What is the Boundary Process?

- Florida statutes 1001.41 and 1001.42 give School Boards the power and duty of assigning students to schools
- To equitably serve our large student population while complying with local policy Second Amended Inter-local Agreement (ILA)which is a requirement for financial viability in the District's 5year capital plan (DEFP) and state mandated Class Size Reduction it is necessary to review schools' geographic attendance areas on an annual basis for potential changes
- During this review communities have several opportunities to provide input on all school attendance areas
- The process concludes when the School Board votes to adopt the school boundaries for the following school year



Review of the 2017/18 Boundary Process

- School Boundary Committee representing 23 of 28 I-Zones brought forward by SAF's and appointed to Area Advisory
- Community members worked with Demographics & Student Assignments (DSA) staff to create proposals
- Boundary change proposers presented their maps at a District-wide public School Boundary Committee meeting
- School Boundary Committee met and deliberated on proposals to make a recommendation to the School Board
- School Board members discussed proposals at a School Board workshop
- The Superintendent released a memo with his final boundary recommendations including four changes
- School Board members voted at two public hearings to adopt the a boundary change involving three elementary schools, and the implementation of a 6th-12th grade collegiate academy at an existing middle school



Successes and Challenges with the 2017/18 School Boundary Process

Successes

- 1. Quorum reached and maintained at every meeting
- 2. School Board adopted two of the SBC's recommendations

Challenges

- 1. Only 23 of 28 I-Zones represented
- 2. School Boundary Committee selection process
- 3. I-Zones without proposals are less engaged
- 4. Only 14 I-Zones attended both mandatory meetings



Optional Boundary Processes

- 1. I-Zone School Boundary Committee
- 2. Stakeholder School Boundary Committee
- 3. No School Boundary Committee

All 3 process options have an additional School Board Workshop in October for review of all boundary proposals.

All 3 process options allow for community members to submit boundary change proposals.



2018/19 School Boundary Process Option 1: I-Zone Boundary Committee Current process + October School Board Workshop

- Process used since 2014/15 Boundary Process
- A Committee representing each of the 28 I-Zones, identified by SAFs and Area Advisories votes on boundary proposals to make a recommendation to the Board

Pros	Cons
1. Districtwide perspective	 SAF's don't meet until September
2. Committee pre-vets proposals	2. Process for selecting reps when there are multiple candidates (quorum at AA, etc.)
3. Reduces community conflict	3. Lack of engagement

- Each community impacted by a potential change has its own School Boundary Committee

1. High level of engagement	1. Potential for community infighting
Represents different viewpoints within an impacted community	2. Local focus/ perspective only
3. Members selected after October workshop	3. Potential for many meetings

- No School Boundary Committee
- Staff collects input directly from impacted communities and shares with the Board

Pros	Cons
 Proposals not filtered by committee before Board consideration 	1. No committee recommendation
2. Simplified process	2. "Top down" perception
3. Allows for consideration of larger scale or interconnected changes	3. No direct representation

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Schools to Monitor

- Schools projected to exceed gross capacity within 3-4 year phase-in period
- Potential for non-boundary solutions
 - 1. Pioneer Middle
 - 2. Westglades Middle
 - 3. Stoneman Douglas High
- Not projected for 2018/19 boundary change



Monitor School Enrollment

Continue to watch enrollment through best practices

- Communicate with any school approaching capacity
- Conduct review of all programs at identified schools approaching capacity
- 3. Limit new reassignments and phase-out reassignments at schools approaching capacity
- 4. Perform on-site capacity usage analysis through school walk-through
- 5. Consider other SB Policy 5000 Options, such as school-within-a-school, co-teaching, floating teachers, etc.
- 6. Address verification, government database review, and potential use of private investigator

- 27 relocatables on the site, 13 are vacant
- Per Physical Plant Operations, units are satisfactory and available for use in August 2018
- Planning move for current occupants
- Facility review completed
- Planning for new enrollment
- Furniture and fixture review pending
- Internet access and connectivity to main campus review pending
- Upon School Board directive to change the use of Pioneer Portable Annex from Administrative to Educational use, a Spot Survey will be submitted to the Florida Department of Education for amendment of the Plant Survey
- Possible 5th grade annex



Alternate Opportunities in SB Policy 5000

- Alternate calendar
- Grade reconfiguration
- School-within-a-School (FS 1003.02 (4)) including floating teachers, co-teaching, reorg of groups of students
- Enrollment capping
- Choice seats
- Portable movement



Prek ESE Space Planning

- PK ESE will communicate with Demographics & Student Assignments (DSA) on available space to determine potential placement for PK ESE programs in the area being targeted.
- Having received the information from DSA, PK ESE will communicate with Transportation to determine which of the DSA recommendations are viable in terms of cost and travel time for PK students.
- PK ESE will communicate with OSPA and identified principals
- Current students with disabilities will remain at their current school until they age out of preschool.
- Preschool students with disabilities, who will turn three on or after September 2, 2017 and who are eligible for the type of ESE services provided in one of the preschool classes being discontinued at their current school, will be assigned at a preschool program that is not at or over capacity within the boundary of or near their home school, even if their boundaried school is their current school.
- The number and type of preschool classrooms will be determined based on staffing needs and projected growth.



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Accepting 2018/19 Community Boundary Proposals

- Community boundary proposals will be accepted from May 31, 2017 to September 29, 2017
- Based on School Board approved school boundary process timeline
