Choice #2: | WILL **NOT** permit my child to photographed, videotaped, and/or interviewed for school publications, such school yearbooks, school newspapers, class pictures, school and/or District websites, social media, BECON TV or for other communication tools by Broward County Public Schools or its approved vendors.

The Media Release Form is required for students to be recognized at our Quarterly Honor Roll and/ or Perfect Attendance Award Assemblies. Parents and community members attending take photos with their phones showcasing their child's accomplishments. These photos of their child are then shared with their family and friends on Facebook and other social media networks.

### Traffic and Parking Safety Alert

Please help us make car rider morning drop off and afternoon pick up run more smoothly. Drivers are asked to please review and adhere to the following information.

#### Tips for the morning/arrival:

- Pull all the way forward to the stop sign, leaving no gaps (except for the crosswalks).
- NEVER allow a student to exit the car from the driver's side. The oncoming traffic in the pass -through lane (if open) is a hazard.
- Stay in your vehicle at all times.
   If you need to help your student with anything please park in a designated parking space as to not impede traffic. Please be sure hugs, kisses, paperwork signing, hair brushing, etc. are done prior to entering car line.
- Pay attention for pedestrians in the cross walks.
- Additionally, pedestrians are asked to not step out into traffic.
- NEVER move the safety cones or drive around them, on them or over them! The pass-through lane may be congested in the morning so be sure to arrive

before 7:40am for conferences.

#### Tips for the afternoon/dismissal:

- Please place the name hanger on your rearview mirror. Staff members will call for your child.
- Pull all the way forward, leaving no gaps (except for the crosswalks)
- Do not stop at the grade level groups, your student will come to your car.
- NEVER allow a student to enter the car from the driver's side. The oncoming traffic in the pass -through lane is a hazard.
- Stay in your vehicle at all times.
  Continue pulling forward until
  your student comes to you. Do
  not exit to look for your student
  unless you are in a dedicated
  parking space.
- If your student needs extra assistance loading, please pull into a designated parking space and your child will be brought to you.
- Pay attention to the staff members' instructions.
- Pedestrians are asked to not step out into traffic.
- NEVER move the safety cones

or drive through them, on them or over them!

 Please ONLY park in dedicated parking spaces (do NOT park in handicap spaces without proper authorization). There is NEVER parking in the pass-through lane. Most importantly NEVER use your cell phone at any point in the car line!

#### Tips for parking:

- When extra parking is needed for special events, the gates at the corner of Douglas Rd. and Sheridan Street will be opened.
- NEVER park in a handicap space without proper authorization and hanging tag.
- NEVER park in the pass-through lane or exit the vehicle in the pass-through lane to pick up your student. If everyone works together during the morning and afternoon rush, our students will be safer and the car line will operate more quickly.

#### Illnesses

Please remember to keep your student home if he/she is ill. Sick students can easily infect others. If a child becomes ill at school, and after a period of rest in the clinic, cannot return to class, you will be notified to pick up your student.

Children cannot remain at school when ill. Any student having or suspected of having a communicable disease will not be permitted to attend school. Any student returning to school after having a communicable disease must provide a doctor's note indicating that return to school is safe.

### Lack Of Sleep = Lack Of Learning!

According to the National Sleep Foundation, children ages 5-10 should sleep 10-11 hours per night. "Reducing the amount of hours a child sleeps manifests itself in the child becoming wired and hyper-excitable - exhibiting behavior similar to children with "attention deficit disorder", says David Gozal, Director of Pediatric Sleep Program at the University of Louisville in Kentucky. Kids emotions may become erratic", says Gozal, "and they may be less apt to listen or pay attention."

Researchers at the University Of Montreal report that a study of children showed that those who slept significantly fewer hours than the recommended 10 hours were more hyperactive and impulsive.

#### Strategies for Reading Fluency

Fluency is defined as the ability to read with speed, accuracy, and proper expression. In order to understand what they read, children must be able to read fluently whether they are reading aloud or silently. When reading aloud, fluent readers read in phrases and add intonation appropriately.

- Record your child reading aloud on their own.
- Ask your child to use a ruler or finger to follow along. Decoding is easier when they don't lose their place as they move across a page.
- Have them read the same thing several times. When you're trying to improve fluency, it helps to see the same text multiple times.
- Practice any sight words given by their teacher.
- Make use of a variety of books and materials.

Guide your child to help them establish a steady pace.

### Math: Mrs. Balboa, Math Coach

#### Strategies to Increase Math Fluency

Math fluency is about understanding mathematical concepts to the point of feeling confident in completing math processes and solving problems.

#### I. Good old-fashioned practice

It's important to reinforce math facts with consistent practice through lessons at home and in school.

Practicing math at the grocery store while buying items

- Using fractions while cooking or baking at home
- Keeping math manipulatives on hand and engaging during playtime
   Play family games that include math

#### 2. Flex and hone mental math skills

Ask math questions and problems aloud. Reflex Math Flash cards

#### 3. Offer variety

Kids should experience math and solve problems in a variety of ways to learn math inside-out.

#### 4. Make it fun!

When students are having fun while learning, they tend to gain a better appreciation Make it a competition! Use card games, dice or dominos to create new and engaging games to play with your child.

### Pre-Kindergarten

We are in the beautiful season of Fall and the Pre-K, VPK, and AM/PM students are adjusting well as we have returned to face-to-face instruction. Our print rich classrooms are exposing our students to different concepts that will continue to build academic and developmental skills. Additionally, we are learning about ourselves, our classmates, and our PLE Community. Our classrooms are taking the term "Teaching" to new levels. Students are being exposed to Math, Reading, Social and Independent skill concepts. Thank you all for your continued support and cooperation; together we will continue to have a fantastic year.

### Kindergarten

We are thankful to be in Kindergarten! This month we will be learning about maps and directions, Pilgrims and Native Americans, and stories about Thanksgiving. Students will be able to identify the topic and details for informational text. The students will also be identifying characters, setting, and important events in the stories we read. In Math, we are exploring numbers 6-10, counting, writing, and comparing numbers. We are looking forward to another spectacular month in Kindergarten!

#### First Grade

First grade continues to be off to a great start with our e-learning platform, even with everything that is going on we can't wait for what's ahead. Thank you for your help and flexibility during this difficult time. We hope that you are as safe and as healthy as possible! Please be on the lookout for information pertaining to the e-learning upcoming school meetings and/or events/holidays that are around the corner. If you would love to donate extra supplies to our classrooms, please send them in with your child. If you have any questions and/or concerns, please contact your child's teacher.

\*\*Friendly Reminders\*\* Please read every night for at least 10-15 minutes with your child. Please go through each subject area module and assist your child with completing his/her assignments that are due throughout the week. Log onto I-ready, Study Island, Teach Your Monster to Read, Epic Books, and Reflex Math following the independent schedule outlined by your child's teacher. Password information has been emailed/sent through Class Dojo or Canvas inbox. School begins promptly at 8:10 a.m., please make sure your child arrives on time, has a fully charged laptop with their charger, or that they are logging in daily as per our schedule. As always, we are here to help and support you!

**Reading:** Students will be identifying the topic of and relevant details within a text. They also will be reviewing who is telling the story at various sections within a text and what the story is mainly about, what problems did the characters have, and how the characters solve the problem.

**Writing:** When writing students are encouraged to remember to practice capitalizing dates and names of people and places. They are encouraged to use the correct punctuation at the end of each sentence. Students will **write opinion** pieces on topics or texts, supporting a point of view with reasons and information. (Which pet is the best and why).

**Math:** Students will continue practicing their math strategies. They will be able to find missing numbers, work on addition and subtraction facts within 20, and solve basic word problems while using numbers 1-20. Please work with your child on their addition and subtraction math facts (3,4,7), (3+4=7) up to 20. (18+2=20, 19+1=20).

**Science:** Our marvelous scientists will be sorting objects by observable properties, such as size, shape, color, temperature (hot and cold), weight (heavy and light), texture, and whether objects sink or float. Students will learn that the motion of objects can be changed by forces.

**Social Studies:** Students will understand history tells the story of people and events of other times and places. Students will distinguish between historical facts and fiction using various materials. (Tall tales, fables, and non-fiction) (text features, differences between fiction and non-fiction). Students will review that money is a method of exchanging goods and services.

#### Second Grade

**Reading:** Students will learn about the Main Topic, Connection between Historical Events, Scientific Ideas, and the Main Purpose of text. They will determine if the author answers a question, explains, or describes an idea. Continue to ask and answer questions as you read to your child and focus on new vocabulary words. Ask your child about what they are reading in class and discuss the stories at home. Utilize Study Island and I-Ready at home for reading practice.

**Math:** In math we will be learning how to add 3-digit numbers. As students work check how they are solving math problems to avoid math misconceptions, show your work. Students can utilize ReFlex Math at home 5 times a week for practice. We are finding that they are not fluent in their addition and subtraction facts. Also utilize Study Island and I-ready. Math practice skills are vital to increase math fluency!

**Science:** Our young scientists will be learning all about Earth and Space Science. We will discover rocks and minerals along with Earth Systems and their patterns which includes weather.

#### \*\*IMPORTANT MESSAGE\*\*

**Homework:** Find a quiet place at home for your child to do their homework, make it special. We are finding that many students are NOT completing these assignments. Homework is included in the Canvas course. Homework is key to practicing skills learned at school. Students should also be reading at home nightly to increase fluency, stamina and speed. Research shows that students that read for at least 20 minutes nightly increase test scores.

**Field Trip:** Students will participate in a **virtual** SEAS, online field trip entitled, "Numbers Don't Lie." This field trip will take place on November 18<sup>th</sup>.

#### Third Grade

Third Grade students are engaged and adjusting to our new learning circumstances! Covid-19 procedures has made us more aware of our environment and how we care for ourselves and others. Our new way of interacting with our peers and teachers has helped us to be creative in connecting while keeping a safe distance. We miss hugging and playing the way we used to but this new way of being in school has helped us to grow in our humanity!

Academically, we are working on our Reading Comprehension, Writing, Critical Thinking and Problem-solving Skills. Our teachers have spent hours planning and teaching us strategies to learn and retain information. Our science and social studies topics are challenging but exciting! We enjoyed learning about Lantin America culture and the contributions of famous Lantin Americans. Our parents can help us by listening to us read for 20 minutes each night before bed and asking us questions about what we are reading, a quiet place to do homework and study, and limits on screen time.

#### Fourth Grade

Our fourth graders are working diligently as we continue eLearning home or on campus. In Mathematics, our students are practicing strategies to solve multiplication problems (Area Model, Partial Product, Distributive Property, and Standard Algorithm). The students are also working on multi-step mathematical problems and learning to explain the reasoning behind it. Please continue to encourage your child to practice their multiplication facts nightly.

In Reading, students are immersed in reading complex texts. We will continue uncovering the meaning of unknown words and phrases. We are also reviewing poems, drama and prose. Students should be able to compose thoughtful written responses using evidence from the text. They are learning the RACES (Restate, Answer, Cite, Explain, Elaborate, and Sum it up) strategy along the way.

In Writing, we are starting Informative Essay writing. Our students are learning to write an essay with an introduction, body paragraphs, as well as a conclusion. The goal is for our fourth graders to understand the purpose of the prompt, stay focused, and organized during writing, using textual evidence to support the main idea, and making sure to incorporate text-to-text, text-to-self, and/or text-to-world connections. Thank you again to our phenomenal fourth grade parents for your continuous partnership.

#### Fifth Grade

All students have a very firm understanding of how to navigate Canvas, Teams, and all online resources used in their classroom; as well as, the expectations to complete assignments and quizzes. It is imperative that students keep up with their work by checking "Course Progress" on Canvas and checking grades through the Pinnacle icon on Clever.

Reading: We currently are focusing on identifying the main idea in informational texts and using multiple sources to locate and gather information on similar topics. We will also focus on theme, literary structure, and point of view in literature. Students will be reading novels and/or short stories and completing research projects. Students should also be completing a total of 45 minutes of Reading on iReady every week. Please encourage your child to use this resource daily!

Writing: Students continue to grow their knowledge of essay writing – focusing on writing informational or explanatory essays about a given prompt.

Math: Our focus is on decimals – adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing. Students should be keeping up with their daily work on Canvas; as well as, daily homework from their Student Books. In addition, please ensure that your child is completing 45 minutes of iReady weekly and working in his or her math facts through Reflex Math.

Science: November's focus is on Life Science. We will cover the topics of changing environment, animal adaptations, human and animal interdependence and consumers and producers.

### Special Programs

Happy Fall! We would like to say thank you to all of our parents for their hard work and patience when it comes to e-learning and the beginning of our face to face instruction. Here are some tips for getting students engaged:

- 1. Make learning fun.
- 2. Provide your child with reinforcers throughout the day.
- 3. Take breaks as needed.
- 4. Use first-then boards and other visuals.

Remember to take baby steps and know that each step in the right direction is a success!

### Physical Education, Dr. Mobley-Bellinger

The K-2 students have been diligently working on locomotor and non-locomotor skills. Locomotor skills move the body from one place to another in a vertical plane and help develop bodily control. Examples: Walking, running, leaping, jumping, hopping, galloping, sliding, & skipping. These skills are used to create routines and games. Non-locomotor skills are body movements without travel, such as bending, swaying, twisting, turning, or wiggling.

The 3-5 students have focused on the Health-Related Fitness Components. The five components are (1) cardiovascular endurance, (2) flexibility, (3) muscular endurance, (4) muscular strength, and (5) body composition. Students have learned the difference between the components and that it is important to achieve an adequate level of fitness in all five categories to maintain good health. In class the students practiced exercise examples for each component.

I encourage all parents to motivate your kids to be active. To go a step further, participate in physical activities with them. Below is a list of suggestions for keeping your children physically active:

- I. Focus on fun. Help your child find activities he enjoys doing.
- 2. Limit screen time.
- 3. Make fitness a personal priority.
- 4. Go outside.
- 5. Get active as a family.
- 6. Ride a bike, walk, or run (don't drive).
- 7. Give kids chores.

### S.T.E.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math): Ms. Organo

Welcome to STEM at Pasadena Lakes Elementary School. As we are teaching in the eLearning Model at this time, the students are learning how to navigate the STEM Canvas Course successfully. The students will be observing and actively asking questions and answering to better understand all in-class demonstrations. Primary students will be learning some of physical properties of matter, science tools and how to use the tools successfully.

**<u>PreK-1</u>**: The students learn physical properties of matter, such as color, shape and size. They are learning how to use three science tools, observe objects, and learn that heavy objects sink and lighter objects float.

<u>Grades 2<sup>nd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup>:</u> The students will be learning on the STEM Canvas Course, science critical thinking skills, question eliminations, and how to understand science models.


