choice: No boundary change.

Rationale: With our new addition, Morrow's FISH (Florida Inventory School Housing), capacity will be 782. We currently have 830 students. Next year, we are projected to have 835. We are using our building the way it was intended to be used. However, we are experiencing a serious traffic flow problem on our campus. We did not feel we could recommend a boundary change that would bring more children into our school, thus bringing more cars onto our campus, without creating a serious safety hazard.

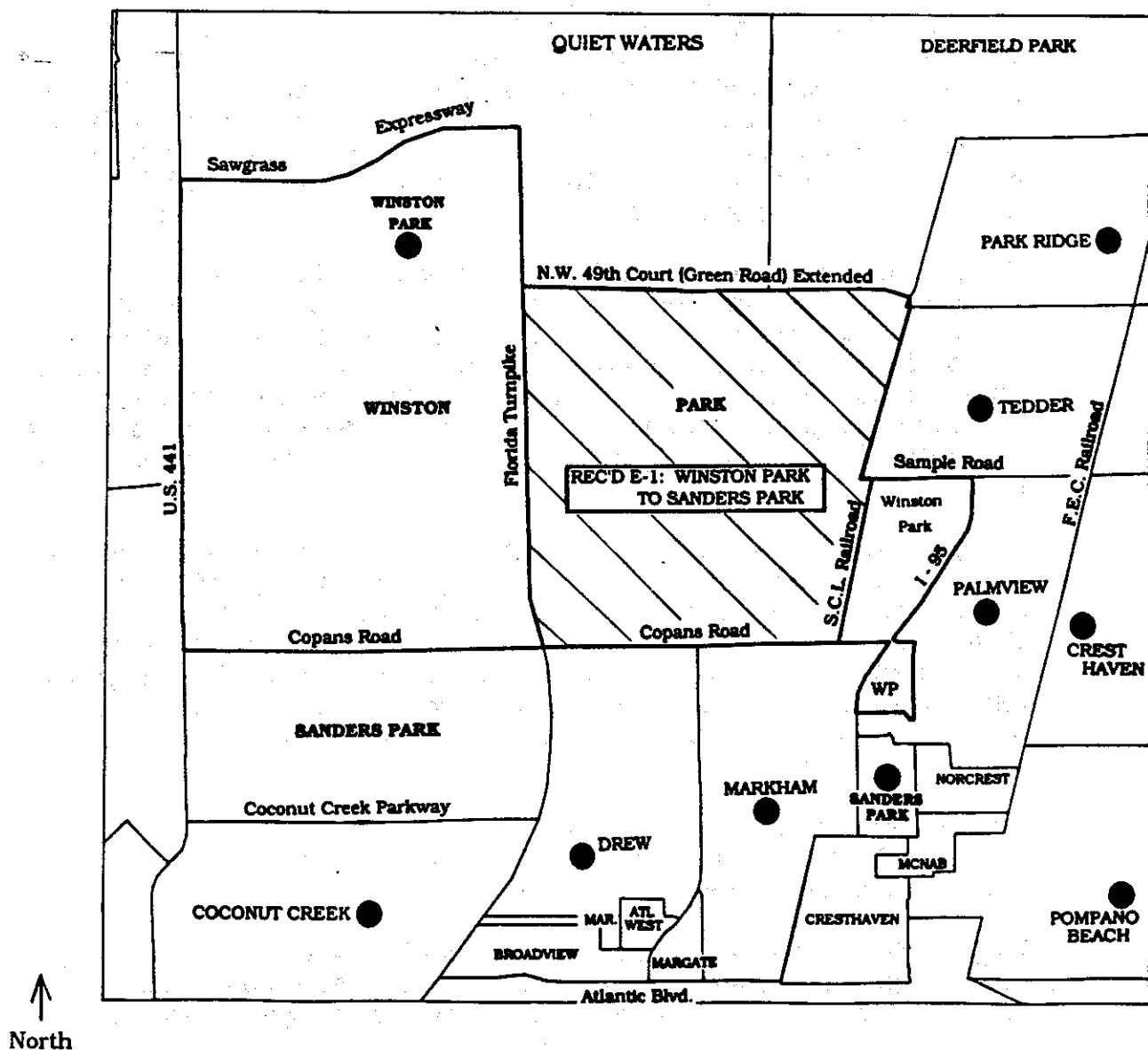

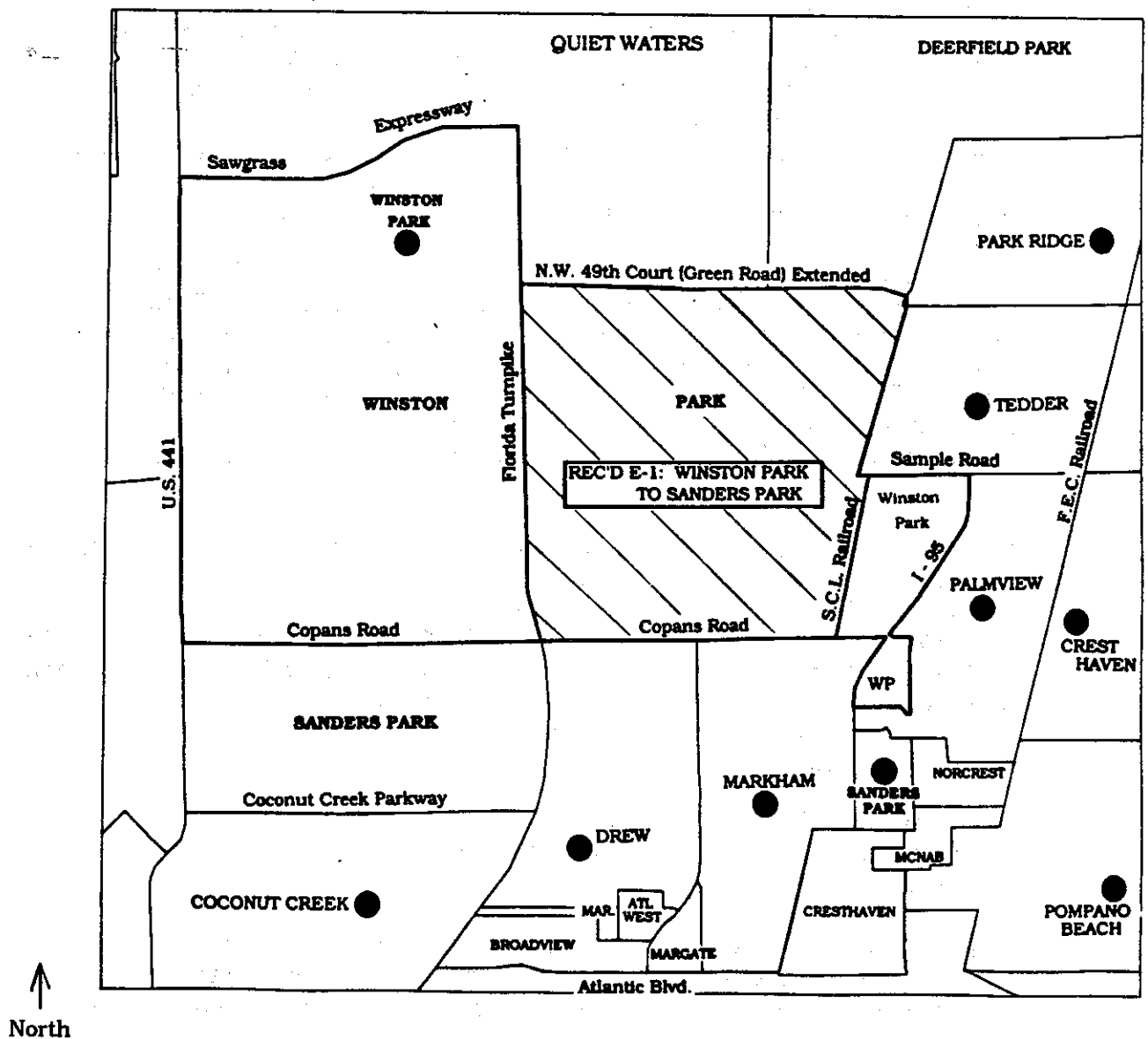

STEPHEN FOSTER ELEMENTARY BOUNDARY CHANGES & CONCERNS FOR 1994 -95 SCHOOL YEAR

Stephen Foster Elementary is requesting an increase of enrollment of around 150 students via a boundary change. Our present enrollment is 563 students that generate FTE funds and our current FISH is 582. Presently additional classrooms are being built on campus. The committee feels we will not reach the County's cohort projection of 640 students for the 1993-94 school year. Our committee is not recommending that we lose any of our present students.

Possible boundary changes may include receiving students from Martin Luther King Elementary by adding a contiguous area to our boundaries. There is presently a bus stop for Martin Luther King Elementary at Sunset Learning Center and students could walk directly to Stephen Foster.

If the existing court order will not allow students from Martin Luther King Elementary to be transferred out of that school, our committee discussed looking at some of the western schools off Interstate 595. The bus ride from the west would be equal to that of minority students being bused north of Broward Blvd.

As principal of Stephen Foster Elementary, I am concerned over the fact that this year we lost 13 students to the Nova schools. Thirteen students equal half of a teacher's salary and I had to form three combination grades this year. This seemed to be a high number of students to lose in one year and felt this concern should be addressed along with boundaries.

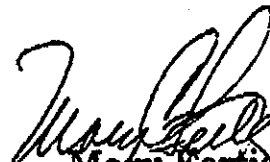

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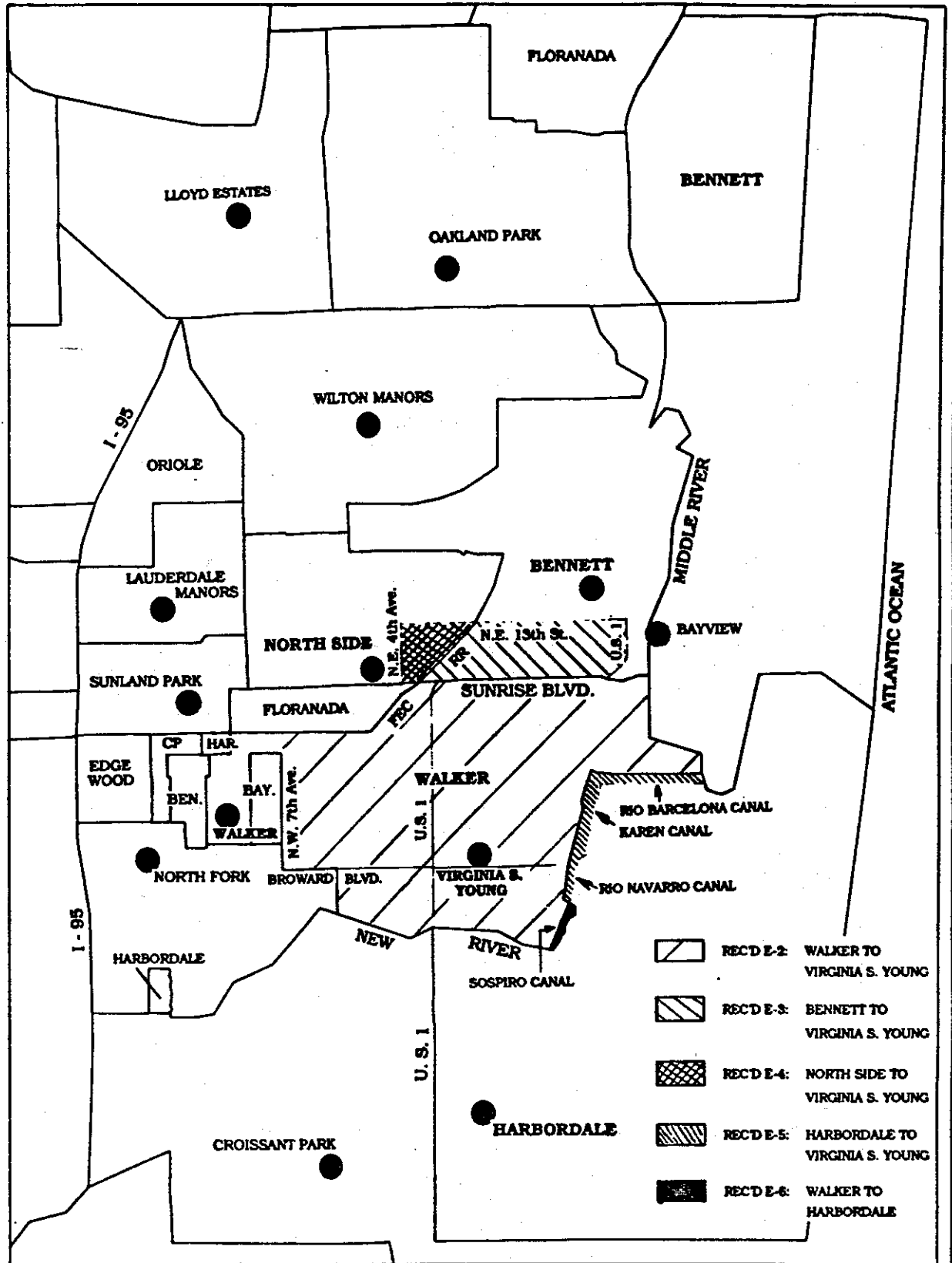

This memorandum contains a general description of the boundary proposals for the 1994-95 school year, and the rationale for the recommended changes. Additionally, the supporting documentation, which is included, provides detailed projections, maps, and descriptions of the areas proposed for change.

This fall, the Superintendent's Boundary Committee reviewed, analyzed and discussed over sixty-five proposed changes and concerns which were submitted by advisory representatives, PTA/PTO representatives, parents, principals, school staff, community groups, the South Area Boundary Committee, elected officials, and citizens. The Boundary Committee considered and discussed each of the recommendations and proposals. Written responses will be sent to the organizations, advisory groups, and individuals whose proposals were received for review. The responses will indicate whether or not the proposal was recommended, and the rationale for the decision.

The boundary recommendations for the 1994-95 school year address the following objectives:

- to establish the attendance area boundaries for two new elementary schools;

- to provide relief for existing overcrowding at five elementary schools; and

- to utilize existing classroom space to provide relief for an overenrolled elementary school;

Changes to the attendance areas for seven elementary schools are being recommended. A boundary change is proposed to move students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This change will reduce existing overcrowding at Winston Park. Sanders Park Elementary School is underenrolled and can accommodate additional students.

The boundary area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School will be established. This school will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools, and some relief for North Side Elementary School. The boundary area for new Elementary School "G-91" will be established. Students in this boundary area will attend an existing portable facility until Elementary School "G-91" has been constructed. The portable facility will provide relief for Indian Trace Elementary School.

**Recommendation E-1:
Winston Park and Sanders Park Elementary Schools**

This recommended boundary change will bring students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. The current membership at Winston Park exceeds the permanent capacity of the school by 523 students. The projected enrollment at Winston Park Elementary School for next fall exceeds 1450 students, without boundary changes. The potential for continued residential development around Winston Park Elementary School is significant. Sanders Park Elementary School had a twentieth day membership of 466 students. This elementary school is underenrolled by 224 students. The permanent capacity of Sanders Park Elementary School is 690 students. The projections for Sanders Park indicate the enrollment at the school will be less than 500 students for the next five years, based upon the current attendance area. In light of our capital budget shortfall it is important to utilize available space, where feasible and practical.

The area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of the S.C.L. Railroad are proposed for reassignment from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This recommendation includes the Crystal Lake community and the Blue Lake, Quail Close areas south of Sample Road. The demographic makeup of the students residing in these areas is predominately white. Therefore, assigning these students to Sanders Park Elementary School will improve the racial balance at the school.

The proposed change, moving students out of Winston Park Elementary School, will provide some relief for existing overcrowding. However, because of the continued rapid development in the area, Winston Park Elementary School will remain overenrolled over the next two years. It is anticipated that the opening of new Elementary School "I-91" will provide relief for Winston Park Elementary. Elementary School "I-91" is one of the nineteen new schools designated to be funded from the anticipated capital revenues.

**Recommendations E-2 through E-6:
Virginia Shuman Young, Walker, North Side, Bennett,
and Harbordale Elementary Schools**

Virginia Shuman Young (Elementary School "W") was approved in July 1989, as part of the amendment to the five year capital plan. At that time, the school was proposed to relieve overcrowding at North Side

Elementary School. Since 1989, it has become apparent that other eastern schools are overenrolled and in need of relief.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is under construction at 101 Northeast Eleventh Avenue in Ft. Lauderdale. The proposed attendance area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools. In addition, the opening of Virginia Shuman Young will provide some relief for North Side Elementary School.

The current enrollment at Walker Elementary School is 1004 students. The permanent capacity is 634 students. Walker is a magnet school for the performing arts. The boundary change would move areas east of Northwest Seventh Avenue from Walker Elementary School to Virginia Shuman Young. The designated area includes the Holiday Park and Victoria Park communities, Cooley Hammock, the Las Olas and downtown areas north of New River, a portion of the Progresso neighborhood, and areas adjacent to Sistrunk Boulevard, east of Northwest Seventh Avenue.

The proposed change, moving students to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary, will reduce significantly the student membership at Walker Elementary School. This reduction will allow for growth in the magnet program. Marketing efforts will be concentrated on attracting white students to Walker, thereby helping to enhance our desegregation efforts.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is located in a predominately white neighborhood. United States Census data indicate that over two hundred children, who are elementary school age, reside in the portion of the Walker Elementary School attendance area located east of U.S. 1, south of Sunrise Boulevard, and north of New River. With the attendance area proposed for Virginia S. Young, the school is anticipated to open with an enrollment of approximately 500 students. The capacity of the new elementary school is 776 students. The opening of Virginia S. Young with a projected enrollment which is below the capacity of the school will allow opportunities for neighborhood children to attend the public school system.

Bennett Elementary School has a current membership of 767 students. The permanent capacity of the facility is 501 students. The southern portion of the current Bennett Elementary School attendance area, the areas located south of Northeast Thirteenth Street, are proposed to be moved to Young Elementary School. The proposed change will relieve current overcrowding at Bennett Elementary School.

North Side Elementary School, which includes the North Side Annex facility located across from Ft. Lauderdale High School, is housing over 1200 students. The enrollment exceeds the permanent capacity of the combined facilities by 664 students. The area east of Northeast Fourth Avenue and south of Northeast Thirteenth Street is proposed for reassignment to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The area is contiguous to the area which is proposed for reassignment from Bennett Elementary School to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The change will give North Side some relief for the 1994-95 school year. North Side Elementary School will have an additional reduction in numbers when Thurgood Marshall Elementary School opens. Thurgood Marshall is under construction at 800 Northwest Thirteenth Street in Fort Lauderdale. It is anticipated that Thurgood Marshall Elementary School will open in the fall of 1995.

Boundary adjustments are also being proposed for a portion of the Harbordale Elementary School attendance area. Portions of the current boundary line which divide Harbordale and Walker elementary schools are Sunrise Key Boulevard, Victoria Park Road, and Mola Avenue. Those students who reside on opposite sides of these streets would attend different elementary schools. The proposed adjustments will move the boundary line to adjacent canals, thereby placing all of Sunrise Key Boulevard and Victoria Park Road into Virginia Shuman Young's boundary, for the 1994-95 school year. Therefore, all of the Victoria Park neighborhood will be assigned to the same school. All of the students who live on Mola Avenue would be assigned to Harbordale Elementary School, under this proposal.

In addition to the proposed changes described above, I am proposing that Virginia Shuman Young be designated a School Near the Workplace. Students of parents who work within a two mile radius of Virginia Shuman Young and north of New River, and who fall within the Schools Near the Workplace guidelines, would be eligible to attend Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School. It is anticipated that this program would draw additional students to the school from parents who work in the downtown areas north of New River, from the Las Olas Boulevard corridor and areas on Fort Lauderdale Beach. As mentioned previously, Virginia S. Young Elementary School is anticipated to open with a membership which will be below the capacity of the school. This will allow room for potential workplace students.

The current Schools Near the Workplace Program at Harbordale Elementary School would continue. Based upon the work locations of parents with students in the current workplace program at Harbordale

Elementary School, primarily Broward General Hospital, it is anticipated that the proposed new program at Virginia S. Young Elementary will have a minimal impact on the enrollment at Harbordale.

**Recommendation E-7:
Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91"
and Indian Trace Elementary School**

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

Please be advised that the parents and staff of Martin Luther King Elementary School met on Wednesday, September 29, 1993 to discuss our boundary recommendations for the 1994-95 school year.

Since the current F.I.S.H. capacity of our school is 726 and the anticipated enrollment for 1994-95 is 993, we would like to make the following recommendations based upon the indicated rationale:

1. Students walking north on N.W. 31 Avenue must walk past a dangerous canal. These children live on Washington Drive, NW 9th Court, NW 9th Place, NW 9th Street and the 2800 block of NW 8th Court and have been observed shoving each other near the canal. We do not want students placed in potential danger because they must walk this route to get to our school. We recommend that these students be removed from our school boundaries and reassigned to another school site. The number of students affected is approximately 45.
2. Since our enrollment is now 986 we are presently 260 students over our F.I.S.H. capacity and more growth is expected. We recommend that 148 students living on SW 37th Terrace, SW 38th Avenue, Jackson Blvd., Atkinson Ave., Tennessee Ave., Pennsylvania, Long Island, Wyoming, Campus, Dayton,

Evanston and Park Drive which are in closest proximity to Stephen Foster Elementary School be reassigned to that school site. Since Stephen Foster presently has 560 students (FISH 583), that will equalize our populations. When these students were originally bussed to our school, they were Caucasian families and it enhanced the unitary school philosophy. This is no longer the case, therefore, the movement of these students will not be in conflict to the unitary school philosophy.

Reassignment of these students will make available some of the portables on our school site for distribution throughout the district. If these changes are accepted, we would work with these families to facilitate this process.

Thank you for your consideration of these recommendations.

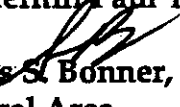

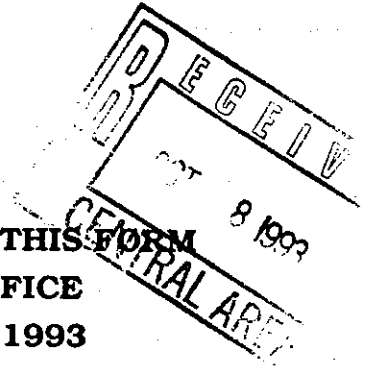

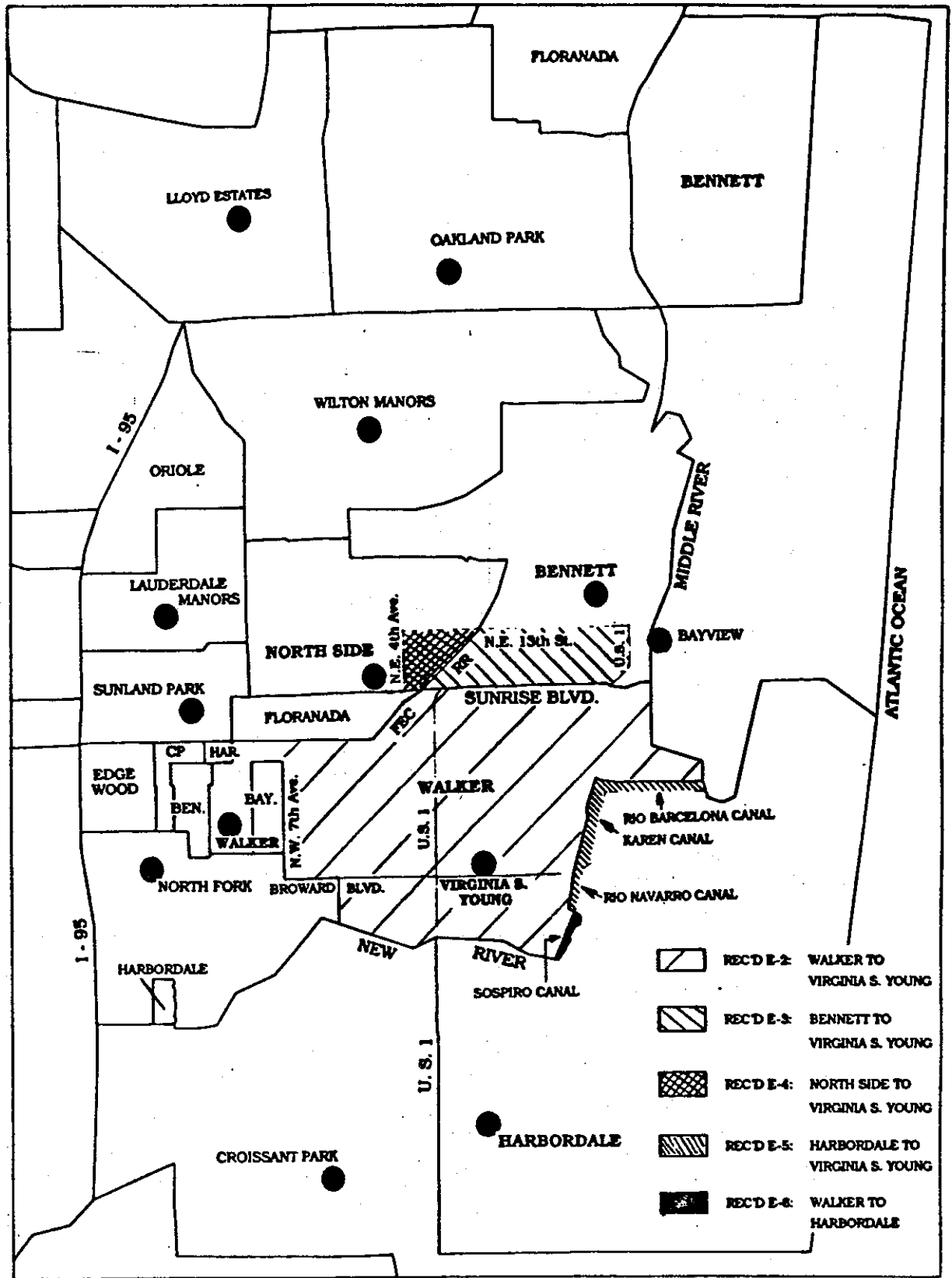

This memorandum contains a general description of the boundary proposals for the 1994-95 school year, and the rationale for the recommended changes. Additionally, the supporting documentation, which is included, provides detailed projections, maps, and descriptions of the areas proposed for change.

This fall, the Superintendent's Boundary Committee reviewed, analyzed and discussed over sixty-five proposed changes and concerns which were submitted by advisory representatives, PTA/PTO representatives, parents, principals, school staff, community groups, the South Area Boundary Committee, elected officials, and citizens. The Boundary Committee considered and discussed each of the recommendations and proposals. Written responses will be sent to the organizations, advisory groups, and individuals whose proposals were received for review. The responses will indicate whether or not the proposal was recommended, and the rationale for the decision.

The boundary recommendations for the 1994-95 school year address the following objectives:

- to establish the attendance area boundaries for two new elementary schools;

- to provide relief for existing overcrowding at five elementary schools; and

- to utilize existing classroom space to provide relief for an overenrolled elementary school;

Changes to the attendance areas for seven elementary schools are being recommended. A boundary change is proposed to move students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This change will reduce existing overcrowding at Winston Park. Sanders Park Elementary School is underenrolled and can accommodate additional students.

The boundary area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School will be established. This school will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools, and some relief for North Side Elementary School. The boundary area for new Elementary School "G-91" will be established. Students in this boundary area will attend an existing portable facility until Elementary School "G-91" has been constructed. The portable facility will provide relief for Indian Trace Elementary School.

**Recommendation E-1:
Winston Park and Sanders Park Elementary Schools**

This recommended boundary change will bring students from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. The current membership at Winston Park exceeds the permanent capacity of the school by 523 students. The projected enrollment at Winston Park Elementary School for next fall exceeds 1450 students, without boundary changes. The potential for continued residential development around Winston Park Elementary School is significant. Sanders Park Elementary School had a twentieth day membership of 466 students. This elementary school is underenrolled by 224 students. The permanent capacity of Sanders Park Elementary School is 690 students. The projections for Sanders Park indicate the enrollment at the school will be less than 500 students for the next five years, based upon the current attendance area. In light of our capital budget shortfall it is important to utilize available space, where feasible and practical.

The area east of the Florida Turnpike and west of the S.C.L. Railroad are proposed for reassignment from Winston Park Elementary School to Sanders Park Elementary School. This recommendation includes the Crystal Lake community and the Blue Lake, Quail Close areas south of Sample Road. The demographic makeup of the students residing in these areas is predominately white. Therefore, assigning these students to Sanders Park Elementary School will improve the racial balance at the school.

The proposed change, moving students out of Winston Park Elementary School, will provide some relief for existing overcrowding. However, because of the continued rapid development in the area, Winston Park Elementary School will remain overenrolled over the next two years. It is anticipated that the opening of new Elementary School "I-91" will provide relief for Winston Park Elementary. Elementary School "I-91" is one of the nineteen new schools designated to be funded from the anticipated capital revenues.

**Recommendations E-2 through E-6:
Virginia Shuman Young, Walker, North Side, Bennett,
and Harbordale Elementary Schools**

Virginia Shuman Young (Elementary School "W") was approved in July 1989, as part of the amendment to the five year capital plan. At that time, the school was proposed to relieve overcrowding at North Side

Elementary School. Since 1989, it has become apparent that other eastern schools are overenrolled and in need of relief.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is under construction at 101 Northeast Eleventh Avenue in Ft. Lauderdale. The proposed attendance area for Virginia Shuman Young Elementary will provide relief for Walker and Bennett elementary schools. In addition, the opening of Virginia Shuman Young will provide some relief for North Side Elementary School.

The current enrollment at Walker Elementary School is 1004 students. The permanent capacity is 634 students. Walker is a magnet school for the performing arts. The boundary change would move areas east of Northwest Seventh Avenue from Walker Elementary School to Virginia Shuman Young. The designated area includes the Holiday Park and Victoria Park communities, Cooley Hammock, the Las Olas and downtown areas north of New River, a portion of the Progresso neighborhood, and areas adjacent to Sistrunk Boulevard, east of Northwest Seventh Avenue.

The proposed change, moving students to Virginia Shuman Young Elementary, will reduce significantly the student membership at Walker Elementary School. This reduction will allow for growth in the magnet program. Marketing efforts will be concentrated on attracting white students to Walker, thereby helping to enhance our desegregation efforts.

Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School is located in a predominately white neighborhood. United States Census data indicate that over two hundred children, who are elementary school age, reside in the portion of the Walker Elementary School attendance area located east of U.S. 1, south of Sunrise Boulevard, and north of New River. With the attendance area proposed for Virginia S. Young, the school is anticipated to open with an enrollment of approximately 500 students. The capacity of the new elementary school is 776 students. The opening of Virginia S. Young with a projected enrollment which is below the capacity of the school will allow opportunities for neighborhood children to attend the public school system.

Bennett Elementary School has a current membership of 767 students. The permanent capacity of the facility is 501 students. The southern portion of the current Bennett Elementary School attendance area, the areas located south of Northeast Thirteenth Street, are proposed to be moved to Young Elementary School. The proposed change will relieve current overcrowding at Bennett Elementary School.

North Side Elementary School, which includes the North Side Annex facility located across from Ft. Lauderdale High School, is housing over 1200 students. The enrollment exceeds the permanent capacity of the combined facilities by 664 students. The area east of Northeast Fourth Avenue and south of Northeast Thirteenth Street is proposed for reassignment to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The area is contiguous to the area which is proposed for reassignment from Bennett Elementary School to Virginia S. Young Elementary School. The change will give North Side some relief for the 1994-95 school year. North Side Elementary School will have an additional reduction in numbers when Thurgood Marshall Elementary School opens. Thurgood Marshall is under construction at 800 Northwest Thirteenth Street in Fort Lauderdale. It is anticipated that Thurgood Marshall Elementary School will open in the fall of 1995.

Boundary adjustments are also being proposed for a portion of the Harbordale Elementary School attendance area. Portions of the current boundary line which divide Harbordale and Walker elementary schools are Sunrise Key Boulevard, Victoria Park Road, and Mola Avenue. Those students who reside on opposite sides of these streets would attend different elementary schools. The proposed adjustments will move the boundary line to adjacent canals, thereby placing all of Sunrise Key Boulevard and Victoria Park Road into Virginia Shuman Young's boundary, for the 1994-95 school year. Therefore, all of the Victoria Park neighborhood will be assigned to the same school. All of the students who live on Mola Avenue would be assigned to Harbordale Elementary School, under this proposal.

In addition to the proposed changes described above, I am proposing that Virginia Shuman Young be designated a School Near the Workplace. Students of parents who work within a two mile radius of Virginia Shuman Young and north of New River, and who fall within the Schools Near the Workplace guidelines, would be eligible to attend Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School. It is anticipated that this program would draw additional students to the school from parents who work in the downtown areas north of New River, from the Las Olas Boulevard corridor and areas on Fort Lauderdale Beach. As mentioned previously, Virginia S. Young Elementary School is anticipated to open with a membership which will be below the capacity of the school. This will allow room for potential workplace students.

The current Schools Near the Workplace Program at Harbordale Elementary School would continue. Based upon the work locations of parents with students in the current workplace program at Harbordale

Elementary School, primarily Broward General Hospital, it is anticipated that the proposed new program at Virginia S. Young Elementary will have a minimal impact on the enrollment at Harbordale.

**Recommendation E-7:
Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91"
and Indian Trace Elementary School**

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

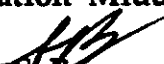

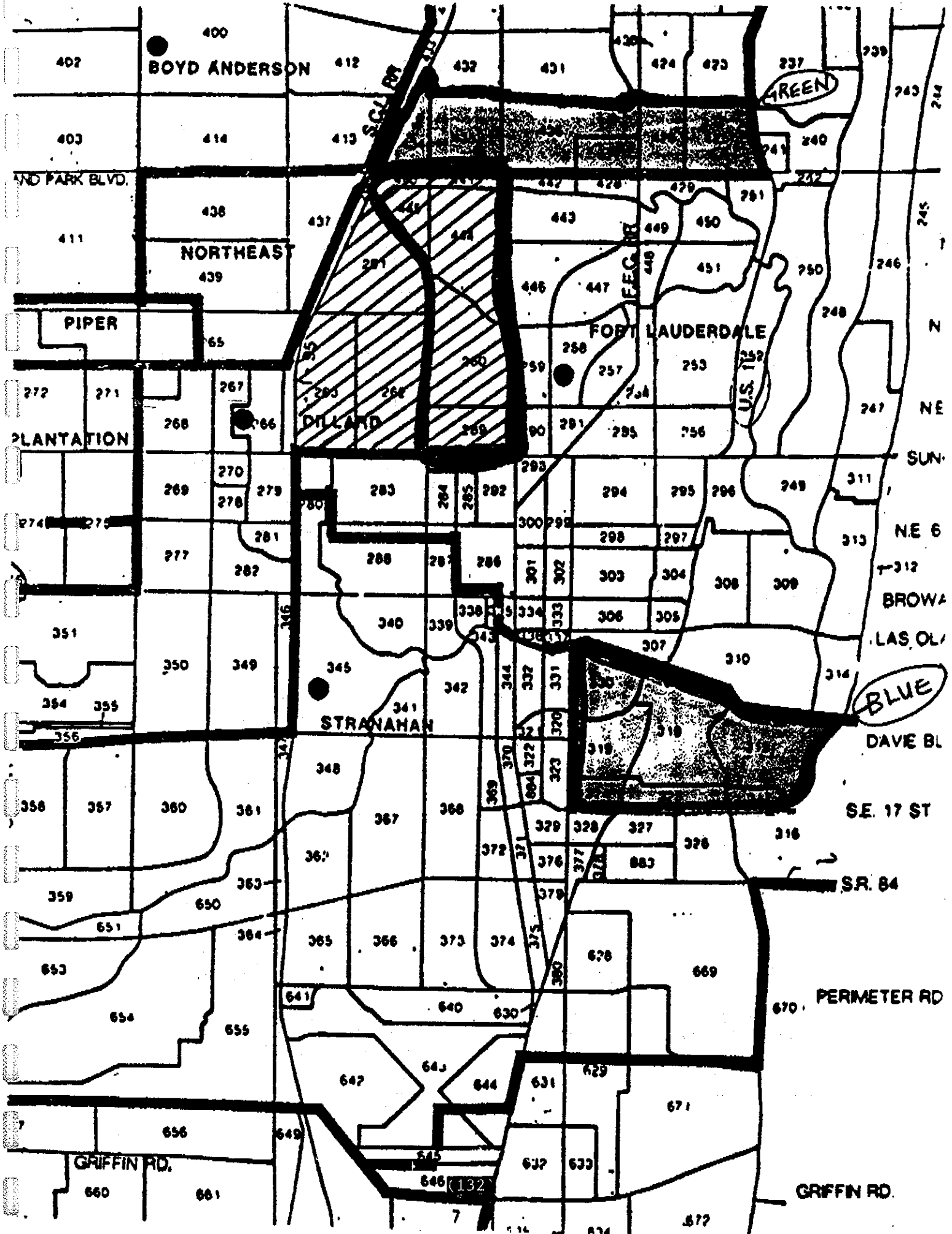

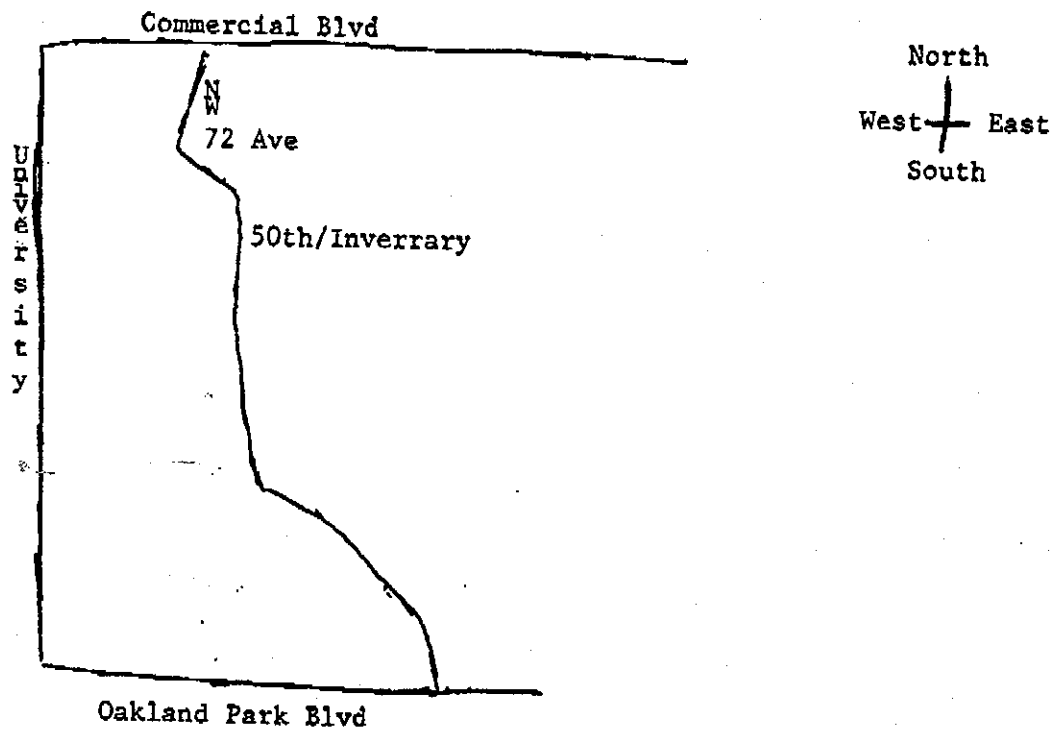

Map of the area Piper High School is requesting in their boundary change.

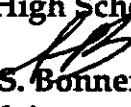

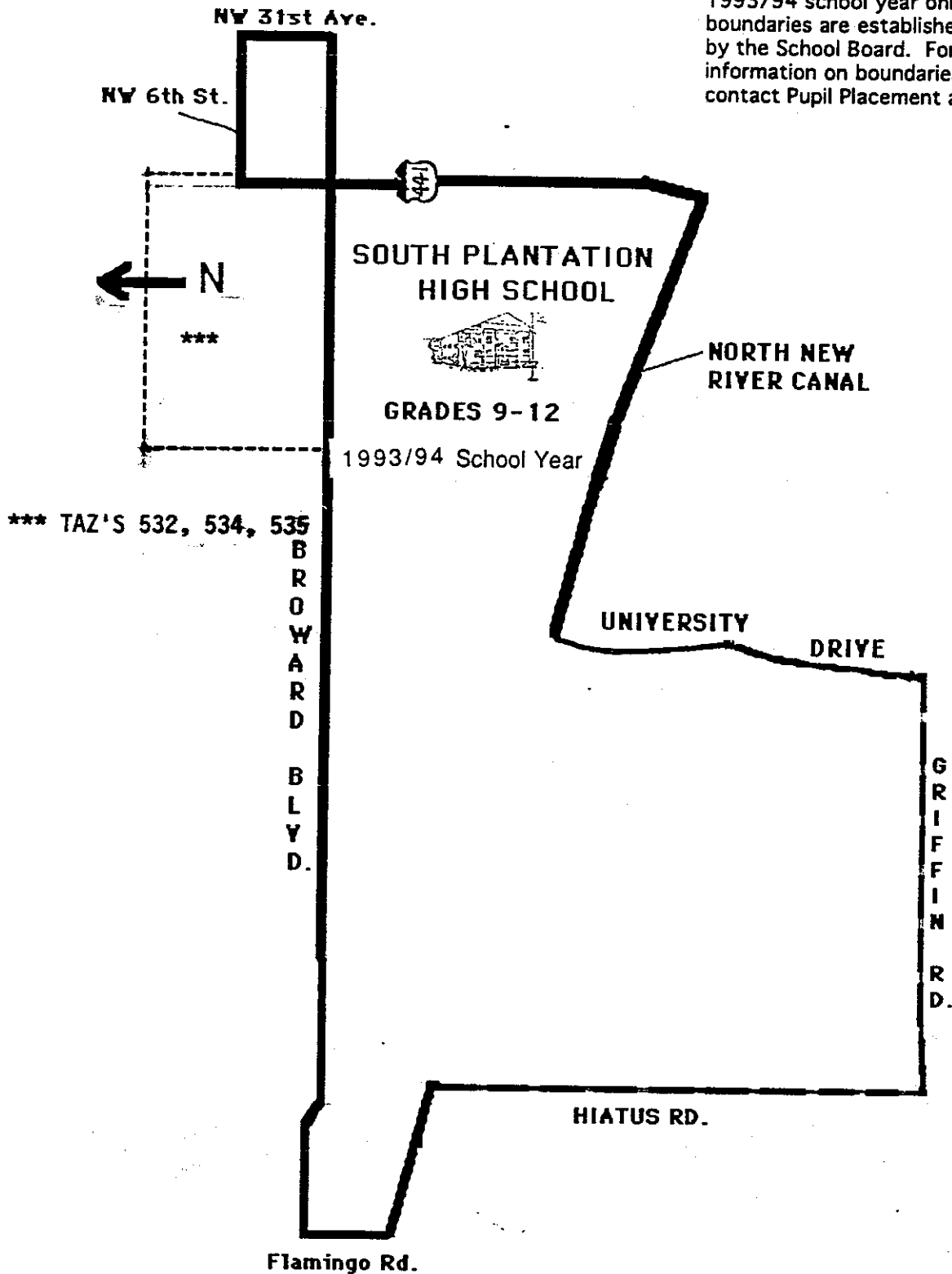

Boundary Request or Concerns:

Proposal #1 -

Fairway Elementary recommends, in support of the effort of the Carver Ranches Feasibility Study Committee, the deletion of all students east of State Road 441 from Fairway's assigned boundaries. We propose the opening of an elementary facility in the Carver Ranches community (a magnet school). This will initiate the long term goal of unifying the Carver Ranches community by bringing together the student population from the Carver Ranches community into one school rather than divide them up among five different elementary schools. In addition, we believe this would eliminate transportation problems, improve school to home communication, increase parental involvement in education, and increase community pride. Option 2: The reassignment of these students to Lake Forest Elementary. The current enrollment figure at Lake Forest Elementary indicates that this school could accommodate these students (approximately 100), stay within their racial percentages, and keep the school's enrollment within educationally sound parameters.

Additional Considerations:

1. Presently 27 portable classrooms are located on site. There is no area for additional portables and P.E. and play areas are non-existent.
2. Safety concerns increase as enrollment increases due to the fact that there is only one street (Fairway Blvd.) available to dismiss students.
3. Currently under renovations, construction will continue until the 1994-95 (960 construction days).
4. District projected enrollment figures predict 1,400 students in 96/97.

Proposal #2 -

Because Sea Castle Elementary School was built to help alleviate the overcrowding of Fairway, we propose that students in the Missionwood Community adjacent to the North Knolls (North of Miramar Parkway; West of University Dr.) be reassigned to Sea Castle.

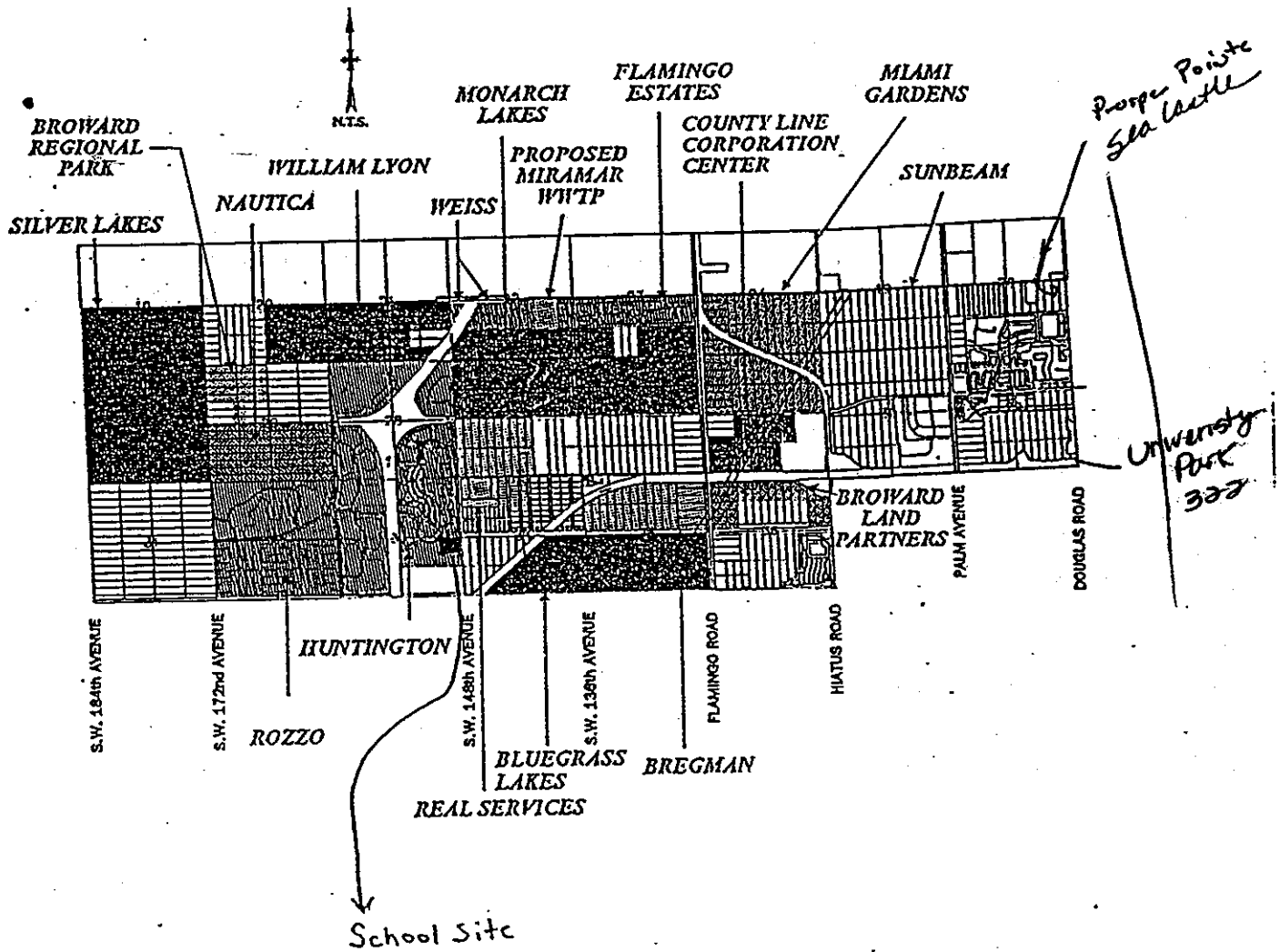
Proposal #3 -

Three hundred and twenty-two 3 and 4 bedroom townhomes will be built in the University Park area between 1993-95. They are scheduled to begin construction 11/93 with occupancy in 4/94 in the overcrowded Fairway boundaries. This, coupled with the large population growth in the S.W. Miramar (i.e. Huntington) area, will require a new elementary school.

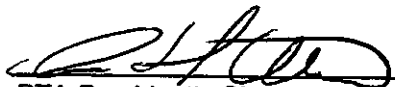

The issue of overcrowding and its effect on Hawkes Bluff Elementary has been studied by the Growth Committee. Members of the committee included staff, faculty, parents and community. Hawkes Bluff's FISH capacity is 776 and our enrollment at this time is 986. We have had approximately eight meetings where we investigated development within and adjacent to our boundaries, the facility usage through 1998, and possible options. These options include grade restructuring, satellite schools, double sessions, modified calendar, magnet schools, capping enrollment, extended 4-day schedule, and charter schools.

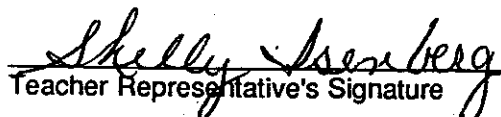

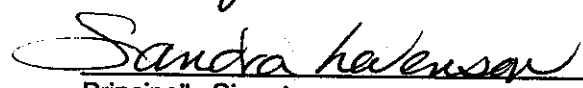

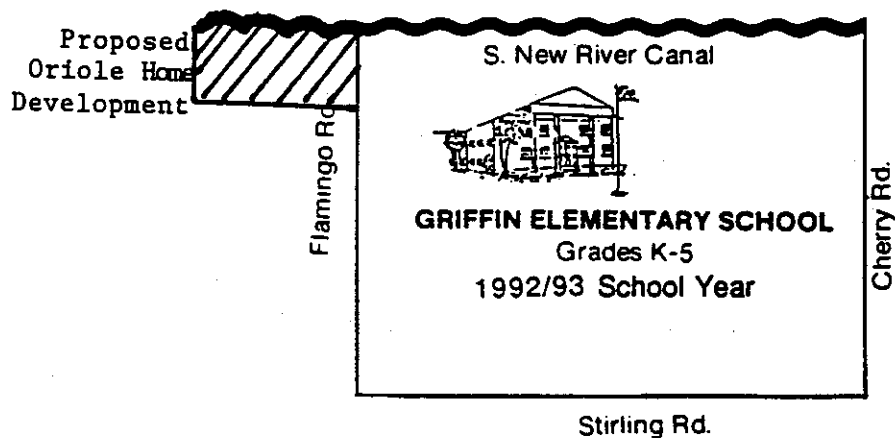

I have enclosed a packet of the updated information for boundaries. I have also enclosed the packet presented to Moody Fisher and Jackie Burdick from Carlo Caldasola, a representative of 84 South group (per his info). It is my recollection that Anna Valaderes is the voice of Bonaventure.

A main concern of the Lakes is having to go to the portable site next year. They feel this unfeasible due to their close proximity to Indian Trace. The Lakes is the only Weston community in partial dispute of Proposal A.

The addendum to Proposal A attached, is to alleviate the child movement between school's objection with Bonaventure and 84 South residents. This would keep all 5th graders for fall '94 here at Indian Trace, with siblings, for a one year basis only. Allowing 5th graders to graduate at Indian Trace...Upon completion of the 94/95 school year siblings go to their perspective schools (691).

To apprise you of the current situation, letters have already circulated in the Weston communities supporting Proposal A to enable multi-cultural diversity within schools among other factors. I am certain that you will be receiving them all shortly. When availed of these letters, I will forward copies to you to be sure that you are informed of their content.

It is unfortunate that many parents are so focused on boundaries instead of letting our School Board professionals do the job they are so well trained to do. The parents would obtain such a great sense of accomplishment if they only had the foresight to channel their energies toward this year's education for their children. Is it not the excellence in education that we all strive for?

INDIAN TRACE ELEMENTARY GROWTH TASK FORCE BOUNDARY PROPOSAL

The Indian Trace Growth Task Force has considered two possible proposals "A" and "F". By a majority ballot vote held on Wednesday, October 6, 1993, Proposal "A" was approved 11 to 3.

Proposal "A" was approved for the following reasons:

**CONCERNS AND RECOMMENDATIONS
PRESENTED TO THE INDIAN TRACE ELEMENTARY GROWTH TASK FORCE
BY BONAVENTURE RESIDENTS**

The Bonaventure Community met on Tuesday Oct 5, 1993 to discuss the current boundary issue. The residents reviewed the different proposals presented to them which included proposals A-E emitted by the Growth Task Force as well as the proposal emitted by the community of 84 South, from here on referred to as proposal F.

Bonaventure Residents's expressed that in their priorities as a community is necessary to secure the well being of all children. Therefore the objectives were to create STABILITY, a SENSE OF NEIGHBORHOOD COMMUNITY and CONTINUITY, all necessary elements in creating an excellent learning environment for our students. Consensus was reached in supporting proposition "F" which makes possible the continuity of the current school community allowing the children to feel secure in a stable environment with the same group of teachers and students.

After careful consideration we feel that proposition "A" does not meet our needs and objectives as a community. In scenario "A" a new boundary process would have to be undergone by both Indian Trace and the new school by 1997. Long established communities like Bonaventure and 84 South were assigned to Indian Trace Elementary following the 1989 Country Isles Boundary Change process. Due to the projected growth expected in this area and its effect on student enrollment another boundary process will be necessary. We feel strongly that our neighborhood school community should not have to undergo a another dislocation again.

Looking at the growth pattern of proposition "F" one can see that the school population at Indian Trace Elementary will stabilize by the year 1995/96 with approximately 1137 students. Proposition "F" would also allow the newer Weston Communities: The Islands, The Lakes, The Landings and Weston Hills to create continuity and a sense of community. In the same manner that Bonaventure, The Springs and 84 South will preserve their continuity as a school community.

In addition, based on our estimations the transportation of students in proposal "A" may ultimately prove to be more expensive than in proposition "F".

Bonaventure Residents will appreciate the careful considerations of our community concerns and recommendations by the Indian Trace Growth Task Force, the District, and the South Area Offices.

We are concerned because Proposal A will force our community's children to be shifted yet again. Please review the history of our community's school boundaries:

Flamingo Elementary and Portable Site: 1987/88 School Year

Country Isles Elementary: 1988/89 and 1989/90 School Year

Portable Site: 1990/91 School Year

Indian Trace Elementary: 1991/92 and 1992/93 School Year

Should Proposal A be adopted our children will once again be moved to the Portable Site for one year and then to the new school. In a few years when Boundary Changes are to be considered again, as per Proposal A, our children will be the first to be moved because they live the farthest from the new school and from the land designated for the next school.

Let this be an opportunity to designate Indian Trace Elementary as the permanent school site for our children, whose community is fully developed and long established. Our proposal provides stability for the population of Indian Trace Elementary as well.

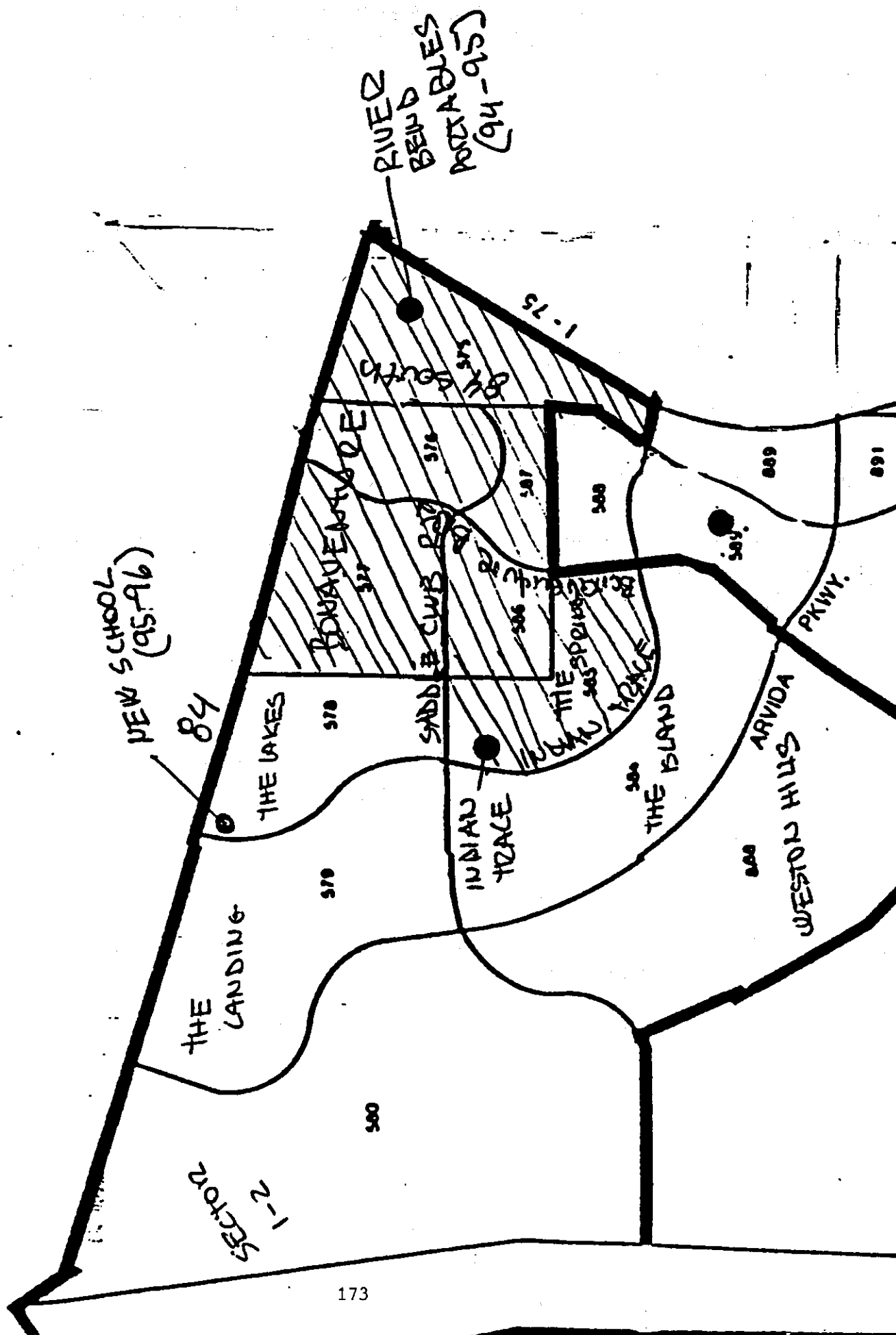
Residents of 84 South Alternative Proposal

- This proposal allows for a more "even" over-crowding status between Indian Trace and the new school over a four year period than the recommended Proposal A.
- This proposal leaves less students at Indian trace at the end of the 97/98 School year, and only 29 more students at the new school at the end of 97/98 School year than Proposal A.
- The Indian Trace population will level off in two years (95/96), thus avoiding more boundary changes for Indian Trace. Even though Indian Trace will have more student overcrowding in 95/96 and 96/97 than the new school. Indian Trace will be secure in the knowledge that the population of the school will not increase and the numbers are compatible with the other schools in our area. Proposal A does not allow for this provision.
- This proposal allows for the least amount of students in the portable school than any other proposal. (When Indian Trace opened in the portables, the student count was 624.) Placing 970 students in the portables while only 789 remain at Indian Trace, as per Proposal A, provides overcrowding for those students affected to endure again. The cafeteria at the portables is too small to handle 970 students. This will cause additional expense for the School Board for such items as an additional cafeteria and staff.
- Indian Trace would have 789 students while other area schools have more than 1100 students.
- As Weston develops, the new Weston residents would attend the new G-91 school.
- Regarding this new school being labeled a "Weston" school, it is inevitable, due to the large geographic area of Weston, that one of the elementary school boundaries remain with Weston.
- Proposal A indicates that the new school would open at 988, which is eight students short of the maximum capacity of 996. History has shown that projections of student enrollment have been incorrect, and always less than the actual amount of enrolled students. For example, Indian Trace was supposed to solve our boundary problems for four years, however, at the beginning of our third year, Indian Trace has 1410 students in a school designed for 776. By the time the new school opens, there will be more than 997 students attending.

Student count numbers in this proposal are based upon figures provided by the Indian Trace Elementary Growth Task Force Committee presented at their September 30, 1993 meeting.

We appreciate careful consideration of our proposal and trust that our representative Advisory Council will vote on the best boundary solution for our children.

Recommendation E-7:

**Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91"
and Indian Trace Elementary School**

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

facility and the travel times and distances from areas where minority children reside, it is not practical or feasible to assign areas to the school which would result in an integrated enrollment. Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed farther west than any existing elementary school in the district.

SUMMARY

The recommendations which are being proposed for the 1994-95 school year were derived from a comprehensive review and analysis by the staff and the Boundary Committee. All of the requests and concerns received from parents, schools, advisory groups, committees, elected officials and others were given due consideration.

If the proposals are approved, they will facilitate the opening of Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, and relieve overcrowding at three east central elementary schools. We will continue our desegregation efforts by reducing the overenrollment at Walker Elementary School, thereby allowing for growth in the magnet program. Moreover, the assignment of additional white students to Sanders Park Elementary School is a positive step to improve the racial balance, while utilizing existing available space.

The creation of the boundary area for the new Elementary School "G-91" will allow relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. Utilization of the existing portable facility will also eliminate some of the current logistical problems at Indian Trace which are associated with overcrowding.

The Desegregation Task Force will formulate recommendations for your consideration. These recommendations will relate to our future course for desegregation efforts in Broward County. It is anticipated that the report from the Task Force will be presented this year. The results of the efforts of the Task Force should have implications for future boundary recommendations for the 1995-96 school year and beyond.

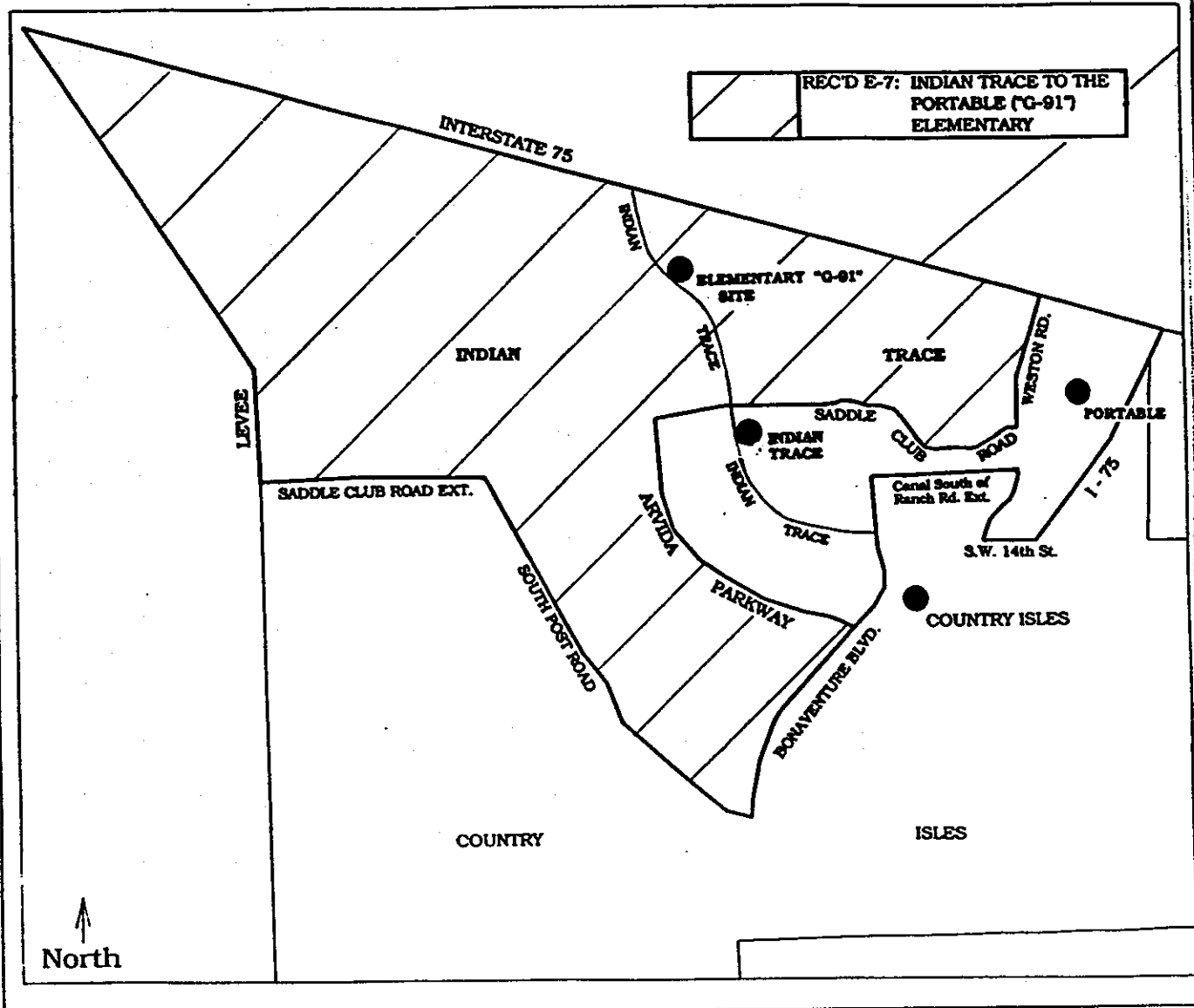
ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS - RECOMMENDATION E-7

Our school population is a naturally well-balanced multi-cultural community. To alleviate the overcrowding problem we are requesting that students who come from the Carver Ranches area be moved. We would still retain our well-balanced multi-ethnic school community if this change was instituted.

- Our FISH capacity is 1380 but our Real Program Capacity (RPC) is 1041. There are 29 Chapter I classes, 35 ESE classes and 36 DOP classes.
- Sixteen rooms are being utilized that are the exceptions to the original intent of these rooms (i.e., Faculty Dining is a classroom, Graphics Lab is being divided to accommodate two classrooms, the Reading Lab is being used as a classroom, resource rooms are being used as classrooms, one art room is now a reading classroom.

Dania to Bethune Elementary: Students living west of the FEC railroad tracks between Farragut Street and Stirling Road should be relocated from Dania Elementary to Bethune Elementary. This is approximately 30 children in Taz #639. This would prevent students from crossing the railroad tracks to attend school. The School Board has identified this as a hazard.

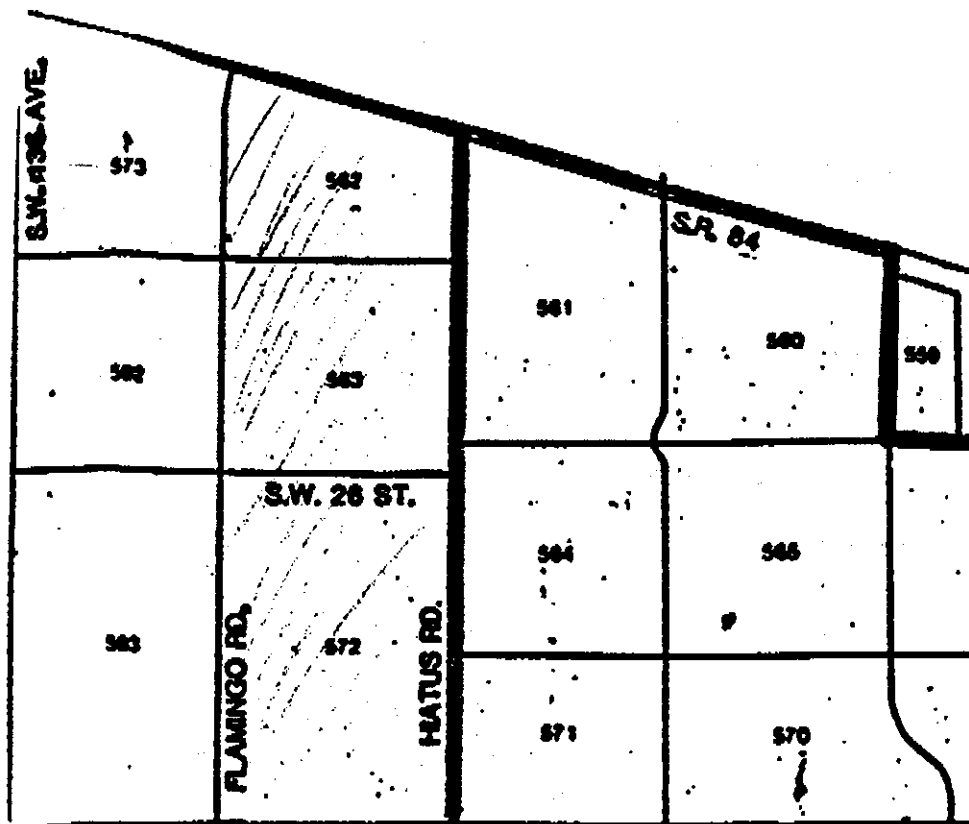

Priorie, who lives in SilverLakes, said he is glad his stepdaughter, Michelle Zube, 13, will attend the magnet-school program in science, pre-engineering and medical sciences at Stranahan High School in Fort Lauderdale next year.

If Michelle had not passed Stranahan's entrance exam, Priorie said she would attend Miramar High School, which has 2,363 students in a school designed for 1,681.

Western Pembroke Pines won't simply have more people. The population will be different from the rest of Broward.

"From a people standpoint, it will probably be a little more Latin," said Thomas Powers, president of a Fort Lauderdale market-research firm that tracks real estate trends.

"In southwest Broward subdivisions, 20 percent to 30 percent of the buyers are Latin, and most of them are from Dade [County]," Powers said. Broward's 1990 population was roughly 10 percent Hispanic, the U.S. census showed.

Lydia and Luis Ruiz are part of the new influx, though they did not move here from Dade.

The Ruizes moved to SilverLakes last winter. Both are retired from New York City and chose SilverLakes because of the tranquility it offered them.

Lydia Ruiz suffers from heart problems. To improve her health, she swims each day in the lake.

"This is the way we always wanted to live: near the birds and the plants. There are fish. She swims with them and feeds them every day," Luis Ruiz said.

But all the new residents may adversely affect the very environment they want to be near.

More people need more water — which means more will have to be pulled from the Biscayne Aquifer, South Florida's main drinking water source. If too much is pulled, the aquifer could be tainted with salt

water seeping in from the ocean. Water officials must carefully watch how much they draw — and perhaps seek other, more expensive sources, said Tom Teets, supervising professional for the South Florida Water Management District.

There are other costs to life in far-western Pembroke Pines: the cost of a gallon of milk.

Right now, the only place west of I-75 to buy groceries is a pair of convenience stores inside gas stations. The closest grocery store is at Flamingo Road and Pines Boulevard — nearly two miles east of I-75 and eight to 10 miles from most of the western Pines subdivisions.

Relief is expected to arrive sometime next year. A grocery store will be included in a shopping center in SilverLakes, to be built at the corner of Pines Boulevard and Northwest 184th Street.

Another grocery store is planned for a center in Chapel Trail, but it is unknown where it will be located or when it will open, said Michael Konig, general

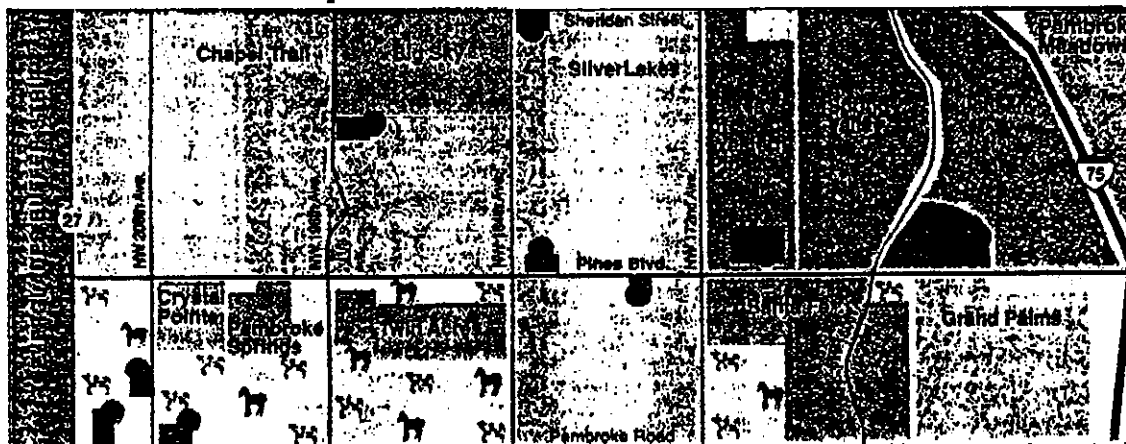

partner for Chapel Trail.

What is known about the future of western Pembroke Pines is that there will be more building, more people and more growth. The question is when it will happen and how quickly.

As western residents look out their windows and watch the construction trucks rumble past their homes toward the pastures, they know the future will come soon.

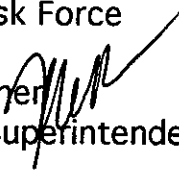

I received your boundary recommendations and concerns in October, 1993. The Boundary Task Force recommendations were reviewed and considered by the Superintendent's Boundary Committee. The Superintendent has recommended a change for Indian Trace Elementary School. The following considerations relate to the decision making process for the Task Force recommendations submitted.

Recommendation #1: Fairway Elementary School to Lake Forest Elementary School

The current enrollment at Lake Forest Elementary School exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity by 236 students. The current enrollment at Sea Castle Elementary School exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity by 332 students. Moving additional students to either of these schools would further exacerbate the overcrowding.

Recommendation #2: Fairway, Miramar, and Perry Elementary Schools/
Carver Ranches

The Carver Ranches Feasibility Study has been completed. The district is determining how we would fund the potential future magnet school.

Recommendation #3: Miramar Elementary/Watkins Elementary

The current membership at Watkins Elementary School exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity of the school by 116 students. Projections indicate enrollment increases over the next five year period with the current boundary area.

Recommendation #4: Sea Castle Elementary/Palm Cove Elementary

Projections indicate that the enrollment at Palm Cove Elementary School will continue to increase with the existing boundary area.

Recommendation #5: Hawkes Bluff Elementary School to Griffin Elementary School

The enrollment at Griffin Elementary currently exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity. Projections indicate that the enrollment at Griffin Elementary will continue to increase over the next five year period.

Recommendation #6: Indian Trace Elementary

Refer to the attached recommendation and rationale.

Recommendation #7: Pines Lakes Elementary

The boundary for the new elementary school in Chapel Trail will be established next school year. It is anticipated that the new school will open in the fall of 1995.

Additional Elementary Recommendations:

Silver Ridge: The concerns have been forwarded to the appropriate staff personnel for review and consideration.

Dania to Bethune: The enrollment in Bethune Elementary School currently exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity by 376 students. Adding additional students to your school will exacerbate the overcrowding.

Hollywood Central to Hallandale Elementary: The proposed change would have a negative impact on the unitary school system.

Recommendation #8: Tequesta Trace Middle

The current enrollment at Pioneer Middle School exceeds the permanent F.I.S.H. capacity of the school by 169 students. Projections indicate a continued membership increase over the next five year period.

Your other concerns have been forwarded to the appropriate staff personnel for review and consideration.

Recommendation #9: Walter C. Young Middle

The staff is continuing to explore options to accommodate the current and projected overcrowding at Walter C. Young Middle School.

Recommendation #10

The district is reassessing the direction of magnet programs countywide. No new magnet programs have been recommended for the 1994-95 school year.

Additional areas of concern:

The concerns you raised concerning enrollment projections and feeder patterns have been forwarded to the property management department and other appropriate staff personnel for review.

**Recommendation E-7:
Portable Elementary School - New Elementary "G-91"
and Indian Trace Elementary School**

Indian Trace Elementary School has a current enrollment which exceeds 1400 students. The permanent capacity of the school is 776 students. Twenty-four portables are necessary to accommodate the overcrowding. The areas surrounding the school are parts of the rapid residential growth from construction of homes in the Weston and Bonaventure communities. The site and construction of a new elementary school, designated "G-91", has been approved by the School Board. The New Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed on a site located approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Indian Trace Elementary School, on Indian Trace Boulevard.

The need to relieve the overcrowding at Indian Trace Elementary School is immediate. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1994, with the current attendance area, exceeds 1750 students. Therefore, I am proposing to establish the attendance area for Elementary School "G-91" and house the students in an existing portable facility until the permanent school can be completed. The existing portable facility is located at 270 North New River Circle in the City of Sunrise. The portable school is currently housing students who are assigned to Sawgrass Elementary School, which is nearing completion. The portable facility is located approximately two and three-fourths miles east of Indian Trace Elementary School.

The proposed boundary area for Elementary "G-91" includes the Lakes, and Weston Hills communities and the planned Landings development in Weston. Portions of the Bonaventure community, located north of Saddle Club Road, are also proposed for inclusion in the boundary of Elementary School "G-91". The proposed attendance area will provide needed relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. However, if the explosive growth which is currently occurring in the area continues, both of the schools will require additional relief in the future.

It is anticipated that Elementary School "G-91" will open with a predominately white membership. The staff explored options for integrating the new school. However, due to the location of the proposed

facility and the travel times and distances from areas where minority children reside, it is not practical or feasible to assign areas to the school which would result in an integrated enrollment. Elementary School "G-91" will be constructed farther west than any existing elementary school in the district.

SUMMARY

The recommendations which are being proposed for the 1994-95 school year were derived from a comprehensive review and analysis by the staff and the Boundary Committee. All of the requests and concerns received from parents, schools, advisory groups, committees, elected officials and others were given due consideration.

If the proposals are approved, they will facilitate the opening of Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School, and relieve overcrowding at three east central elementary schools. We will continue our desegregation efforts by reducing the overenrollment at Walker Elementary School, thereby allowing for growth in the magnet program. Moreover, the assignment of additional white students to Sanders Park Elementary School is a positive step to improve the racial balance, while utilizing existing available space.

The creation of the boundary area for the new Elementary School "G-91" will allow relief for Indian Trace Elementary School. Utilization of the existing portable facility will also eliminate some of the current logistical problems at Indian Trace which are associated with overcrowding.

The Desegregation Task Force will formulate recommendations for your consideration. These recommendations will relate to our future course for desegregation efforts in Broward County. It is anticipated that the report from the Task Force will be presented this year. The results of the efforts of the Task Force should have implications for future boundary recommendations for the 1995-96 school year and beyond.

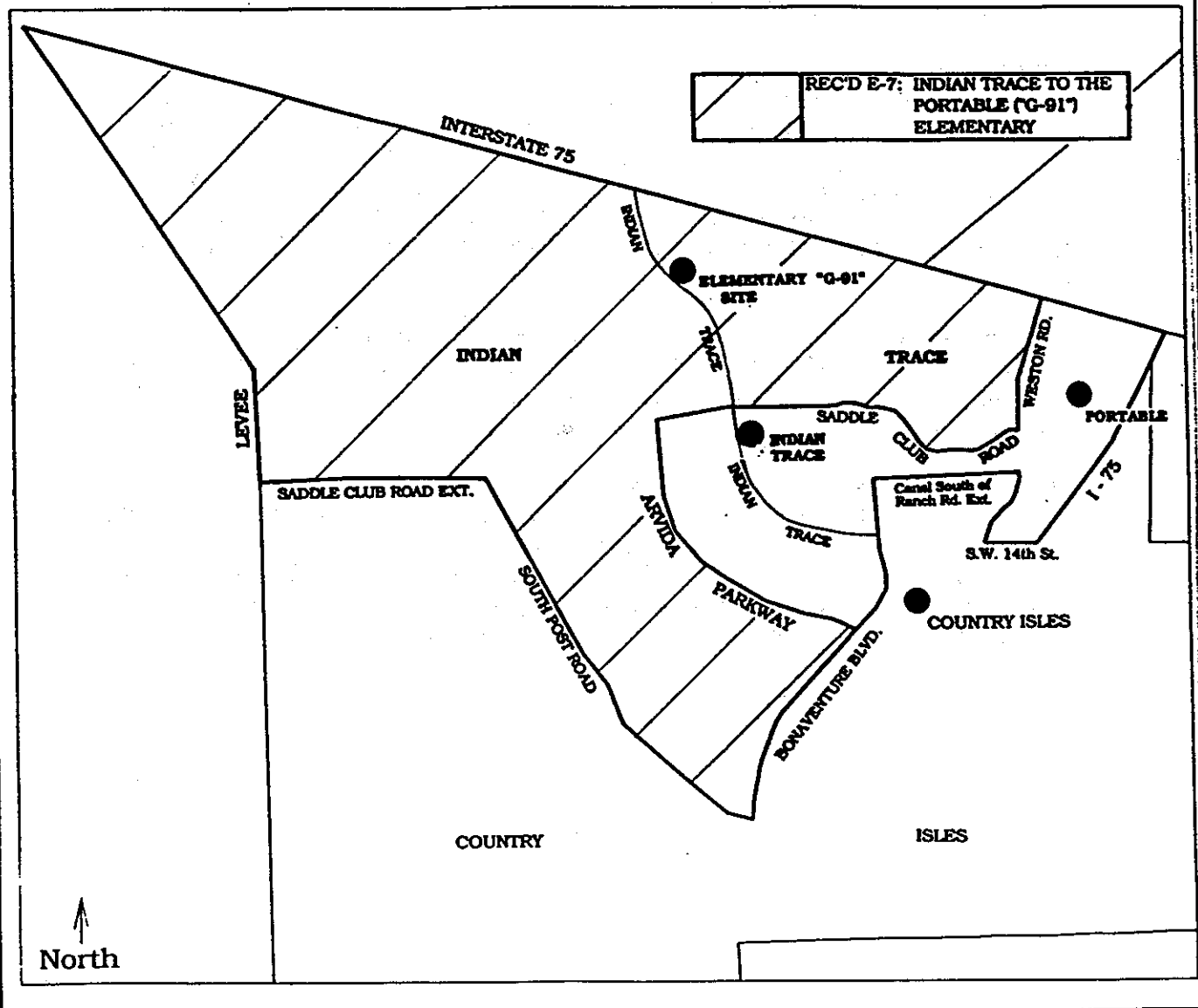
