



Broward County Public Schools comprise the fifth largest school district in the nation, and the second largest in Florida. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) has accredited every school and every center in the school district - making Broward's public schools the largest fully accredited school district in the United States. Each school or center meets more than 70 rigorous standards set by SACS.



PUBLIC SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

The table below lists the Broward County total public school enrollment for the 1991/92 year through the 1996/97 school year. Over this period, total enrollment increased by 47,610 students. Elementary grades Kindergarten through 5th grade accounted, for 43% of the growth; secondary schools accounted for 57%.

The figure that follows is the historical growth in total public school membership, 1986-1996, and the projected membership through the year 2001. Growth will continue in the elementary grades over the next five years, but at a smaller increase per year. Middle school growth is also projected to increase as the baby boomlet ages. A larger annual gain in the number of high school students is also anticipated.

EXCEPTIONAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The Exceptional Student Education program provides comprehensive programs for all students with disabilities and gifted students. Exceptional

Student programs include services to students certified as Educable Mentally Handicapped, Trainable Mentally Handicapped, Profoundly Mentally Handicapped, Specific Learning Disabled, Emotionally Handicapped, Speech and Language Impaired. Autistic, Deaf, Hard of Hearing, Partially sighted, Blind, Physically Handicapped, Hospital, Homebound, and Gifted. Ranked among the most comprehensive and progressive in the United States, approximately 27,000 students benefit from these programs

The following initiatives are being implemented in Exceptional Student Education programs:

- The Exceptional Student Education (ESE) staff, ESE Advisory and the Family Network on Disabilities jointly publish a calendar with activities and topics of interest for families with exceptional students. The calendar is mailed to all ESE parents.
- Special education and related services are now provided to all disabled three and four year old children.
- Family counselors, mental health therapists, and psychiatrists provide mental health services to students who have emotional handicaps.
- A program for identifying and serving gifted students from under-represented groups is being implemented and has resulted in improved representation.
- Increasing numbers of medically complex students are being served in public schools with appropriate support services.
- Programs options for autistic students have been expanded and incorporate nationally known instructional models.

VOCATIONAL, ADULT AND COMMUNITY EDUCATION

Vocational technology education programs cover virtually every career field in Agribusiness and National Resources Education, **Business** Technology-Education, Science Health Education, Family and Consumer Sciences, Industrial Education, Marketing and Diversified Public Service Education. Education and Technology Education. These programs, using state-of-the-art equipment, are on the cutting edge, constantly evolving to keep pace with changes in technology. Students who complete Broward's programs enter the workforce with the most up-to-date skills needed to succeed in today's competitive environment.

Over 60 different occupational programs are taught by highly trained instructors providing training for careers that include nursery worker, bookkeeper, nursing assistant, child care aide, bank teller, travel agent, engineer, auto body technician and corrections officer.

Other courses provide updated technical skills to meet industry standards and request. Some examples are Master Cam and Smart Cam software for improved precision machine training Computer Aided Design (CAD) courses, Child Care Services Program, Coder Specialist Program and Instrumental technician for Health Science and a skills lab located at Sheridan Vocational Technical Center.

Special programs include the Academy of Finance and the Academy of Travel and Tourism, partnerships between the district, the National Academy Foundation and local business, which offer a rigorous two-year multidisciplinary programs that prepare the students for a career in either finance or travel and tourism; and the Academy of Applied Technology, implemented at Sheridan this year, developed to incorporate both advanced academic and vocational studies into an integrative secondary program.

Many of the vocational programs provide a coordinated sequenced program of academic and technical courses that starts in the ninth grade and leads to the completion of a two-year certificate of Associate of Science Degree program called TECH PREP.

Broward County has received national recognition for numerous innovative programs, such as Ford Automotive Student Services Training Program, the Centers for Electronic Emphasis, an apprenticeship program and Auto Body Technical (ATT) which leads to an Associate of Arts Degree.

Adult Education covers instruction in basic skills (literacy, English as a second language, high school completion, and GED preparation). Community Education provides instruction and services which address unique community needs.

Special Adult and Community Education programs and services are designed to address the unique needs of handicapped adults, minorities, the homeless, Project Independence clients,

eligible legalized aliens, parents, inmates in correctional facilities, the elderly and senior learners. Extensive cooperative agreements and partnerships with community-based organizations, business, industry, churches, and governmental agencies exist to insure educational and support services.

More than 145,000 full and part-time students are enrolled in vocational education courses in 30 middle schools, 22 high schools and three full-time centers; Atlantic Vocational Center, William T. McFatter Vocational Technical Center, and Sheridan Vocational Technical Centers. Courses are also offered at 25 community schools and numerous off sites throughout the county, such as hospitals, industry sites and correctional facilities.

As the largest instructional area in Broward schools more than 337,000 residents ranging from birth to the nineties are enrolled in Adult and Community Education programs utilizing 23 community schools maximizing the use of facilities between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. Adult General Education instruction is also available through six comprehensive centers for adults (including the three vocational centers). In addition, instruction is available at off-campus locations throughout Broward County.

STUDENT SERVICES

To meet the challenge of educating students in the modern day urban society, Broward has developed a comprehensive program of student services. The program includes Broward Advisors for Continuing Education, Family Counseling, Guidance and Counseling. Prevention Programs, Psychological Services and School Social Work and Attendance. departments provide coordination curriculum and support services to school so that they may implement programs which assist students, school staff and families of the students.

Student Services plays an integral part in assessing student academic, psychological and social strengths and weaknesses, communication and learning skills, aptitudes and interests. A comprehensive guidance curriculum helps students with career and post-secondary educational planning, with social and personal development and building self-esteem. Peer counseling and other prevention programs further assist students in achieving their goals. Through joint funding by the Broward County

Commission, Student Services provides family counseling at no cost to families in various school sites throughout the district.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

The Special Programs Department coordinated programs and services that assist schools with improving the academic achievement of at-risk students. This is done through the development and implementation of various programs designed to meet the special need of students eligible for these programs: Chapter 1 Basic, Chapter 1 Migrant, Indian Education, Community Outreach and Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY).

Chapter 1 Basic:

Using federal funds that flow through state educational agencies, Chapter 1 Basic provided financial assistance to local educational agencies to meet the special academic needs of educationally deprived children in school attendance area with high concentrations of children from low income families, as well as children in selected private schools and institutions for neglected or delinquent youth.

Chapter 1 Migrant:

The Migrant Education program is a federally funded compensatory program that is designed to provide for some of the unmet needs of children who are enrolled in public schools in the district. The students are children of migratory workers and fishermen.

Indian Education:

The Indian Education program helps low-achieving Indian students overcome academic skill deficiencies by providing an after school tutorial programs.

Home Instruction Program For Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY):

HIPPY is an educational program for disadvantaged preschool children and their parents. Through regular contract with a home visitor, parents are provided skills needed to teach their children at home, using a variety of educational materials.

DROPOUT PREVENTION

The Dropout Prevention Program is an organized system of instruction and services designed to address the educational and personal needs of identified students whose school success requires specific support and services. Traditional School sites offer programs designed to fit the needs of the specified population. Structured support and services are provided to students attending alternative schools/centers and in specified Children and Family Services, Dept. of Juvenile Justice and other private/public agencies. These programs include students who are unmotivated or disinterested, teen parents, disruptive or delinquent students and others who need programs that address substance issues.

MAGNET AND OPEN BOUNDARY SCHOOLS

Magnet schools are centered around a specialized curriculum such as communications, languages, pre-engineering, performing and visual arts, broadcast arts, or marine science. These schools are designed to attract and motivate students as they promote diversity.

Magnet Programs offer a unique course of study and open or extended boundaries. They are open to all students in the County. Transportation is provided for students residing more than two miles from the school. The current magnet programs include:

High Schools:

Science/Pre-Engineering Program - Ely High School (North/Central Area) Stranahan High School (South/Central Area)

This program is a rigorous four year course of study for students who plan to continue their education in the fields of Engineering, Science and Technology. Students participate in state, national and international competitions.

Architecture and Design - Northeast High School (North of Sunrise Blvd.)

The Architecture and Design Program provides students with practical and theoretical knowledge. This unique program fills a need for students who have the potential to succeed in design careers that call for applied arts, talents and abilities.

Finance and Entrepreneurship - Northeast High School (North of Sunrise Blvd.)

The Finance and Entrepreneurship Program is designed for students interested in pursuing careers or post secondary studies in the fields of finance and entrpreneurship. Students develop businesses, market products, and understand financial planning, securities, and the global marketplace.

International Affairs and Business - Hallandale High School (South of Sunrise Blvd.)

Pompano Institute of International Studies (north of Sunrise)

The four year International Affairs and Business Program focuses on a study of cultures through language, art, music, economics, and political systems. Students participate in the national Model United Nations Program and local and state foreign language competitions.

Performing and Visual Arts-Dillard High School (Countywide)

The Performing and Visual Arts Program allows students the opportunity to explore a wide range of artistic disciplines including dance, drama, visual arts, vocal and instrumental music. Students also take coursework in stagecraft and costume design. Season performances are held at the Broward Center for Performing Arts.

Emerging Computer Technology - Dillard High School (Countywide)

This program integrates state-of-the-art equipment and interdisciplinary instructional strategies into a dynamic menu of educational opportunities. A challenging curriculum complements student's core academic requirements.

International Baccalaureate - Boyd Anderson School (South and Central Areas) Deerfield Beach High School (North Area)

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Program is an accelerated four-year liberal arts curriculum designed to meet the needs of the highly motivated and academically talented student. Successful students of this program receive the prestigious IB Diploma, held in

the highest esteem by universities throughout the world.

Communications/Broadcast Arts - Deerfield Beach High School (North of Sunrise Blvd.), Hallandale High School (South of Sunrise Blvd.)

Students enjoy the professional on-campus television and radio studios, remote cameras, video tape recording, video switching and editing equipment, and high quality computer graphics lab to complete academic and extracurricular student projects. An emphasis on writing and speaking develops students' communications skills.

Medical Sciences Program - Stranahan High School (South of Sunrise), Ely High School (North of Sunrise)

This is a rigorous four-year program for selected students who plan to pursue their education in the fields of medicine, dentistry, veterinary science, pharmacology, nursing, or allied medical careers. Regular, gifted, honors, and advanced placement levels are offered in all required academic courses.

Pre-Law and Public Affairs Program - Fort Lauderdale High School (Countywide)

The Pre-law and Public Affairs Magnet Program is designed for students who are interested in careers in law, criminal justice, or public affairs. Students are exposed to a broad range of law-related issues, including: due process, privacy rights, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, the death penalty, search and seizure, client/lawyer confidentiality, ethics, the justice system, and the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.

Maritime Academy - South Broward High School (Countywide)

Students participate in an exploratory curriculum focusing on South Florida's waterways, nautical systems, maritime business and industries, along with sea culture. The program emphasizes a broad spectrum of career and academic opportunities in ecological, environmental and marine areas.

The Latin School - Northeast High School (North of Sunrise Blvd.)

The Latin School is designed for students who have a desire to excel. Curriculum options may include the Great Books program, Creative Man, 19th and 20th Century America (a social studies and English combination) and discussion of ethics including behavior, social norms and attitudes.

Marine Science Program - South Broward High School (Countywide)

Students participate in an exploratory curriculum focusing on South Florida's waterways, nautical systems, maritime businesses and industries, and ocean sciences. Research, mentorships and internships are an integral part of the program.

Middle Schools:

Performing and Visual Arts - Parkway Middle School (Countywide)

The Parkway School of the Arts provides unique opportunities and unlimited artistic experiences for the dancer, the musician, the singer, the actor and the artist. Language arts, mathematics, science and social studies are thoroughly integrated with intensive work in the arts. The school is a high technology facility.

Communications/Broadcast Arts - Pompano Beach Middle School (North of Sunrise), Attucks Middle School (South of Sunrise Blvd.)

Students explore the areas of television and radio production, marketing, advertising, and public relations while developing writing, speaking and computer skills. Students work in a three-camera television production studio, complete audio studio, video editing suites and state-of-the-art control room.

Pre-Law and Public Affairs - William E. Dandy Middle School (Countywide)

The Pre-Law and Public Affairs Program provides students with realistic experiences and foundations needed in this field. The student learns to recognize the citizen's role in maintaining a just society based on law and is exposed to a broad range of law related issues.

Pre-Medical - William E. Dandy Middle School (Countywide)

The Pre-Medical program gives students a strong foundation in science and mathematics, coupled with creative extracurricular activities enhancing basic studies. Students explore pre-medical, dental, veterinary and allied medical careers.

Science/Pre-Engineering - Crystal Lake Middle School (North of Sunrise Blvd.), McNicol Middle School (South of Sunrise Blvd.)

This program is for the student who has an affinity for investigation and problem-solving. Students have the opportunity to practice the skills of observation, experimentation, inference, predication and measurement with a strong emphasis in science and mathematics.

International Affairs and Business - Crystal Lake Middle School (North of Sunrise Blvd.), McNicol Middle School (South of Sunrise)

This program provides students with the opportunity to become proficient in a second language while becoming knowledgeable about world affairs and different cultures. Students learn about other countries around the world by studying their customs, foods, history, music and language. Introductory business classes are designed to prepare students for the world of work.

Marine Science - New River Middle School (Countywide)

The Marine Science Program provides an indepth, real world exploration of Florida's coastal habitats. The program emphasizes an appreciation of the environment, the conservation of our coastal ecosystems, and understanding of the South Florida Water management District and other Florida Agencies.

Health and Wellness - Driftwood Middle School (Countywide)

The Health and Wellness Program prepares students for a multitude of career opportunities including wellness management, fitness management, physical therapy, athletic training, nutrition, health and physical education, and preventive medicine.

Students learn how to test, analyze and interpret data related to the health/wellness field.

Environmental Science - Sawgrass Springs Middle School (North of Sunrise Blvd.)

This program is designed to provide students with an integrated, hands-on laboratory approach to environmental science supported through technology. Students explore and evaluate the many challenges and concerns related to their environment: water supply, ecosystem restoration, wastewater reuse, solid waste disposal, drinking water quality, aquifer contamination and restoration, and storm water runoff.

Montessori Sunrise Middle School (Countywide)

The Montessori Program encourages students to do their own research, analyze what they have found, and come to their own conclusions. The course of study is an integrated thematic approach that ties the separate disciplines of the curriculum together into studies of the physical into studies of the physical universe, the world of nature, and the human experience.

Elementary Schools:

Performing and Visual Arts - Walker (Central Area), Bethune (South Area), Deerfield Park (North Area), and North Andrews Gardens (Countywide) Elementary Schools

The Performing and Visual Arts Program provides unlimited artistic experiences. In addition to the students' basic academic education, creative children are inspired to imagine, create and communicate their ideas and feelings through music, theater, art, dance and the written word.

Science, Mathematics, and Technology - Colbert (South Area), Broward Estates (Central Area), and Charles Drew (North Area) Elementary Schools

Students have daily access to computers and other technologies as well as modern

mathematics and science laboratories. Children are encouraged to solve problems

for themselves, by logical thinking, sorting, recognizing patterns and recording the results of their work.

Communications & Languages - Sanders Park (North Area), Thurgood Marshall (South Area, and Watkins (Central) Elementary School.

This program features an innovative approach to learning, as well as daily study of French, Japanese or Spanish. Emphasis on written and oral communication skills with the publication of journals and newspapers, and production of television and radio programs in a specifically designed studio.

Montessori - Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School (Countywide)

Learning takes place in a carefully prepared, nurturing, multi-age classroom.
