

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

The School Board of Broward County, Florida, will vote on all elementary, middle, high, and prekindergarten through eighth grade schools as separate agenda items.

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2010-11 SCHOOL ATTENDANCE AREAS/BOUNDARIES AND SCHOOL USAGE RECOMMENDATIONS

James F. Notter Superintendent of Schools

INTRODUCTION

Based upon School Board input at the December 8, 2009 Boundary Workshop IV, the final Superintendent's 2010-11 school attendance areas and school usage recommendations for all schools includes changes for three elementary schools, one prekindergarten through eighth grade school, two middle schools, and one high school boundary that will:

- assign elementary, middle and high school attendance areas to the "Wedge" area, recently annexed from Palm Beach County
- establish choice zones for a new pre-kindergarten through eighth grade Montessori magnet school, and adjust the choice zones for two existing Montessori magnet schools.

For all other schools in the District, attendance areas will be the same in the 2010-11 school year as they were in the 2009-10 school year or will follow the previously approved grade phase-ins.

2010-11 Boundary Process Overview

The following is a summary of key dates throughout the 2010-11 Boundary Process:

- June 23, 2009 Growth Management and School Boundaries School Board Workshop I: Growth Management staff updated the School Board on Senate Bill 360, consequences of not meeting school concurrency mandates, alternative LOS standards and the process of modifying the Interlocal Agreement (ILA) for Public School Concurrency. School Boundaries staff reviewed last year's boundary process and this year's proposed boundary process, reviewed boundary process drivers and schools potentially entering the boundary process based on the current state and local mandates on school facility space requirements.
- August 25, 2009 Growth Management and School Boundaries School Board Workshop II: Growth Management staff provided the School Board with further updates on Senate Bill 360, ILA, and (8) Concurrency Service Areas (CSAs) based on feeder patterns. School Boundaries staff presented a preliminary draft list of recommended schools to enter this year's boundary process, the potential for future domino boundary changes, and a table illustrating the potential timeline for grade phase-ins to occur.
- August through October 2009 Data Gathering: Immediately following the twentieth
 day of enrollment, the online Planning Tool for School Enrollment and Capacity was
 updated to include: student count, enrollment projections, feeder patterns, permanent,
 gross, and core capacity, classroom additions, Magnet, ESE, NCLB and Reassignment

data, and Facility and Growth Management Level of Service. Utilizing the information gathered by District staff, Research Development & Assessment, ETS staff compiled the Class Size Survey for all schools within the District.

- August through October 2009 Community Orientation: School Boundaries staff educated the community about the state mandates affecting the 2010-11 revised boundary process which included Public School Concurrency, Class Size Reduction, and the State Plant Survey.
- October 6, 2009 Emergency Rule (policy) Amendment Process: Attendance areas were assigned and effective immediately through the emergency rule amendment process for children living in the Palm Beach County land area known as the "Wedge" which was annexed into Broward County on September 21, 2009. Children residing within this area were assigned to attend Park Trails Elementary, Westglades Middle, and Marjory Stoneman Douglas High Schools for a period not to exceed 90 days. Within the 90 day period two policy readings to amend the existing 2009-10 school boundaries were approved on November 10, 2009, and adopted on December 15, 2009.

Also during this time on November 10, 2009, an Interlocal Agreement was approved between the School Boards of Broward and Palm Beach Counties to allow the existing 14 students residing in the Wedge area the choice to remain in Palm Beach County schools where they were currently enrolled for the remainder of the 2009-10 school year, or to attend their assigned schools in Broward County.

• October 27, 2009 School Board Workshop III: Growth Management staff presented further updates on the process of amending the ILA and recommendations from the Oversight Committee which included the use of gross capacity at the individual school boundary until 2015. School Boundaries staff presented updates on Class Size Reduction, the Planning Tool for School Enrollment and Capacity, and the Superintendent's initial boundary recommendations.

The Superintendent's initial boundary recommendations included Pioneer Middle School, the opening of a new School C prekindergarten through eighth grade Montessori, modifying the attendance areas for two existing Montessori magnet schools (Virginia Shuman Young Elementary and Sunrise Middle Schools), and assigning elementary, middle and high school attendance areas to the recently annexed area known as the "Wedge."

- **November 2009 Community Conferences:** The Superintendent's initial boundary recommendations and rationale were presented to all communities at four separate community conferences. The same materials were discussed at each community conference and community input was collected.
- **December 8, 2009 School Board Workshop IV:** Growth Management staff provided an update on amending the ILA and recommendations from the Staff Working Group to move forward with 8 CSAs were presented to the School Board.

Public input on the Superintendent's initial school boundary recommendations were presented to the School Board for discussion. As a result of this discussion, the Superintendent recommended postponing the Pioneer Middle School boundary recommendation for one year to await the outcome of the ILA amendment process and to move forward with the boundary recommendations for the "Wedge" into Park Trails and Heron Heights Elementary Schools, Westglades Middle and Marjory Stoneman Douglas High Schools in addition to boundary recommendations for the three

- Montessori schools: Virginia Shuman Young Elementary, Sunrise Middle and new School C Montessori.
- December 15, 2009 School Board Agenda Item "J-27" Formal Initiation of the Proposed Amendments to the Amended Interlocal Agreement for Public School Facility Planning: Approve the authorization to initiate the proposed amendments to the Amended Interlocal Agreement for Public School Facility Planning to enable commencement of the formal process to amend the Agreement.
 - At the December 9, 2009 Special Oversight Committee meeting, convened at the request of the School Board to reconsider their position and support the 8 expanded concurrency service areas (CSAs), the Committee voted unanimously to amend the Amended ILA to change the adopted level of service (LOS) for each elementary, middle and high school from 110% permanent capacity to 100% gross capacity commencing from school year 2010-11 to school year 2018-19, with the CSAs to remain as individual school boundaries. The ILA amendment process is anticipated to be completed in fall of 2010.
- January 27, 2010 Public Hearing I: The Superintendent's final school attendance areas and school usage recommendations for 2010-11 include changes for three elementary schools, one pre-kindergarten through eighth grade Montessori school, two middle schools, and one high school in addition to the continuation of the 2009-10 boundaries for all remaining elementary, middle, and high schools in the District. School Board Members must approve next year's attendance areas with two consecutive School Board votes before attendance areas are adopted for the upcoming 2010-11 school year. Public input will be taken at each hearing.
- **February 24, 2010 Public Hearing II:** Public input will be taken at the second reading and final hearing of the school attendance areas and school usage recommendations for 2010-11.

AGENDA ITEMS SUPPORT DATA

Recommendation Maps with Area Descriptions

Each boundary recommendation is supported by a map illustrating the existing attendance areas (bold lines) and area recommended for boundary change (thin, hatched, angled lines). Included on the map are street labels identifying existing and potential school boundaries. A written description of each area proposed for change is provided.

Projected Enrollment and Diversity

Unless a choice area is modified, the affected school's demographics as a result of the boundary change are provided with each boundary recommendation map. Permanent capacity known as Florida Inventory of School Houses (FISH), gross capacity (permanent capacity plus relocatables), and School Concurrency Level of Service (LOS) are provided in the table for each year. Classroom additions (if any exist) are calculated for each school for the next five years to arrive at the projected capacity for each school.

The **net transfer** is used to indicate the amount of enrollment relief or additional enrollment gained for each school. A number in parenthesis indicates a negative value or decrease in

enrollment while a positive value indicates additional enrollment. A net amount is used because it reflects the results of either a phase in of grades by year or a domino-type boundary change. For example, in an enrollment domino, a portion of Elementary School A's boundary is proposed to move into Elementary School B's boundary, while a portion of Elementary School B's boundary is proposed to move to Elementary School C's boundary. Some enrollment is both relieved and added to School B resulting in a net transfer. The two boundary changes affecting Elementary School B involve 608 students. While 405 students are expected to leave the school, 203 students are expected to be added. The resulting net transfer is negative (202) students, indicating relief of that amount.

Enrollment projections and forecasted capacity are used to forecast future enrollment in order to thwart unnecessary boundary changes as a result of future capacity additions. The analysis is completed for the 2010-11 through 2014-15 school years. The column, Without Change, illustrates projected enrollment prior to a boundary change. The column, With Change, reflects the projections in light of the net transfer as a result of the boundary change. The +/- FISH With Change column reflects the number of students over/under permanent capacity at the school as a result of the boundary change. The +/- LOS With Change column reflects the Level of Service as a result of the change and the % Permanent FISH With Change illustrates the percentage of permanent capacity consumed as a result of the change.

Diversity Breakdown is used as a means to determine the changes in ethnic, English Language Learners (ELL), Exceptional Student Education (ESE) and Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) percentages. Rows identified as (**E**) reflect the existing diversity percentages while (**P**) reflects the proposed changes as a result of the boundary movement.

Feeder Patterns are the percentages of students within an attendance area that feed into the next level attendance areas. An aligned feeder pattern is when all (100%) the students in one elementary school matriculate to the same middle school and/or all (100%) students in one middle school matriculate to the same high school.

DESCRIPTION OF BOUNDARY RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation E-1: "Wedge" Area to Park Trails Elementary School

Number of students to change next year in 2010-11: 8

Adjust the boundary for Park Trails Elementary School to include the portion of the recently annexed "Wedge" area east of Nob Hill Road extended. Kindergarten through fifth grade students in this area are assigned to attend Park Trails Elementary School in 2010-11.

Commence at the intersection of the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line and County Line Road, west along County Line Road to Nob Hill Road extended, north along Nob Hill Road extended to the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line, and southeast along the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line to County Line Road.

Recommendation E-2: "Wedge" Area to Heron Heights Elementary School

Number of students to change next year in 2010-11: 0

Adjust the boundary for Heron Heights Elementary School to include the portion of the recently annexed "Wedge" area west of Nob Hill Road extended. Kindergarten through fifth grade students in this area are assigned to attend Heron Heights Elementary School in 2010-11.

Commence at the intersection of the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line and Nob Hill Road extended, south along Nob Hill Road extended to County Line Road, west along County Line Road to the Conservation Area boundary, north along the Conservation Area boundary to the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line, and southeast along the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line to Nob Hill Road extended.

Recommendation E-3: Adjust Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School

Reserve 150 choice seats for prekindergarten through fifth grade students in the community surrounding Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School defined as east of FEC Railroad, south of Sunrise Boulevard, west of Middle River, north of Sunrise Key Boulevard, west of Victoria Park Road/Mola Avenue, and north of the New River.

Prioritize 25% of the remaining seats for prekindergarten through fifth grade students residing north of Interstate 595 in schools where enrollment exceeds 110% of permanent capacity. Remaining seats will be filled by prekindergarten through fifth grade students residing north of Interstate 595. Students will be admitted in accordance with the provisions of School Board Policy 5004.1.

Students residing south of Interstate 595 currently attending Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School may continue in the program or may apply to attend new School C Montessori. Students residing south of Interstate 595 matriculating in theme from elementary to middle will have a priority to receive a middle level seat at new School C Montessori if their application is received prior to the Magnet Program application deadline.

Recommendation EM-1: Establish the Attendance Area for New School C Montessori

Reserve 150 choice seats for prekindergarten through eighth grade students residing within the South Broward High School attendance area.

Prioritize 25% of the remaining seats for prekindergarten through eighth grade students residing south of Interstate 595 in schools where enrollment exceeds 110% of permanent capacity. Remaining seats will be filled by students residing south of Interstate 595 through the Magnet random selection process. Students will be admitted in accordance with the provisions of School Board Policy 5004.1.

Students residing south of Interstate 595 currently attending Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School or Sunrise Middle School may continue in these programs or may apply to attend new School C Montessori. Students residing south of Interstate 595 matriculating in theme from elementary to middle will have a priority to receive a middle level seat at new

School C Montessori if their application is received prior to the Magnet Program application deadline

Recommendation M-1: "Wedge" Area to Westglades Middle School

Number of students to change next year in 2010-11: 3

Adjust the boundary for Westglades Middle School to include the recently annexed "Wedge" area. Sixth through eighth grade students in this area are assigned to attend Westglades Middle School in 2010-11.

Commence at the intersection of the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line and County Line Road, west along County Line Road to the Conservation Area boundary, north along the Conservation Area boundary to the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line, and southeast along the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line to County Line Road.

Recommendation M-2: Adjust Sunrise Middle School

Students residing within the Sunrise Middle School attendance area automatically attend this school. Prioritize 25% of the remaining seats for sixth through eighth grade students residing north of Interstate 595 in schools where enrollment exceeds 110% of permanent capacity. Remaining seats will be filled by sixth through eighth grade students residing north of Interstate 595. Students will be admitted in accordance with the provisions of School Board Policy 5004.1.

Students residing south of Interstate 595 currently attending Sunrise Middle School may continue in the program or may apply to attend new School C Montessori. Students residing south of Interstate 595 matriculating in theme from elementary to middle will have a priority to receive a middle level seat at new School C Montessori if their application is received prior to the Magnet Program application deadline.

Recommendation H-1: "Wedge" Area to Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School

Number of students to change next year in 2010-11: 3

Adjust the boundary for Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School to include the recently annexed "Wedge" area. Ninth through twelfth grade students in this area are assigned to attend Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in 2010-11.

Commence at the intersection of the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line and County Line Road, west along County Line Road to the Conservation Area boundary, north along the Conservation Area boundary to the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line, and southeast along the Broward/ Palm Beach County Line to County Line Road.




RECOMMENDATION DESCRIPTION:


Map incorporating school boundary changes for the 2010-11 school year








RECOMMENDATION DESCRIPTION:

A PreK-8 MONTESSORI MAGNET SCHOOL:

Reserve 150 choice seats for prekindergarten through eighth grade students residing within the South Broward High School boundary (see map).

Prioritize 25% of the remaining seats for prekindergarten through eighth grade students residing south of Interstate 595 in schools where enrollment exceeds 110% of the permanent capacity. Remaining seats will be filled by students residing south of Interstate 595 through the Magnet random selection process. Students will be admitted in accordance with the provisions of School Board Policy 5004.1.

Students residing south of Interstate 595 currently attending Virginia Shuman Young Elementary School or Sunrise Middle School may continue in these programs or may apply to attend new School C Montessori. Students residing south of Interstate 595 matriculating in theme from elementary to middle will have a priority to receive a middle level seat at new School C Montessori if their application is received prior to the Magnet Program application deadline.



SUBJECT: PROJECTED FISCAL IMPACT OF RELOCATABLE CLASSROOM

RELOCATION - SCHOOL YEAR 2010-2011

At this time, it is unclear as to how the State will proceed with implementation of the period-by-period phase of the Class Size Reduction mandate. Currently, there is a significant fiscal impact at the State level to hire the teachers necessary to implement period-by-period Class Size Reduction; therefore, at this time, at the local level, there is no need to move relocatables as a response to Class Size Reduction. Discussion regarding the implementation of period-by-period Class Size Reduction is expected to continue during the next Legislative session which begins on March 2, 2010. There may be relocatable moves charged to capital projects as a result of construction activity that occurs during the year. The average moving cost per relocatable classroom is \$86,000. This cost includes: plan preparation, relocatable moving, foundation and pier preparation, hook-up of life-safety systems and plumbing, Department of Education upgrades, installation of stairs and ramps, and repair/replace items to meet the Florida Building Code requirements.






2009-2010 ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BOUNDARIES Traffic Analysis Zones

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ADEQUATE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES, DESIGNATION OF SCHOOLS AND ATTENDANCE AREAS, DEVELOPMENT OF POSITIVE ALTERNATIVES TO ACCOMMODATE GROWTH, TO KEEP SCHOOLS OPEN, AND TO ELIMINATE, CONSOLIDATE, OR RE-PURPOSE SCHOOLS

THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS SHALL, NO LATER THAN THE SECOND WEEK IN MARCH, OR AS THE SUPERINTENDENT DEEMS NECESSARY, SUBMIT TO THE SCHOOL BOARD RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT, ORGANIZATION, AND OPERATION OF EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES. THIS ORGANIZATION OF SCHOOLS, CLASSES AND SERVICES WILL PROVIDE ADEQUATE EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR ALL CHILDREN IN THE DISTRICT.

AFTER CONSIDERING RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, THE SCHOOL BOARD SHALL ADOPT AND PROVIDE FOR THE EXECUTION OF PLANS FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT, ORGANIZATION, AND OPERATION OF THE SCHOOLS OF THE DISTRICT WHICH SHALL INCLUDE:

- DESIGNATING SCHOOLS AND ATTENDANCE AREAS FOR THE ENSUING SCHOOL YEAR(S).
- 2. PROVIDING ADEQUATE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES FOR ALL SCHOOL-AGE CHILDREN IN THE DISTRICT.
- 3. PROVIDING STRATEGIES TO ACCOMMODATE GROWTH.
- 4. PROVIDING POSITIVE ALTERNATIVE STRATEGIES TO BE IMPLEMENTED WITHIN A DESIGNATED TIMEFRAME FOR THOSE UNDER ENROLLED SCHOOLS TO INCREASE THEIR ENROLLMENT.
- 5. PROVIDING FOR THE ELIMINATION OF SCHOOL CENTERS AND FOR THE REPURPOSING/CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS WHENEVER THE NEEDS OF PUPILS CAN BETTER AND MORE ECONOMICALLY BE SERVED.
- 6. PROVIDING STANDARDS TO BE UTILIZED IN THE LONG RANGE PLANNING OF FACILITIES FOR THE DISTRICT EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES PLAN.

THE PROVISIONS OF THIS POLICY REGARDING OVERCROWDED SCHOOLS AND CRITERIA SHALL BE CONSISTENT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF ADOPTED AMENDED INTER-LOCAL AGREEMENT FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL FACILITY PLANNING AND SCHOOL BOARD POLICY 1161.

DEFINITIONS

School Boundaries: The geographic area that identifies public school assignments as annually approved by the School Board.

Feeder Patterns: A clean feeder pattern is when all the students in one elementary school matriculate to the same middle school and/or all students in one middle school matriculate to the same high school.

FISH: FISH is an acronym for Florida Inventory of School Houses. FISH capacity represents the Department of Education's measure of occupancy for permanent and relocatable buildings, hence gross capacity.

Permanent FISH Capacity: The Department of Education's measure of occupancy for permanent buildings.

Relocatables: The new Florida Building Code and the Florida Inventory of School Houses (FISH) use the word relocatable in reference to temporary buildings. Relocatable buildings are considered as temporary accommodations and are not considered as part of the permanent capacity of an educational facility.

Gross Capacity: Gross capacity is permanent capacity plus relocatable capacity at an educational facility.

Core Capacity: Core Capacity is the number of student stations that can be accommodated by the cafeteria, toilet facilities, media center, and circulation space at a school.

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ADEQUATE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES, DESIGNATION OF SCHOOLS AND ATTENDANCE AREAS, DEVELOPMENT OF POSITIVE ALTERNATIVES TO ACCOMMODATE GROWTH, TO KEEP SCHOOLS OPEN, AND TO ELIMINATE, CONSOLIDATE, OR RE-PURPOSE SCHOOLS

Class Size Reduction (CSR): Beginning with the 2003-2004 fiscal year, the District was required to reduce the average number of students in each classroom by at least two students per year until the maximum number of students per classroom is achieved:

- The maximum number of students assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for pre-kindergarten through grade 3 shall not exceed 18 students;
- The maximum number of students assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 4 through 8 shall not exceed 22 students; and
- The maximum number of students assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 shall not exceed 25 students.

District Educational Facilities Plan: The comprehensive planning document prepared annually by the District and submitted to the Office of Educational Facilities and SMART Schools Clearinghouse and the affected Local Government(s), as defined in Section 1013.5, Florida Statutes, as amended.

Concurrency: In Florida, concurrency refers to a system for providing new public facilities and services to accommodate growth. These facilities and services must be provided at the time of new development. A new development can not cause a facility to exceed an adopted level-of-service (LOS).

Level of Service Standard: A level of service at which a public school facility is expected to operate, as defined in Section 163.3180, Florida Statutes, as amended. An indicator of the extent or degree of service provided by, or proposed to be provided by, a facility based on and related to the operational characteristics of the facility. Level of service shall indicate the capacity per unit of demand for each public facility. The LOS for Broward County Public Schools is 110% of the permanent capacity for each boundered school.

Overcrowded School: Schools shall be deemed overcrowded when enrollment is greater than 110% of permanent FISH capacity and are projected to have an enrollment greater than 110% for the following school year.

RULES

The procedural guidelines to be used in the implementation of this policy shall include the following components:

Objectives

- 1. The School Board is committed to maintaining a unitary school system and to applying student assignment strategies equally and fairly for all students in a manner that promotes diverse student enrollments.
- 2. Provide opportunities for equitable instructional services throughout the district.
- 3. Improvement of instructional services and student learning.
- 4. Stabilization of school attendance boundaries to the greatest extent possible.
- 5. There shall be a comprehensive review of boundaries annually and changes shall be made, as necessary at the School Boards' discretion.
- Equitable impact on groups as defined in the district's diversity definition in School Board Policy 5001.
- 7. Provide the opportunity for public input.
- 8. Establishment and maintenance of feeder patterns that permit students to move forward together from elementary school, to middle school and middle school to high school to the maximum extent possible.
- Involvement of the affected community in the decisions regarding recommendations for uses of schools no longer needed by the district.

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ADEQUATE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES, DESIGNATION OF SCHOOLS AND ATTENDANCE AREAS,
DEVELOPMENT OF POSITIVE ALTERNATIVES TO ACCOMMODATE GROWTH, TO KEEP SCHOOLS OPEN,
AND TO ELIMINATE, CONSOLIDATE, OR RE-PURPOSE SCHOOLS

- 10. Apply guidelines and standards for adequate educational facilities, designate schools and attendance areas, provide positive alternative enrollment strategies for accommodating growth, consider alternative strategies for under enrolled schools and, after due consideration of all factors, eliminate and consolidate schools or construct new schools.
- 11. Insure that educational facilities throughout the district are equal. The ultimate mission of the School District is to provide equal educational opportunity for all students while assuring an equitable distribution and use of resources.

GUIDELINES FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF BOUNDARIES AND ATTENDANCE AREAS

- 1. Boundary changes are appropriate means to maintain equal educational opportunities.
- 2. Consideration should be given to the demographic changes of the community and the student populations at each school in order to maintain a unitary school system and to promote diverse student enrollments.
- 3. Visual inspection of affected boundary areas shall be made by District staff before proposing any boundary adjustments, school closings, or establishing boundaries for new schools.
- 4. The assignment of a student to or from a particular facility should be considered if it is continually over utilized or underutilized. The standards for closure or construction shall be considered in the application of this guideline.
- 5. The Superintendent of Schools shall annually present to the School Board the new boundary process with specifically defined steps no later than November of each school year.
- As part of the annual boundary process, each school that is on the list of schools to be included in the boundary process will hold a boundary conference with stakeholders who will have the opportunity to provide input. Participants will be notified for consideration of proposed boundary changes, new school openings, and/or recommended school repurposing/closures, prior to School Board action. School boundary conferences participants shall include, but are not limited to, School Principals, School-based Staff, School Advisory Council, School Advisory Forum, PTA, PTO, Diversity Committee members, Community members, Parents, and Students. Area Superintendents, and School Boundaries Department after receiving input from the school boundary conferences, will make recommendations to the Superintendent of Schools who, in turn, will make recommendations to the School Board. Staff shall analyze such recommendations with regard to impact on current or future permanent capacity status at the sending or receiving school(s). School data shall be transmitted by School Boundaries staff to the Principal(s)/Innovation Zone stakeholders, in a timely manner, for information purposes. The data shall be part of the boundary process record and shall be considered by Individual School Committees, Innovation Zones, Area Superintendents and individual program staff and Diversity Committee members, in their recommendations during the annual boundary process.
- 7. Consideration should be given to class size mandates, Level of Service Standard (LOS), feeder patterns, sites, proximity, community/neighborhood integrity, capacity, growth or decline, and natural barriers. The Broward County School District is a county wide school system by state law and attendance zones/boundaries are not determined by municipal limits.

STANDARDS FOR SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION AND SCHOOL SITES

- 1. Planning new school construction, site acquisitions or disposals, building additions, or the location of relocatables shall be done consistent with School Board Policy 7000. Overall financial impact on the District, cost effectiveness, (including capital cost,) transportation requirements, core capacity of the facility, instructional programming and enrollment projections for the affected geographical areas should also be carefully considered as relevant factors.
- 2. Relocatable buildings should be considered as temporary accommodations and not considered as part of the permanent capacity of an educational facility.

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ADEQUATE EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES, DESIGNATION OF SCHOOLS AND ATTENDANCE AREAS, DEVELOPMENT OF POSITIVE ALTERNATIVES TO ACCOMMODATE GROWTH, TO KEEP SCHOOLS OPEN, AND TO ELIMINATE, CONSOLIDATE, OR RE-PURPOSE SCHOOLS

- 3. New plant construction should be considered when long-range enrollment projections clearly indicate the need for construction of additional facilities. The guidelines for establishment of boundaries shall be considered in the application of this standard.
- 4. A long-range plan for site acquisition and disposal of surplus property must be prepared in conjunction with longrange projections of enrollment and the adopted District Educational Facilities Plan.
- 5. All plant construction, site acquisition and disposal of surplus property must comply with State Board Rules and Florida Statutes.

STANDARDS FOR OVERCROWDED SCHOOLS

- After the twentieth day count of each school year, the School Boundary Department in conjunction with the Area 1. Superintendents, and Area Offices will evaluate the impact of actual student enrollment and determine underenrolled and overcrowded schools.
- 2. Schools shall be deemed under-enrolled when enrollment is below 90% of permanent FISH* capacity and are projected to remain under 90% of permanent capacity for the following school year.
- 3. Schools shall be deemed neutral when enrollment is greater than or equal to 90% and less than 110% of permanent FISH* capacity and are projected to remain as such for the following school year.
- Schools shall be deemed overcrowded when enrollment is greater than 110% of permanent FISH capacity and are 4. projected to have an enrollment greater than 110% for the following school year.
- All schools shall strive to achieve student enrollments aligning with 100% of FISH capacity enabling non-traditional 5. classrooms to be utilized for the intended purpose.
- Available capacity at under-enrolled schools may be considered as an option to relieve overcrowded schools during 6. the boundary process.
- 7. Schools with less than 110% permanent capacity may be deemed overcrowded, based upon the criteria of class size reduction requirements, special programs or special circumstances.
- 8. Schools for which the School Board has approved a boundary change moving students out of an overcrowded school as defined in paragraph 4 above, shall be subject to the provisions of School Board Policy 5001.
- 9. Criteria for determining alternative student enrollment options will include, but not be limited to, a review of the following criteria:
 - a. Welfare, health and safety of children and faculty/staff
 - b. Impact on the overall facility (ingress and egress problems)
 - c. Impact on support services, such as cafeteria and library
 - d. Amount of funding dedicated to the classroom through the instructional allocation, including but not limited to, books, equipment, supplies, and educational materials
 - e. Number of floating teachers
 - f. Co-teaching
 - Full classroom use of non-traditional classroom spaces (i.e., resource rooms, art, music, stage, skills labs, g. media center and conference rooms)
 - h. Class size (student to teacher ratio)
 - Number of relocatables i.
 - Acreage of site į.
 - k. Playground area/sports/recreation
 - 1. Planned future renovations or replacement of facility
 - Parking on campus m.

- Impact of changes on diversity of school(s) and district
- p. Impact on community/neighborhood

- r. Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) accrediting standards
- s. The number of reassigned students in the school
- t. All special programs including but not limited to cluster, PEPPER, PLACE and magnet programs
- u. School concurrency Level of Service Standard
- v. Choice seats
- w. Flexible school day/week/month/year
- 10. As a result of this review process, the School Board will maximize the use of existing space throughout the District, not to exceed capacity equal to or greater than 110% of permanent capacity, through **boundary changes** in order to meet school concurrency.

As a **temporary** solution, the implementation of alternative enrollment options as identified by the Superintendent will be the sole discretion of the School Board to ease overcrowding until permanent capacity becomes available through the building of additional facilities on site, boundary change, or new schools. Options to be considered, but are not limited to, or required include:

- a. Utilization of existing relocatables at the site
- b. Enrollment capping (i.e. school will not accommodate any more students and new students are assigned to designated schools that are less crowded)
- c. Flexible school day/week/month/year
- d. Dual enrollment programs with institutions of higher learning
- e. Other school day/week/month/year models that may be identified through this process
- f. School-Within-A-School (F.S. 1003.02 (4)) such as co-teaching, floating teachers, and re-organization of groups of students.
- g. Choice seats
- h. Reconfigured grades/educational programs and sites, dependent on available capital funds to be provided by the school district and/or other individuals/groups/entities. The School Board maintains a district-wide elementary (K-5), middle (6-8) and high (9-12) school grade configuration philosophy.
- 11. The Area Superintendent in conjunction with the School Boundaries Department will make a recommendation to the Superintendent of Schools during the annual boundary process.
- 12. The Superintendent of Schools will make a recommendation to the School Board prior to the Public Hearings.

STANDARDS FOR THE CLOSING OF SCHOOLS

Schools should be considered for closing if they are consistently not educationally effective in relation to other schools in the district, using one or more of the following criteria:

- 1. The overall financial impact on the District, cost effectiveness, (including capital outlay), transportation requirements and enrollment projections for the affected geographical areas should be carefully considered as relevant factors.
- 2. The school's student enrollment is one of the lowest in the district and/or the population projections of the school's contiguous attendance area is predicted to continue declining.
- General condition of the building is poor and/or design is educationally obsolete and exceptionally large amounts of capital outlay are needed to continue the operation of the school.
- 4. A school will not be considered for closing if doing so would have an inequitable impact on groups as defined in the district's diversity definition.

Guidelines for the Development of Positive Alternatives to Keep Schools Open

1. School boundary conferences, established and facilitated by the impacted school principals in conjunction with the Area Offices and School Boundaries Department will identify under enrolled schools with the potential to increase their enrollment. Implementation plans in this regard will be developed by the Area Superintendents, designated principals, School Advisory Forums and School Advisory Councils.

Guidelines for Implementation

- 1. The School Boundaries Department in conjunction with Area Superintendents shall submit to the Superintendent of Schools a list of:
 - Schools with recommended boundary changes; a.
 - Schools or areas designated for new construction or building additions; h.
 - Schools subject to further review with recommendations for implementation of positive alternative c. strategies;
 - d. Schools that will be recommended for closing and/or consolidation;
 - And any other policy revisions necessary to ensure the implementation of this policy. e.
- 2. When recommendations have been made by the Superintendent of Schools to the School Board for a school closing or major boundary change, the Area Superintendents in conjunction with the School Boundaries Department and designated staff will meet with the school personnel, School Advisory Council, School Advisory Forum, PTA, PTO, parents of the students at the affected school(s), the Diversity Committee, local governments and other members of the community, for information on and preparation for the change.
- 3. When recommendations have been made for strategies to increase enrollment designated personnel will work with the staff and parents of that school to begin design and implementation of the plan to effect the same. The School Board shall designate a reasonable timeframe for implementation and results at the end of which the school will be reviewed.
- After final adoption of recommendations by the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools shall immediately 4. designate personnel (Area Superintendents) to plan with the parents, community and staff of the schools involved to ensure a smooth transition process during implementation of the recommendations.

Guidelines for the Use of Closed Schools

- 1. The Superintendent of Schools shall bring within a reasonable time, recommendations for disposal or alternative uses of schools closed by the School Board.
- 2. If the system has no further need for the facility, the School Board shall act in accordance with Chapter 1013.28 (1) Florida Statutes, after receiving recommendations for use from a task force of parents, citizens and the local government of the affected community.
- 3. School sites may not be reserved unless there is an anticipated need to activate the site in the future.

INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS/PARENT OPTIONS

The School Board of Broward County Public Schools is committed to providing quality educational opportunities for all students regardless of background characteristics by providing each student an educational environment that enhances that individual's educational success. The School Board is also committed to encouraging all parents to play an active role in their children's education and to increasing the educational options available to parents and students in the public schools. Finally, the School Board is committed to providing settings for education that promote understanding of diversity, tolerance and fair play, so that the positive tenets of a democratic society are reinforced by what students experience in schools. In Broward County Public Schools, diversity is a broad concept that includes gender, race, ethnicity, socioeconomic background, linguistic differences, exceptional abilities, variations of talents and abilities, and special needs. Throughout this Policy, wherever the word "parent(s)" appears, it shall also refer to "guardian(s)."

The School Board supports Innovative Programs/Parent Options as one tool for achieving these goals. First, the School Board believes that Innovative Programs/Parent Options should provide educational programs that promote educational excellence for all students. The Innovative Programs/Parent Options will offer students with different interests, talents and aptitudes, distinct choices that may enhance their educational success. Second, the School Board believes that Innovative Programs/Parent Options should be used to develop innovative instructional practices and promote systemic reform. Third, Innovative Programs/Parent Options is one tool for the promotion of diversity within schools, including, but not limited to, the prevention, reduction, or elimination of minority group isolation. In addition, Innovative Programs/Parent Options supports the District's goal to stabilize enrollment at selected schools. Innovative Programs/Parent Options are developed, established and maintained, dependent on the needs of the District as a whole, in meeting identified school district enrollment and diversity goals.

I. **DEFINITIONS**

Active Military Duty Personnel: Currently serving in any branch of the U.S. Armed Forces (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard).

Applicant: The parent/guardian of a natural, adopted, or foster, son, daughter, stepson, or stepdaughter living in the same household, who is currently applying to a requested school/program for the next school year.

Boundaried School: Except as otherwise allowed and approved by the appropriate process, all students residing within a particular attendance zone shall attend the assigned school for the zone of residence

Feeder Patterns: A feeder pattern is when students in one elementary school matriculate to the same middle school and/or students in one middle school matriculate to the same high school.

Full-Time Employee: Confirmed full-time School Board employee working at same school of his/her child.

Innovative Programs/Parent Options: Schools that provide unique or thematic instruction to attract and maintain home boundary student enrollment. Marketing will target students living with the home school boundary. Stabilization of enrollment will be from existing boundaries. Innovative Programs/Parent Options support unique or thematic instruction within matriculating feeder patterns. There is no application process for this program. Magnet Programs that no longer meet the criteria to stabilize enrollment from within the school's boundary will transition to an Innovative Program, continuing with the implementation of thematic instruction for students.

Magnet Schools: Magnet schools/programs provide an opportunity for under-enrolled schools to stabilize/increase student enrollment. Magnet schools offer specialized curriculums with an emphasis on instruction that includes a rigorously defined sequential course of study not offered at other schools and that are different from those offered in other schools throughout the school District. Magnet schools provide transportation within transportation zones for those students living more than two miles from the Magnet school. Magnet schools can be total-school or program-within-a-school. Students must meet criteria and apply within a designated timeframe to be considered for placement.

No Child Left Behind (NCLB Choice) Choice: Students are eligible for NCLB Choice when the Title I school that they attend has not made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP), as defined by the state, for three or more years. Any child attending such a school must be offered the option of transferring to another public school in the District with a grade C or higher or a Title I school not identified for school improvement. The District (subject to a spending cap in the legislation) must provide transportation to students who decide to change schools under this definition for those students living more than two miles from the receiving school. Students must apply within a designated timeframe to be considered for placement.

Nova Schools: An active learning community of all stakeholders established in which, kindergarten through twelfth grade, students receive a personalized, quality education. The Nova Schools are charged with researching, identifying, and implementing best practices in teaching literacy that promotes maximum student achievement. The Nova Schools will provide pre-service and in-service opportunities to teachers and prospective teachers in collaboration with the Education Consortium. Students must apply within a designated timeframe to be considered for placement.

Overcrowded School: Schools shall be deemed overcrowded when enrollment is greater than 100% of permanent Florida Inventory of School Houses (FISH) capacity and non-traditional classrooms are being utilized for their intended purpose (per Standards Information for Overcrowded Schools in Policy 5000, page four, item five).

Parent(s): Refers to either or both parents, any legal guardian of a student, any person in a legal parental relationship to a student, or any person exercising legal supervisory authority over a student in place of a parent.

Random Selection Process: A computerized student selection process through which student applications that meet the deadline are equally represented in a random pool of names from which applicants for each school are selected and assigned based on identified seats available.

Reassignments: An application for placement to attend a different school other than the boundaried school approved, based on capacity at the requested school or a compelling documented hardship. Students must apply within a designated timeframe to be considered for placement. There is no guarantee for a student to matriculate to the next school through the reassignment process.

School Boundaries: The geographic area that identifies public school assignments as annually approved by the School Board.

Sibling: A natural, adopted, or foster brother, sister, half-brother, half-sister, stepbrother, or stepsister living in the same household as a student who is currently attending a requested school and will continue to attend the requested school during the next school year.

Socioeconomic Status: May be determined by indicators including, but not limited to, participation in free/reduced lunch program.

Statement of Bona Fide Residence Form: Broward County Public School required form on which a parent can document primary place of residence to allow for immediate, temporary enrollment and provide the parent up to 30 calendar days to produce required documentation as stated in this Policy.

II. RULES

1. Eligibility

- **A. Magnet Schools -** All students that apply to an elementary Magnet School are eligible. Students that apply to a Magnet middle or high school must meet eligibility criteria. There are no eligibility criteria at the elementary level. At the secondary level, the only eligibility criteria shall be as follows:
- 1. For the *International Baccalaureate Program*, applicants must have FCAT SSS scores for reading and mathematics at or above level 4 and have a minimum 3.0 GPA or better in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics. For students who do not have FCAT scores, a nationally recognized norm-referenced standardized examination with scores of 90th percentile or above in reading and mathematics and have a minimum 3.0 GPA or better in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies and Mathematics.
- 2. For the *Science/Pre-Engineering Program* and *The Latin School*, applicants must have FCAT SSS scores for reading and mathematics at or above level 3 and have a minimum 3.0 GPA or better in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics. For students who do not have FCAT scores, a nationally recognized standardized norm-referenced examination with scores of 75th percentile or above in reading and mathematics and have a minimum 3.0 GPA or better in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies and Mathematics.
- 3. For *other secondary Magnet programs*, applicants either must have FCAT SSS scores for reading and mathematics at or above level 3 and have a minimum 2.0 GPA or better in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics. For students who do not have FCAT scores, a nationally recognized norm-referenced standardized examination with scores at the 50th percentile or above in reading and mathematics and have a minimum 2.0 GPA or better in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics.
- 4. The following eligibility criteria and procedures will be used for acceptance of English Language Learner (ELL) students and Exceptional Education Students (ESE other than Gifted) or other students who may not meet the established eligibility criteria:
 - a. For secondary applicants for whom FCAT SSS and/or norm-referenced standardized examination scores are unavailable, a student's portfolio demonstrating proficiency in reading or mathematics in English or the student's native language (for ELL student) and teacher recommendations may be utilized in place of examination scores and applicants must have a GPA at or above the required GPA in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies and Mathematics for specific Magnet programs. For ELL students who have recently arrived in the United States, grades earned in the home country while still in residence there can be used. Applicants who do not meet these eligibility criteria shall be apprised of the opportunity to be considered eligible based on special circumstances and to submit the information listed below to the Magnet

school for review by the Magnet Review Panel, which will be comprised of Magnet coordinators and other appropriate personnel, established and chaired by the Superintendent or his/her impartial designee. The application review process may take into consideration:

- i. the written recommendation of teachers and/or administrators
- ii. a written explanation of special circumstances indicating the student's ability to succeed in a Magnet program compiled by both the sending school and the receiving Magnet school
- iii. interview with the student, where appropriate
- iv. a student's portfolio demonstrating proficiency at the assigned grade level in reading and/or mathematics in English and/or the student's native language
- v. names of ELL and/or ESE applicants who meet the above eligibility criteria through the alternative process will be placed into the qualified applicant pool. Applicants will be placed in Magnet schools/programs according to procedures.
- vi. In the case of a child whose extraordinary and/or special needs require the development of an Individualized Educational Program ("IEP") or an Educational Plan ("EP"), attendance at a Magnet or Nova School must be consistent with his/her IEP/EP.
- 5. For the secondary Performing Arts Programs, auditions shall also be required (in addition to the criteria in Rule 1.A.3. above). Auditions shall be judged by a qualified, diverse panel of professionals.
- **B.** Innovative Programs/Parent Options All students attending a school where an innovative program has been established may have opportunity to participate in the program.
- **C. Nova Schools -** Any student residing in Broward County is eligible to apply. There are no academic eligibility criteria.
- **D.** Reassignments Any student attending a Broward County public school is eligible to request a reassignment to attend a school other than the boundaried school. There are no academic eligibility criteria.
- 1. A student must be registered at their assigned school to be considered for reassignment. Once a reassignment is granted, the student may remain at the reassigned school until he or she completes its highest grade, unless otherwise specified.
- 2. Commencing with the first day of the second semester, any student who moves out of the attendance area for his/her school shall be allowed, upon completion of the reassignment request form by parents to complete the second

semester in the school that the student has been attending. If the student wishes to continue at that school the following year, however, the student must obtain a reassignment pursuant to this Policy.

- 3. For schools which the School Board has approved a boundary change, and for first year implementation of the boundary change, students meeting the highest-grade criteria and entering grade 12 will receive an automatic approval with transportation. Students entering grade five (grade six for elementary schools with sixth grade) and grade eight will go through the reassignment process as space permits without transportation.
 - Athletic Eligibility In order to represent a school in any athletic a sport, a student must be a bona fide student of that school -- bona fide meaning, one is regularly enrolled and in regular attendance. In order to practice with a school on any athletic sports, a player must be a bona fide student of that school. A student shall be eligible in the school in which he or she first enrolls each school year, and makes him or herself a candidate for an athletic team by engaging in a practice prior to enrolling in any member school. The student shall be eligible in that school so long as he or she remains enrolled in that school and meets all other eligibility requirements (e.g. academic standing/GPA requirements/ residency). A student who transfers his/her attendance from one public school to another public school following his/her initial enrollment, or engagement in athletic practice, shall be ineligible to represent the new school he/she is attending for the duration of that school year. This rule shall not apply if the change of attendance from one school to another is accompanied by a corresponding change in residence on the part of the student's parent(s) or other individual with whom the student has lived continuously for a full calendar year, which makes it necessary for him/her to attend a different school. A student may file a waiver or hardship appeal with the Florida Activities Association regarding their athletic ineligibility.
- **E. NCLB Choice** Students who currently attend a Title I school that has not made AYP for three or more years, in accordance with federal and state guidelines, will be provided an opportunity to transfer to another school. There are no academic eligibility criteria.

2. Application Process

A. Magnet Schools - The Superintendent or his/her impartial designee shall make Magnet applications available at all schools and at the central office and shall mail Magnet brochures and applications to the parents of all K, 1, 2 and identified 5th and 8th grade students currently attending a Broward County Public School. All parents of students interested in applying for a Magnet school/program for the following school year must complete a written or online application and submit it between the first school day of December and a designated February date to the Innovative Programs office. The applicant must apply between the opening application day of school in December and a designated February date. Where there are more eligible students than available seats in a given grade level at a Magnet schools/programs, the District shall select

students for the grade level at the Magnet schools/programs by a random selection process as defined in the <u>DEFINITIONS</u> section of this Policy.

After the random selection process, a waiting list will be generated for each of the oversubscribed Magnet schools/programs. A student may hold a place on no more than one waiting list. The waiting lists will be maintained until the beginning of the second semester, and student vacancies will be filled until that time. Students on the waiting list who are offered assignments to a Magnet school/program must accept the assignment at the time given or relinquish their seat and apply for the next annual random selection process.

- **B.** Innovative Programs/Parent Options Seats available at an Innovative Programs/Parent Options School will be determined based on projected enrollment as compared with capacity at each school on an annual basis. If the District determines that there are seats available at an Innovative Programs/Parent Options School, parents will apply through the defined reassignment process.
- C. Nova Schools Applications for the following school year will be accepted from all students in the Broward County School system on an annual basis to the Innovative Programs office. Applications will be accepted from December first through a designated date in February. Where there are more applicants than available seats in a given grade level at a Nova School, the District shall select students for the grade level by a random selection process as defined in the <u>DEFINITIONS</u> section of this Policy.

The waiting list will be maintained until the beginning of the second semester, and student vacancies will be filled until that time. Students on the waiting list who are offered assignments to a Nova School must accept the assignment at the time given or relinquish their seat and apply for the next annual random selection process. Students admitted to the Nova Schools may remain in these schools as long as their parents/legal guardians are residents of Broward County and the student has not been withdrawn to attend another school, public or private.

D. Reassignments - The Superintendent (or his/her impartial designee) shall make reassignment applications available at all schools, at the Innovative Programs/Parent Options and NCLB Choice & Reassignment Departments, and via the browardschools.com website. Parents shall submit completed forms for a reassignment for the following school year to the NCLB Choice & Reassignment Department, between May 1 and June 15. No reassignment applications will be accepted after June 15. A reassignment shall be granted when it has been determined that the school has capacity based on historical enrollment trends and when any reassignment would not increase the school's enrollment beyond permanent capacity. On the application, parents/guardians will have an opportunity to site a bona fide academic programmatic requirement which may trigger an opportunity for the parent to share the student need with the Superintendent Hardship Committee if the program is not available at the home boundary school.

The Executive Director of Educational Programs (or designee) shall consider reassignments that are not submitted to the NCLB Choice & Reassignment Department, or via the browardschools.com website by the above deadline, only in cases of special needs.

The Executive Director of Educational Programs or designee shall review the circumstances of the application based upon the provisions of this Policy and render a decision if the applicant shall be granted an appeal hearing through the Superintendent Hardship Committee.

E. NCLB Choice - The application window for NCLB Choice occurs from the end of March after the conclusion of FCAT, through the end of April. The District will notify eligible parents at identified Title I schools about NCLB Choice in the spring of each year about the requirements under NCLB Choice for Title I schools that do not make AYP. NCLB Choice notification letters will be sent home with every child at the identified schools. NCLB Choice letters for incoming new grade levels to the schools (grade kindergarten for elementary schools and grade six for middle schools) are mailed directly to the homes. The NCLB Choice letters will provide general background information on AYP and NCLB Choice as well as Supplemental Educational Services (SES) options for students at identified schools that qualify for free or reduced lunch.

A post-AYP notification process will occur in the summer after the AYP results have been released by the state for any school that was not identified before the new AYP scores are released by the state. The District will notify parents in the summer of each year about the requirements under NCLB Choice for Title I schools that do not make AYP for the third year after the new scores have been released. Summer NCLB Choice letters are mailed to all eligible students. These letters will also provide general background information on AYP and NCLB Choice and SES options.

3. Assignment Priority

By January 15 of each year, the District will evaluate the extent to which the annual applicant pool for Nova and Magnet Schools reflects the geographic, gender, racial/ethnic, socioeconomic, linguistic and special needs diversity of the District as a whole. If any identifiable group of students in the annual applicant pool according to these criteria is under-represented, the District shall recruit additional Nova and Magnet applicants from the under-represented groups before the random selection process is implemented. Applicants that are assigned to an over-crowded school, whose enrollment exceeds 110% of the permanent capacity of the school, will be granted a priority for available seats. Priority for these applicants is defined as 25% of the available seats will be assigned to students attending over-crowded schools before a random selection process is employed for remaining available seats. Twenty-five percent (25%) of available seats will be awarded to students who are assigned to schools over 110% permanent capacity.

A. Magnet and Nova Schools - The following students have priority in the selection process prior to the random selection process:

- 1. Dependent children of active-duty military personnel (who otherwise meet the eligibility criteria for special academic programs such as advanced placement, dual enrollment and International Baccalaureate for Magnet Programs) shall be given first preference for admission to such programs, when an application is submitted by the published deadline even if the program is being offered through a public school other than the school to which the student would generally be assigned. F.S. 1003.05(3).
- 2. Elementary applicants who have a sibling currently attending a K-5 level Magnet school, who meet the application deadline and who will continue to attend the following year, will be placed in the same Magnet elementary school on a space-available basis prior to the random selection process.
- 3. Secondary applicants that have a sibling who will continue at the same Magnet (sibling must meet the eligibility criteria) school and who meet the application deadline will be placed in that school on a space-available basis prior to the random selection process.
- 4. Students presently in a Magnet program and wishing to continue in the same theme at the next level (e.g., middle, high) must apply between the first day of the application window in December and a designated February date. If the student meets the entrance criteria, he/she will be placed in the Magnet school on a space available basis prior to the random selection process.
- 5. A confirmed, permanent School Board employee, assigned a full-time work schedule at the requested school, may request through the application process that his/her student be placed in the Nova or Magnet School (secondary Magnet School applicants must meet criteria) on a space-available basis prior to the random selection process if the employee has met the application deadline.
- 6. Students selected to attend a Nova program will be given an opportunity to attend and remain in Nova K through grade 12.
- 7. Students who apply and meet the application deadline date for a Nova program, who have a documented sibling attending a Nova school and the sibling will continue to attend the following year, will be placed at a Nova school prior to the random selection process. Siblings that apply at the same time and do not have a sibling currently attending a Nova school will be given a priority if the other sibling is selected through the random selection process when a seat becomes available at the specific grade level.
- **B.** Reassignments In the case of a sibling applicant, a younger sibling will not be automatically approved to attend the same reassigned school of the older sibling(s). Hardship circumstances will be taken into consideration, dependent upon the capacity of the requested school. However, if the older sibling is in 5th, 8th, or 12th grade, the younger sibling may only be given a one-year reassignment.

C. NCLB Choice - NCLB Choice is given to all eligible students attending a Title I school not making AYP for three or more years that complete an NCLB Choice application and submit it by the designated deadline. If the demand for NCLB Choice exceeds available funds (as set annually by the state), priority will be given to the lowest achieving students that applied and met deadline. Priority factor for identifying lowest achieving students include FCAT level 1 or 2. If prioritization is required, those students that meet the prioritization requirements will be provided transportation. All students that submitted their NCLB Choice application within the application window will be given an assignment, however transportation will be given to those meeting the priority factor of FCAT level 1 or 2 prior to other students eligible for NCLB Choice dependent on the funding (set-aside required by the state).

4. Transportation

- A. Magnet Schools The School Board shall provide transportation to all students in out-of-boundary Magnet programs who reside more than two miles from the Magnet school/program as determined by the established Magnet transportation zone and for elementary students residing within two miles who face hazardous walking conditions. The parent understands that the child is subject to the Student Code of Conduct while on the bus. Where economically feasible, the School Board shall also provide activity buses to and from Magnet secondary schools/programs to enable students to participate in extracurricular activities offered at the Magnet school/program which they attend.
- **B.** Innovative Programs/Parent Options Transportation is not provided for students that live outside the designated school boundary. (Refer to reassignment transportation language 4.D in this Policy.)
- C. Nova Schools Transportation is provided for all Nova students that reside more than two miles from the assigned Nova school.
- **D.** Reassignments For all reassignment approvals, parents will be notified that they must assume responsibility for transportation, attendance, and behavior of the student, and that failure to do so will result in a rescission of the reassignment. The District is not obligated to provide transportation for reassigned students. It is the parent's responsibility to provide transportation to the reassigned school. Parents can request, via their requested school, a seat on the school bus through the "empty seat Policy." However, a seat is not guaranteed. A reassignment at one school level does not guarantee the approval of a reassignment at the next school level.
- **E. NCLB Choice** Transportation is provided for all students opting to participate in NCLB Choice. If the demand for NCLB Choice with transportation exceeds available funds, priority will be given to the lowest achieving students. The priority factor for identifying lowest achieving students is FCAT level 1 or 2. If prioritization is required, those students that meet the prioritization requirements will be given a school with transportation.

5. Appeals/Hardships

A. Magnet and Nova

- 1. If a parent believes that any of the procedures listed in this Policy have been violated, he/she may appeal in writing to the Superintendent or his/her impartial designee. An appeal to the Superintendent must be received in the Innovative Programs/Parent Options' office no later than fifteen (15) calendar days from the date of the alleged violation of the procedure. The Superintendent shall select an impartial designee to hear the appeal.
- 2. Applicants who do not meet the Magnet eligibility criteria shall be apprised of the opportunity to be considered eligible based on special circumstances and to submit the information listed below to the Innovative Programs office. The Magnet Review Panel comprised of Magnet coordinators and other appropriate personnel, established and chaired by the Superintendent or his/her impartial designee. The Magnet Review Panel will notify the parent when the review will take place and inform the parent of the final decision. The application review process may take into consideration:
 - a. the written recommendation of teachers and/or administrators
 - b. a written explanation of special circumstances indicating the student's ability to succeed in a Magnet program compiled by both the sending school and the receiving Magnet school
 - c. interview with the student, where appropriate
 - d. a student's portfolio demonstrating proficiency at the assigned grade level in reading and/or mathematics in English and/or the student's native language.
- **B.** Innovative Programs/Parent Options All hardship requests will follow the reassignment process for appeals. Refer to reassignment language 5.C. in this Policy. The provision in paragraph 5.C., shall govern all language in this Policy.
- C. Reassignments A parent may apply and submit his/her student's application to the Innovative Programs office for a hardship appeal for denial of a reassignment under one of the circumstances listed below. Upon receipt of a reassignment denial letter, a parent has 15 calendar days in which to apply for a hardship appeal describing the hardship with documentation of such attached. The letter must be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days of receipt of denial letter for the family to be eligible for a scheduled hardship committee hearing. The Superintendent's Hardship Committee shall hear the appeal and timely notify the parents of the outcome. This constitutes the final administrative decision.

Hardship may include:

- 1. unique circumstances for a particular family as determined by the Superintendent's Hardship Committee;
- 2. documented ongoing medical, or psychological reason, confirmed by school staff and medical professional;
- 3. highest grade situation student who is entering or currently in the highest grade in a school he/she has been attending and wishes to remain at that school to complete that level with his/her class;

- 4. mobility related to students in the foster care system and homelessness; and.
- 5. documented, bona fide programmatic situation.
- **D. NCLB Choice** A parent of an eligible NCLB Choice student may request an appeal to the outcome of the NCLB Choice process by calling the NCLB Choice & Reassignments Office by no later than 10 calendar days beyond the application due date. A Documented Challenges Committee will review all documents on a weekly basis and provide notification of the outcome to the parent's appeal within 48 hours of the documented challenges meeting. A parent may request an appeal for the following circumstances:
- 1. incorrect address in the student information system must be corrected by parent at boundary Title I school and student information systems updated before parent is eligible for an appeal;
- 2. sibling (not guaranteed under NCLB Choice Act);
- 3. medical (documented).

6. Withdrawals

A. Magnet

- 1. Elementary Magnet School placement is in effect through the remainder of the grades in the receiving school unless rescinded by the affected area superintendent or by the School Board. Elementary Magnet school placement may be rescinded after documented interventions have been attempted at any time during the school year by the affected Area Office for repeated violations of the Code of Student Conduct guidelines including poor attendance, excessive tardiness, or inappropriate behavior, and failure to follow school procedures. When students do not follow the rules and expectations outlined in the Code of Student Conduct may be taken until the problem is resolved.
- 2. If an elementary student moves out of the Magnet "transportation zone," the student may remain in the Magnet school through the remainder of the grades if the parent provides transportation.
- 3. If an elementary student moves out of the boundary of the elementary Magnet school but still resides within the Magnet transportation zone, the student may remain enrolled at the Magnet elementary school utilizing existing transportation.
- 4. If a Magnet student moves out of a Magnet transportation zone into another Magnet transportation zone in which the SAME THEME Magnet program is available, the Magnet student will have priority for a seat. This does not apply to students changing school level.
- 5. At the secondary level, students admitted to the Magnet schools/programs may remain in these schools/programs as long as their parents are residents of Broward County, the student has not been withdrawn to attend another school, public or private, and the student maintains a 2.5 GPA.

- a. Any secondary Magnet student who is experiencing difficulty maintaining a 2.5 GPA shall have documented opportunity to receive appropriate counseling and assistance at his/her Magnet school/program. However, if a student fails to maintain a 2.5 GPA for two consecutive semesters or one full school year (dependent upon the school's schedule), with documented interventions, he/she will be ineligible to continue in the Magnet program and will be assigned to his/her home school, based on approved school boundaries.
 - i. Whereas a secondary Magnet school/program is identified as under-enrolled, the administration at that secondary Magnet school/program may opt to extend the timeframe of the documented interventions for a student in the event that removal of that student would increase a declining enrollment trend at the school.
- 6. Requests for withdrawal must be filed with the Principal of the school and the Director of Innovative Programs/Parent Options. Withdrawals for the purpose of the relocation of the student's parents/legal guardians outside of Broward County or to allow a student to enter a private school shall be granted at any time. Withdrawals for the purpose of attending the affected student's regularly assigned public school, based on approved boundaries, shall be granted at any time.
- 7. A student who withdraws from a Magnet school/program must reapply for admission according to the provision of this Policy.
- 8. Any request for temporary leave from a Magnet school/program must be approved by the Principal and Director of Innovative Programs/Parent Options before the student is withdrawn. A leave of absence from the Magnet school/program shall be considered in the following situations:
 - a. A student may be granted a leave of absence from the Magnet school/program for the period of time necessary to complete any of the following programs or hospital stays: being a patient in a hospital for an extended period of time; being enrolled in the Board's Hospital Homebound Program; acceptance into a Board approved Alternative Education Program or other exceptional education programs; enrollment in a licensed, full-time substance abuse treatment program; or participation as an exchange student.
 - b. If a family or student is moving out of Broward County temporarily, a leave of absence may be granted for a maximum of one (1) year.
- **B.** Innovative Programs/Parent Options Defined as a reassignment if the student attends from beyond identified school boundary. The provision in paragraph 5.C., shall govern all withdrawals under this Policy.

C. Nova Schools -

- 1. Nova school placement may be rescinded by the affected Area Office after documented interventions have been attempted at any time during the school year for repeated violations of the Code of Student Conduct guidelines including poor attendance, excessive tardiness, or inappropriate behavior, and failure to follow school procedures. When students do not follow the rules and expectations outlined in the Code of Student Conduct, one or more of the actions under the procedures in the Code of Student Conduct may be taken until the problem is resolved.
- 2. Requests for withdrawal must be filed with the Principal of the school and the Director of Innovative Programs/Parent Options. Withdrawals for the purpose of the relocation of the student's parents/legal guardians outside of Broward County or to allow a student to enter a private school shall be granted at any time.

Withdrawals for the purpose of attending the affected student's regularly assigned public school, based on approved boundaries, shall be granted at any time.

- 3. Any request for temporary leave from the Nova Schools must be approved by the Principal and the Director of Innovative Programs/Parent Options before the student is withdrawn. A leave of absence from the Nova Schools shall be considered in the following situations:
 - a. A student may be granted a leave of absence from the Nova Schools for the period of time necessary to complete any of the following programs or hospital stays: being a patient in a hospital for an extended period of time; being enrolled in the Board's Hospital Homebound Program; acceptance into a Board approved Alternative Education Program or other exceptional education programs; enrollment in a licensed, full-time substance abuse treatment program; or participation as an exchange student.
 - b. If a family or student is moving out of Broward County temporarily, a leave of absence may be granted for a maximum of one (1) year.
- 4. A student who withdraws from the Nova Schools must reapply for admission according to the provisions of this Policy, with no preferential treatment given for re-admission.

D. Reassignments -

- 1. Withdrawals for the purpose of the relocation of the student's parents/legal guardians outside of Broward County or to allow a student to enter a private school shall be granted at any time. Withdrawals for the purpose of attending the affected student's regularly assigned public school, based on approved boundaries, shall be granted at any time.
- 2. Granted reassignments may be rescinded at any time during the school year by the affected Area Office for violations of the Code of Student Conduct

Guidelines. Whenever possible, the student will be returned to the assigned boundaried school during a scheduled break in the school year, such as at the end of the quarter or semester. When students do not follow the rules and expectations outlined in the Code of Student Conduct, one or more of the actions under the procedures in the Code of Student Conduct may be taken until the problem is resolved.

E. NCLB Choice - Withdrawals for the purpose of the relocation of the student's parents/legal guardians outside of Broward County or to allow a student to enter a private school shall be granted at any time. Withdrawals for the purpose of attending the affected student's regularly assigned public school, based on approved boundaries, shall be granted at any time.

7. Monitoring and Reporting

After the 20th day enrollment count each school year, the School Boundary Department, in conjunction with the Innovative Programs/Parent Options Department, will report the impact of the student enrollment. This report shall include:

- **A.** the number and characteristics of students who submitted a completed application, registered and attends the school;
- **B.** data reflecting the reasons for which applications were granted or denied District-wide:
- C. the impact of the assignments that enrolled on the capacity and the diversity of each school;
- **D.** Planning tool;
- **E.** in November, seats available at any Broward County Public School will be annually reviewed for enrollment/program needs and included in the school boundary recommendation process; and
- **F.** any recommendations regarding modifications to this Policy or it rules.
